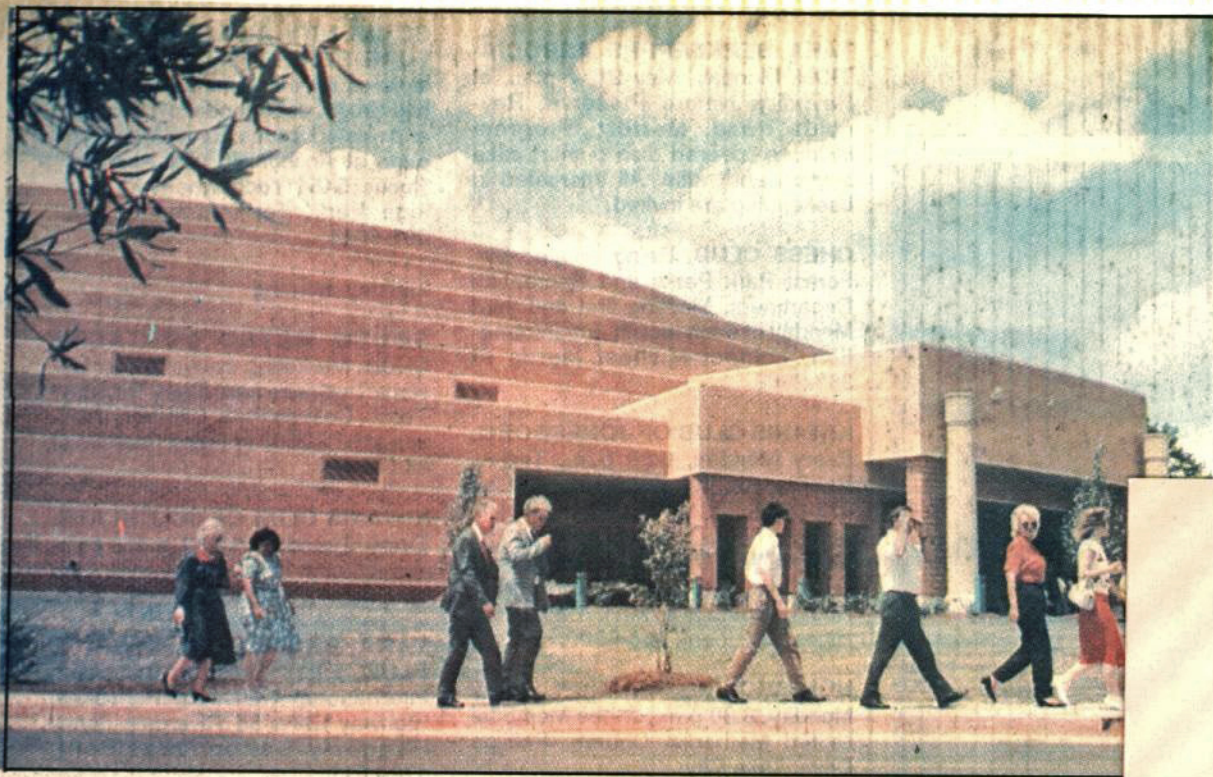

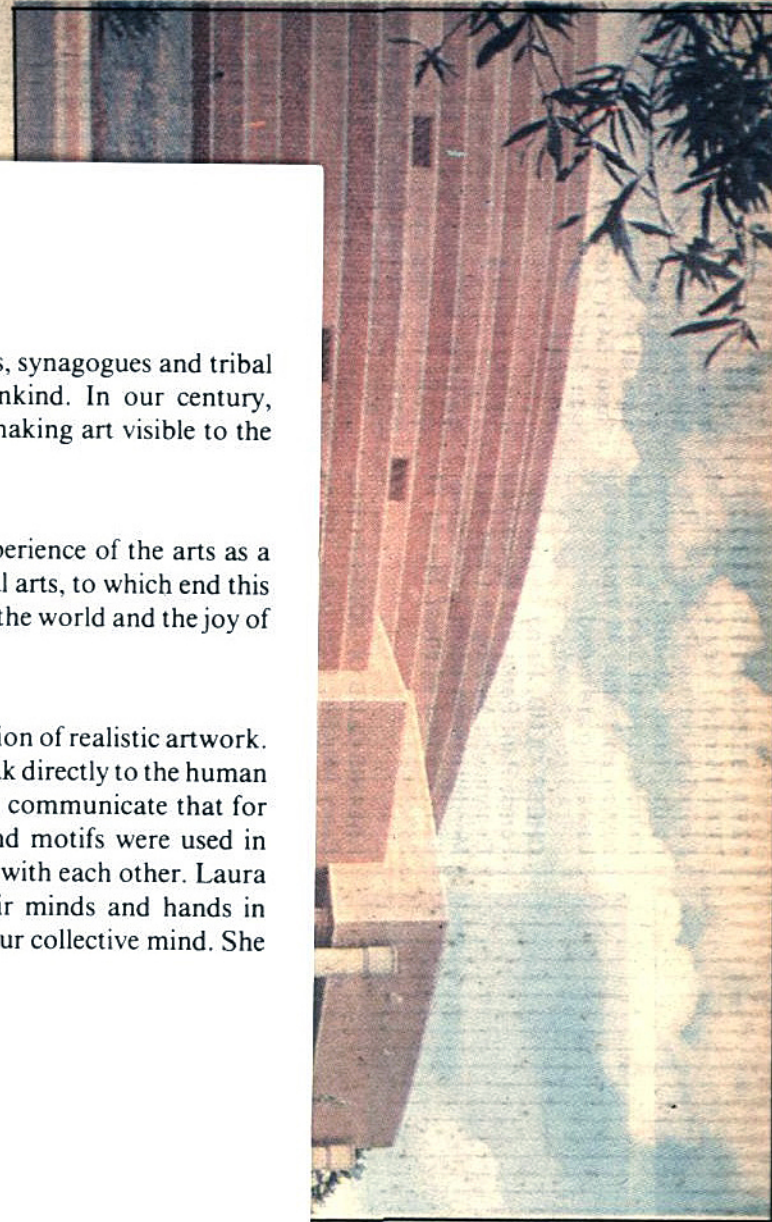

Artist's Statement

Art was once an integral element in all lives. Through churches, mosques, synagogues and tribal religions the finest areas of each culture were visible to most of mankind. In our century, government, business and the schools have taken over the function of making art visible to the public.

By titling this work "GATEWAY" the artist is referring to her own experience of the arts as a gateway to the self. The experience of music, dance, theater and the visual arts, to which end this facility is dedicated helps us to see, understand and explore the beauty of the world and the joy of life.

The old saying, "a picture is worth a thousand words," describes the function of realistic artwork. Abstract art seeks to transcend language and image memory banks to speak directly to the human subconscious. The history of textiles is full of examples of this effort to communicate that for which we have no words. Remarkably similar "images" or symbols and motifs were used in different parts of the world by cultures who cannot have had any contact with each other. Laura Strand Mills believes this to be the result of people working with their minds and hands in expressions that are universally meaningful, and somehow ingrained in our collective mind. She works in textiles largely to have contact with this ancient tradition.

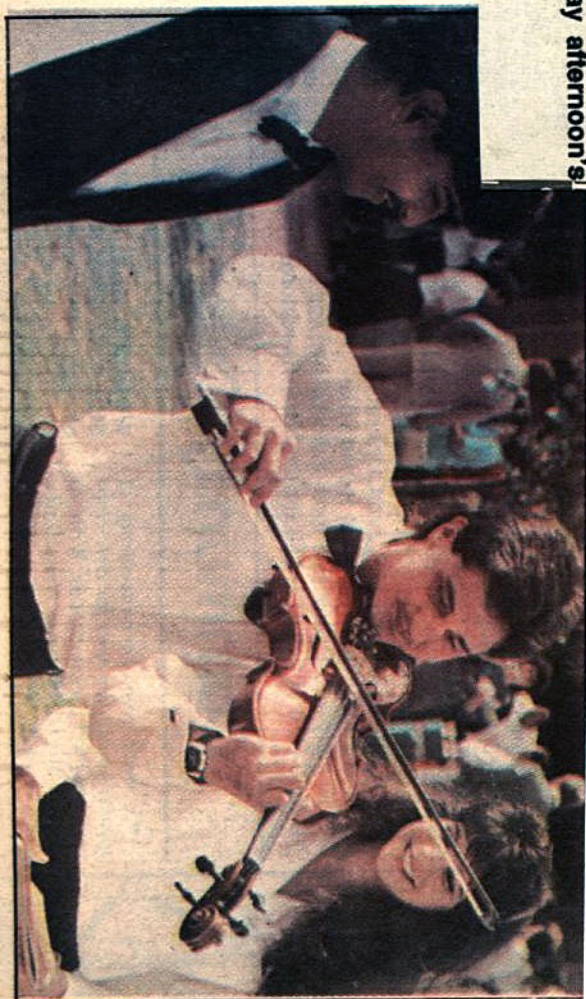

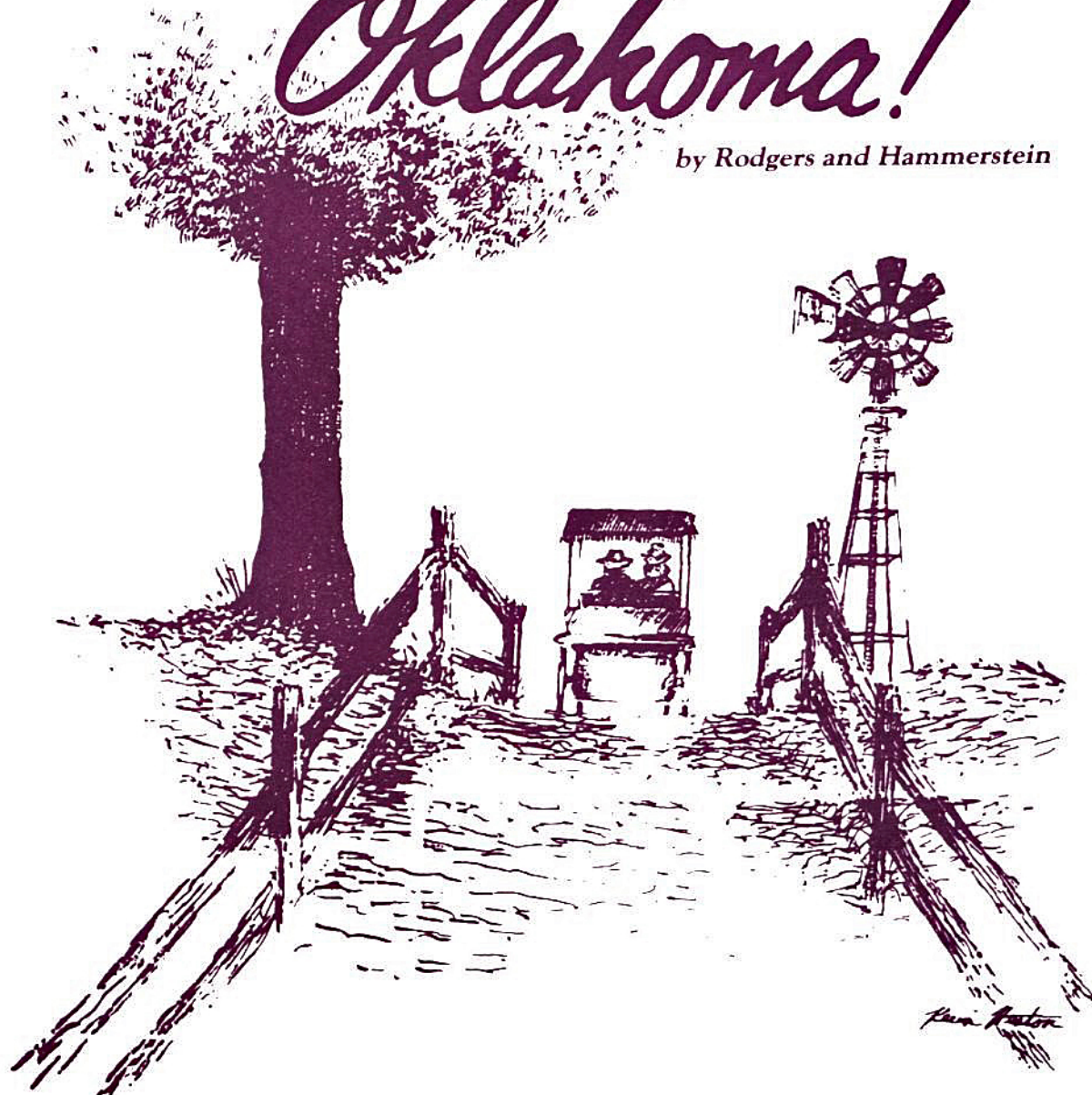

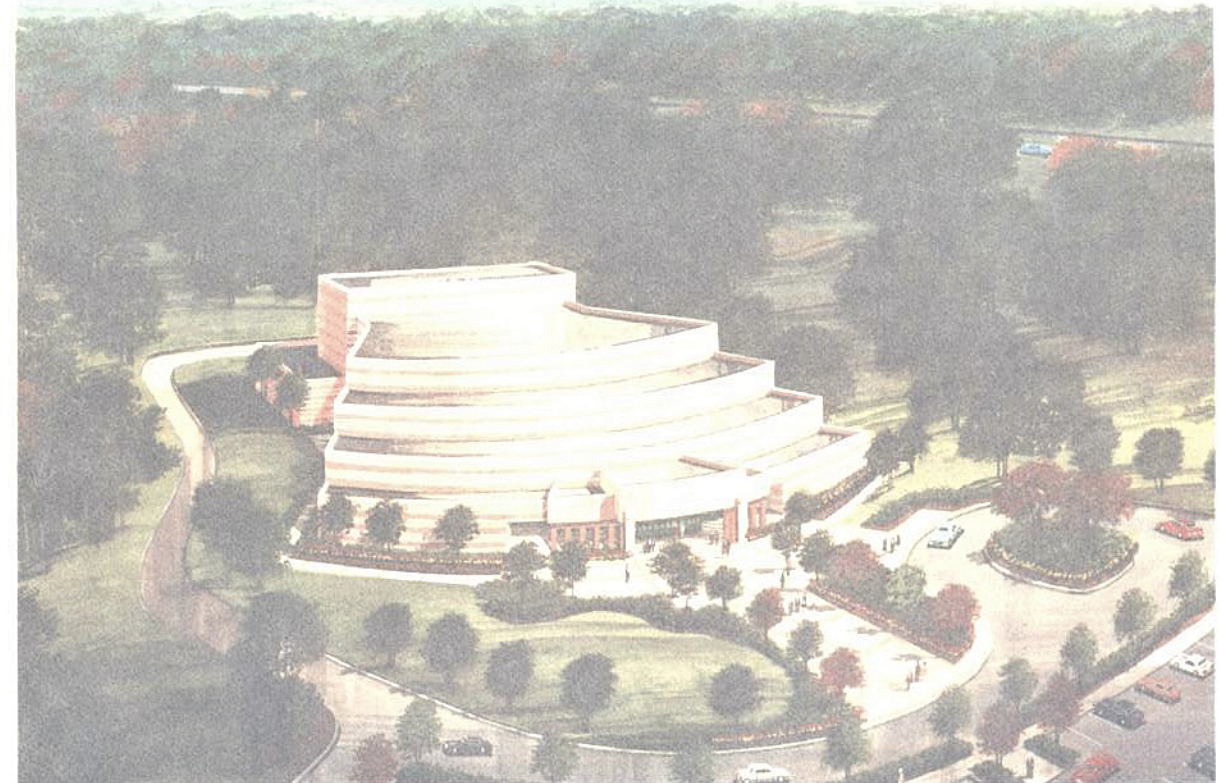
Four years ago, the citizens of Clayton County made a bold statement by approving a bond referendum which included a \$6,000,000 multi-purpose auditorium. Clayton County had long supported the schools' music and drama programs, but adequate facilities were not available.

In 1986, the Clayton County Board of Education authorized the school system to employ architects to prepare plans for the new Performing Arts Center. Robert and Company of Atlanta submitted design specifications for bidding which were awarded to MG Engineering and Construction Company of Peachtree City, Georgia in March, 1988. With a low bid of \$7,000,000. Construction was begun shortly thereafter.

Major features of the Performing Arts Center include a 1800 seat hall with proscenium stage and electronic orchestra pit. The center features three stages: a 5000 square foot, full flyloft auditorium stage; a 1200 square foot recital podium with a 250 seat turntable. The center totals 54,000 square feet.

The center includes space for ancillary functions. The scene design and construction area is adjacent to the mainstage with access for large scenery to the main stage.

The first priority for the center will be to serve the needs of the schools, but it will also be available to community and state-wide organizations. The facility's versatility will enable scheduling of many different events simultaneously, all within the same building.

GOP targets Democrats' spending

Republican legislative candidates launched a concerted attack over the weekend against the tax-and-spend records of Democrats in the heat of the largest political rally of the campaign in Clayton County.

One after another on Saturday, the GOP challengers accused the Democrats of mis-spending — on golf courses, a carpet exposition and the Georgia Dome — proceeds from the new 1 percent state sales tax.

The Democrats, declaring that their experience in the Legislature benefits Clayton County, for the most part ignored the Republican onslaught.

investor Walter Krauth, who is also the Republican Party chairman and Jimmy B...

Emmett J. "Jerry" Arnold, Gail Buckner and Joy Cavin; the Republicans are Jimmy Norman and Randy Wilson.

Two Republican members of the delegation avoided the blanket charge against the Democrats by having opposed both the sales tax increase and the spending projects, Mr. Krauth said.

"They didn't vote for [the sales tax increase]," snapped Clayton Democratic Chairman Lee Fincher. "But they are taking credit for the programs the money is going for."

Democrats attempting to recapture County Commission seats turned the tables on the Republicans and accused them of tax mismanagement.

Six candidates seek open House seat

Six candidates are in the running for the seat being given up by Rep. Frank Bailey.

Bailey, D-Riverdale, is running for Lt. Governor and will not seek to retain his Post 5 District 72 seat.

Four Democrats have stepped forward hoping to fill the vacancy: Gerry Adams, Jerry Arnold, Joy Cavin, and Gail Buckner.

Republicans Jimmy Norman and Randy Wilson also want the seat, and will square off in the July 17 primary.

Wilson, at 23, is probably the youngest Clayton candidate running this year. He lives in Riverdale, and manages a Jonesboro courier service.

"I'm tired of the size of the state budget and the amount of waste in our budget," Wilson said.

Wilson favors reducing class sizes in Georgia schools, and also wants teachers' salaries brought up to the national average.

Lake City Democrat Gail Buckner, 39, is betting her experience in juvenile and health issues will put her in good stead with the voters.

Ms. Buckner helped draft child protection legislation which passed the General Assembly unanimously in 1986. She worked on legislation for preventing drug abuse which passed this year.

"I can hit the floor running," Ms. Buckner said.

Thirty-four year old Republican Jimmy Norman, a real estate broker, lives in Riverdale. He is opposed to abortion.

"My position is one of strong pro-life legislation," Norman said.

"I think in that area we've taken

away accountability and personal responsibility," he said.

Norman favors capital punishment, and opposes gun control. He is a lifelong member of the National Rifle Association.

Democrat Joy Cavin lives in Jonesboro with her husband Mike and their three children.

"One of my main concerns is in crime and citizen safety," Ms. Cavin said.

"I'm for the death penalty. I'm definitely for work camps," she said.

Recycling and student dropout rates are also issues of concern to Ms. Cavin.

Democrat Emmett J. "Jerry" Arnold, 35, lives in Jonesboro with his wife Angela and their two children. He is an attorney, and also works for Delta Air Lines.

Property taxes are his main concern.

"I would do what I could to lower property taxes," Arnold said.

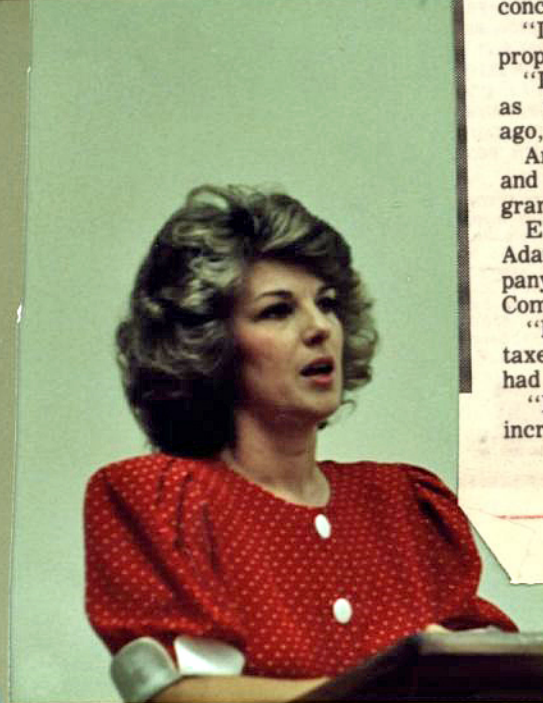
"I'm for putting funds into QBE, as was promised several years ago," Arnold said.

Arnold wants more prison space and an end to early-release programs.

Ellenwood Democrat Gerry Adams, 43, owns a vending company. He was a Clayton County Commissioner from 1977-79.

"People are concerned about taxes," Adams said. "People have had enough."

"I will vote against any tax increase, period," he added.

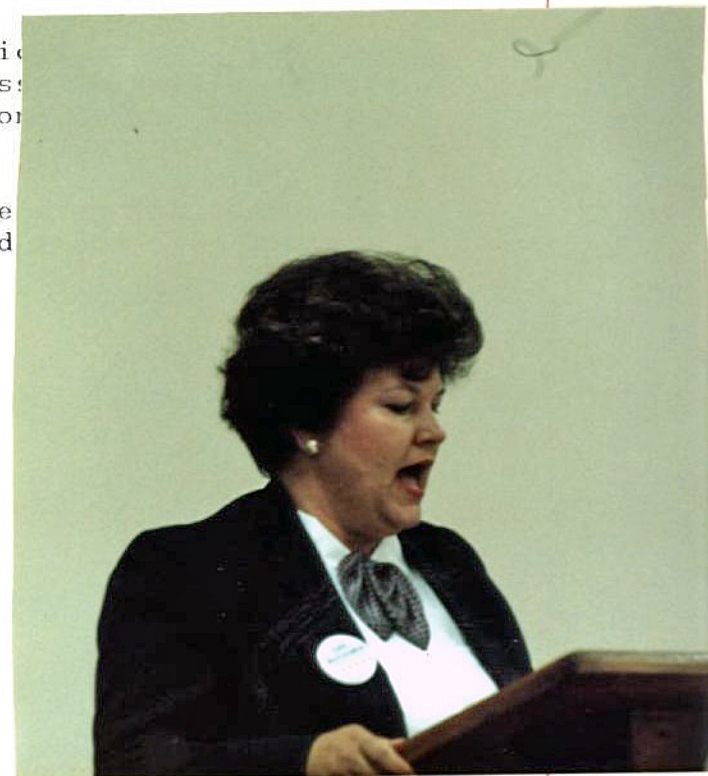

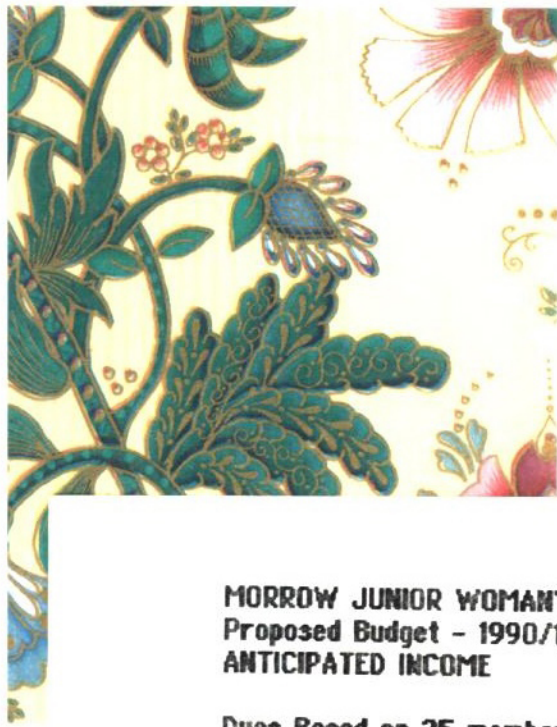

The paper comes in two different widths and a variety of lengths, so be sure to check the roll sizes. Some of the foils & high gloss papers do not have as much paper per roll as the others. The 24-inch wide roll is standard size; the 18-inch wide roll is shirt-box size (eliminates a lot of wasted paper). The paper samples are arranged according to roll width (except for the French Floral Ensemble) - 24 inch wide papers are on the left & 18 inch wide papers are on the right. To cut down on confusion, you might want to move the Floral print to the right side of the samples.

We need to start taking orders as soon as possible - before all the schools start their fund-raising. I would like to send in our order no later than October 10th. Please bring your order blanks to our October club meeting. Please turn both money and the order in to me. I need to complete my records before the money is turned in to Nancy.
