A mock Civil War battle will be staged at 2:30 p.m. with 500 troops taking part on Georgia Highway 54 at the Voyles Farm. A parade will be held at 10:45 a.m. in the heart of Jonesboro. The United Daughters of the Confederacy will hold a memorial service at 3 p.m. at the Confederate Cemetery in Jonesboro. A centennial spokesman said fried chicken will be sold at the Jonesboro Fire Department and an art show and attic sale will also highlight the centennial.

LAST 'CIVIL WAR BATTLE' SET

The last Civil War battle re-enactment planned in Georgia will be part of a full day of festivities Saturday in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Jonesboro.

The City of Jonesboro will host the commemoration activities which will range from a mock battle to an art show.

A parade set for 10:45 a.m. will kick off the celebration. Over 600 people, including a mounted cavalry unit, will participate in the parade, which will start at the intersection of Highways 54 and 41 and continue south through Jonesboro.

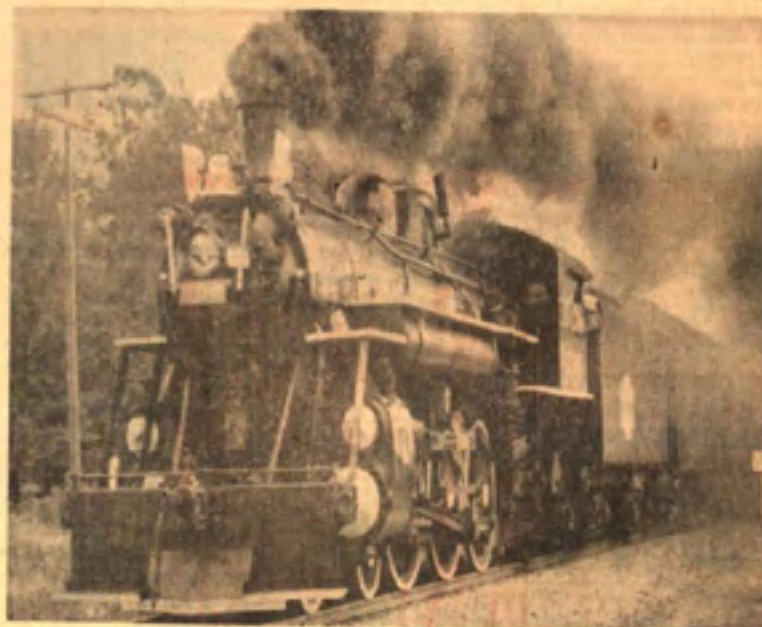
The 3rd Army Band will set the tempo for the march. Mrs. Georgia and Miss Clayton County will be featured guests.

FOLLOWING the parade, there will be a chicken fry at the Jonesboro Fire Department.

At 2 p.m. the United Daughters of the Confederacy will hold memorial services at the Jonesboro Confederate Cemetery. Sixth District Rep. Jack Flynt Jr. will speak, and a 21-gun salute will be fired in honor of the dead.

The battle re-enactment, with more than 500 authentically uniformed, reactivated Civil War troops from several states participating, is scheduled for 3:30 p.m.

Restored Engine Part of Jonesboro Centennial Celebration

Central of Georgia Railway in operation at the Jonesboro Commemoration Saturday. Engine No. 750, which served as a shuttle train between Jonesboro and Atlanta more than 40 years ago, has been restored and will make three round trips between the two cities during the celebration.

THE ENGINE will leave Atlanta at 10 a.m., reach Jonesboro at 10:45 a.m., leave Jonesboro at 11:30 a.m., arrive at Atlanta 12:15 p.m.,

leave Atlanta 1 p.m., arrive Jonesboro, 1:45 p.m.; leave Jonesboro, 2:30 p.m., arrive Atlanta 3:15 p.m.; leave Atlanta, 4 p.m., arrive Jonesboro 4:45 p.m.; leave Jonesboro 5 p.m. and arrive Atlanta, 6:45 p.m.

Passengers may board the train in Atlanta at the Terminal Station, Spring Street, and in Jonesboro at the Jonesboro Depot in the center of town. Tickets may be purchased in Atlanta and Jonesboro.

An art show will be set up

in the Jonesboro Depot during the day. It will feature paintings entered by persons from throughout Clayton County.

Jonesboro will sponsor attic sales during the festivities Saturday, and visitors may purchase real sassafras tea or watermelon at stands around town.

A spokesman for the Clayton County Centennial Committee described the centennial commemoration as "the biggest celebration ever held in Jonesboro."

'OLD 79'

Yankees Wanted For Jonesboro War

The Jonesboro Centennial Commission is asking for Yankee volunteers to play the part of Union troops in a mock battle slated for Aug. 28. The battle will re-enact the fight for Jonesboro during the War Between the States and will climax local centennial activities.

The celebration will include Atlanta-to-Jonesboro train rides on "Old 79," a steam locomotive brought out of retirement for the day by the Atlanta Chapter of the National Historical Society.

Jonesboro's chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy will conduct a memorial service at the local Confederate cemetery.

A CHICKEN DINNER sponsored by the Jonesboro Recreation Department and the Jonesboro Optimist's Club will be served to the public that afternoon.

A rummage and antique sale by the Jonesboro Woman's Club and the Morrow Junior Women's Club will also be held.

The Atlanta General Depot has been asked to fire cannon to re-create the moment when Gen. Sherman, who was near Jonesboro, heard Atlanta's ammunition dumps exploding as Gen. Hood's troops left the city.

Gen. Sherman is said to have then set on a stump and wrote a telegram to President Lincoln saying, "Atlanta is ours and fairly won."

As the cannon are fired taps will be played on the battlefield at Jonesboro and the Confederate battle flag will be pulled down. Then the Stars and Bars will be run up and the celebration will be over.

The Jonesboro activities will climax centennial action around Atlanta as the battle there was the last and decisive one on the campaign for Atlanta 100 years ago.

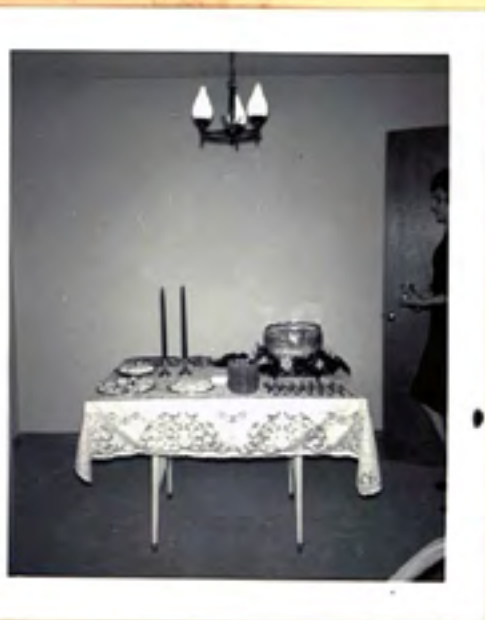

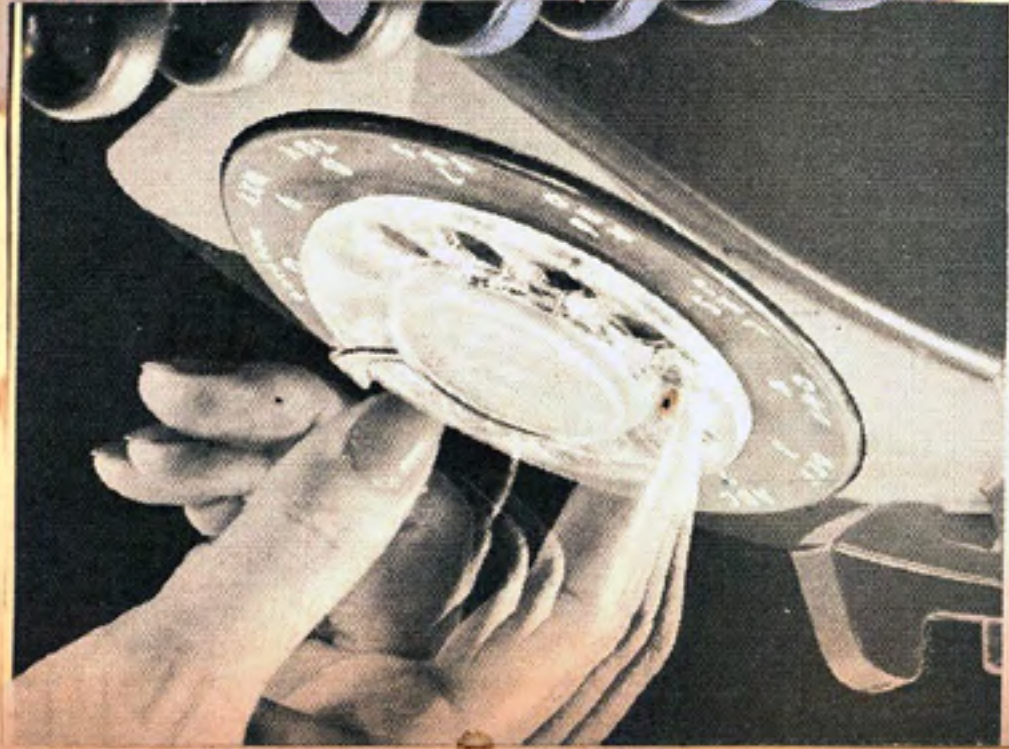

GFWC Contributes Much to State

JEKYLL ISLAND, May 12—Clubwomen throughout the Georgia Federation of Women's Clubs work hard all year, not only on their individual club projects, but on the federation projects on their local levels.

The number of women attending the 69th annual GFWC convention through Wednesday has grown to 600 representing the many clubs throughout the state. The convention theme is "Freedom Through Service—Service Through Gifts of Time and Talents."

CLUB WOMEN do give their time and talents to the betterment of their local communities thus improving the state. They devote time to mental health and throughout the club year members are volunteers in local hospitals, institutions and help in any way they can.

This year for the first time there is a detention home and counselor for every child in

Georgia who needs it to keep children out of jail. This progress report has been sent to the General Federation for judging at the general convention in New Orleans in early June.

They encourage young people in the field of art with their annual penny art competition and now they are encouraging club members with the members art competition for the first time this year.

THEY WANT to see that every child who needs them has free school lunches. They want to help those who can't read and write learn to do so and some clubs sponsor a reading council for this purpose. They are helping the foreign-born become American citizens.

Many clubs sponsor ballets and other performing arts in their cities. The GFWC owns and operates Tallulah Falls School which is the only school supported today by a women's organization.

This is only a small part of what they contribute to the state of Georgia. Each year

at convention time they are rewarded for the work they have done. However, most of them feel that helping others is reward enough.

The majority of awards were given during Tuesday's convention activities.

TWO OUTSTANDING awards given to individual junior clubwomen are the Irene J. Watts award for the outstanding junior club woman and the Clara C. Jordan good citizenship award to Georgia's 100 per cent citizen. Mrs. Felton Patterson Jr. of Macon Junior Woman's Club, received the Watts award for the most outstanding work done by an individual junior clubwoman. Mrs. George W. Carswell of the Albany Junior Woman's Club, received the Jordan Award for being a 100 per cent good citizen.

Mrs. Patterson was the second Macon Junior to receive this award. Mrs. Charles Wood Jr. also of the Macon

Junior Club received the award last year.

The Gertrude Harris award for outstanding work done in all departments was won by the La Vista Junior Woman's Club. Macon Junior Woman's Club received the Brunswick Junior Family Life Award. Marietta Junior Woman's Club had the greatest increase in membership on a percentage basis and received the Louise Black McDougald Award. The Dalton Junior Woman's Club received the International Peace Award for the most effective work promoting world peace and international understanding.

THE LA VISTA Junior Woman's Club of Atlanta won four of the seven first place awards given for outstanding work done in the departments for clubs with membership under 35.

They won first place in the departments of Conservation, International Affairs, Public

Affairs and Tallulah Falls.

The La Vista Junior Club also took second in education and home life.

Department awards for clubs with membership over 35 were presented to Dalton Junior Woman's Club for conservation; Augusta Junior Woman's Club for education; Junior Woman's Club of Columbus for fine arts; Albany Junior Woman's Club for home life; Dalton Junior Woman's Club for international affairs; Brunswick Junior Woman's Club for public affairs and Augusta Junior Woman's Club for Tallulah Falls.

Students

High school choral, orchestra, and band students (grades 8 through 12 during the 1965-66 school year) are eligible to enroll. Enrollment may be for chorus, orchestra, or band, and those interested may participate in two of the three activities.

Students are offered:

- ... Instruction by sections in instrument and voice groups in addition to scheduled organization rehearsals.
- ... Elective work in musicianship (theory), music literature, conducting, small ensembles, and accompanying.
- ... Private lessons (minimum additional cost) with teaching specialists in all wind and string instruments, percussion, voice, and piano.

Teachers

Teachers of high school music, either vocal or instrumental, may enroll. The State Department of Education will present a certificate of attendance to Georgia teachers who attend a minimum of six hours daily for 10 days.

Teachers will have the opportunity to:

- ... Observe techniques of master band and choral directors.
- ... Attend daily seminars with guest conductors.
- ... Participate in demonstrations and clinics with specialists in the various performance media.
- ... Become acquainted with the best music literature for High School use.

living arrangements

Housing. All students, except "Day Students" (those with permission to live with parents or relatives) will be housed in University dormitories reserved for Workshop participants. All buildings where students are assigned will be properly chaperoned and supervised.

Teachers may reserve dormitory space, arrange housing at the Georgia Center, or at their choice of Athens motels or hotels.

Meals. All meals, with the exception of the two Sunday evening suppers, will be served at Memorial Hall Cafeteria on the University campus.

The same eating arrangement is available to teachers at nominal cost.

Recreation. A swimming pool, tennis courts, and other recreation facilities of the University will be available for use during free time each day.

Recitals, concerts, movies, informal parties, and other special programs will be planned for all evenings during the Workshop.

Medical Care. Services of the University Infirmary will be available for emergency medical care if needed. Parents are expected to assume the cost of other than first aid or minor treatment.
