

Upon being chosen Sixth District Homemaker she was presented an engraved silver tray. Wednesday October 4 she will be guest at a luncheon to be held at Davison's. She and her husband will have dinner the same evening with the State judges at the Fair Hall.

Mrs. Cooper resides with her husband and two children, Deborah and William, at 6120 Oak Ridge Drive, Morrow. Mr. Cooper is Zone Manager, Lincoln-Mercury Division of Ford Motor Company. They are active members of the First Baptist Church of Morrow, where she is the Sunbeam leader and Mr. Cooper is Chairman of the Board of Deacons. Mrs. Cooper's favorite hobby and past time is playing the piano. She does some freezing and canning of foods for her family.

MORROW — Mrs. W. H. (Mary) Cooper, a gifted musician whose civic activities are underscored by personal pride in the town of her birth, is 1967 Homemaker of the Year of the Sixth Congressional District.

anywhere else. "I've never wanted to live anywhere else," she told The Constitution. "I hope I never have to. We have a marvelous town here, and it is improving all the time."

Much of that improvement can be credited to the dedicated young homemaker: She has served as president of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club, the organization which nominated Mary for homemaker honors, and is currently serving as treasurer of the Morrow Civic Improvement Drive.

BEAUTIFICATION

"We now have the money to begin work on our major community beautification project," Mary proudly reported. "We're going to beautify a spot in the center of town, turning the bus stop into an old-fashioned depot stand, with flowers lining the main street, which is down the railroad track. It gives me chill bumps of pleasure when I think how that area will look when we complete the project."

Mrs. Emma DeFoor, a retired schoolteacher in Morrow, declared that the Sixth District winner "has been an example and an inspiration because she has been a wife and mother who in every way possible filled the needs of her loved ones.

GREAT FULFILMENT

"The great need today is for more homes such as Mary's to make the world a better place. This is expressed meaningfully in the following lines by Grace Nell Crowell: 'So long as there are homes where fires burn and there is bread; So long as there are

homes where lamps are lit and prayers said; although people falter through the dark —and nations grope — With God himself back of these little homes, we have sure hope."

"Mary's home reflects her good taste," added Mrs. Bobby E. Childs, president of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club. "It is artfully furnished, warm and friendly."

CHURCH PIANIST

Mary devotes her extensive musical knowledge and skill as a pianist primarily to her church, the First Baptist Church of Morrow. She has been pianist there for 10 years and is director of the Sunbeam Class Band, which has the highest honor rating possible for such an organization.

Co-chairman of the WMS, she teaches Vacation Bible School each year, is an assistant teacher in the Junior Department of the Sunday School. In addition to her contributions to her own church's musical programs, she is associational pianist for the Clayton Baptist Women's Missionary Society.

"I enjoy music," Mary said.
"I took piano lessons from
our next door neighbor. She's

a marvelous teacher — now my daughter is taking lessons from her."

CHILDREN FIRST

The dedicated homemaker's civic activities are varied. She is education chairman of the Morrow JWC, after serving as club relations chairman, public affairs chairman, first vice president and president. In the PTA, she has been hospitality and inspirational chairman.

While her outside activities demand much of her time, Mary never allows them to interfere with her primary responsibility to her family.

Mary's husband, Homer, who is zone manager for an automobile manufacturer, has his own plane. The children share his enthusiasm for flying as a hobby. "They love to fly with him," Mary reported. "I'm still a little afraid." CHILD TRAINING

The children are encouraged to develop self-reliance by making their own decisions. They are encouraged to learn money management through discretion in the handling of their allowances. Each is encouraged to tithe and to save part of their allowances. They are completely responsible for care of the family pets, have been taught to assume responsibility for their clothing and personal appearance. They perform such household chores as cleaning their rooms, helping with the kitchen work and 'straightening up" the house.

Deborah Anne and William Mark are exposed to good music and literature as part of their home environment. They are developing an awareness of possible career choices through reading and hobbies.

Mary assures her family an excellent diet by properly varied menus. She contributes by freezing vegetables in season, by making jams, jellies, preserves, relishes and pickles. She also freezes main dishes and baked goods

Morrow Juniors Cop 10 Ribbons at Fair



Morrow Junior Woman's Club Holds Meeting



To have each citizen of Morrow a registered voter is the aim of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club. For this reason a special registration is scheduled for Saturday, November 18, at Morrow City Hall between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 12 noon.

According to Tootsie McKinnon, City Clerk, all persons who shall have by December 2, 1967, been a resident of the city of Morrow for six months and a resident of the State of Georgia for one year and who shall have by such date be qualified to vote in election for members of the General Assembly of Georgia are eligible to register to vote in the December 2 election for a Mayor and two Councilmen. However, at this time, one will be able to register for general elections and city elections as both officials will be present for registration.

November 20 will be the last day for registering, therefore we are hopeful every eligible citizen will be registered before that date.

This is the ninth year that such collection of paintings and prints has been made available through the cooperation of the University Art Department.


