Hometown pride is wonderful and Morrow is a city charged with just that.

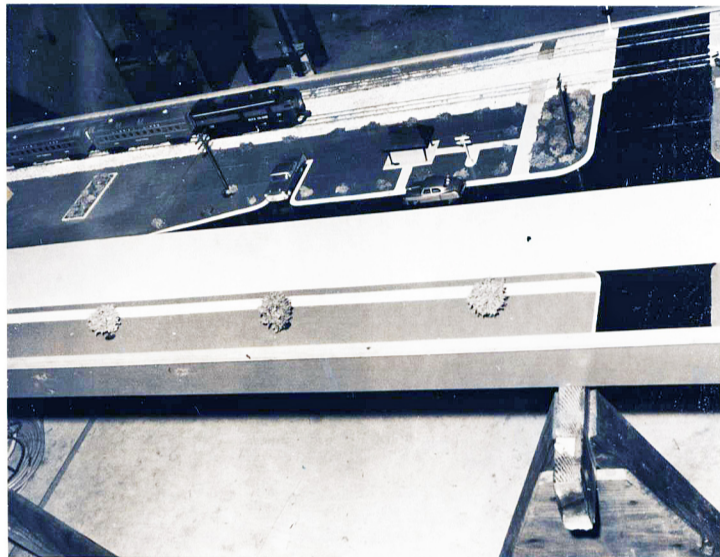

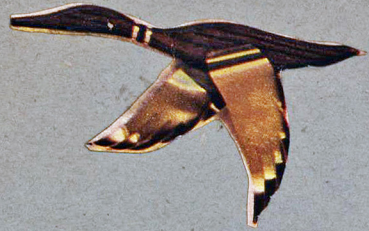


Traveling Art Exhibit

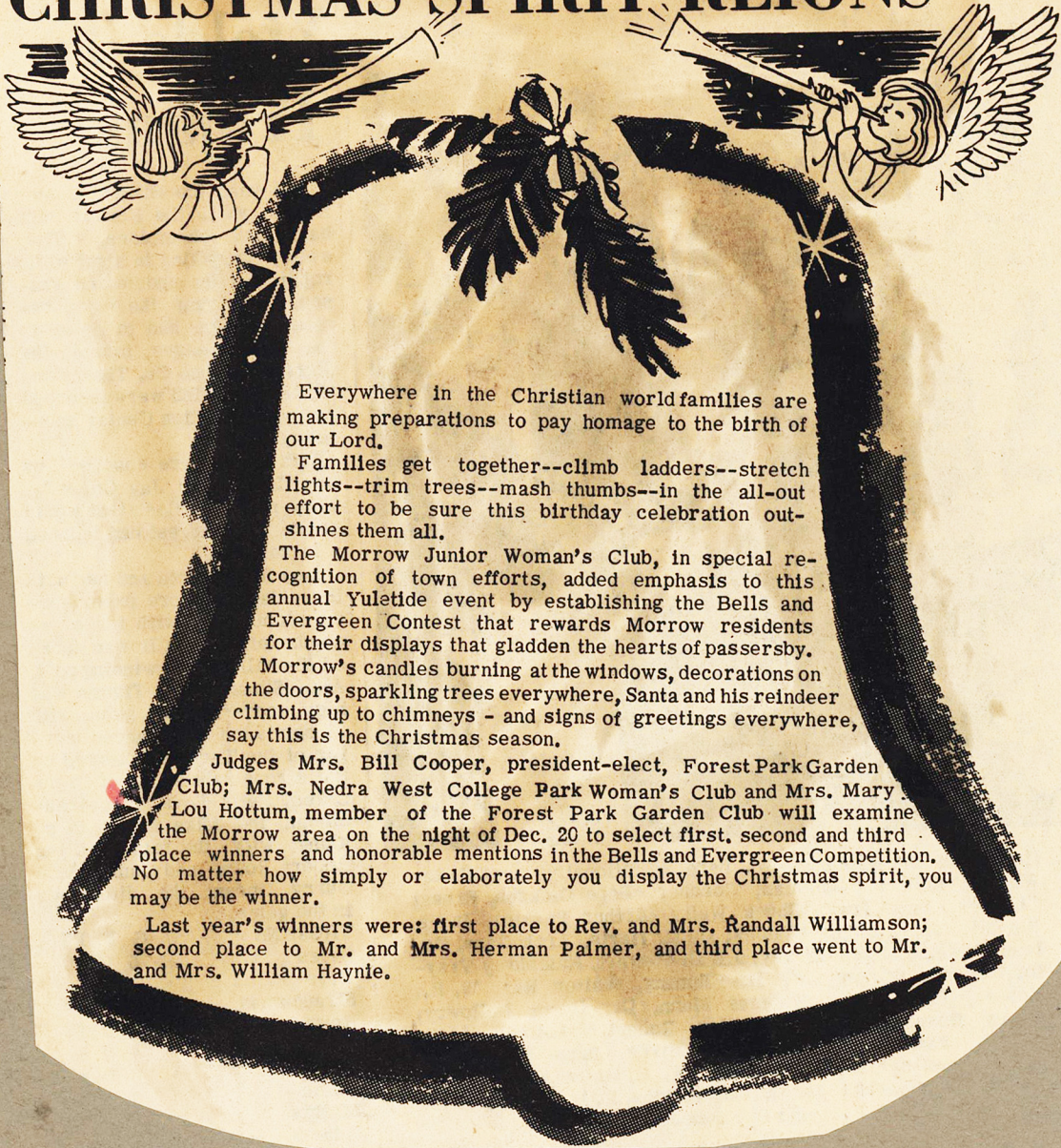

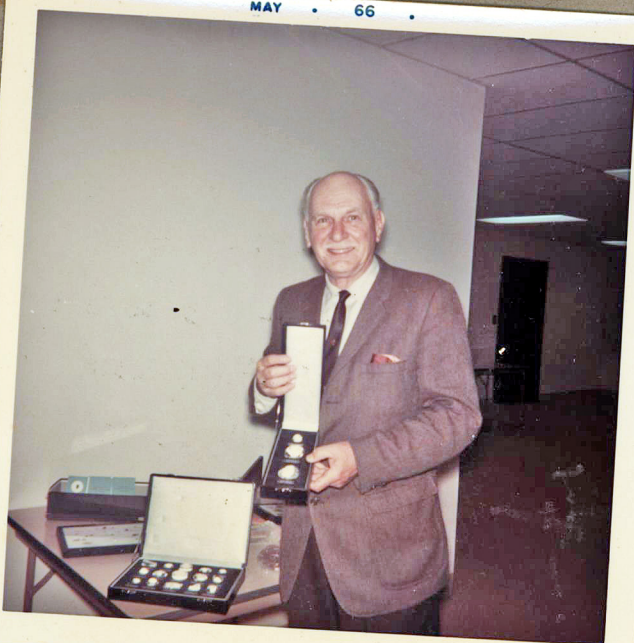

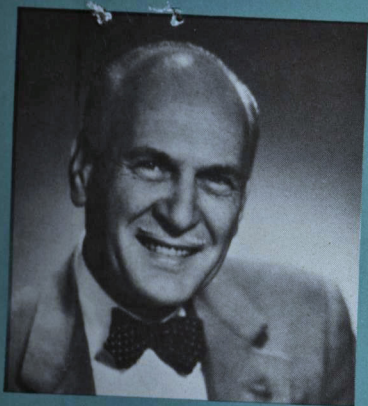

Later he organized an import-export company in Atlanta dealing in precious and semi-precious gem materials from 38 countries. World Gems Corporation, as it was known, was one of the largest firms of its kind in the world, supplying more than 4000 gem and mineral shops throughout the United States and Canada. These shops cater to the more than 10 million men, women and children who make a hobby of gem collecting. Mr. Withers resigned as president of World Gems Corporation in 1963 and the company was moved to Miami.

He now devotes his time to writing and lecturing. Few men know gems—their romance, history, geology and geography—as thoroughly as Gil Withers, and few can talk about them as entertainingly.



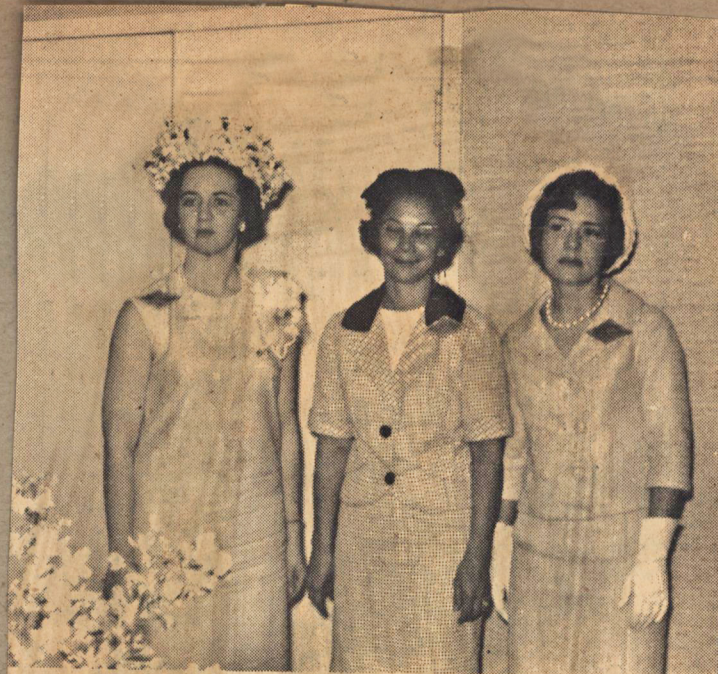
Mrs. Dutch Young, president of Morrow Juniors, was elected district corresponding secretary and co-chairman of Clubwoman Magazine.
