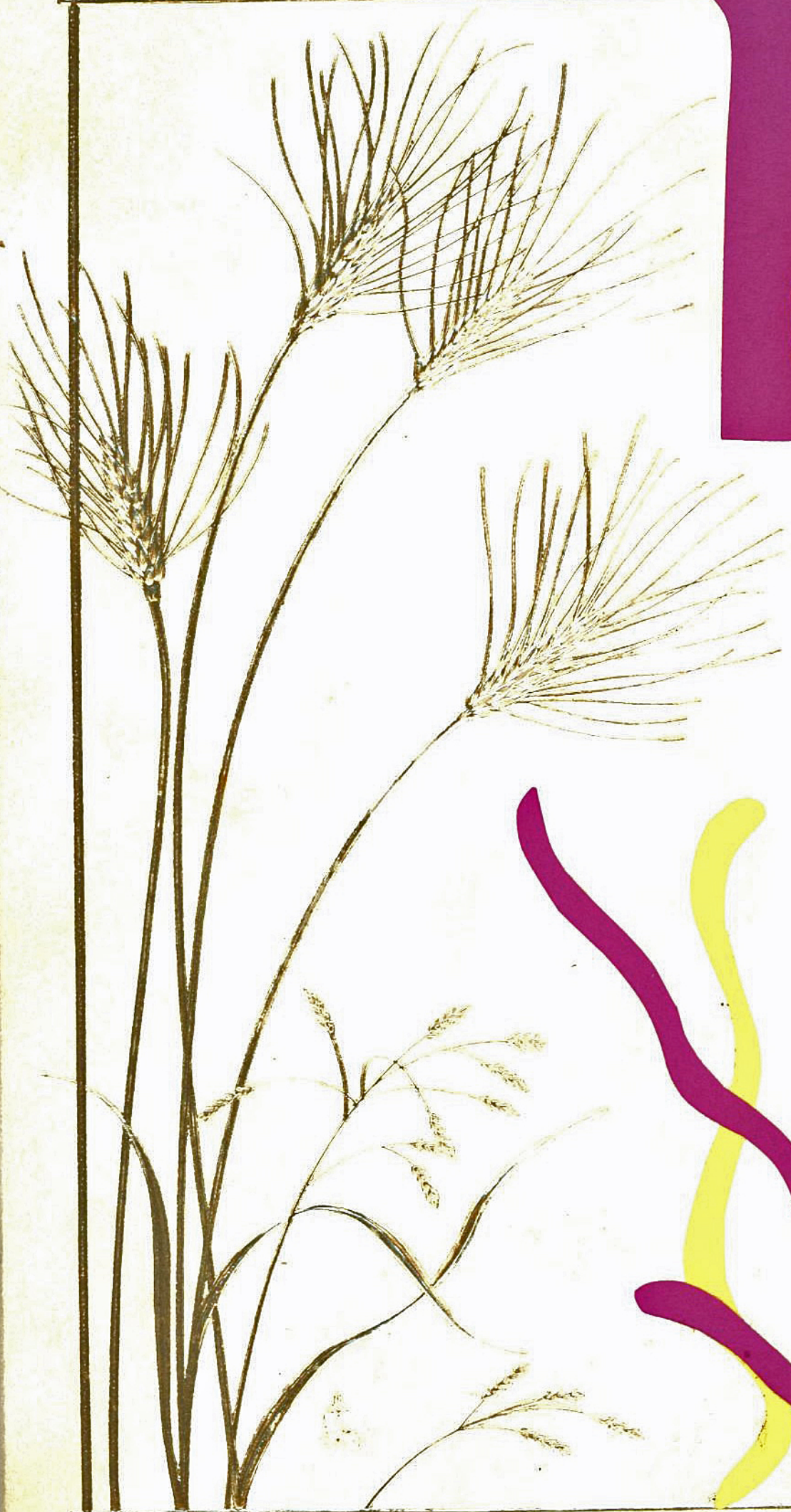

Members of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club have elected a new slate of officers to lead the group through its 23rd year.

According to Mrs. Hatfield, members of the club are busy planning upcoming projects including the fourth annual political forum and barbecue which will be held prior to the August primary.

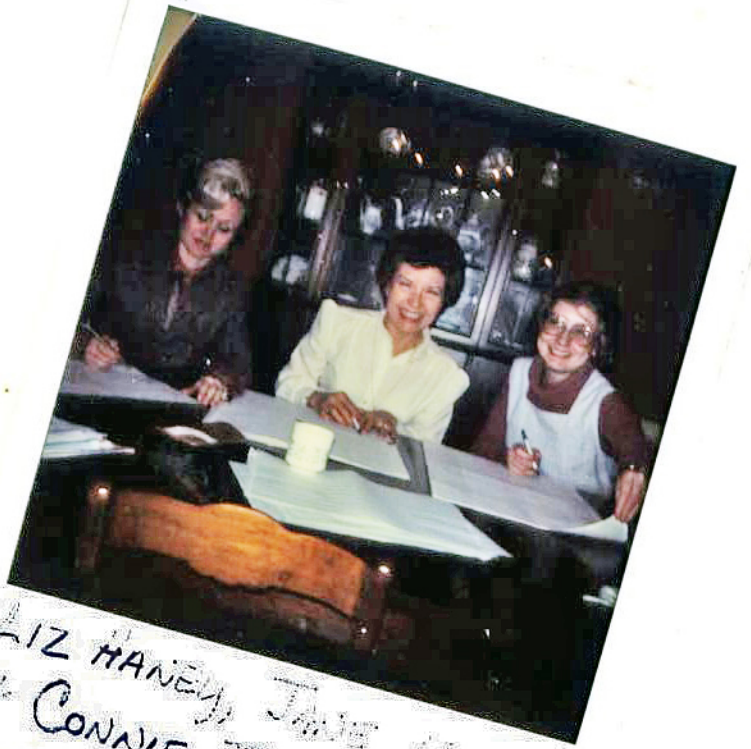

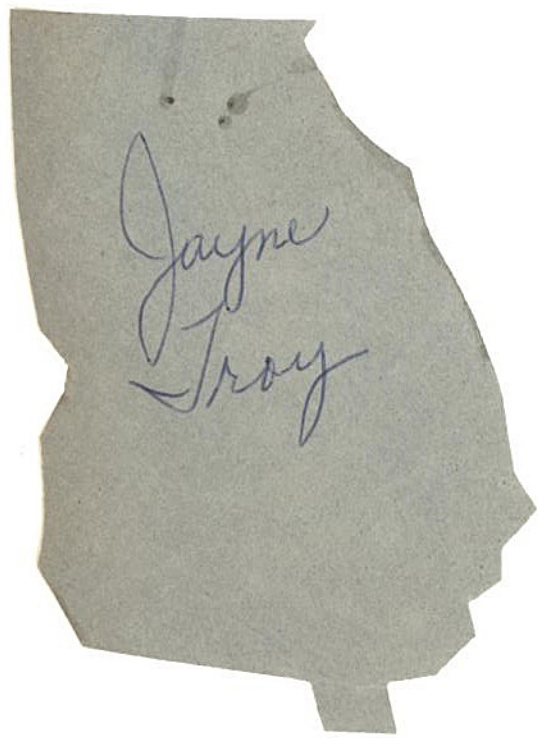
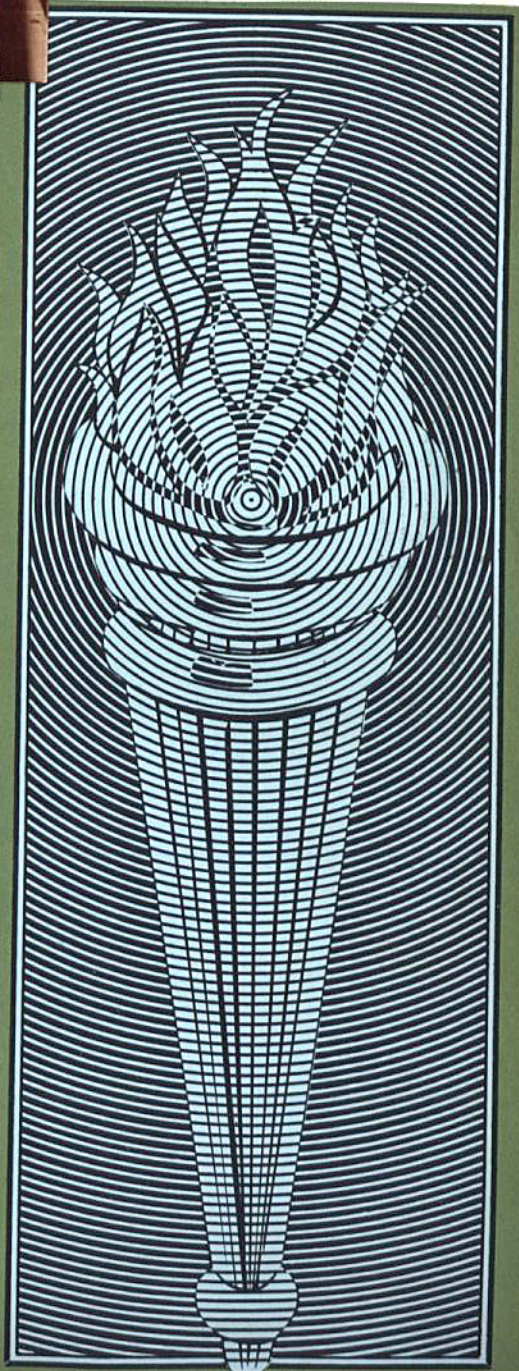

Morrow Junior Women Hold Best Yard Contest In The City

The Morrow Junior Women's Club is sponsoring a Best Yard Contest in the City of Morrow this week with the best yards being named on Saturday.

The City of Morrow will pick up limbs less than five inches in diameter and trash except tires today through Friday.

Judges chosen by the Morrow Junior Women's Club will judge the yards Saturday and present two plaques—one to the best yard on the west side of the city and one to the best yard on the east side of the city.

The judges will be looking for yards with lush carpets of grass,

neatly cut lawns and trimmed shrubs and bushes and neat pine islands.

They are encouraging participants to get rid of fallen branches, dead trees or shrubs and poison ivy.

The criteria for judging also indicates that bales of pine straw and other planting materials should not be visible and that woodpiles

should be logically located.

In addition, the judges will be looking for trailers, boats and campers to be kept out of sight from the street and for garage doors to be closed.

The Best Yard Contest is an annual event in Morrow sponsored each year by the Morrow Junior Women's Club.



'Best Yard' Contest Set In Morrow

It is a chance for Morrow to do a little spring cleaning, and, at the same time, celebrate those yards that help to keep Morrow beautiful year 'round.

Morrow's annual Beautification Program — which includes the city-wide trash pick-up and "best yard" contest — is scheduled to run for a four day period between May 1 and May 5, according to City Councilwoman Gwen Grayson, chair of the event.

This year will see a new twist to the "best yard" contest. Instead of awarding one first prize and one second prize for the best yard, the city will award a first prize for the best yard to the east of the railroad tracks along Highway 54, and a first prize to the best yard on the west side of the tracks, Grayson said. There will still be one second prize.

FIRST PRIZE is "a beautiful wooden plaque with their name engraved on it," Grayson said.

The contest will be judged by a panel from the Morrow Junior Women's Club, who will conduct their study Friday and Saturday, May 4 and 5.

In addition to the contest, there will be a city-wide trash pick-up, which is the main focus of the beautification program. During that week, a city truck will cruise the neighborhoods and pick up most any trash the sanitation people do not get.

AMONG THE items the city will pick up are old furniture, appliances, and tree limbs, less than five inches in diameter that have been cut by the owner, Grayson said.

"About the only thing we won't get is tires," Grayson said.

In addition to picking up the existing trash, the city will also make efforts to plant hardy, perennial flowers around the city and city hall, Grayson said.

"WE HOPE the businesses, as well as the residents will participate in Morrow Beautification Week," Grayson said.

In the best yard contest, a person does not have to have their front yard planted in flowers to win. "There was a man who just had this beautiful grass, and pine trees in his yard. But he kept that yard so neat, it looked as if he trimmed the grass around the trees with nail clippers. He won the contest two years in a row," Grayson said.

Any civic organization who would be interested in adopting-a-spot to beautify Morrow should phone Grayson at Morrow City Hall during the week at 961-4002, and leave a message for her, Grayson said.

Morrow Beautification Week Set

MORROW—The city of Morrow is planning a beautification week for May 1 through 5 and homeowners will be given the opportunity to have garbage, as well as tree limbs, picked up by the city, according to Councilman Gwen Grayson.

Grayson said two members of the Morrow Junior Women's Club will judge homes on May 5, and that two homeowners will be given first place for having the best-kept yards.

One winner will be picked from the east side of the railroad tracks and another winner will be chosen from the west side, she said.

DURING THE city council's regular business

meeting Tuesday, a request for a variance in the city's parking ordinance was granted for Rich's department store.

A representative of Rich's said the change would be made "to accommodate expansion in the redevelopment of Rich's." He added that the store will be building a 30,000 square foot addition. The variance allows the store to have 5.0 parking spaces per 1,000 square feet of floor space instead of 5.5 parking spaces.

David Low, a consultant hired to study parking at the department store, told the council that at another location, the expansion brought no appreciable increase in traffic but did increase sales in the store.

IN ANOTHER matter involving the Southlake area, the council approved a request for a land variance on the Marshalls Department Store property.

Jim Bealle, a Carter and Associates' representative, said when Marshalls was constructed, builders measured the distance for setback of the building from the curb instead of the property line.

Initially, the company requested a variance so that the building would have a setback of 35 feet on Ring Road and 45 feet on Lake Drive. The variance granted Tuesday will allow the building to exceed those limits by several feet.

THE COUNCIL granted a request by Marion J. Young

to build a masonry building on his property off Highway 54. Young owns a tire business, but the building will house an auto transmission shop.

Young has agreed to build a fence around the property.

The council also granted a request by Al Buntyn of Buntyn Realty to put a grand opening sign up at 1187 Morrow Road. The sign, which will be four by eight feet, will be erected within the next two weeks.

The council also voted to ask a representative from Robert and Company, a firm doing a study on Clayton County planning, zoning and traffic, to come before the city council to discuss Morrow's traffic, planning and zoning.

DECORATIVE ARTS — The Virginia Carroll Crawford Collection documents the styles of American decorative arts from 1805 to the First World War. On view are woodwork, metalware, glass, ceramics, and textiles. Well-known firms such as Samuel Kirk, Herter Brothers, Tiffany and Company, and the Rockwood Pottery are represented, as well as less familiar makers. Other decorative arts collections on view include the Emory and Frances Coche Collection of English Ceramics, the Scott-Allen collection of European porcelain, the 18th century furniture, silver, glassware, and ceramics. Also included is Georgia furniture of the late 18th and early 19th centuries, and the work of 19th century Georgia silversmiths.

AFRICAN ART — The Fred and Rita Richman Collection of African Art includes figures, textiles, masks, household objects, musical instruments, and ceremonial weaponry.

HENRY P. McILHENNY COLLECTION: 19TH CENTURY FRENCH AND ENGLISH MASTERPIECES — The Henry P. McIlhenny Collection, one of the most outstanding private collections of paintings and drawings in America, will be shown at the High Museum of Art from May 25 through September 30, 1984. Housed in an elegant town house in Philadelphia, the collection comprises 41 French paintings, drawings, and sculptures by major works. Included are masterpieces from such artists as Chardin, Degas, Renoir, Toulouse-Lautrec, Matisse and Rouault.

AMERICAN ART — The West Collection, a group of 19th century American paintings and sculpture acquired by the West Foundation of Atlanta, remains on view. These works, on extended loan to the Museum, are being displayed as a collection for the first time. Works on view include paintings by George Henry Hall, Rembrandt Peale, Sanford Gifford, Alfred Britcher, Albert Bierstadt, and John Casilear, and sculpture by Randolph Rogers, Hiram Powers, and others.

EUROPEAN PAINTINGS — Paintings by Guercino and Paolo de Matteis join the Kress Collection masterworks of the Italian Renaissance and Baroque Periods, including examples by Caracciolo, Bellini, Gaulli, and Tiepolo.

AMERICAN PAINTINGS, SCULPTURE — The Experience of Architecture is a selection of works which take architecture as their theme, drawn primarily from the Museum's permanent collection. The Civil War photographs of Matthew Brady and George Barnard set the stage for a school of American landscape photography.

METROPOLITAN OPERA CENTENNIAL: A PHOTOGRAPHIC ALBUM — The collection by International Center of Photography in New York features photos of turn-of-the-century opera personalities, Maria Callas' debut, and Enrico Caruso's last role, to name a few.

AFRICAN-AMERICAN ART IN ATLANTA: PUBLIC AND CORPORATE COLLECTIONS — This exhibition is from the Museum's permanent collection, Atlanta Life Insurance Company, Atlanta University, Spelman College, and other public collections in the area.

20TH CENTURY ART — Works on view include loans from the Gilman Paper Company Collection. Among the works on display are pieces by Carl Andre, Lynda Benglis, Mel Bochner, Bruce Boice, Jim Dine, Dan Flavin, Ellsworth Kelly, Sol Lewitt, Ed Moses, Dorothea Rockburne, Richard Serra, and Frank Stella.

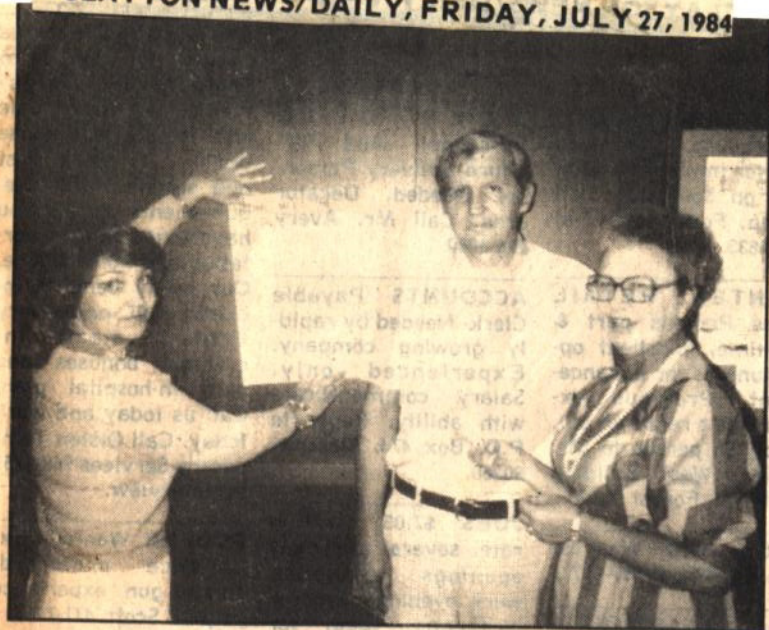

Clayton Candidates Address Issues During Woman's Club Political Rally

Candidates for the Clayton County Commission, the Clayton County Board of Education and the Georgia House of Representatives took their campaigns to the Morrow City Hall Saturday night for a rally sponsored by the Morrow Junior Woman's Club.

The Democratic and Republican primaries for each race will be held on Aug. 14, with the primary winners facing each other in the Nov. 6 general election.

Jimmy Dudley and Gerald Matthews, Democratic candidates for the commission District A Post 2 race, and Tom Salter, a Republican candidate for that post, spoke at the rally.

Dudley spoke in favor of the county land use plan, a multi-purpose senior citizens center, sidewalks around the county schools, town hall meetings and the appointment of more women to responsible positions in county government.

"The next four to eight years is a crucial time in the lives of the citizens of Clayton County," Dudley

said. "We need good, solid leadership from someone who can make his own decisions based on what's best for the people in the county."

Matthews emphasized his experience in civic affairs and his service as chairman of the Clayton County Private Industry Council and the Clayton County Planning Commission.

"Our theme is 'working with you for Clayton County,' because without you, nothing could be done," Matthews said. "It takes all of us working together to get things done."

Salter said that a commissioner has to have proven leadership ability, persistence, integrity and a concern for the county. He said he has all of those qualities.

Sharkley J. Buford and M.M. Buice, Democratic candidates in that race, and Jack Branan, a Republican candidate in that race, were not at the rally.

Incumbent Clayton County Commissioner Loren Cheaves will face a Democratic challenger James Harris in the District B Post 2 race, with the winner of that primary facing Republican James Petty in

the general election.

Cheaves emphasized his record of voting for only one tax increase during his 12 years in office—the one the voters approved last December to finance bonds for the new county jail.

"You cannot spend more money than you take in," Cheaves said. "I will continue saving you money and looking after your tax dollars."

Harris was not at the rally. Petty said the three minutes allotted him would not be enough time to discuss the issues.

"I don't want to half do it," Petty said. "As your commissioner, I would not half do that job, either."

Incumbent state Reps. Rudolph Johnson (D-Morrow) and Frank Bailey (D-Riverdale) emphasized their records of providing quality education and road improvements. Johnson also emphasized his role in reforming the state retirement system.

Dee Epps, Bailey's Republican challenger for the District 72 Post 5, emphasized the need to improve education in the state.

Morrow Jr. Women's Club Safety Tip:
The National Rifle Association suggests the following ten "Commandments" for your hunting safety:
1. BE POSITIVE of your target's identity before shooting.
2. TAKE TIME to fire a safe shot. If unsure, or if you move quickly, pass up the shot. When you have to wonder whether you should shoot—DON'T.
3. USE the right ammunition for your firearm. Carry only one type of ammunition to be sure you will not mix different types.
4. IF you fall, try to control where the muzzle points. After a fall, check your UNLOADED gun for dirt and damage and make sure the barrel is free of obstructions.
5. UNLOAD your gun before attempting to climb a steep bank or travel across slippery ground.
6. WHEN you are alone and must cross a fence, UNLOAD your firearm and place it under the fence with the muzzle pointed away from where you are crossing. When hunting with others and you must cross a fence, UNLOAD the guns so that they may cross safely.
7. NEVER use a scope sight as a substitute for binoculars. (Imagine how you would feel if you discovered you were being looked at through a scope mounted on a gun.)
8. ALCOHOL, DRUGS, AND HUNTING do not mix. Drugs and alcohol may impair your judgement. Keen judgement is essential to safe hunting.
9. BEWARE of fatigue. When you are so tired that hunting isn't fun anymore, go back to camp. Fatigue can cause carelessness and clumsiness which, in turn, can cause you to see things that aren't there.
10. WHEN you have finished hunting, UNLOAD your gun before returning to your vehicle or camp.

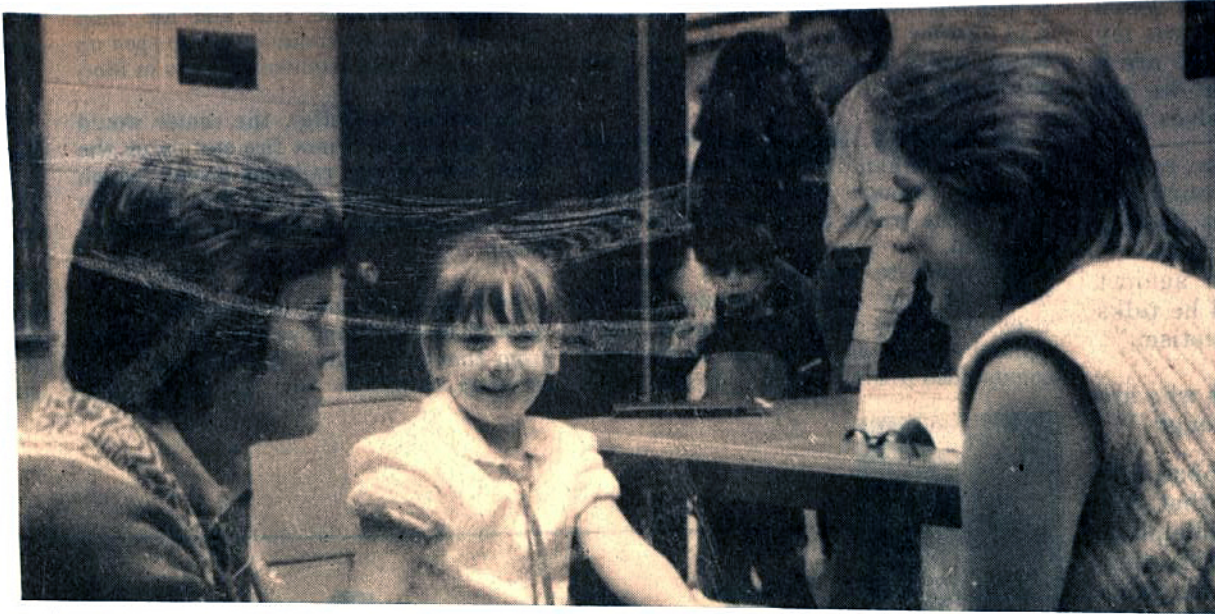
