Morrow Nursing Course

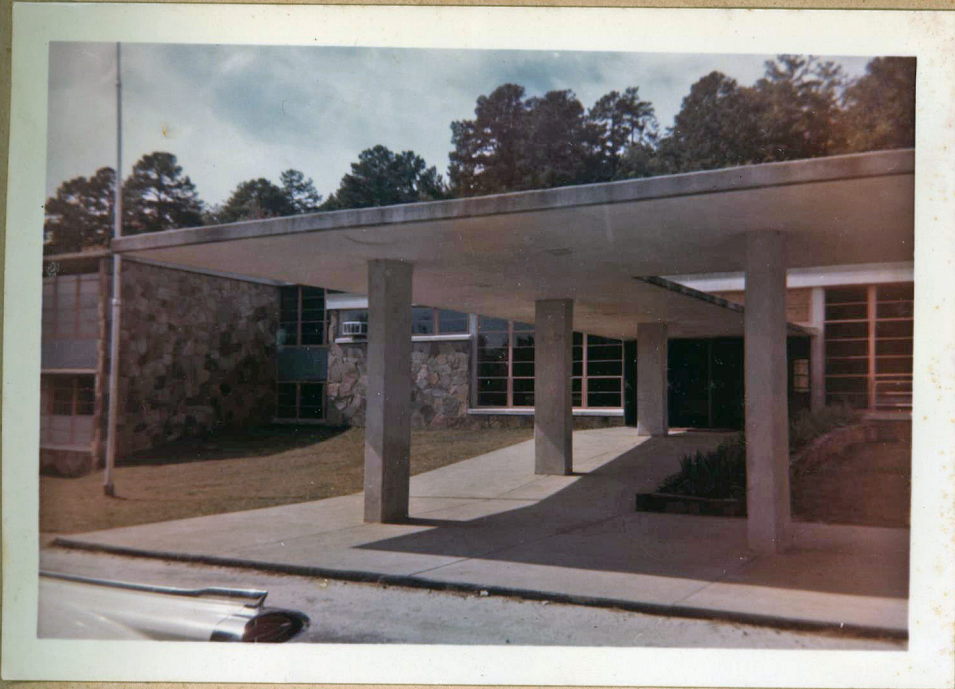

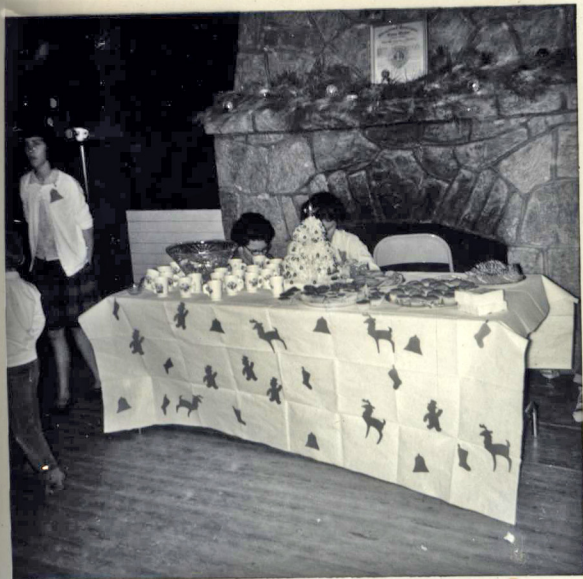

and Mrs. B. L. McKinnon.

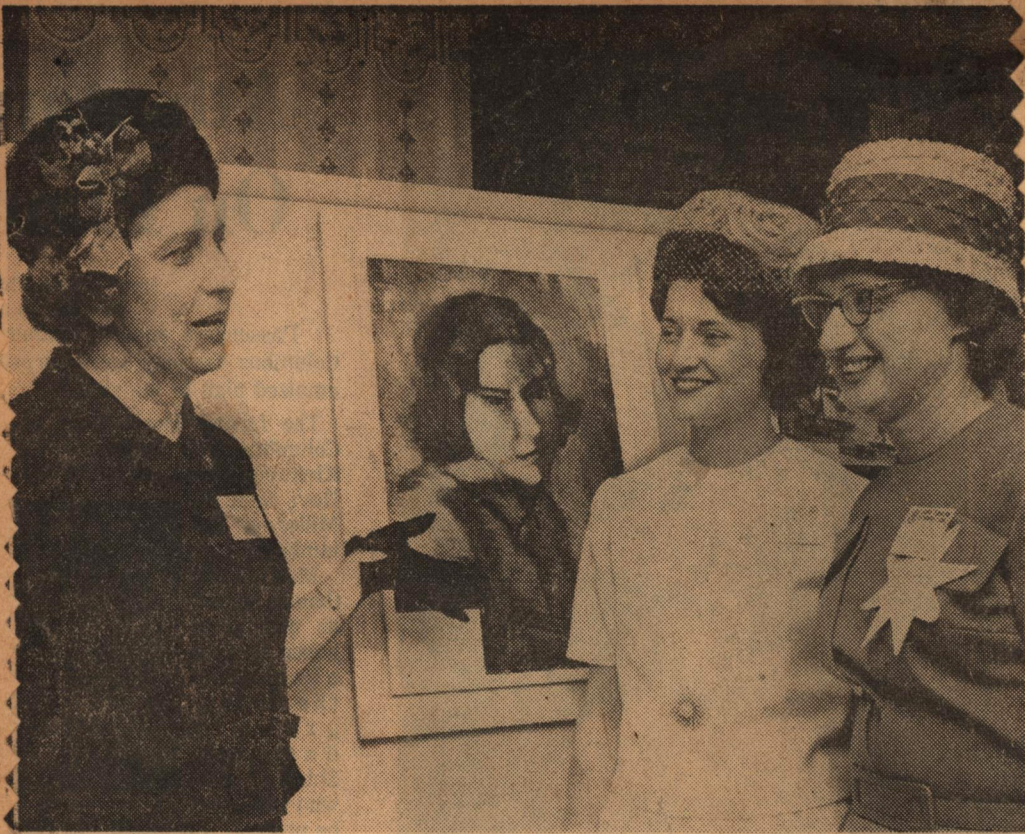
