





We want you to meet some young people who are desperately in need of help. These children live with scars and open wounds . . . The open wounds of child abuse. They have known physical cruelty, mental anguish, sexual perversion and neglect. These children need help



that only you or others like you can give. These are the children of need

These children do not live in the far corners of the world, they live right here in Clayton County. The causes of their pain are many and diverse. Some are the

victims of discipline that has forgotten the child.



During the past eight years the problems of child abuse and neglect have tripled . . . and we do not foresee an end in sight. This problem is not confined to the poor, uneducated or minorities. It crosses all social, cultural

and economic boundaries.

Our children come to us for a variety of reasons. The parents of these children are unable, for the present, to provide the protective care all children deserve. These children are in danger and have one thing in common . . . an immediate need for shelter.

Some children need a foster home, some need to be taken into the full membership of a family through adoption, and others need a suitable emergency shelter home where "Professional" help is available 24 hours a day. Most of these children have special problems which



require special help. But they all need a place to go and people who will love them for themselves.

Our most pressing problem is the lack of an emergency shelter home facility. We need a place where children can go, day or night, to receive the kind of

professional help to heal the wounds of child abuse. We want to build a facility to house 12-16 children, operated by a paid professional staff. This facility would include a living room/play/recreation area, separate sleeping quarters for boys and girls, kitchen/dining/study/quiet

room, infant/nursery, laundry rooms, interviewing rooms, quarters for house

parents, and a playground.

The staff for this home would include a group home coordinator, live-in house parents, relief house parents, a secretary, a housekeeper/cook and a part-time van driver.

Your Christmas gift to the Clayton County Children's Emergency Shelter would be greatly appreciated. With your help the foundation of a new tomorrow for these children can be built today.







A question and answer period concluded the program.




ON MJWC DRUG ABUSE PROGRAM (l-r) Larry Hart, Peggy Pruett, Judi Nesbitt




Edward also enjoys soccer. Reading and tinkering with tools as well as bike riding and playing are included in his list of favorite

- Voting delegates shall be seated together in a designated area during the business meetings of the Annual Convention." (GaEWC Bylaws, Article IX. Section 5.) Only voting delegates will be seated in this section.
- 4. No delegate shall represent more than one club or be entitled to more than one vote
- 5. A delegate wishing to use her privilege of the floor shall address the chair and announce her name, club and town.
- 6. Delegates shall not speak a second time upon the same question until all others who desire to speak upon the question have been heard.
- 7. During business meetings each speaker shall be limited to two minutes. Time limits shall be strictly adhered to.
- 8 To vote as an alternate, the alternate must wear the delegate's voting badge in addition to her own "alternate badge."
- 9. No page service will be available during platform speeches.
- 10. Main motions must be written, signed and sent to the head table.

### Phyllis Roberts, GFWC President-elect



Phyllis Roberts of Fairfax. Virginia is President-elect of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the largest and oldest nondenominational, nonpartisan, international women's organization of volunteer women in the world.

She has been a member of the Board of Directors of the GFWC, with its 500,000 members in the United States and 10 million internationally, since her election as President of the GFWC/Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs (1970-1972).

For Mrs. Roberts. GFWC volunteerism has also been a passport to other achievements. Virginia governors have named her to committees or commissions concerned with such diverse issues as education, welfare, soil and water conservation, licensing procedures and constitutional amendments.

She has traveled widely as a Professional Registered Parliamentarian serving conventions of many types of organizations, teaching classes, and conducting workshops in parliamentary procedures. She currently is President of the Virginia Registered Parliamentarians, a member of the National Association of Parliamentarians and the American Institute of Parliamentarians.

A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of North Carolina where she also was elected to Alpha Kappa Delta and Sigma Delta Pi. Phyllis Roberts is listed in "Who's Who in America" and "Personalities of America." She is a former high school English and history teacher.

Prior to her election as GFWC President-elect she was First Vice President. Second Vice President. Recording Secretary. Southeastern Regional President, and GFWC Safety Division Chairman.

Her local, district and state GFWC service includes dozens of offices, including the presidency and two clubs, and many chairmanships. She also is the first woman in her Episcopal Church to have been elected to its governing body.

Phyllis Roberts' community concerns have been expressed in many ways. She has been a Scout leader and officer of the Parent Teacher Association. Civic Association. Chruchwomen United, the American Association of University Women, the Red Cross, the Conservation Council of Virginia Foundation, the Nature Conservancy and the Virginia Mental Health Fund. She also has been a member of the Fairfax School Board Advisory Cimmittee and the National Capital Planning Committee for the Year 2000.

Her husband, James B. Roberts, a former executive with the U.S. Office of Education, is a business management consultant. They have a son, Jim: two daughters, Mrs. Cam Riddle, and Laurie, both GFWC Junior Clubwomen, and a grandson, Logan Riddle.

### W. Cleon Skousen Biographical Background, 1985



Born in Canada. Dr. Skousen has lived most of his life in the Untied States. However, he resided for two years in Mexico and two years in England and has traveled and lectured in 45 different countries.

Dr. Skousen attended San Bernardino College where the served as student body president. He received his Juris Doctorate degree from the George Washington University Law School and was admitted to practice law in the District of Columbia, the Fifth District Court of Appeals, and the United States Supreme Court.

His professional background includes 16 years with the FBI and 4 years as Chief of Police in Salt Lake City Time Magazine said he ran a "model" police force. He became a full professor at Brigham Young University where he taught an average of a thousand students per week. After serving ten years, he retired in 1978.

Dr. Skousen has become well known as an author, having written thirty books, some of which have been published in seven languages and nine of which have been used as college texts. For 17 years he served as the Editorial Director of Law and Order, the leading law enforcement publication in the United States. He has lectured at more than a hundred colleges and universities and he makes frequent presentations on radio and television programs. His largest audience was in the Hollywood Bowl where he spoke to 15,000 people on a nationally televised program.

Today. Dr. Skousen serves as President of the National Center for Constitutional Studies which he founded in 1971 (as the Freeman Institute) to promote the revival of constitutional principles and the restoration of free enterprise economics.

In 1982 he received the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge "George Washington Honor Medal."

Dr. Skousen and his wife, the former lewel Pitcher of San Bernardino, California, are the parents of eight children and have 41 grandchildren.

### Governor

Joe Frank Harris is the 78th Governor of Georgia.

Before his election as the state's chief executive in 1982, Harris served for 18 years in the Georgia General Assembly, the last eight years as Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee. He was reelected to a second term as Governor in November 1986.

During his first term, Georgia set new standards of achievement, accountability and financial commitment at all levels of public education, and growth in the state's economy has been unprecedented.

Harris also has a strong commitment to enhancing Georgia's quality of life. His public awareness campaigns against drunk driving and child abuse have been nationally recognized for their effectiveness. In his second term, he is committed to efforts to combat adult illiteracy, drug use, teen pregnancy and infant mortality.

Harris is First Vice-Chairman of the Southern Governors' Association, Chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board, past Chairman of the Southern Growth Policies Board and past states' Co-Chairman of the Appalachian Regional Commission. He is Vice-Chairman of the Committee on Energy and Environment; chairs the Energy subcommittee; and serves on the Committee on Transportation, Commerce, and Communications of the National Governors' Association.

Born February 16, 1936, in Bartow County, Harris received his education in the Cartersville Public Schools and completed a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration at the University of Georgia in 1958.

Following active duty in the U.S. Army, Harris was in the concrete products business with operations in Bartow and Cobb Counties. He also served as President of the Harris Georgia Corporation, a diversified industrial development company.

In 1961, Harris married Elizabeth Carlock, and they have one son, Joe, who attends the University of Georgia School of Law. The Harrises are members of the United Methodist Church.

Zell Bryan Miller enters his fourth term as Lieutenant Governor holding the dual distinctions of serving longer in this office than any of Georgia's previous Lieutenant Governors and being the only one to have been a member of the State Senate before becoming its President. He is the former chairman of the National Conference of Lieutenant Governors.

Born 54 years ago in Young Harris, Zell was the younger child of Birdie Bryan and Stephen Grady Miller. He attended public schools in Towns County and graduated from Young Harris College.

After a three-year enlistment in the U.S. Marine Corps, Zell graduated from the University of Georgia with A.B. and M.A. degrees and completed two years of work toward a Ph.D.


He has taught at Young Harris College, DeKalb Community College and the University of Georgia and held the title of Distinguished Lecturer at Emory University.

In 1965, then-Governor Carl Sanders appointed Zell the Director of the State Board of Probation, and he later served as Deputy Director of the Department of Corrections. He was Executive Secretary to Governor Lester Maddox, and Governor Jimmy Carter appointed him as a Member of the State Board of Pardons and Paroles. He also served as the Executive Director of the Democratic Party of Georgia for two years.

He is the author of three books: THE MOUNTAINS WITHIN ME (1976), GREAT GEORGIANS (1983) and THEY HEARD GEORGIA SINGING (1984).

He is married to the former Shirley Carver of Andrews, N.C., whom he met as a student at Young Harris College. The president of a bank, Shirley has been Honorary State Chair for the Georgia Special Olympics and served on the President's Commission on Mental Retardation during the Carter Administration.

The Millers have two sons, Murphy and Matthew; a granddaughter, Asia, age 10; and a grandson, Justin Grady, age 4.







### HOT PICKLED CAULIFLOWER

### 6 serving

- 1 medium-size head cauliflower (about 11/2 pounds)
- 3 tablespoons wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons butter [or margarine]\*
- 2 tablespoons diced pimiento
- 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Break cauliflower into flowerets; cook in small amount of boiling salted water for about 10 minutes; drain.
- While cauliflower cooks, combine remaining ingredients in a small saucepan; cook over low heat for about 5 minutes.
- 3. Pour over hot cauliflower.



### CHARLOTTE WITH STRAWBERRY SAUCE

1 envelope unflavored gelatin

1/4 cup water

1 cup milk

4 egg yolks

1/2 cup sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 pint heavy cream, whipped

12 to 15 ladyfingers

1 cup whipped cream Whole strawberries

Crushed strawberries



Fresh orange juice

Soak the gelatin in the water. Let the milk come to a boil. While the milk is heating, beat the egg yolks with the 1/2 cup sugar and vanilla in the electric mixer until it can be poured in a ribbon. Now pour the boiling milk slowly into the egg yolks while they are beating, to prevent the yolks from cooking. Just before you stop the electric mixer, pour in the gelatin mixture to blend it thoroughly with the egg mixture.

Strain and let cool in the refrigerator. When it starts to thicken, fold in the cream, and pour the mixture into a round mold or melon mold, which you have lined with ladyfingers. Leave in the refrigerator for about 4 hours or more. Unmold by dipping mold into warm water. Place on a serving dish with the molded side up, and decorate with the additional whipped cream, using your pastry tube, and whole strawberries spaced around the outer edge.

A separate serving dish of crushed strawberries, with sugar and fresh orange juice added to it, accompanies the charlotte to the table. Serves 6.
