More recently, a wholesale food co-op was begun that serves twenty-four area families. A cookbook is now being printed that will provide a continuing project for the club. All club members contributed recipes that were compiled by the Budget and Finance Committee.

Two annual socials are given: a Christmas party and a summer activity. During the year members attend as a group such events as the Decorator Showhouse, Christmas at Callanwolde, and the Theater of the Stars.

Our club has an open membership and has no age restriction. The regular meeting is held the first Thursday of each month at the Maddox Road Community Center (Fire Station #8) on Maddox Road at 7:30 P.M.

Morrow Women Aid Nature Preserve

The Morrow Junior Womens Club has donated approximately \$200 to benefit the William H. Reynolds Memorial Nature Preserve in Morrow.

The club raised the money through the sale of "Culinary Keepsakes," a

treasury of recipes collected, compiled and distributed by the conservation department of the MJWC.

THE REYNOLDS Preserve has been adopted as an ongoing project of the club, earning the local women's group a first place

project award during the 6th-District Spring Conference of Womens Clubs this year.

Specifically, the proceeds from the sale of the recipe booklet will be used for the purchase of signs which will be erected along a trail which preserve directors

hope to develop at the park site.

According to Pat Robertson, MJWC conservation department chairman, the decision to support the Preserve and to help toward its future development was made after the group consulted with Clayton Junior College's Dr. O.C. Lamb, chairman of the Preserve's Board of Directors, and learned of the Preserve's needs.

MJWC MEMBERS submitted favorite recipes to include in the cookbook and conservation department members designed, compiled and assembled the recipes into "Culinary Keepsakes."

"We spent a number of hours putting the book together," remarked Ms. Robertson.

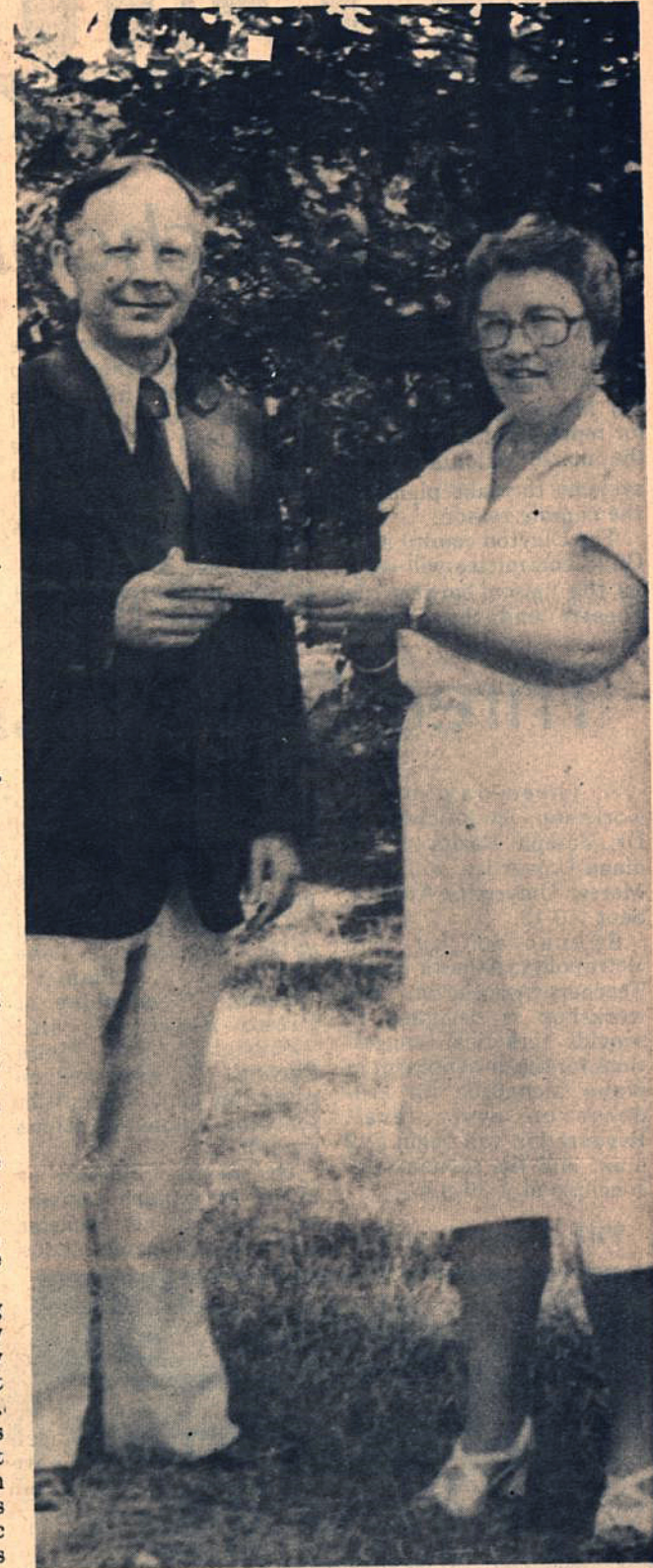
She indicated the club still has some copies of "Culinary Keepsakes" available for sale in the community. The 35-recipe booklet sells for 75 cents and bears the signatures of recipe contributors. All proceeds will go to the Reynolds Preserve.

Ed Robertson also had a booth on home repairs, and the Dorcas Group from the Morrow United Methodist Church served as hostess and provided refreshments.

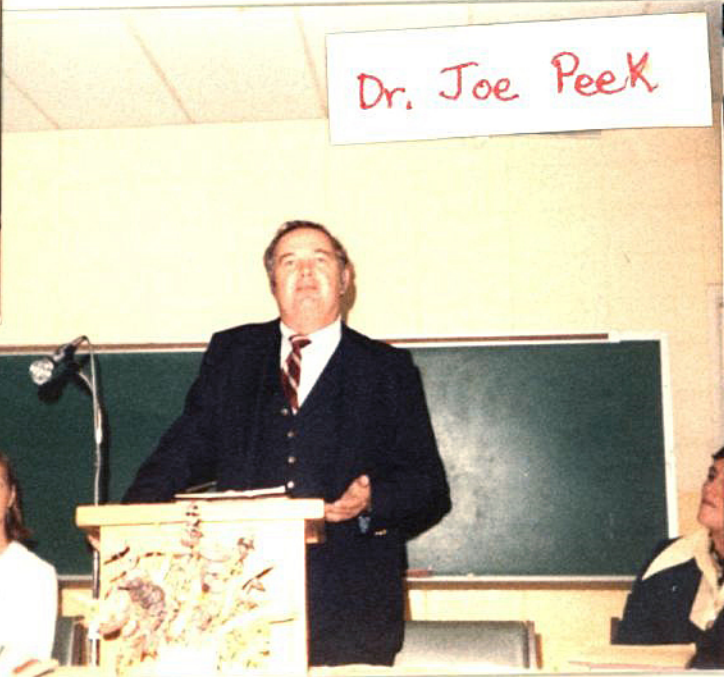

Lawmakers Field Questions At Morrow Woman's Club

State legislators representing Clayton County fielded questions from members of the Morrow Woman's Club on expected bills and issues for the next legislative session to begin Jan. 14.

Bills discussed during the meeting included: legalizing use of marijuana for cancer patients, taking the sales tax off drugs for the elderly, rapid transit coming to Clayton, having an accredited law school begun at Georgia State University, and House Bill 690 on scientific creation being taught in schools.

H.B. 690 has caused more controversy than the Equal Rights Amendment, according to Rep. Jimmy Benefield who said he has received more letters on the proposed bill than he did concerning ERA.

"It's a very simple little old bill," said Rep. Rudolph Johnson, "which says if you teach one (the theory of evolution) you teach the other (scientific creationism). The First U.S. Amendment didn't anticipate there would be no religion in schools."

Benefield, Johnson, Rep. Jim Wood and State Senator Terrell Starr all said they would support the bill as it now stands.

The first paragraph of the Bill is as follows: To assure academic freedom by requiring the teaching and presentation of scientific creationism in public schools if the theory of evolution is taught..."

Definition of the theory of evolution, according to the proposed bill, is "the belief that present processes, acting essentially as at present, suffice to explain the past history of the cosmos, including its assumed evolutionary development from primeval chaos into its present form. The origin and development of the elements, the galaxy, the solar system, of life, of all the species of plants and animals, the origin of man, and the origin of all things are included in this cosmology. Matter or energy, or both, in some form are assumed to be eternal, so that there has never been any real creation of anything ex nihilo (from nothing) as used in this definition."

"Scientific creationism", according to the bill, means "the belief, based upon scientific principles, that there was a time in the past when all matter, energy, and life, and their processes and relationships were created ex

nihilo (from nothing) and fixed by creative and intelligent design."

If references are made to one theory, then the second theory must be presented "equal in content and in context," and the provisions of the Act apply to all public and secondary schools within the state, the bill says.

"Nothing in this Act shall be construed as a control on discussion. Nothing in this Act shall be construed so as to prevent the use of dual textbooks or teaching materials, or

both, to achieve the equal content requirements of this Act," the fourth section says.

Representative Johnson said the State Board of Education should have resolved the issue itself instead of leaving it up to the state legislature.

One proposed bill Representative Benefield said he "expects will create a little excitement" is the legalization of marijuana for use by cancer patients.

"I personally am for anything that will help the cancer

victim. With the right controls, it certainly will be a support for them," he added.

In addition, he noted the sales tax eliminated from cost of drugs for the elderly will cost the state an estimated \$7 to \$8 million dollars. To take the sales tax off cost of food for the same group would cost approximately \$180 million which Benefield did not think the state budget could afford.

Clayton's chances of obtaining rapid transit, or MARTA's services, are not very high for the near future, according to Representative Johnson. Clayton voted 12 to one in a "substantial turn-out" not to levy the one cent sales tax for construction and operation of transit lines.

Representative Wood noted Clayton is a member of MARTA's Board of Directors and the county approved the Board's creation "by the highest majority of any members"; however, the county voted not to levy the sales tax. In addition, most of the funds in construction are federal and estimated at 80 percent of the total monies involved, he said. County commissioners in Clayton would decide whether the tax would be levied and have been approached to do so at the airport terminal which would bring in approximately \$600,000 yearly.

Senator Starr noted, "People in general are now impressed with what they see with MARTA. What really soured us were political considerations. First the station was to have been at Clayton Junior College. Then it was moved to Forest Park, then Mountain View. We would be paying and be lucky to get on in the tip of the county."

MARTA is building a station in the new airport terminal but there is no transit line there and Clayton's concurrence is needed for a levy, which the Clayton delegation is using as a control on the noise pollution issue at the airport, Senator Starr said.

One Woman's Club member asked about chances for Georgia State University's acquiring a law school which would be an accredited one.

Representative Wood noted the Board of Regents has approved a state law school but by a seven-six vote and with a "lot of controversy." In addition, law library funds are not available.
