Dr. Turpin is a native of Ashland, Ky. He served as an enlisted man in the United States Navy and did his in-ternship at Crawford W. Long Hospital in Atlanta, and resi-

dency in general practice at Sonoma County Hospital, Santa Rosa, Calif.

He was associated with Dr. Fred Simonton at Chickamauga, Ga., for six months in general practice. Then he had a practice at Coronado, Calif.

He founded Project Concern, Inc. in 1961 with the purpose of providing medical assistance in the developing area of the world. In 1962, he estab-lished the clinic in the Walled City in Kowloon, Hong Kong.

DR. TURPIN has been active in social and civic work having served as vice presi-dent of the Coronado PTA and as a member of the education advisory board. He served as a member of the Coronado City Council and as a member of the relief committee and helped establish sister city re-lationship with Puerto Mont, Chile, when the disastrous earthquake struck in 1960.

ONE OF THE highlights of

the Tuesday banquet was a panel discussion on safety featuring Dean Dickins, Sam Philips and Al Reddick.

Miss Dickins of the Atlanta Traffic and Safety Council stressed that individuals can save lives and prevent injuries.

"Think what you can do as a group," she said. "Your power is tremendous. Death on the highways is a disease. It can only be stopped by every individual working on it. There won't be a Salk vaccine for highways deaths. It must begin with you. You can become a better driver by taking the defensive driving course. Everybody thinks they know how to drive, but take the defensive driving course and you KNOW you'll be a better driver."

MR. PHILIPS of the Teenage Safety Council said teenagers and safety are one of the biggest problems. The Council is a division of the Georgia Safety Council.

"The Teen-age Council has seven members," he said. "A long-range plan is to have a teen-age safety program in every high school. Our organization is one year old, and you, as clubs, can help. We are having a safety confer-

ence and we hope clubs will contact local high school principals for the names of students who want to attend.

"You can help. If schools in your area don't have a teenage safety council, you can

start one. If your school has such a council, support it."

Mr. Reddick, director of Allstate Foundation, spoke on legislation and safety. He asked the women to continue their safety projects and talk

with their legislators about safety programs for the state.

Mrs. Michell urged all clubwomen to get behind reexamination for drivers' licenses and to recognize their own limitations.

GFWC Holds Meet at Seaside

JEKYLL ISLAND—Georgia Federation of Women's Clubs members have again mobilized at Georgia's year-round playground for a few days of fun, play and a little work.

More than 500 women have come to Jekyll Island to actend the 73rd annual convention of the state organization.

Seventh District (Marietta area) members planned the convention at home and brought it to the ocean—but not without a few minor problems.

The Town and Country Junior Woman's Club of Marietta had charge of making the tote bags to be given as convention favors.

"We started making them out of a material lined in black," said Mrs. Chester Slater, immediate past president of the club. "I don't know how many we finished before we discovered the black was rubbing off on everything; we had to start over.

"WE GLUED little flags on the bags, and when we finished, someone knocked over a bottle of glue we were using and it spilled on a carpet I had down just a week. I called the chemical manufacturing company that made the glue and asked what to do. I was told to put water on it and keep it wet. I poured three buckets of water on the carpet. Then I had to rent a commercial machine to get the water out of the carpet. It worked and there wasn't a spot left."

The club with 29 members made 600 bags and it was the job of the Mareitta Junior Woman's Club to fill them with souvenirs.

"We had 30 items to put in," Mrs. Oliver Studstill, president, said. "We packed the items in plastic bags and planned to bring them to Jekyll in a station wagon, but they wouldn't fit. So we had to rent a trailer to bring them down.

"I'VE NEVER pulled a trailer and was afraid to try. So my husband drove the car down with the trailer and then caught the bus home."

The Town and Country Club had charge of a dummy to bring down. They call it a naked lady, but they also call her Matilda. She had to model a bridal gown made by Mrs. George Marcinko for the Creative Home Decorating show.

"We have taken Matilda everywhere," Mrs. Slater said. "She went to the district meeting and when her dress won, we had to bring her here. The gown looks better on her than just hanging."

A local department store let the club borrow the manikin. She was too large to fit into the car, so she traveled in pieces — head on the floorboard, legs on the back seat and arms in the trunk.

The Marietta Juniors had another problem planning a convention 325 miles from home.

FOR THE International Arts banquet the women wanted a large map of the world to put on a wall at the Aquarama. Several members met at the home of Seventh District President Mrs. Ronald Cofer to make the map.

"We took 35 pieces of poster paper," Mrs. Cofer said, "and spread it out on the

floor. One girl literally stood on her head to draw the map. Then we used 7 pounds of glitter and 3 pounds of glue to cover the map. When we finished, her home was permanently decorated for Christmas."

The women stacked the pieces and brought them here. Then there was the problem of getting them up onto the brick wall. The maintenance crew at the Aquarama came through and nailed wooden poles to the walls so that the women could staple the mural.

MOST of Monday was spent setting up exhibits such as Creative Home Decorating show. This is something new this year that came from the General Federation of Women's Clubs to get women more interested in creative homemaking.

Mrs. John C. Rheay of Jonesboro is state chairman of the division which is in the Home Life department. The contest has three categories: Creative Home Furnishings, Crafts and Sewing and Needlework.

Women who entered the event have been working with youth groups and teaching them in these categories.

MRS. RHEAY also has charge of the Creative Costume competition with 18 women participating. These women have created costumes which they feel are ideal for clubwomen to wear to club luncheons and meetings. They will be judged on

the way they fit and the accessories used.

Tuesday's activities included a series of panel discussions on the seven departments of work of the Federation. These discussions were requested by members so that they can learn where they can serve best.

They Urge Better Films for Youth

Georgia Federation of Women's Clubs delegates unanimously passed a Better Films for Youth resolution during the final day of the 73rd annual convention.

The resolution, which was written by the Augusta Junior Woman's Club, was introduced by Mrs. Joe J. Hewell Sr. of Atlanta, resoultions chairman.

THE CLUB said it was vitally concerned over pornography, obscenity and sexual abnormalities as the dominent theme in the motion picture industry today. The club reported that the new Motion Picture Association code of self-regulation is neither reliable nor being enforced, and statistics prove that the movie audiences are made up primarily of our youth in their formative years.

Mrs. Robert G. Lingenfel-

Mrs. Robert G. Lingenfelser, chairman of the Better Films for Youth Committee of the Augusta Junior Woman's Club, spoke on behalf of the resolution. She has four boys and four girls between the ages of 1 and 11.

"I can still select the movies my children see," she said, "because they are small, but I am concerned with movie theaters showing adult previews during a Walt Disney or other family type movie. I'm concerned with what teen-agers are seeing."

WHEN the Augusta club started the project, Georgia had no obscenity law to protect minors. However, April 2 of this year, Gov. Maddox signed Act No. 191 which deals with minors under 18 years of age. The act defined obscenity in detail and in-

cluded not just movies, but literature and any other pornography.

"Our reason for working with better films concerns youth and not adults. We aren't trying to tell adults what to see or what not to, but we want to work with theater managers to keep minors out of theaters where Adults Only films are being shown."

Mrs. Lingenfelser said that from the very beginning her club has made this a community project. She set up a committee of outstanding community leaders. They went to movie managers in Augusta; told them they wanted to work with them and gave their grievances such as showing adults previews at a family movie.

"WE CONDUCTED a survey in Augusta's junior and senior high schools to see if the majority of those attending movies are minors. We found it to be true. We sent out 13,000 questionnaires to these students and they overwhelmingly named 'The Graduate' as the best picture they had seen.

"We asked theater managers to print the code as to what type movie they are showing, and we asked the newspapers to run a brief synopsis and rating of each movie playing the next week. We asked the managers to confine all real raw movies to one theater. And they agreed, but the movies leave this theater and go to the driveins. We asked that adult movies be shown in the downtown area, and family movies in the neighborhoods. The movie managers have agreed to do

this whenever possible."

The c'ub conducted a campaign to explain the green

sheet put out by the Motion Picture Industry which explains what movies are about and lets the public know what is being shown.

"We distributed 10,000 green sheets a month in Augusta for four months. We sent sepakers to many PTA and civic group meetings explaining the green sheet and the type of movies minors are seeing.

"We stopped distributing the sheets because after four months we felt the public knew they could get the sheets at theaters in our area."

ROSEMARIE MARKGRAF, of the public relations department of the Motion Picture Industry of America, spent three days in Augusta at the request of the club speaking at meetings open to the general public.

"We wanted the public to hear the industry's side as to why they are making this type of adult movies. The industry is interested in what we are trying to do in Georgia, and I have received special delivery letter after letter from them," Mrs. Lingenfelser said.

"We can talk about dirty movies all the time, but it is time to stand up and do something. If we don't nip this in the bud now, it will be too late. We now have a bill on obscenity for the first time, but this bill won't be any good if people don't act on it.

"WE URGE club members to get to know their district attorneys, as complaints are to be filed with these officials. A theater manager will be given written notice and he will have 30 days to show no cause to the court.

"We have proclaimed May as Better Films for Youth Month to explain our new state law. We want to make it clear that minors will be prosecuted along with theater managers. We urge clubwomen to explain the new rating system of movies—G, M, R and X—and ask managers to use the rating system in their advertising and on their marquees.

"Women should meet with their local theater managers and let them know we are aware of the law and we want it enforced and will work with

Mrs. Wilton W. Stewart Sr. of Avondale Estates, president of the Fourth District, said she received a request from women in her area to do something about movies being shown.

"WE TALKED with our theater manager and he agreed not to show any more adult moves, but we, the clubwomen, didn't support his theater when he started showing family movies. He had to go back to showing adult movies to stay in business.

"If we ask him to stop

showing dirty movies and he does, we have to support him and go to his theater when he shows good movies."

Brunswick Junior Woman's

Club requested a children's matinee in their area and at first were turned down. The manager finally agreed to try it for a month, but the women had to have at least 200 children attend. The club reported attendance has been between 500 and 1,000 each week and the matinees are continuing.

A group of clubs in the Brunswick are? worked together to get a theater not to show an adult movie they learned was coming. Within 24 hours after they started to work, they received word the movie would not be shown.

A DELEGATE to the convention suggested that if women have not seen a dirty movie, women should see one so that they will knov what the Federation is fighting.

Another delegate asked if the speaker could recommend one.

The speaker said she found "Vixen" was dirty and walked out on it.

Mrs. W. B. Mitchell, state president, said, "We shouldn't support this type movie when we hear it is dirty, but we need to know what they are like.

"Movies aren't the same as they were when most of us went in the '40s. Adults stay home and watch TV today," she said, "and see old movies. They're unaware of what is being shown to teen-agers in the theaters. I hope every club president in the state will write me during the next month and let me know what her club is doing to support Better Films for Youth Month."

A Tour Through The New Executive Center

The architecture of the new Executive Center on West Paces Ferry Road in Atlanta reflects the Greek Revival style which was popular in Georgia and the nation in the first half of the nineteeth century. Historically, this style has been used on private homes as well as on public buildings. It is therefore particularly appropriate for this important building which will serve both as the residence of the Governor and his family and as the site of dinners, meetings, receptions and other official gatherings.

Thirty massive fluted columns surround the rectangular brick house and support a simple wood cornice. Ornamental details on both the exterior and the interior were also patterned on neo-classical designs. For the interior of the house, a valuable and noteworthy collection of early nineteenth century furnishings has been acquired. For the most part, these furnishings are American-made pieces in the neo-classical style, reflecting the same artistic preference as the mansion's Greek revival architecture.

To render the building comfortable and functional as a private and a public home, the architects arranged the rooms on the upper two stories so that the public living and dining rooms occupy the front or southern portion of the building while the family living quarters occupy the rear or northern end. Visible only from the rear of the mansion is a ground floor which consists of a large reception and dining room for five hundred guests, a kitchen, a laundry room, mechanical room, freezer lockers, garage and quarters for the security guards and other house staff members.

As one enters the Executive Center from the South, the entrance facing West Paces Ferry Road, he steps onto the marble floor of the state reception hall. This room is furnished sparingly with an octagonal veneered pedestal-base table, two cane-seated armchairs and bronze busts of George Washington and Benjamin Franklin, both by the noted French sculptor, Houdon. To the left is a guest bedroom furnished with an American-made sleigh bed, a late nineteenth century French wall panel depicting "Psyche showing her jewels to her sisters," and an early nineteenth century English needlework rug.

Also opening to the left from the reception hall is the state living room, a large room which measures approximately forty feet by twenty-five feet. The furnishings in this room are American-made pieces of the Federal period, 1790-1825. Among these are two marble-top pier tables, three mahogany candlestands, two pedestalbase pembroke tables, two armchairs, a chest of drawers and a sofa table. The two mahogany sofas are attributed to the workshop of Duncan Phyfe, a prominent cabinetmaker working in New York City early in the nineteenth century. Two mahogany swivel-top card tables are attributed to Charles Honore Lannuier, a talented Frenchman working in New York at the same time as Phyfe. Along one wall stands a magnificent English double breakfront secretary-bookcase. On the opposite wall are two American-made eagle-top gilt mirrors. The handsome parquet floor is visible around an Aubusson carpet.

Moving clockwise toward the rear of the mansion, one enters the family living room which is paneled in butternut. The furnishings in this room include: an American Federal sofa, a saber-leg drinking table of Baltimore origin, two American Federal tub chairs, a bull's eye mirror and a secretary attributed to the Seymours, early nineteenth century cabinet-makers in Salem, Massachusetts. An Austrian Savonnerie rug covers the floor.

The antiques in the family dining room include an early nineteenth century chest of drawers, a dining table, two pine tables, six Phyfe-style sidechairs and a Chinese rug.

Continuing in a clockwise direction through the kitchen and pantry, one next enters the state dining room. Immediately visible is the extension dining table, made in America around 1810; this table can be opened to a length of fourteen feet. Placed around the table are eighteen chairs, modern reproductions of an unusual early nineteenth century American chair in the possession of The Telfair Academy of Arts and Sciences in Savannah, Georgia. A marble-top side table of New York City origin stands along the east wall beneath a Federal looking glass. Along the north wall is a handsome sideboard made in the Philadelphia area around 1815, similar in design to a chest of drawers along the opposite wall. Flanking the chest are two New York Phyfe-style tripod-base card tables with cloverleaf tops. An oriental carpet covers the floor.

Other rooms on the first floor include: a small library paneled in walnut and furnished with early nineteenth century American-made pembroke and pier tables, a backgammon table, two armchairs and a sofa; the ladies' powder room furnished with an American-made "Grecian" couch and an early nineteenth century card table; the main stair hall with a pier table attributed to Lannuier, an American looking glass, an urn decorated with a rare portrait of Benjamin Franklin, an early nineteenth century gilt wood and metal chandelier which formerly hung in the Standard Club in Atlanta, and a large portrait of Hugh McCall, first official historian of the State of Georgia.

The front central room on the second floor has been designated "The President's Suite" and will serve as a guest bedroom for visiting dignitaries. This important room is furnished with a Pennsylvania-made four-poster bed dating from the 1790's and an American Chippendale slant-top desk as well as a pedestal-base table, a card table, shield-back sidechairs, a sofa and a chest of drawers, all pieces of American and English origin dating from the early years of the nineteenth century. On the south wall hang portraits of Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe, works by an unknown artist. A nineteenth century Ushak carpet covers the floor.

Next to the President's suite is a small guest lounge furnished with a Federal-style sofa and a lady's writing desk, both believed to be of Massachusetts origin. The walls above two English card tables are decorated with Psyche panels similar to that in the guest bedroom on the first floor.

To the west of the Presidential suite is a guest bedroom. Noteworthy in this room are a reproduction English Chippendale four-poster bed with canopy and an English chest of drawers.

Continuing in a clockwise direction, one enters the Governor's study, paneled in oak, and the Governor's bedroom. The major pieces of furniture in the latter are a tester bed and a large English Regency gentleman's desk. American andirons stand beneath a wood mantel which was salvaged from the Robert Maddox residence, formerly on this property.

The First-Lady's bedroom is the central room at the northern end of the house. The bed, with an early nineteenth century French headboard, is flanked by two tables from the old Executive Mansion on Peachtree

Street. Also in this room are a late eighteenth century French trumeau and a English satinwood baak table.

In the family sitting room are a sofa, an arm chair and tables, all pieces brought from the Ansley Park Executive Mansion, as well as some antique English pieces: two card tables, a chest of drawers and a secretary-bookcase with eglomise glass paneled doors.

Continuing in a clockwise direction toward the front of the house, one finds some early nineteenth century American and English pieces in the hall and two family bedrooms. Of particular importance are a handsome sideboard table, an American Chippendale-style slant-top desk, two American chests of drawers and three wash-stands also of American origin. Most of the carpets in these and other rooms on this floor were made in Georgia; notable exceptions are an American needlework rug and a Turkish rug both dating from the first half of the nineteenth century.

The First-Lady's office, on the southeast corner of the mansion, is furnished with English and American antique pieces dating from the late eighteenth century. Included here are a painted and gilt English sofa, a pembroke table, a serpentine-front chest of drawers and a desk. Displayed on the north and west walls are prints depicting early Georgia scenes.

In many of the mansion's rooms hang curtains styled after the fashions popular in England and America early in the nineteenth century. Reflecting the fashions of that same era are elegant antique chandeliers and handsome marble mantels of European origin and some distinctive Chinese and European porcelains. In addition, the Executive Center's collection includes paintings by the following distinguished eighteenth and nineteenth century American artists: Benjamin West, Ralph E. W. Earl, Thomas Doughty, John Neagle, Severin Roesen, Samuel King and Alvan Fisher.

The antiques used to furnish Georgia's new Executive Center have been selected with great care under the direction of Mr. Henry Green, a connoisseur of the American decorative arts and general chairman of the Fine Arts Committee for the Executive Mansion. These furnishings have been acquired from leading dealers in this country and form a collection of great merit, a collection in which all Georgians will take great pride.
