Williamsons' Door Again Captures Bells-Evergreen

Bells and Evergreen Christmas decorating contest, sponsored for the fourth year by the Morrow Junior Woman's Club, has grown in leaps and bounds with a large percentage of the homemakers participating not just to win but to make the community expressive of Christmas and as beautiful as possible.

Community spirit and pride reigned supreme this year as outdoor decorations wishing passersby a Merry Christmas forced the judges into the unenviable position of placing the first, second and third place ribbons in pleasing order.

This year's second-time first place winners are the Rev. and Mrs. Randall Williamson and their children of 158 Peacock Boulevard.

Red broadcloth draperies frame the stark white front door which was converted into an old-fashioned window by outlining 12 panes with black tape.

Profiles silhouetted in the panes show the Reverend at the top center, while Mrs. Williamson's silhouette smiles from the center pane and the three children (l-r) Kurt, Jenna and Benjy, occupy the three lower panes.

Reading oriental fashion "Merry Christmas" faces the parents while the signature fills the right-top and center panes.

Mrs. Williamson cut the silhouettes herself. Posing her subject against a wall in front of a spotlight she traced the image and cut-out the likeness.

Flanking the draperies on the floor two old oil cans, painted red, held oil lamps, completing the old-fashioned window theme.

Adding to the illusion of a magnificent Christmas card, to ALL from ALL the Williamsons, was the very effective floodlighting with all the mechanisms adroitly concealed.

Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Young of 124 Patricia Drive are the second place winners. Doors caught the judges' eyes this

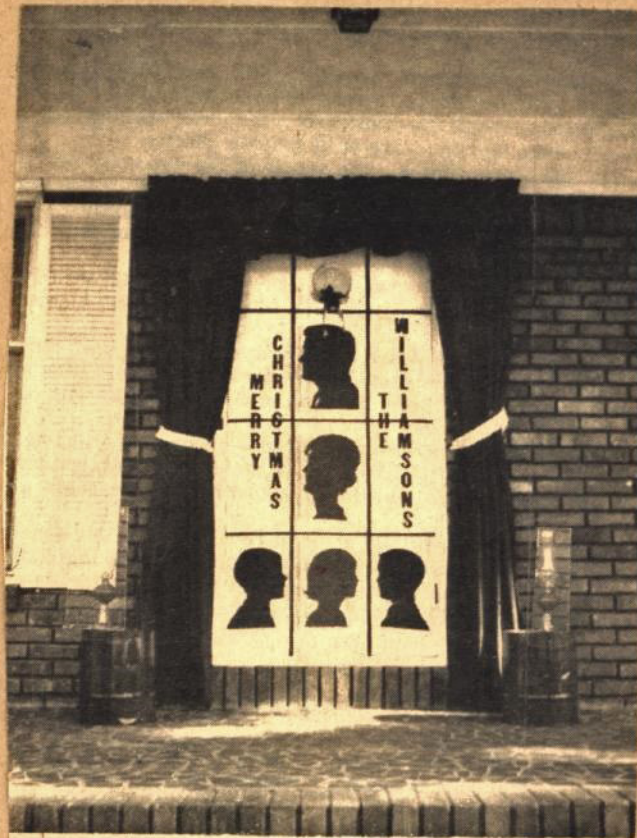
year. The significant message, "Joy to The World" in gold-block letters against a white background posed beneath three golden bells fastened to a double-loveknot of gold ribbon streamers that sheltered the bells and the message, completed their decoration.

Third place winners are the Chester K. Budkoskis of 1841 Lamplight Court. They featured garlands of greenery with red poinsettias entwined in the wrought-iron bannisters and forming an arc under a wicker basket birdcage filled with an assortment of colored Christmas balls on their door. A life-like bird, perched atop the cage, kept a watchful eye on the contents of her nest -- reminding of Psalm 91:4, "And under His wings shalt thou trust."

DISTRICT LADIES TOLD

Georgia's Future Hinges on Schools, Says Talmadge

Sen. Herman E. Talmadge asserted Tuesday "Georgia's future growth and prosperity will be determined in a large part by the excellence of her schools today."

The Georgia senator was principal speaker here at the annual spring meeting of the Sixth District of the Georgia Federation of Women's Clubs.

Saluting the clubwomen, the senator told them they were a far more attractive audience than those he had previously addressed. Commending women's fitness for any particular service, office or employment, he told them he had served with two lady senators who were able representatives, and also when he was Georgia's governor he appointed many women to his committees--not because they were women, but because they were well qualified.

Discussing the "immeasurable importance of education in our changing state," Sen. Talmadge told the ladies:

"Education is the most challenging test of our times. And it can be the most rewarding. Education in recent years has moved to the forefront of importance at all levels of government and civic endeavor,

and it is our job to keep it there and to work to push it even further ahead."

Pointing out the state has made "tremendous progress" in education, Sen. Talmadge declared "we are still moving forward, but there is yet a long way to go in some areas. We cannot afford to stand still or be satisfied with the status quo, for if we do Georgia and its citizens will be left far behind."

He cited the need for "more schools and better schools in order to insure for every boy and girl of the state an adequate education, regardless of who they are or where they live. And we must put more children in school and keep them there for as long as they can stay and as far as they can go. Our dropout rate is still a disgrace and a tragic waste of human resources."

Sen. Talmadge said education is primarily the concern of the state and local governments, "but the responsibility does not end there. It must be made the concern of everyone who is interested in the continued advancement and well-being of Georgia, including business and civic organizations which can be a moving force behind educational progress.

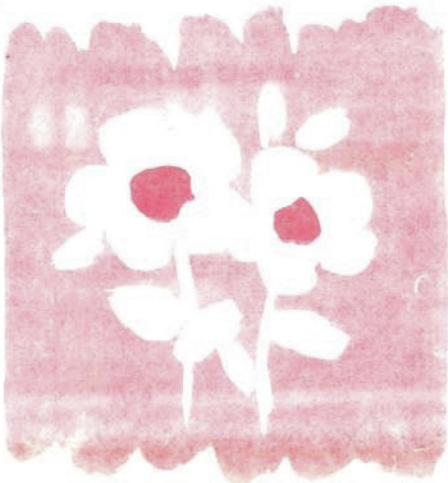

RR Beautification Work Begins Soon

"Where there is no vision, the people perish..." Coupling vision with enterprise Morrow Junior Woman's Club, the Kiwanis Club and the Lions Club of Morrow formed a collective venture to improve the esthetic scenic appearance of the town's main thoroughfare.

Identifying the railroad tracks that traverse the entire length of the city as the most offensive to the eye, they took the initiative in setting up a feasible plan to beautify the railroad right-of-way, to create a more harmonious blending with its beautiful homes, churches and landscaped, well-coiffed lawns.

Outlining a comprehensive plan to the Parks and Recreation Commission of the City of Morrow two years ago (June, 1965) they won enthusiastic approval of the proposed Improvement Project. Feeling that it was the desire of the entire populace, Bob Kerr of the P&R Dept. announced, "The City is pleased to unite with the civic groups in promoting the program."

In cooperation with the clubs' benefit barbecue July 24, 1965, the city sponsored a street dance at which donations were accepted and the proceeds from the combined barbecue-dance netted the project approximately \$400.

Another fund-raising drive, a chicken dinner, was held at the Morrow Elementary school in May of this year when more than \$300 was raised. The Morrow Junior Woman's Club Public Affairs Department sold flags and contributed \$149 from the sale, the club also contributed \$100 from its treasury to the Morrow Community Improvement Project.

Planning and engineering the entire project from scratch, with no special skills but with tremendous civic pride, the group's unflagging, methodical efforts have produced results they are eager to reveal.

After a number of sessions with officials of the city, county, state and Southern Railway System, approvals from each of the following were granted: State Highway Dept., Southern Railway System and the City of Morrow.

After contacting professionals to form an impact study group to assess the cost, the land use, the urban design, a scale model was prepared by David Cheaves and is on exhibit for everyone to see at his home, 117 Patricia Dr., Morrow.

To bring to completion the daring plan to reshape Morrow's future will involve the active participation of the entire citizenry. By action or inaction, one's environment is influenced.

Highlight of the plan is a scenic tree-lined border beginning south at Lake Harbin-Mor-

row roads and Highway 54, and continuing north through town along the highway to Morrow Presbyterian Church. Landscaped grounds around the tracks at the city's lone traffic light, planters, walkways, a small shelter to await the bus, and a monument for the City of Morrow. Selecting this site was because of its prominence and also its easy access to either side of the town that encompasses the tracks.

From four separate bids the contract was let to low bidder William Haynie, general contractor, of Morrow.

Requiring five phases to complete the project, each will be tackled in its turn as the funds are raised.

The first stage is paving and concrete curbs at a cost of \$806. With this money already in the till, they're hoping to start working anyday. The second phase, the shed and monument at a cost of \$1,029. Walkways, planters and additional concrete work, the third phase will cost \$1,111; the fourth, rough grading at \$90. These first four phases will total \$3,036.

For the fifth and final phase, landscaping and planting, there is no bid as yet. The committee is waiting to see the end results before committing to either native wild flowers and shrubbery or to more refined planting.

Aside from the rising social consciousness of improving the community is the practical enhancement of land value. Business, which provides employment as well as revenue, is attracted to affluent locales where consumers are continually seeking higher standards of living, providing a healthy climate for the marketing of its goods and services.

Merchants will be asked to join the beautification crusade by prettying-up their establishments.

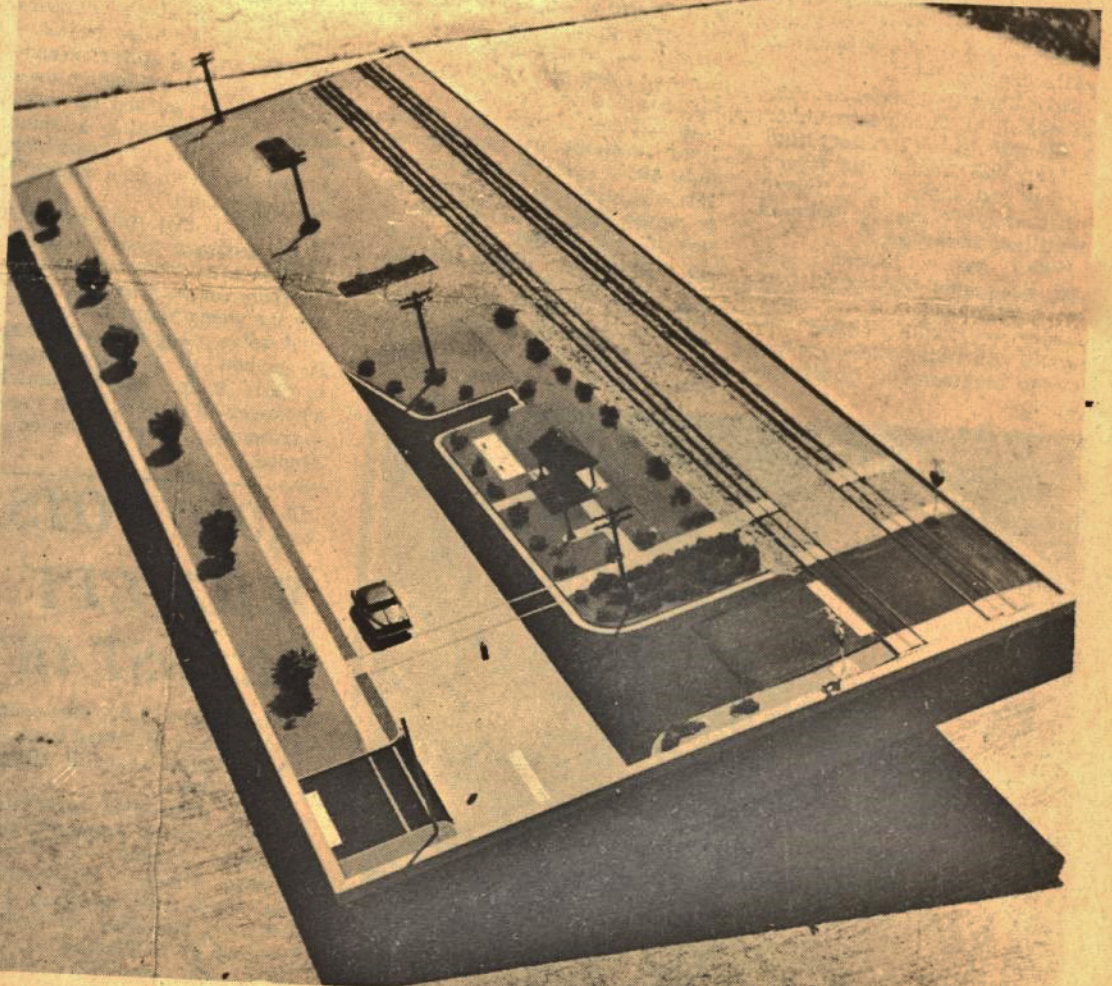
Feeling that they have something worthwhile to sell to the freeholders, the group is confident of a successful fund-raising drive to launch into its second phase of transforming what they see in the scale model into a reality.

Quietly and confidently this dedicated group has worked to benefit the community and they are hoping for a keystone grant from a wealthy philanthropist for the rest of Morrow's town-folk to equal the amount donated.
