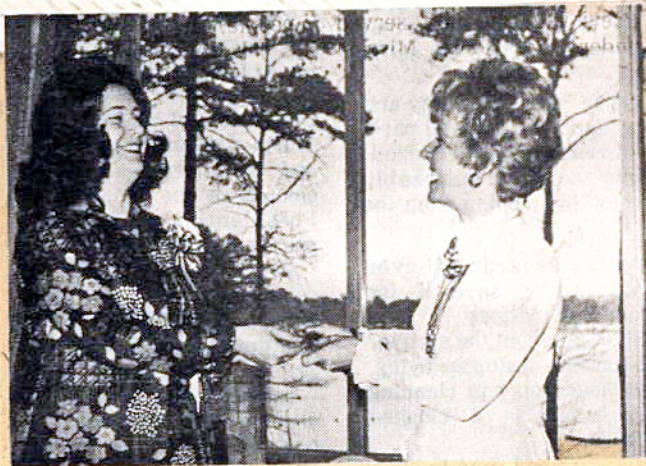

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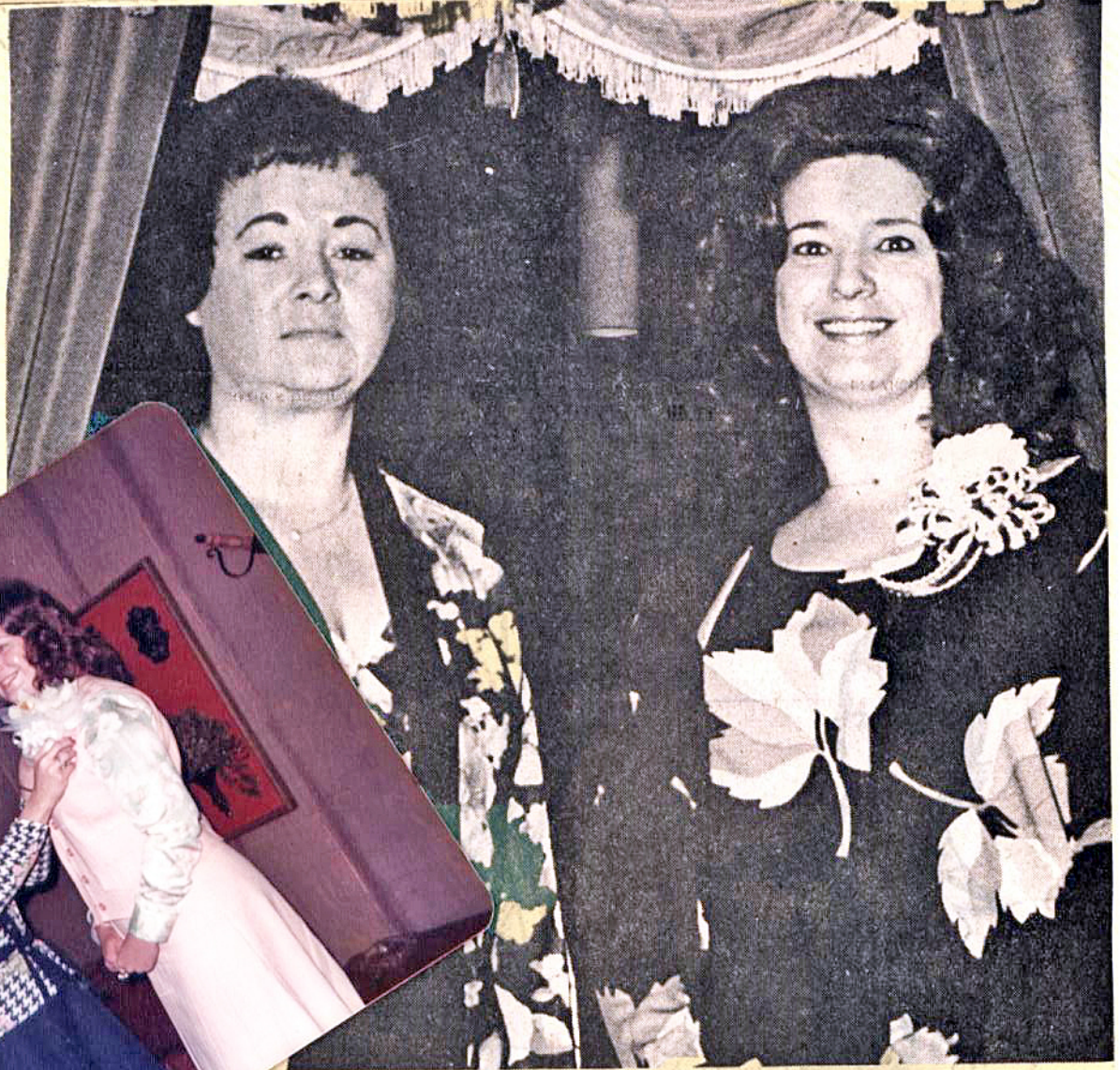

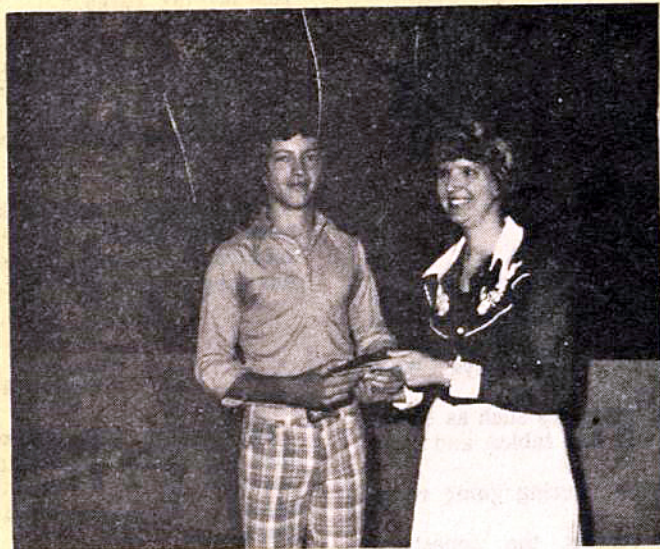

Also present were Mrs. Virginia Cheeves, representing the home life department, and Mrs. Judi Wester, representing the arts department.



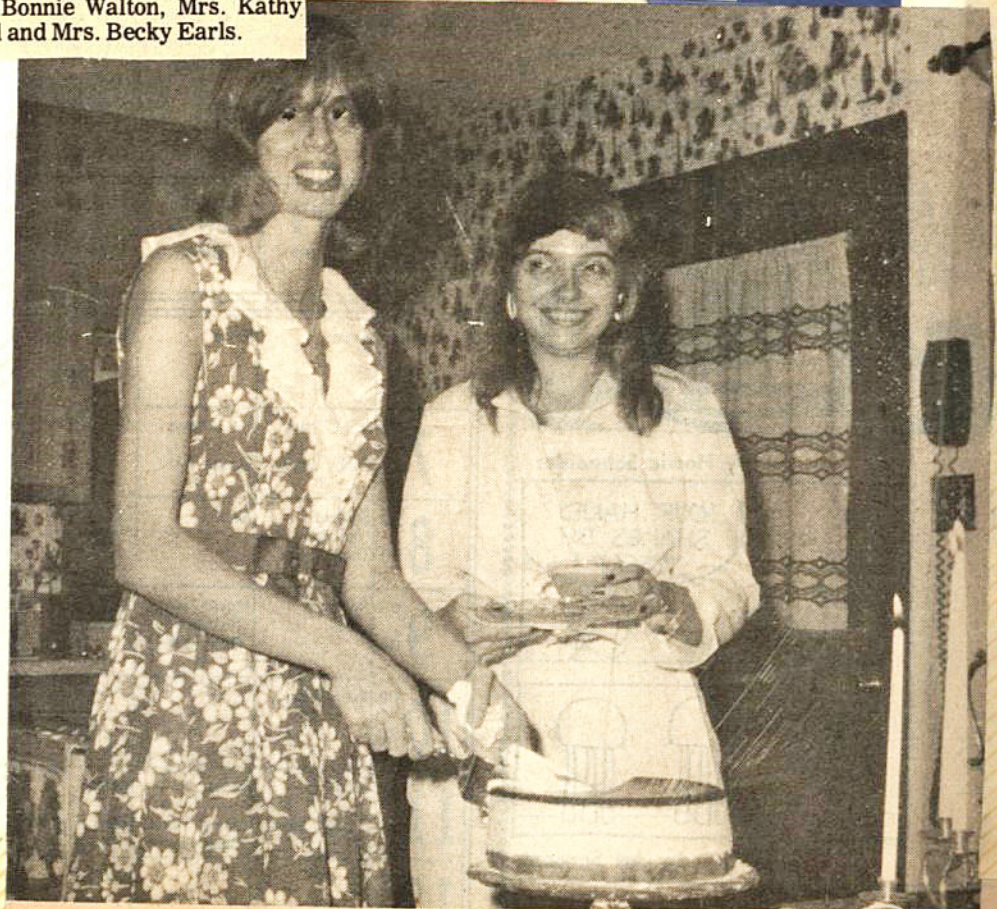

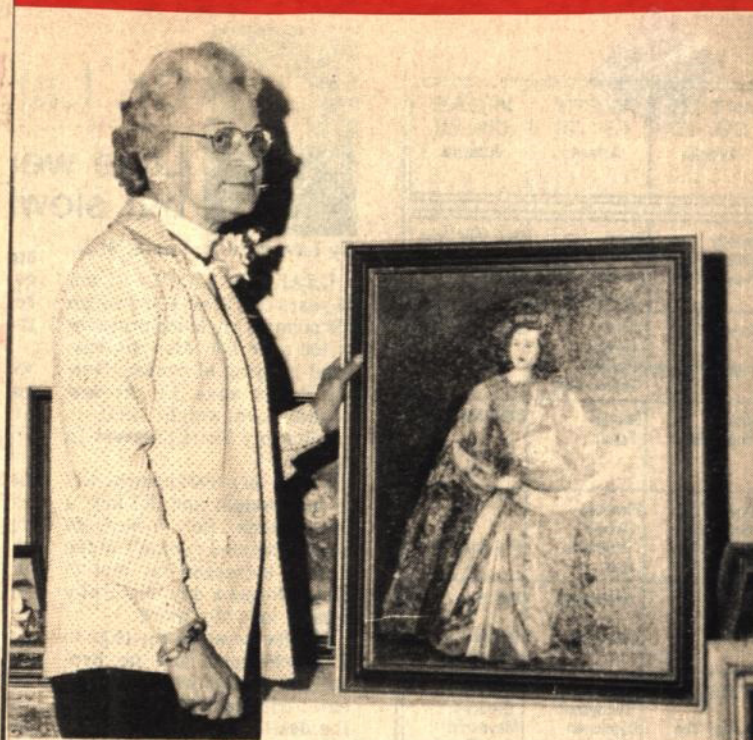

Free Cancer Society BSE Clinics set Oct. 30

Special volunteers of the Clayton County Unit of the American Cancer Society will be working to provide a free breast self-examination clinic for women of this community from 1 p.m. until 3 p.m., on Saturday, Oct. 30.

Clinics in the Clayton County area are planned at two locations. One will be at the First Baptist Church in Riverdale and the other one

will be at Clayton Junior College in Building G.

Mrs. Carol Henderson, Chairman of the local project, said, "Each woman coming to one of the locations should bring a large clean bath towel to be used in the BSE instruction."

Women in Clayton County have the opportunity of taking part in the program, which has been described by Dr. Jim Askew, local

volunteer medical advisor, as the "most practical method of breast cancer control open to the majority of American women."

American Cancer Society reports show that only 23 percent of adult women are currently involved in regular monthly BSE. Early detection of Cancer, or other disorders, can be greatly increased if more did, and

cure rates approach 85 percent if the disease is detected and treated early.

Mrs. Henderson said, "Many of the breast cancer deaths are not necessary, and the program in Clayton County on Oct. 30 provides every adult female with a time and place to do something for herself and everyone who loves and depends upon her."

Goals task force listens to citizens

The "goals task force" committee of the Clayton County Chamber of Commerce Thursday night turned attentive ears to citizens' viewpoints on issues they expect to help shape the future growth and development of the county.

Although the public meeting at Clayton Junior College was sparsely attended, chamber officials hope it could be the start of something big, as far as citizen input of ideas is concerned.

Several attending voiced proposals for future goals. These included a civic center, stricter zoning, an in-county transit system, promotion of Clayton County's school system as one of the state's finest, tax incentives to encourage industrial growth, and boosting Clayton Junior College to full

four-year college status.

Special forms were distributed and those attending also offered written suggestions. The Chamber task force will study each of these suggestions along with others obtained through a questionnaire earlier distributed in the chamber's "Pacesetter" publication.

After the study, a report will be drafted and made public this fall, according to Ed Blalock Jr., goals task force committee chairman.

Other members of the committee are Dr. Paul Fitzpatrick, Bob Maddox, Martin Burks and Roland Downing.

Stan May, Executive vice president of the chamber, opened the meeting with an explanation of purpose and then turned the session over to the committee to hear discussion.

WOMAN IN THE NEWS

The woman behind the gavel of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club is managing a job she has been familiar with for 14 years.

Mrs. Jane Young is one of two charter members still with the club and is now working in her third term as president.

After moving to Morrow in 1961 with her husband Dutch and son Dane, she helped found the club. A few months later she served as its second president.

In her work with the club, Mrs. Young says she has always been mindful of its civic responsibilities.

The club donated a painting to Morrow of the old city hall when it was dedicated several years ago.

The painting was destroyed by fire, but will be replaced in August when the new city hall is dedicated.

Mrs. Young will also serve as hostess during the official dedication, along with other members of the club.

"Our membership has varied over the years," said Mrs. Young. "A couple of years ago we had 50 members, but with so many people moving out of the area and going to work we're back to a little over 20 now."

The club's main project since its inception, according to Mrs. Young, was the Morrow library, which was dedicated last year.

'Special Reason' Guides Her

Mrs. Carole Henderson of Morrow has found a career in volunteering her time to local civic organizations because of what she calls "some special reason."

With that special reason and approximately six years of work for the Clayton County Unit of the American Cancer Society, Mrs. Henderson was recently named as the local chapter's volunteer of the year.

"It's a homely experience to receive it because you

know how hard everyone else worked," she said. "I didn't accomplish it by myself."

Mrs. Henderson said that no close family experience with cancer prompted her volunteer work with the group.

"I do volunteer work at the hospital," she said. "I saw the tragedy that comes from cancer. I saw the suffering that might have been eliminated."

Mrs. Henderson began her volunteer work against cancer as the Morrow co-

chairman of the annual-education funds crusade about six years ago.

She then served as the chairman of the Breast-Uterine Task force for the local cancer society unit and also on the task force at the society's state level.

Mrs. Henderson said the purpose of the task force is to "impress upon women the importance of an annual pap smear (a test for uterine cancer) and of breast self-examination."

"Our goal by the year 1976 was to see that all

Clayton County women would have had a pap smear and know how to perform the self-examination," she said.

"I think we reached our goal," she said, adding that although not every woman was contacted, "more know about it now than we would have."

According to the cancer society, "if one life can be saved it is all worthwhile," she said.

Mrs. Henderson said that in her work with the cancer society she has done ever-

anything from "standing on a street corner handing out literature to showing films at beauty shops, health spas and apartment complexes."

"Our biggest project was to have the first free pap clinic," she said.

Mrs. Henderson and her husband John, a vice-president with the Citizens and Southern National Bank, live on Graceland Circle in Morrow.

They are originally from Mobile, Ala.
