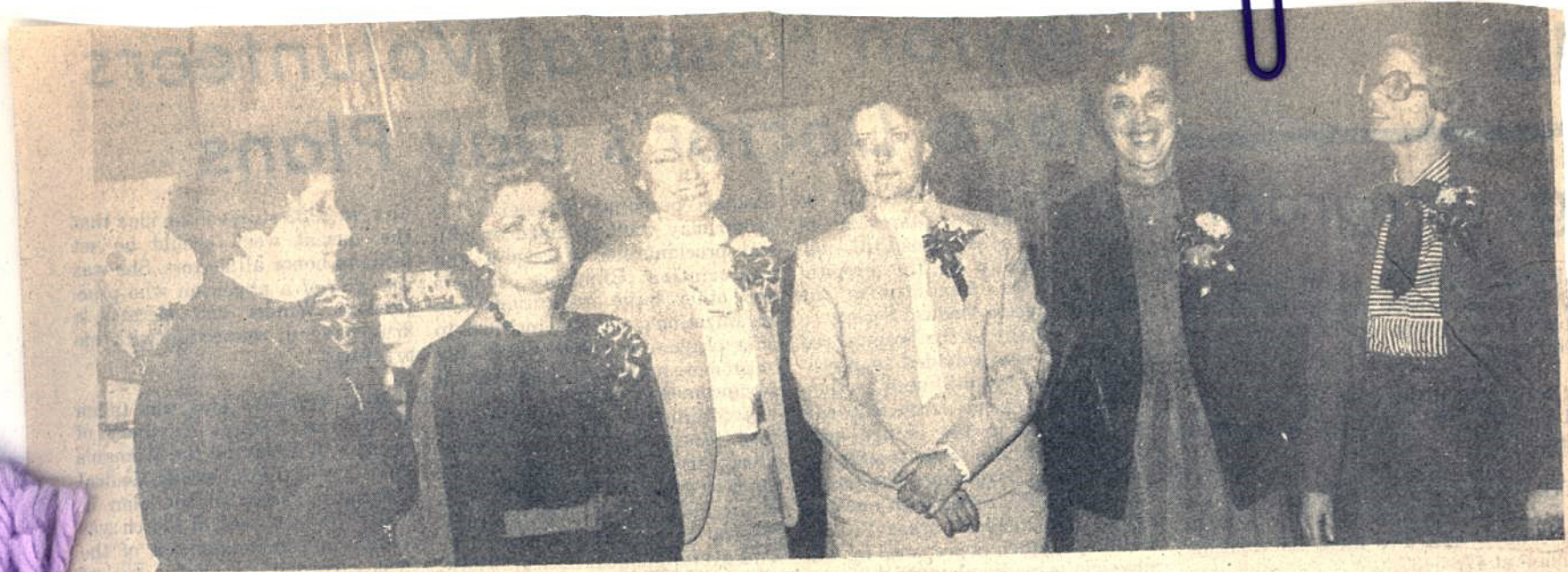

Culinary Hearts Kitchen Planned For April 11

The Morrow Junior Woman's Club (GaFWC-GFWC) in cooperation with the American Heart Association, Clayton County Unit, is sponsoring a Culinary Hearts Kitchen course beginning Thursday, April 11, and running for six consecutive Thursdays.

The classes will be from 7:30 - 9 p.m. at the Georgia Power Kitchen in Jonesboro. Lynn Magnuson, a dietitian at St. Joseph's Hospital, is volunteering her time to teach the classes which will include information on how to cook crea-

tively but with less fat, sodium, cholesterol, sugar and calories.

According to Nutrition Committee Chairman Jayne Troy, the purpose of the program is to educate people and provide them with nutritious alternatives in cooking.

The program is designed especially for people with high blood pressure and heart problems, but the program is good for everybody.

Culinary Kitchen Set For Heart

Six Cooking Classes Begin On April 11

Members of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club and the nutrition committee of the Clayton County Unit of the American Heart Association are busy putting the finishing touches on the plans for a special cooking class.

The organizations have teamed up to sponsor six cooking classes beginning April 11 from 7:30 until 9 p.m. in the Georgia Power kitchen in Jonesboro.

Lynn Magnuson, a dietitian at St. Joseph's Hospital, has volunteered to teach the "Culinary Hearts Kitchen" classes.

The first class, entitled "Introducing the New Way of Eating: Basic Principles," looks at basic concepts of nutrition and health, defines cardiovascular disease and the risk factor, and discusses the American Heart Association Dietary Recommendations: Reducing the Risks and How to Modify Recipes.

The second class includes the new way of cooking meats and poultry; how to show wisely and read labels; how to purchase and prepare lean red meats; and how to purchase and prepare poultry.

The third class will cover "Entrees With A Lighter Touch: Soups and Fish," "How to Enhance Foods with Stocks and Sauces," "How to Create Nutritionally Complete and Harty Soups" and "How To Select and Prepare Fish and Seafood Specialties."

During the fourth class, participants will learn about "Healthy Alternatives: Complementary Proteins and Complex Carbohydrates," "Principles of Preparing Meatless Meals" and "How to Incorporate Grains, Legumes and Starch Vegetables Into Everyday Menus."

"How to Use Vegetables to Add Variety To Meals," and "How to Select and Store Salad Ingredients and Prepare Salads and Dressings" will also be included.

The fifth class in the series will cover the topics of "You Don't Have to Give Up the Goodies: Baking and Desserts," "How to Select and Prepare Breakfast Foods" and "How to Select and Prepare Baked Goods."

Other topics will include "How to Select and Prepare Desserts" and "How to Prepare and Use Fruits Throughout the Menu."

The final class will include "Putting It All Together: Meal Planning," "How to Coordinate Menus," "How to Select Foods When Dining Out," "How to Prepare Quick Meals" and "How to Prepare Foods for Special Occasions."

The cost for series is \$20. For more information or to register, persons may call the Clayton heart office between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. at 961-8325.

The food selections and preparation blended together with creative ways to modify favorite recipes are just a few of the topics covered in the six weeks course being jointly sponsored by the Morrow Junior Woman's Club and the American Heart Association, Clayton County Unit.

The class will begin April 11 from 7:30-9 p.m. and will run continuously through May 16 on Thursday evenings.

"Georgia Power has graciously allowed us the use of their kitchen in downtown Jonesboro," said Lynn Magnuson, dietitian at St. Joseph's Hospital.

Mrs. Magnuson, a member of the Nutrition Committee, will be teaching the Culinary Hearts Kitchen course. Food preparation ideas will include actual recipes, demonstrations and tasting of meats, poultry and seafood, soups, salads and dressings, stocks, sauces and gravies, breads and desserts, breakfasts and beverages.

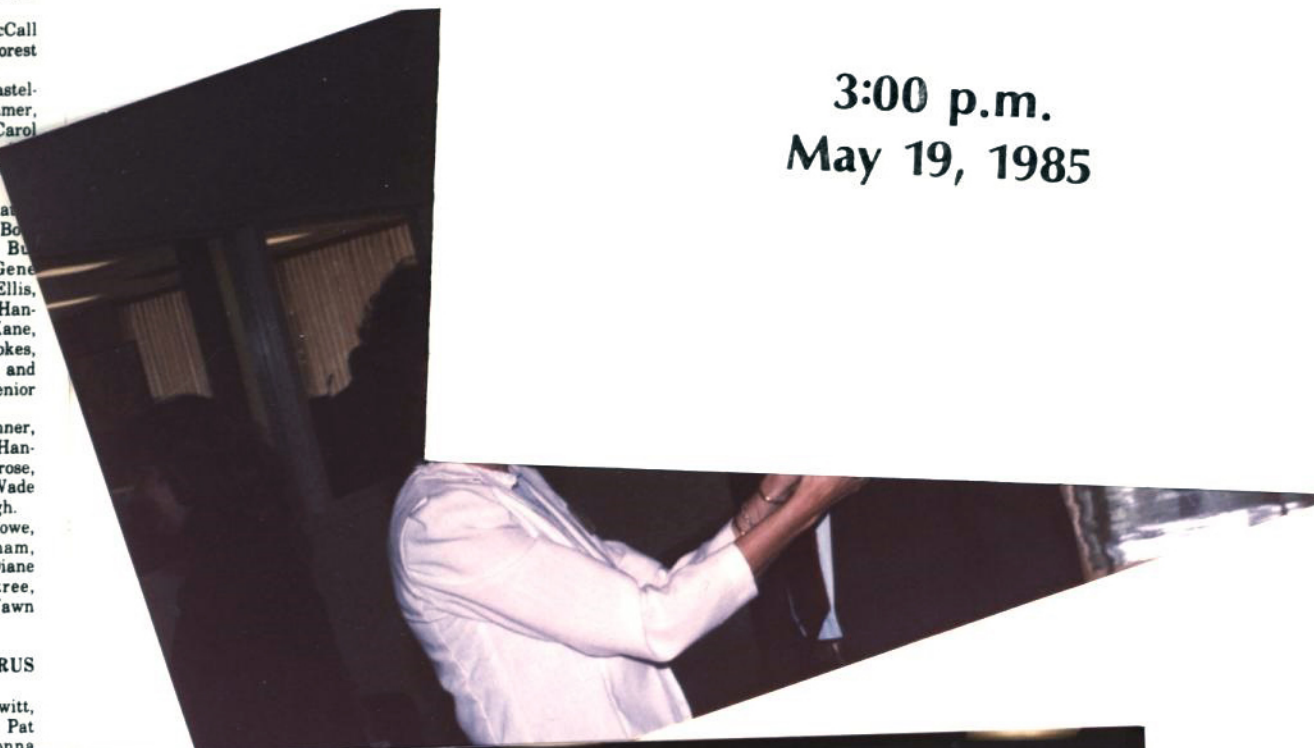

Morrow Jr. Woman's Club Hears Talk About Education

The education department of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club (GaFWC-GFWC) had as its speaker for its monthly meeting, Emmett Lee, Superintendent for instruction for the Clayton County School System. Lee spoke to the club members about Quality Based Education, or Q.B.E., and answered questions concerning education in our county.

Lee opened by saying the new law is extensive and is still being interpreted, but that the main thought is that the continuation of Q.B.E. is important. "There is a commitment here to education," said Lee.

Lee highlighted several points of the law such as: better pay and conditions for teachers, the improvement of student achievement and student discipline, a state-wide standardization of curriculum, and full day kindergarten. Clayton County has wanted and is beginning full day kindergarten this year. Other systems have within three years to go to full day.

MORE ASPECTS OF the law are: expanded remedial programs, more funding for special education programs, and certifying and evaluation of personnel, including formal evaluations for raises. Teachers will be rewarded for merit and outstanding performance. This will enable them to advance in their careers.

According to Lee, under the law, tests scores will be published and explained to the public. There will be incentive grants for innovative programs such as computer programs. Leadership academies for everyone in leadership roles will keep them continually well-informed.



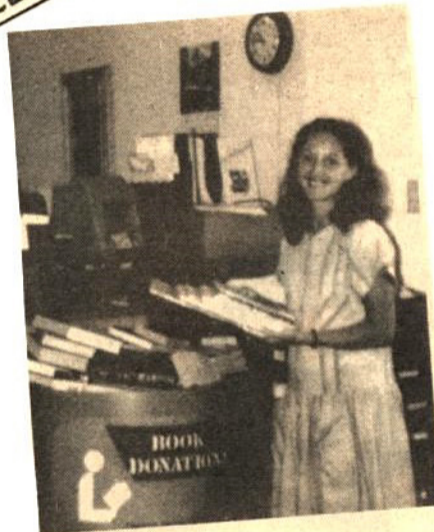

Another area, which will be long-range, will be a central information gathering network, which will

compile information for state-wide sharing.

Lee concluded by saying that "Dr. Charles McDaniel, State School Superintendent, has announced that Q.B.E. means that state and public have a tremendous interest in education. Dr. McDaniel is sure that neither the legislators nor the governor will let Q.B.E. flounder. Its continuation is crucial to our future."

All of the organizations, including

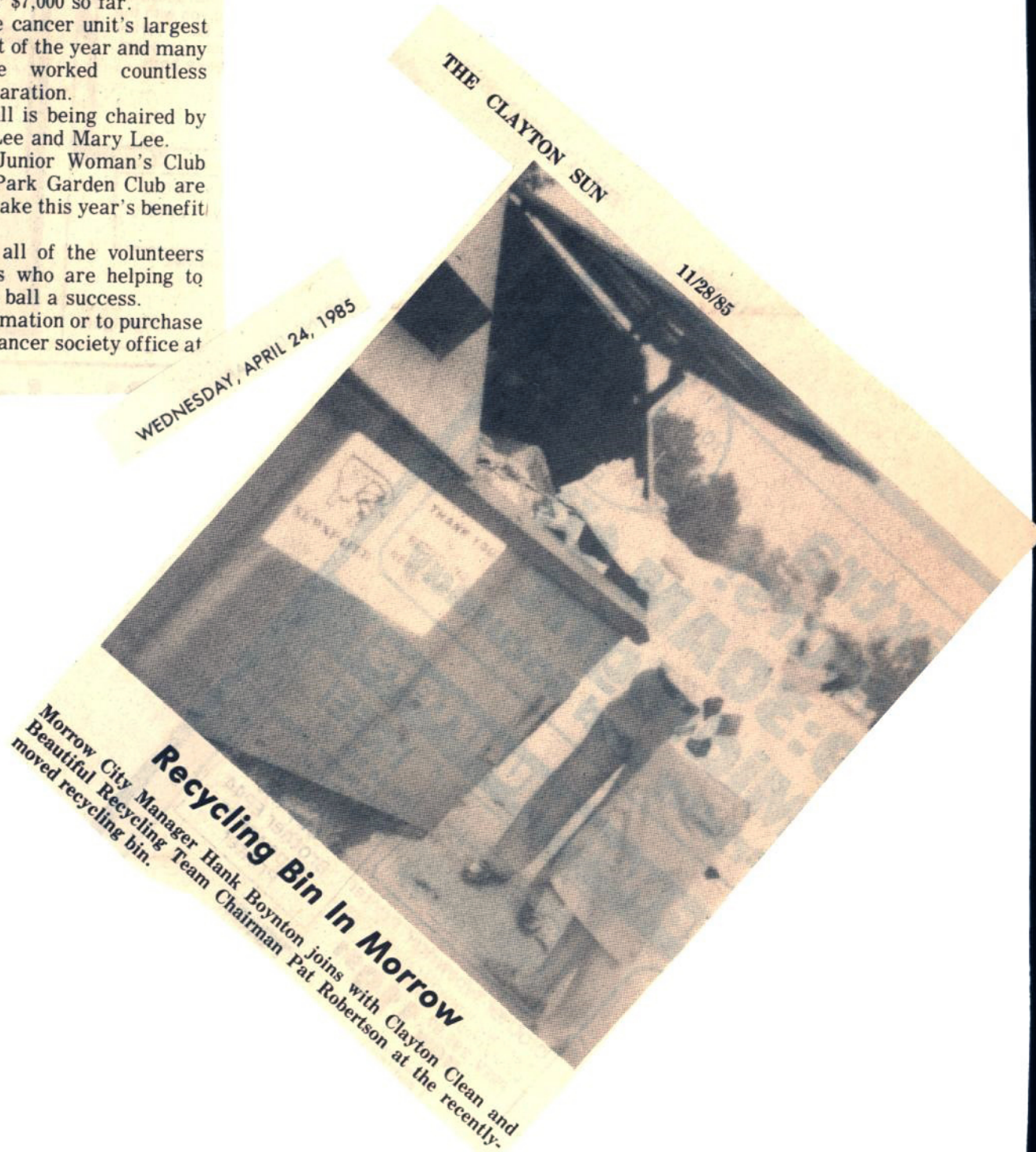

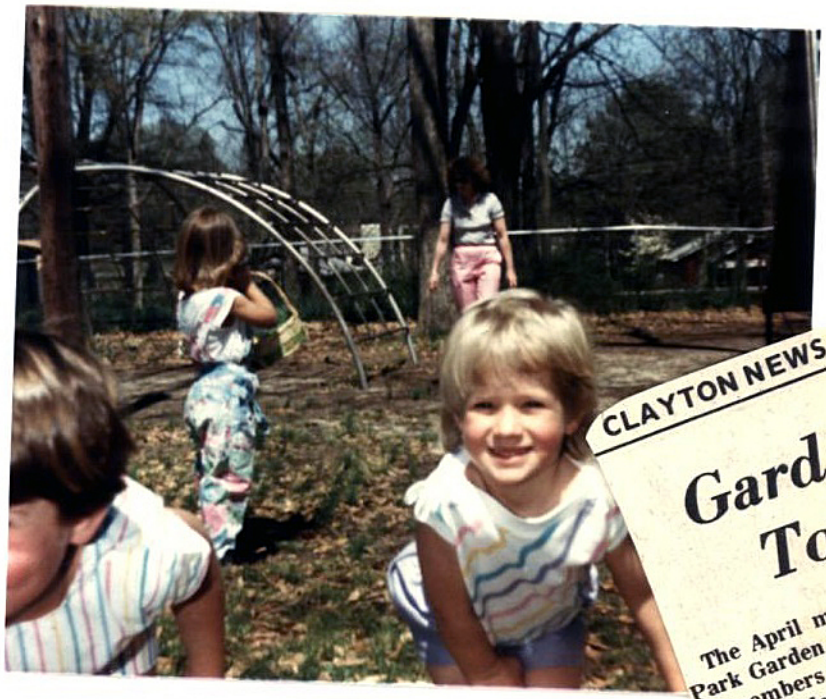

More than \$60,000 was raised last Saturday in the Clayton County WalkAmerica with nearly 1,000 Clayton residents walking the 10-mile distance, according to Z. Stiemke, a spokesman for the March of Dimes.

The walk, which began at the Forest Park City Hall pavilion and concluded at the Clayton County Courthouse in Jonesboro, was able to double its \$30,000 goal.

"We weren't anticipating that number of walkers in Clayton County, because there were only 400 last year," she stated.

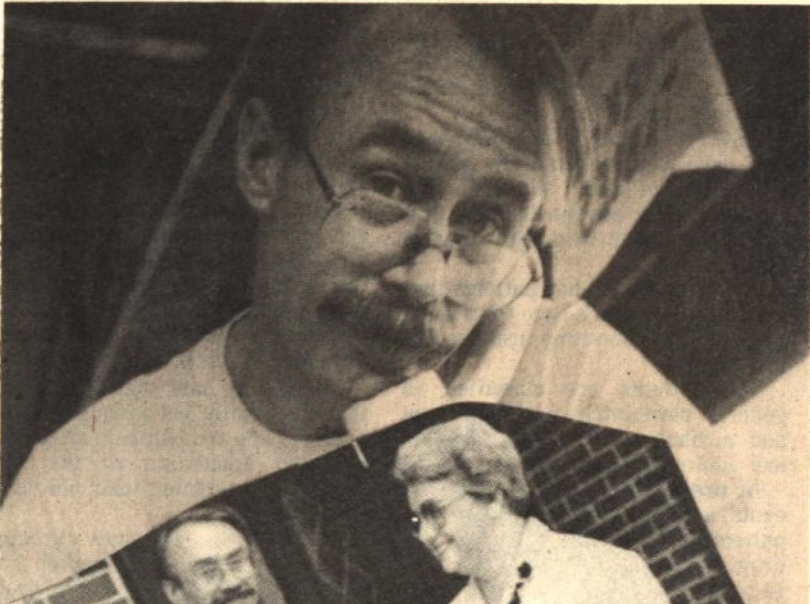
The Clayton WalkAmerica group gave away eight bicycles, which were abandoned and restored, according to Diane Johns, March of Dimes walk coordinator.

"I know that we'll exceed our metro Atlanta goal of \$400,000 this year," Ms. Stiemke said.

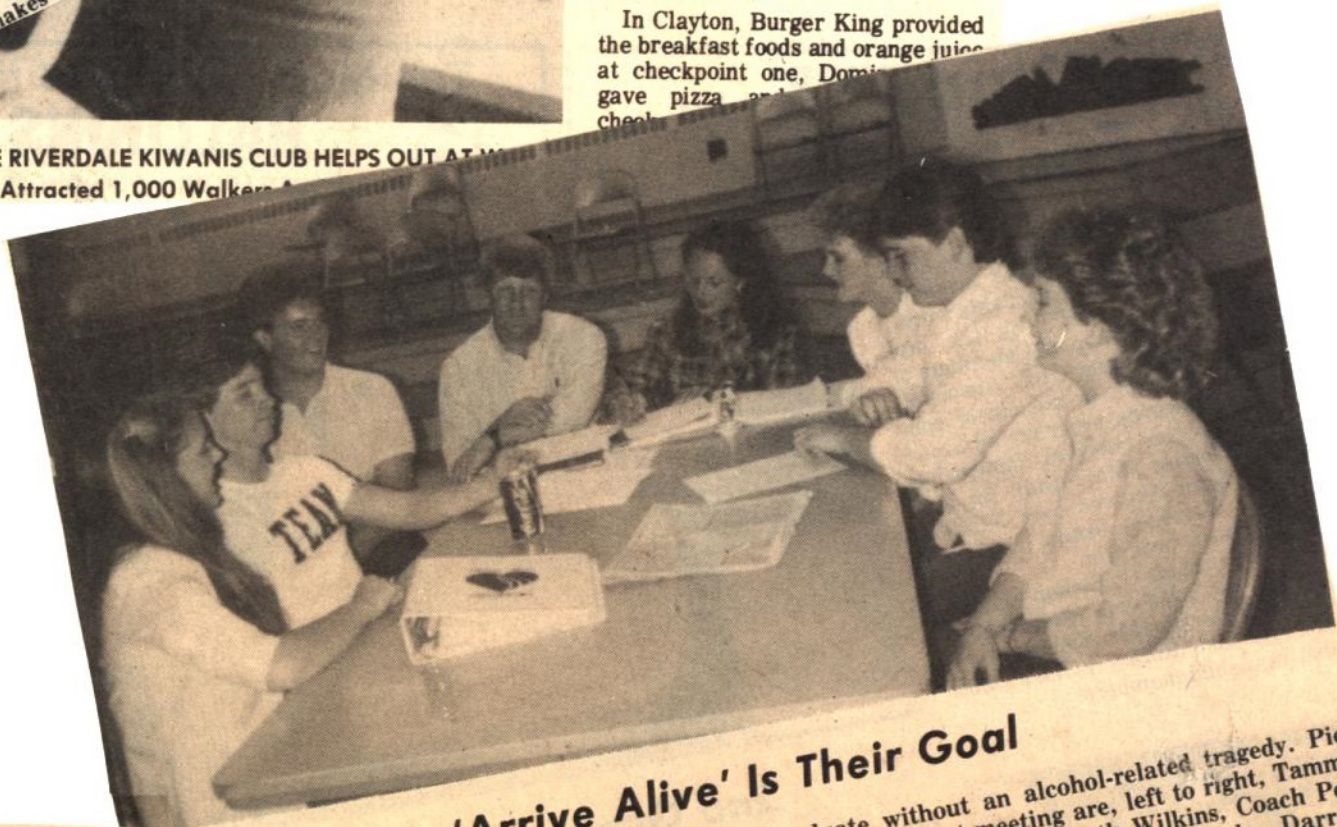

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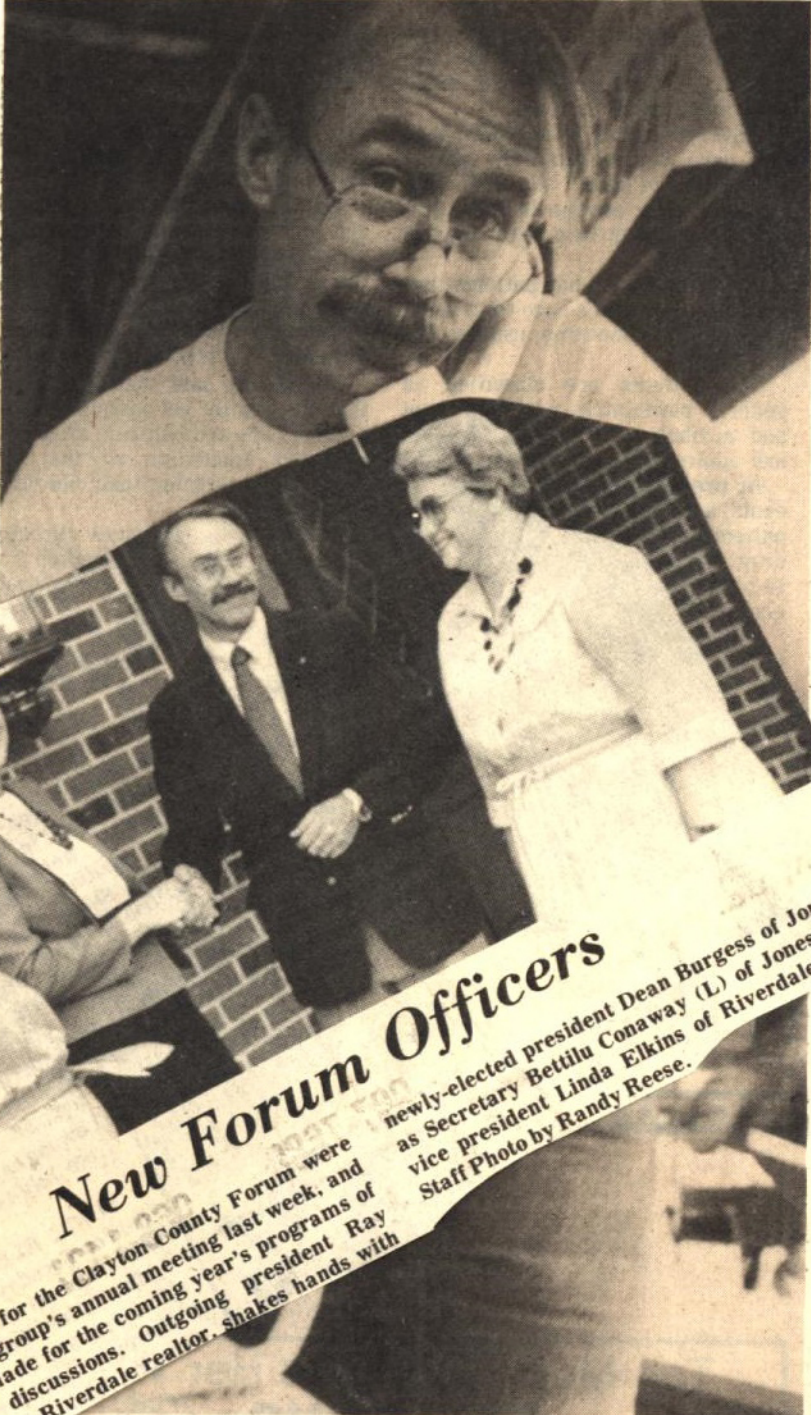
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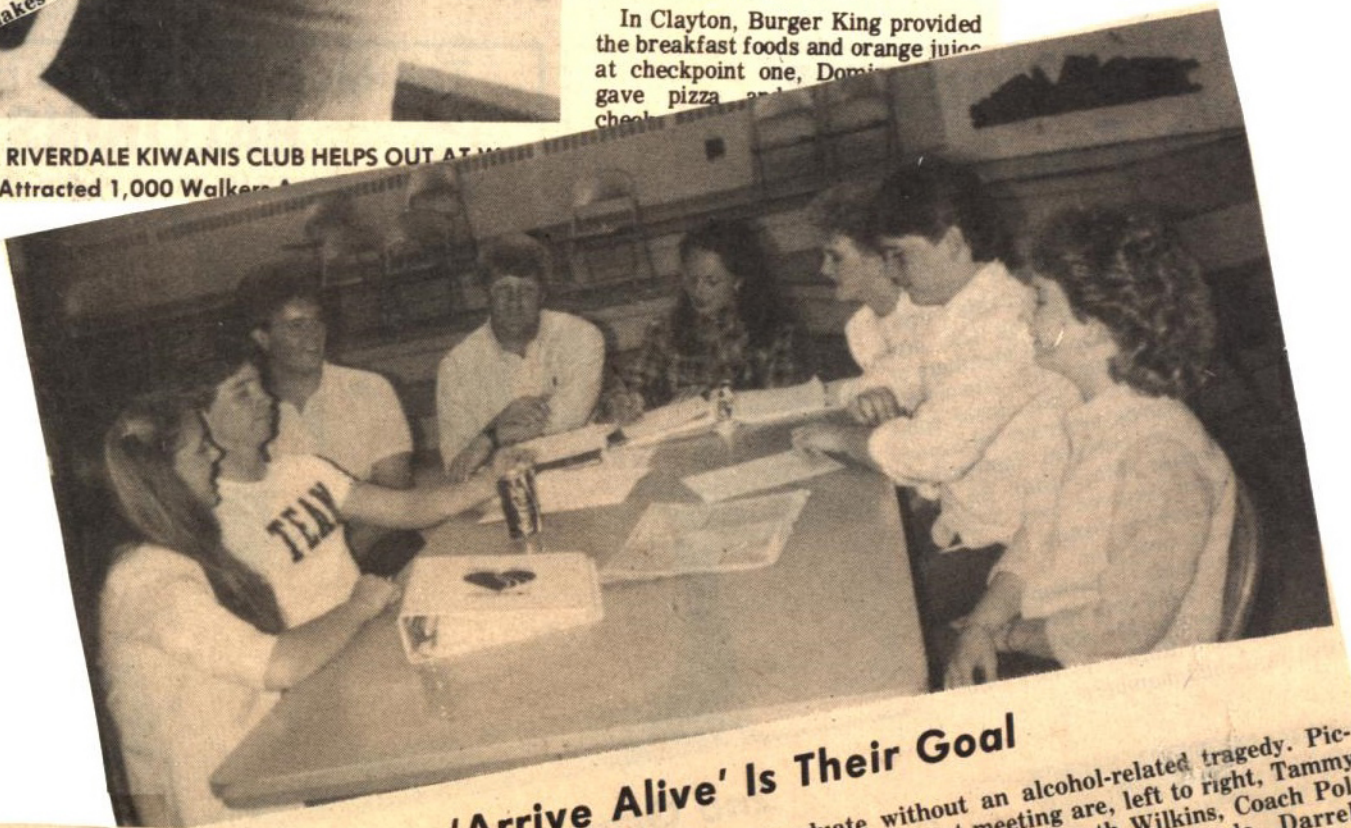
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Historical Jonesboro, Inc. Festival Saturday, Sunday

The 15th annual Jonesboro Arts and Crafts Festival sponsored by Historical Jonesboro, Inc. keeps growing each year and this year the event has drawn more exhibitors than ever before.

The festival will be held Saturday, Oct. 12, and Sunday, Oct. 13, in two places, at the train depot on Main Street and at Stately Oaks, the antebellum home restored and furnished by the organization. This beautiful home will be open for tours.

Hours will be from 10 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Saturday at both places and on Sunday from noon to 6 p.m. A \$1 donation will be requested at the gate in front of the Jonesboro Recreation Center on Lake Jodeco Road across the street from Stately Oaks.

At the Recreation Center, a "For Kids Only" carnival will be set up and will include games from pick up ducks to sock hop. The event will be from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 12 and is designed for children ages 3-12. Tickets for the games will be 25 cents each or eight tickets for one dollar. Prizes will be awarded for those having accumulated winning tickets.

Inside the depot on Saturday, there will be a flea market and country store, and entertainment is scheduled outside. Also waiting for

passengers to "ride the rails" will be the antique train, "Best Friend of Charleston."

Both the history and the modern side of railroading will come alive Saturday, Oct. 12 as the "Best Friend of Charleston" -- Norfolk Southern's colorful trail from the past -- and the Norfolk Southern Exhibit Car visit Jonesboro, Georgia.

Included are a hands-on computer display that allows visitors to actually track the progress of a shipment; a working "hot box detector" which demonstrates how effective box car wheels are found electronically; and a working model

train powered by solar energy.

Few cases of AIDS reported by area hospitals

Clayton and South Fulton counties have not escaped the deadly spread of AIDS, but only about 10 patients have been treated at area hospitals.

Georgia ranks 10th in the nation in the number of acquired immune deficiency syndrome cases reported.

Of about 260 cases diagnosed in the state, about 195 are in the eight-county metropolitan Atlanta area, according to Margaret Draganec, AIDS project director for the state's division of public health.

Most of the AIDS cases in the Atlanta area have been reported in Fulton and DeKalb counties, which have the highest concentrations of gay residents, Ms. Draganec said.

The disease, which destroys the body's ability to fight infections, strikes primarily homosexual men and intravenous drug users. There is no known cure and it has been fatal in about half of all cases.

Less than 10 patients with the AIDS virus have been treated at Clayton General Hospital, said administrator Dennis Scheidt. Probably less than five of those

were confirmed cases, Scheidt said. The patients have been seen in the last year or two.

"We've only had one," said Pat Sandor, spokesman for South Fulton Hospital. The patient was treated at hospital during the spring and summer, and has since died, Sandor said.

Both hospitals have provided training programs for their health care staffs on how to deal with AIDS victims, and neither reported any problems with employee reluctance to treat patients with the disease out of fear they might contract it. "I don't know of any concern

among the staff," Scheidt said.

It is necessary to take some precautions when treating AIDS victims, but no more than when working around patients with hepatitis, he said. AIDS patients are placed in private rooms at Clayton General, but are not put in an isolation area.

"I don't think there's really a need for that," Scheidt said.

There have been more than 14,000 patients diagnosed with AIDS, and that's believed to be only the tip of the iceberg, Ms. Draganec said last week at a seminar sponsored by the Morrow Junior Woman's Club.

The number of cases are now doubling about every nine months. Most victims die within five years, but life expectancy depends a lot on an individual's overall health, she said.

The disease can only be transmitted through sexual contact or contact with the blood of an infected person, Ms. Draganec said. Although the virus has been isolated in saliva and tears, the chances of transmitting it that way are slim to none.

"We feel very comfortable with saying this," she said. "There is no evidence that AIDS is spread through sneezing, cooking, talking or shaking hands."

The fear of children catching AIDS at school has "ballooned out of proportion," she said. "There's really no reason why a child with AIDS shouldn't go to school, as long as they aren't behavioral problems."

There have been only two cases of children with the disease in Georgia, Ms. Draganec said. One has already died and the other is not old enough to attend school.

Local school systems are taking a wait-and-see stance on the issue of whether a child with AIDS would be permitted to attend classes.

"At this point we have not established board policy," said Pat Barnett, coordinator of health and physical education for the Clayton County School System.

Ms. Barnett attended a state forum on AIDS last month with representatives from the state Board of Education and Georgia School

Board Association. The upshot of the meeting was that school systems should decide on an individual basis what to do if a student has AIDS.

If Clayton County ever has students with the disease who want to attend class, the school system will deal each case on a one-to-one basis, Ms. Barnett said.

The Fulton County School System will probably treat a child with AIDS as it does students with any other communicable disease, said J. Lawson Sayre, assistant superintendent for student services.

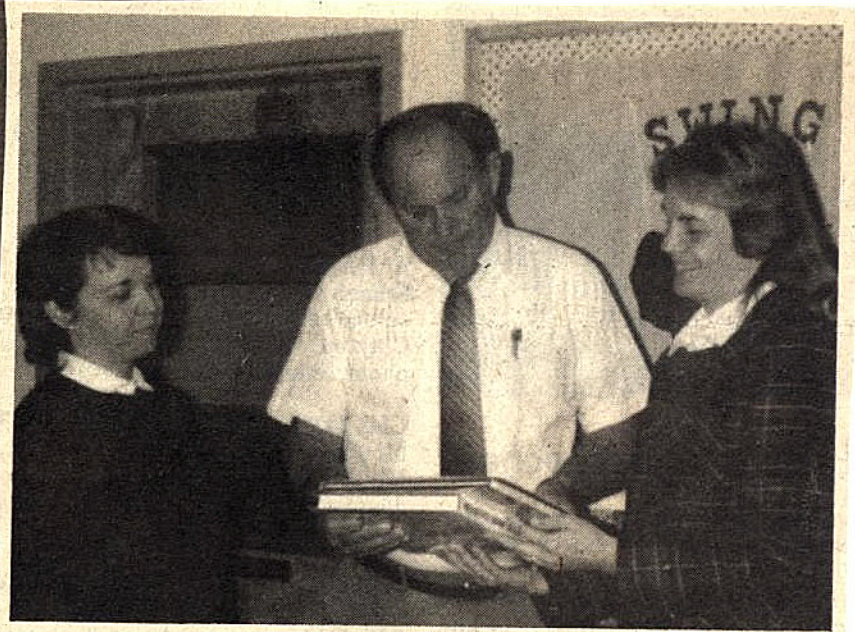
"They could not come to school," Sayre said.

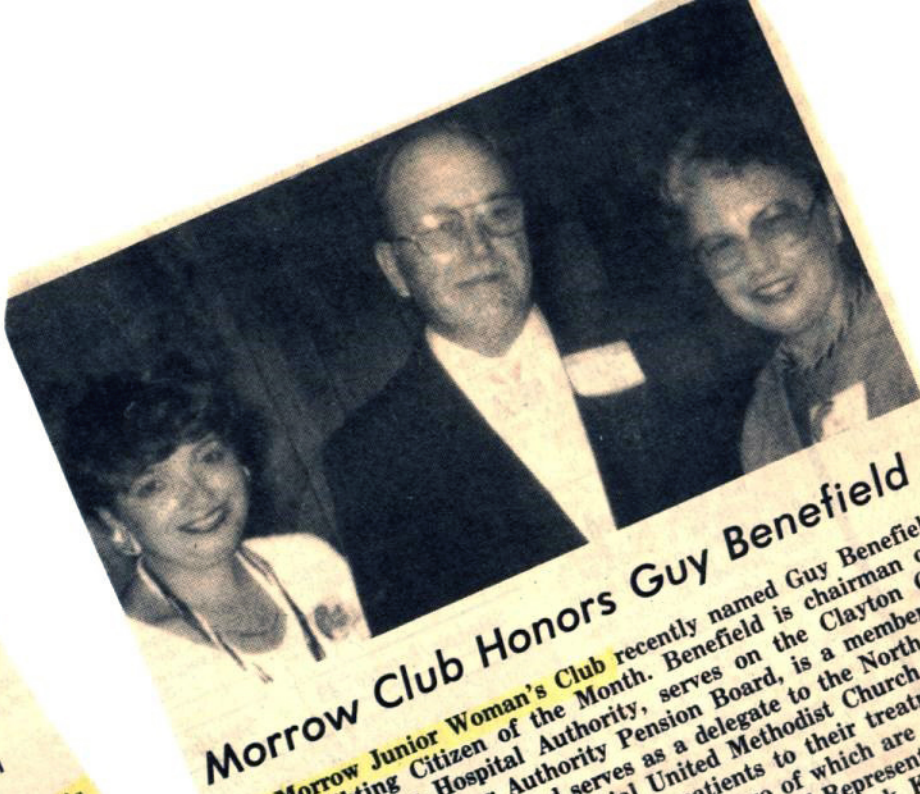

"I asked him to let me give them a summer," Mrs. Morris said.

Her doctor was even amazed to see her up and around and being able to shuttle children to and

from activities and coordinating events.

"I asked God to see me through the summer and I wouldn't asked him for more than that," Mrs. Morris said.

One of the first events she planned for the children was an Easter egg hunt. To Mrs. Morris' amazement, she found the "kids didn't even have one (egg) to boil let alone one to hunt or color."

She contacted the National Council on Egg Commission and persuaded the agency to donate

the eggs for the 150 to 200 children in the project.

After the success of that event, Mrs. Morris went to organize a cookout and yard sale to generate enough money to support a summer program for the children.

She went straight to the top of corporations and talked to the presidents about donating towards the cookout. The generosity of some of the companies came as a surprise to her.

The cookout and sale raised \$258 for the Keystone Kiddies, which

the owner of the complex matched.

Morrow Jr. Woman's Club Hears Talk About Education

The education department of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club (GaFWC-GFWC) had as its speaker for its monthly meeting, Emmett Lee, Superintendent for instruction for the Clayton County School System. Lee spoke to the club members about Quality Based Education, or Q.B.E., and answered questions concerning education in our county.

Lee opened by saying the new law is extensive and is still being interpreted, but that the main thought is that the continuation of Q.B.E. is important. "There is a commitment here to education," said Lee.

Lee highlighted several points of the law such as: better pay and conditions for teachers, the improvement of student achievement and student discipline, a state-wide standardization of curriculum, and full day kindergarten. Clayton County has wanted and is beginning full day kindergarten this year. Other systems have within three years to go to full day.

MORE ASPECTS OF the law are: expanded remedial programs, more funding for special education programs, and certifying and evaluation of personnel, including formal evaluations for raises. Teachers will be rewarded for merit and outstanding performance. This will enable them to advance in their careers.

According to Lee, under the law, tests scores will be published and explained to the public. There will be incentive grants for innovative programs such as computer programs. Leadership academies for everyone in leadership roles will keep them continually well-informed.

Another area, which will be long-range, will be a central information gathering network, which will

compile information for state-wide sharing.

Lee concluded by saying that "Dr. Charles McDaniel, State School Superintendent, has announced that Q.B.E. means that state and public have a tremendous interest in education. Dr. McDaniel is sure that neither the legislators nor the governor will let Q.B.E. flounder. Its continuation is crucial to our future."

Six Cooking Classes Begin On April 11

Members of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club and the nutrition committee of the Clayton County Unit of the American Heart Association are busy putting the finishing touches on the plans for a special cooking class.

The organizations have teamed up to sponsor six cooking classes beginning April 11 from 7:30 until 9 p.m. in the Georgia Power kitchen in Jonesboro.

Lynn Magnuson, a dietician at St. Joseph's Hospital, has volunteered to teach the "Culinary Hearts Kitchen" classes.

The first class, entitled "Introducing the New Way of Eating: Basic Principles," looks at basic concepts of nutrition and health, defines cardiovascular disease and the risk factor, and discusses the American Heart Association Dietary Recommendations; Reducing the Risks and How to Modify Recipes.

The second class includes the new way of cooking meats and poultry; how to show wisely and read labels; how to purchase and prepare lean red meats; and how to purchase and prepare poultry.

The third class will cover "Entrees With A Lighter Touch: Soups and Fish," "How to Enhance Foods with Stocks and Sauces," "How to Create Nutritionally Complete Hearty Soups," and How To Select and Prepare Fish and Seafood Specialties."

During the fourth class, participants will learn about "Healthy Alternatives: Complementary Proteins and Complex Carbohydrates," "Principles of Preparing Meatless Meals" and "How to Incorporate Grains, Legumes and Starch Vegetables Into Everyday Menus."

"How to Use Vegetables to Add Variety To Meals," and "How to Select and Store Salad Ingredients and Prepare Salads and Dressings" will also be included.

The fifth class in the series will cover the topics of "You Don't Have to Give Up the Goodies: Baking and Desserts," "How to Select and Prepare Breakfast Foods" and "How to Select and Prepare Baked Goods."

Other topics will include "How to Select and Prepare Desserts" and "How to Prepare and Use Fruits Throughout the Menu."

The final class will include "Putting It All Together: Meal Planning," "How to Coordinate Menus," "How to Select Foods When Dining Out," "How to Prepare Quick Meals" and "How to Prepare Foods for Special Occasions."
