Russell Key Becomes Financial Aid Director

A new Director of Financial Aid and Placement has been named at CJC. Russell R. Key, Jr., a native of Wilmington, North Carolina, assumed the responsibilities of the position at the start of the Fall Quarter, according to Robert C. Bolander, Dean of Stu-

The Director of Financial Aid and Placement, responsible directly to the Dean of Students, seeks out students in need of financial assistance, and aids them with the various processes involved with a financial aid application. In addition, he counsels students and their families as to the various types of financial aid available, and administers federal, state, local, and institutional regulations governing these programs.

Key was owner and operator of a distributing company in Wilmington prior to joining the CJC faculty. While serving with the

U.S. Marine Corps from 1967-71, he served as a Missile Technician, Educator and Counselor. From 1971-73 he was a bookkeeper and salesman in Wilmington and in 1974-75 became a "budget analyst" with Ford Motor Company in Dearborn, Michigan.

Married and the father of two sons, Key received his bachelor's degree in economics from the University of North Carolina in 1972, and served as a Graduate Assistant in Marketing at Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1973-74 while obtaining his master's degree in finance.

Caldwell Releases Record

Looking at him, it is not immediately noticeable that Clinton Caldwell, CJC printer, was performing on radio at the age of thirteen, and that he has returned to a country music career with the recent release of "Santa's Copter" and "Peace and Joy".

Officially released on November 15, Caldwell's new record is expected to sell very well, with several area department stores having had orders in prior to its recording. According to Caldwell, "Santa's Copter" will be played by many radio stations, not just those playing country music. This will enable the recording to reach a wide variety of people.

Clinton Caldwell's career began with a radio performance when he was thirteen years old. In 1957, he became a regular on the Louisiana Hayride radio program. At this time, he also wrote for the late country star Johnny Horton.

In 1960, as a writer for Cedarwood Publishing Company, Caldwell moved to Nashville, where he began recording for ABC-Paramount. Due to an automobile accident in 1964, he was forced to delay his music career.

He began writing again in 1974 and had several songs recorded by other performers. CJC hired him in June, 1975 as campus printer. In July, 1976, he was instrumental in bringing the OMNI RECORDS ROAD SHOW to campus, where he met music promoter Thomas Jackson, who is now Caldwell's manager.

With the OMNI release of "Santa's Copter" and "Peace and Joy", Clinton Caldwell is back into a musical career. Thanksgiving marked the beginning of a long list of appearances for him in major shopping centers in the Atlanta area.

Division of Business Introduces New Faculty

The newly-created Division of Business at CJC includes 12 faculty members, five of whom are new additions to the faculty.

Included on the list of newcomers is Dr. John F. Loye, Jr., Associate Professor of Business and Chairman of the Division. Other members are Jack D. Hardage and Willie Mae Johnson in Business Education; and Gregory S. Kordecki and Kathleen A. Wessman in Accounting.

Dr. Loye, a native of Lawrence, Mass., holds a bachelor's degree in Military Engineering from the U.S. Military Academy, a bachelor's degree in Industrial Engineering from Syracuse University, a master's degree in Personnel and Industrial Relations from Syracuse, a master's degree in Public Administration from George Washington University, and a doctorate in Educational Administration from Florida State University. Immediately prior to joining the CJC faculty, he served as Director of Curricula and Instruction at Air University, Maxwell Air Force Base.

Hardage, an Assistant Professor of Business Education, served as a temporary instructor at CJC during the past year. A native of Powder Springs, Ga., he received his bachelor's degree in Secretarial Science from North Georgia College, his master's degree in Business Education from Georgia State University, and earned an educational specialist degree in Business Education from Georgia State. Prior to joining CJC, he served on the faculty at Wingate College in North Carolina, at Pebblebrook High School in Mableton, Ga., and at Georgia College, and a master's degree in Business Education from Tennessee State University. Prior teaching experiences include a year at Boddie High School in Milledgeville, two years in the Adult Education Program in Macon, and the past three years as an InState.

Ms. Johnson, a Temporary Instructor of Business Education, is a native of Macon, Ga. She earned a diploma in secretarial studies from National Business School, a bachelor's degree in Business Education from Virginia State structor of Business at Albany State College.

Kordecki, a native of Milwaukee, Wisc., joined the CJC faculty as an instructor of Business Administration. Formerly a Communications and Support Services Administrator for the American Can Company in Atlanta and Neenah, Wisc., Kordecki received his bachelor's degree in English and History from Marquette University and his master's degree in accounting from Georgia State University.

Ms. Wessman, also an Instructor of Business Administration, received bachelor's degrees in Audiology and in Elementary Education from Clarion State College, a master's degree in Accounting from Georgia State University. A native of Natrona Heights, Pa., she served as executive director and chief audiologist at Central Virginia Speech and Hearing Center in Lynchburg, Va., and more recently as a resource teacher of elementary subjects and as the principal's administrative assistant for Elk Grove Schools in California.

Other members of the new Division of Business who were members of the faculty last year are Dr. Doris C. Cash, Associate Professor of Business; John E Feathers, Assistant Professor of Business; Thomas H. Tidrick, Instructor of Business Administration; W. Michael Field, Assistant Professor of Business Administration; Frances F. Bowen, Assistant Professor of Business Education; Marian N. Terrell, Instructor of Business Education; and Martha . Oates, Assistant Professor of Business Education.

As my mind and appetite wandered from place to place, I found that all the five restaurants' menus seem to be evenly balanced as far as competitive content. The main entree for all is fish and chips, with a more complete dinner for around \$2.00.

Cedric's, on Old National Highway, has Fish and Chips for \$1.69 and a dinner consisting of two pieces of fish, chips, slaw, and hushpuppies for \$1.99.

On down the road on Tara Boulevard is Arthur Treacher's Fish and Chips. A dinner with two pieces of fish, chips, and slaw comes to \$1.89. An order of Fish and Chips is \$1.59.

Going on to Jonesboro on Tara Boulevard is Long John Silver's Scafood Shoppes. Their Fish and Fryes is \$1.59. A Treasure Chest of two pieces of fish, fries, and slaw costs \$1.95.

Upon leaving Jonesboro. I traveled back to Forest Park stopping on Jonesboro Road. Coming first to Captain Dee's, I found Fish and Chips with hushpuppies for \$1.49. A fish, fries, slaw and hushpuppy dinner is \$2.09.


The last place I went to H. Salt Esquire, has Fish and Cnips for \$1.65. For \$1.89, you can get a dinner of fish, chips, slaw and a
