# You Can Be A Candidate For S.G.A. Rep.

The election of Student Government Association Representatives will take place on October 17-18, 1989. To qualify, you need to be a currently enrolled student, taking at least a five credit hour load, and must have and maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average. If you are a new freshman, or a transfer from another institution, you must earn a 2.0 this quarter. If you would like to be a candidate, you need to pick up a petition from the SGA table at the Club Awareness Day program on September 28. Petitions are also available in the Dean of Students office located in room C-57.

There are eight Representative positions available. Each of the schools (Arts and

Sciences, Business, Health Sciences, and Technology) have one representative position open. There are also two representatives to be elected from students enrolled in night courses and two from the student body at-large.

Representatives act as liaisons between the SGA and the student body. They are responsible for advising the SGA on matters that pertain to their constituents. All of the Representatives have one vote and the privilege to engage in debate at all SGA meetings. Other responsibilities include voting on student candidates to serve as representatives on a variety of student/faculty committees.

Each year the Student Government Association is involved in a variety of activities on campus. They sponsor the annual Club Awareness Day, the Fall party, a Halloween reception, and co-sponsor activities with various other students organizations and the General Entertainment Committee.

## Computer Labs Are Open To All Who Need Them

Clayton State College has many facilities which can aid students in their studies. Among these facilities are the computer labs. Located in the lower level of the Learning Resource Center, room L-140 and L-146, the labs are available to all students, faculty, and staff. There is also a lab on the upper floor of the Technology building, room T-220.

The Computer labs contain IBM PCs and XTs. The labs also contain four printers, including two letter quality printers, one dot matrix printer, and one laser printer. There are many different software programs available. Wordstar 3.31, Wordstar 5.0, and Word Perfect 5.0 are the word processing programs offered. Lotus 1-2-3 is also offered to those who wish to use a spreadsheet program. Study programs for accounting, world history, and linear algebra students are also available. "I think we've done a good job in

organizing the labs," claimed computer lab supervisor Abate Zewide. "The software we use is the latest and most up to date versions."

For students taking economics or certain business classes, Clayton State offers the cyber labs. These labs, which are located on the upper level of the library, provide study guides to students in these classes.

Students who wish to use the computer labs are encouraged to purchase a 5.25 double sided, double density diskette (which can be purchased at the campus book store) prior to using the computer labs. These disks, which will be formatted by the Computer Lab Assistants, will be used to store the students information.

The computer labs are open from 8:00 a.m. to 10:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Fridays. The labs in the library also have weekend hours of 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, and noon to 5:00 p.m. on Sundays.

# Musical Variety Highlights Fall Offerings

The Lyceum Committee has again been fortunate in attracting a variety of solo performers and ensembles for recitals on campus. The Fall quarter music schedule begins on September 28, with a Faculty Potpourri recital. This 11:05 a.m. program will feature the talents of many of CSC's faculty members.

October brings recitals by guest artists and a faculty member. Mr. Bradley Brookshire, a harpsichordist from Cologne, West Germany, will present a solo recital at 11:05 a.m. on October 5. Mr. Brookshire was the winner of the first triennial Magnum Opus Harpsichord Competition. Dr. Joe Chapman, Director of Keyboard Studies at North Georgia College, will perform a piano recital on October 12, at 11:05 a.m.

On October 19, Ms. Doris Holloway, Head of the CSC music program, will present a viola recital at 11:05 a.m. Con Spirito, a woodwind quintet from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, will be in concert on October 26, at 11:05 a.m. and Thamyris, an Atlanta-based ensemble, will close out the month with a concert on Monday evening, October 30, at 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Brent Weaver, an Instructor of music at Clayton State, will present a bass-baritone recital on November 2, at 11:05 a.m. Mr. Weaver is also writing an opera which will receive its world premier at Clayton State College, in May, 1990. World-renowned pianist, author and lecturer, Dr. Charles Rosen will present two programs in November as a part of his Lyceum Laureate Residency. On Thursday,

November 9, he will lecture on "Chopin and the Romantic Style," at 11:05 a.m. and on November 10, he will present a piano recital at 8:15 p.m.

Our last guest performer for the Fall quarter will be Dr. Calvert Johnson, a harpsichordist from Agnes Scott College. Dr. Johnson will present a lecture/recital at 11:05 a.m. In addition to the many guest

musical artists, there will be student recitals in November and December. The quarter closes with the annual Madrigal Dinner program, featuring the Clayton State College Choir, under the direction of Mr. Brent Weaver. This annual holiday event will take place at 7:00 p.m. on December 8-9, in the College's dining hall. Other than the Madrigal Dinner, all programs will take place in G-132.

## Lyceum Has Diverse Lectures This Fall

A wide variety of lecture programs will be offered this Fall by the Lyceum Committee. Work has gone on all Summer in developing several series of presentations. These lectures are designed to complement the quality academic programs offered by Clayton State College and provide the student body with the opportunity to hear and meet experts in a variety of fields.

The first presentation, a "Financial Accounting Update," will be given by Dr. James Don Edwards of the University of Georgia. This will take place at 11:05 a.m. on October 5. The annual Artist-in-Residence series begins with a one-day residency by ceramicist Polly Sherrill on October 9. Our first week-long artist will be ceramicist Peg Morar. She will be in residence from October 16-20. Calligrapher Julie Cashin will spend a day on campus, working with students, on October 23. The last Fall Artist-in-Residence will be video artist Louis Bailey. Mr. Bailey worked on the Spike Lee film, *School Daze*, and has also done work on the television series, *In the Heat of the Night*.

A series of lectures which concentrates on the South during the last fifty years, "Old Times Not Forgotten," will begin with two lectures by Dr. Numan Bartley, of the University of Georgia. Dr. Bartley's topic for his 7:00 p.m. lecture on October 11 will be "Southern Politics at Mid-Century: New Strategies and Old Directions." On October 12, at 11:05 a.m., he will speak on "The Making of the Sunbelt: Politics and the Perils of Progress." Rev. C. T. Vivian, former National Director of Affiliates for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (S.C.L.C.), will address the topic of "The S.C.L.C. and Southern Change" during lectures on November 1-2. The lectures will take place at 7:00 p.m. and 11:05 a.m., respectively.

Two special programs will close out the Fall quarter portion of the "Old Times Not Forgotten" lecture series. *Gone With The Wind* will be screened at 6:00 p.m. on November 29, in room G-132. Mr. Herb Bridges, author of *Scarlett Fever* and *Gone With The Wind: The Definitive Illustrated History of the Book, the Movie, and the Legend*, will talk on "The Making of *Gone With The Wind* and its Continual Significance and Appeal" at 11:05 a.m. on November 30. Mr. Bridges will bring a portion of his collection of *Gone With The Wind* memorabilia, the largest such private collection in the world, for a campus exhibit that week.

In the health and wellness area, the first "Wellness Fair" kicks off the year. This program runs from 9:00 a.m. until noon on October 19. Representatives from several Atlanta health and wellness organizations have been invited to distribute literature and to answer questions. Five concurrent forums will take place in the B-building at 11:00 a.m. that morning. In addition, the cafeteria will provide a special selection of wholesome food items as part of a health food menu that day. On November 15-16, Ms. Lori Radford, of Talbott Recovery System, will address the topic of "Co-Dependency—People Who Care Too Much." Her presentations will take place at 7:00 p.m. on November 15 and again at 11:05 a.m. on November 16.

Another new program series begins in October. An art lecture series will start with lectures on "Contemporary Perspectives on Art" by Dr. Joseph Perrin, Professor and Head Emeritus of the School of Art and Design at Georgia State University. Dr. Perrin will be speaking at 7:00 p.m. on October 25, and at 11:05 a.m. on October 26. Dr. John Howett will speak on "Con-

temporary Public and Political Art" at 7:00 p.m. on November 8.

Lyceum Laureate speaker, Dr. Charles Rosen, will present a lecture on "Chopin and the Romantic Style" at 11:05 a.m. on November 9, and will give a piano recital at 8:15 p.m. on November 10. Both of Mr. Rosen's programs will take place in room G-132. Mr. Rosen won the 1972 National Book Award for Arts and Letters, for his volume *The Classical Style*. In other music-related presentations, Thamyris, an Atlanta music ensemble, will present a concert of twentieth century music at 7:00 p.m. on October 30. Dr. Calvert Johnson, of Agnes Scott College, will give a harpsichord lecture/recital on "Changes in Instrument Building Technology." This presentation will take place at 11:05 a.m. on November 16. Both of these programs are a part of the Art and Technology series and will take place in room G-132.

# Information On C.S.C. Clubs & Organizations

Clayton State College students have an opportunity to become active in many campus clubs and organizations. Most of these groups have at least one meeting each month during the activities hour as well as meeting at other times. The following clubs and organizations are currently active and functioning on the Clayton State College campus. Other clubs and organizations may be formed in the future based on the needs and desires of the student body.

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## ART CLUB

The purposes of the Art Club are to provide a means for career-oriented development of skills and techniques for art students or any persons interested in graphic or three dimensional arts. The club serves to form and strengthen a bond between the various art majors through joint projects. Membership in the Art Club is open to any student with an interest in this area.

## BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

The purposes of the Baptist Student Union are to provide, for Clayton State College students, fellowship, enrichment and service opportunities in an atmosphere of and promoting Christian ideals.

## BLACK CULTURAL AWARENESS ASSOCIATION

The objectives of the Black Cultural Awareness Association are to cultivate, promote, and sustain a cultural awareness of Blacks and other minority groups and to contribute to the improvement of the educational community. Membership in BCAA is open to all interested students.

## CHESS CLUB

The Chess Club's aim is to foster chess playing among students, provide aid in problem-solving skills, and to promote healthy competition. The Chess Club is open to all students.

## CLAYTON STATE DEMOCRATIC CLUB

The purposes of the Clayton State Democratic Club are to provide a vehicle for individuals on campus to organize and express political opinions, to provide information to the College community concerning Democratic candidates and their positions on the issues, and to enable members of the College community to meet Democratic elected officials and candidates. Membership in this organization is open to all interested Clayton State College students.

## COLLEGE REPUBLICANS

The purposes of the College Republicans are to develop political skills and leadership abilities among Republican students as preparation for future service by them to the party and the community, to make known and promote the principles of the Republican Party among the students at Clayton State College, to recruit Clayton State College students as members of the club and members of the Republican Party, and to aid in the election of Republican candidates at all levels of government. Membership in this organization is open to all interested Clayton State College students.

## DELTA EPSILON CHI

The purposes of Delta Epsilon Chi are to provide an organization for the educational enhancement of marketing, merchandising or management and supervision majors. Among their goals are the development of leadership characteristics, self-confidence and a greater understanding of the free, competitive enterprise system. Students who were members of DECA in high school would be particularly interested in this organization.

## DATA PROCESSING MANAGEMENT ASSOCIATION

The purposes of the Data Processing Management Association are to develop a better understanding of the nature and functions of data processing and assist them in solving their individual problems in this area. It is designed to foster, among its members, a better understanding of the vital business role of data processing and the necessity for a professional attitude among data processors. Membership is open to any Clayton State College student who has the desire to enter the field of data processing.

## GEORGIA ASSOCIATION OF NURSING STUDENTS

GANS is Clayton State College's Nursing organization. The purposes of GANS are to help prepare student nurses for their career after college and to serve as a liaison between members and the college on academic and non-academic matters. This organization is open to all students with Nursing as their declared major.

## INTERNATIONAL AWARENESS CLUB

The purposes of the International Awareness Club are to stimulate interest in foreign languages and cultures. You do not have to be enroll-

ed in a foreign language course to be a member of the International Awareness Club. Members have assisted with the Creative Arts Festival held annually and have also participated in foreign language competitions. A new project of the International Awareness Club is the sponsorship of an annual International Week on campus.

## MUSIC CLUB

The purposes of the Music Club are to support students in the development of their musical talents, to be of service to the music department and to assist in the promotion and production of a variety of musical programs. It is not necessary to be a music major to be active in the Music Club.

## PEACEWORK

The purposes of Peacework are to create awareness about local, state, national, and world-wide problems and to invoke the process of peace at the academic, social, and cultural levels of the community. Membership in this organization is open to all Clayton State College students.

## PHI BETA LAMBDA

The purposes of Phi Beta Lambda are to develop the qualities necessary for business and civic leadership. Membership in PBL is open to anyone who is enrolled in any business course at Clayton State College. Students who have been members of the Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) would be particularly interested in Phi Beta Lambda.

## STUDENT AMERICAN DENTAL ASSOCIATION

SADHA is Clayton State College's Dental Hygiene organization. The purpose of SADHA is to promote better dental health at the College and in our community. This organization is open to any student enrolled in the Dental Hygiene program.

## STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION

The Student Government Association (SGA) provides a framework through which students may work and participate in the operation and the development of the college. The SGA appoints students to several faculty/student committees, sub-committees and commissions which are responsible for coordination and supervision of student-oriented activities and functions. Involvement in the SGA, either directly (by becoming a representative, being appointed to a committee or working on one of the many SGA project(s) or indirectly (by participating in the elections and giving support to the SGA), is encouraged by all of us at Clayton State College.

## STUDENTS SUPPORTING OTHER STUDENTS

Students Supporting Other Students (SSOS) is an organization for students who are returning to school after an absence of several years or students who desire interaction with others in similar situations.

## STUDENT PUBLICATIONS

The Publications Committee, a sub-committee of the Student Affairs Committee, is responsible for all student publications at Clayton State College. At the current time there is one student publication, *The Bent Tree*, the student newspaper.

## THE BENT TREE

*The Bent Tree*, the student newspaper of Clayton State College, is published four times per quarter during the fall, winter and spring quarters. Staff members learn layout, paste-up and writing techniques. Staff members can sign up for Journalism 100 (Journalism laboratory) for one hour of credit. Students may arrange to take this course during pre-registration, registration, or drop/add each quarter. Previous experience, although helpful, is not necessary.

As of the press deadline, the following clubs and organizations have confirmed their participation in this year's program: Baptist Student Union, Black Cultural

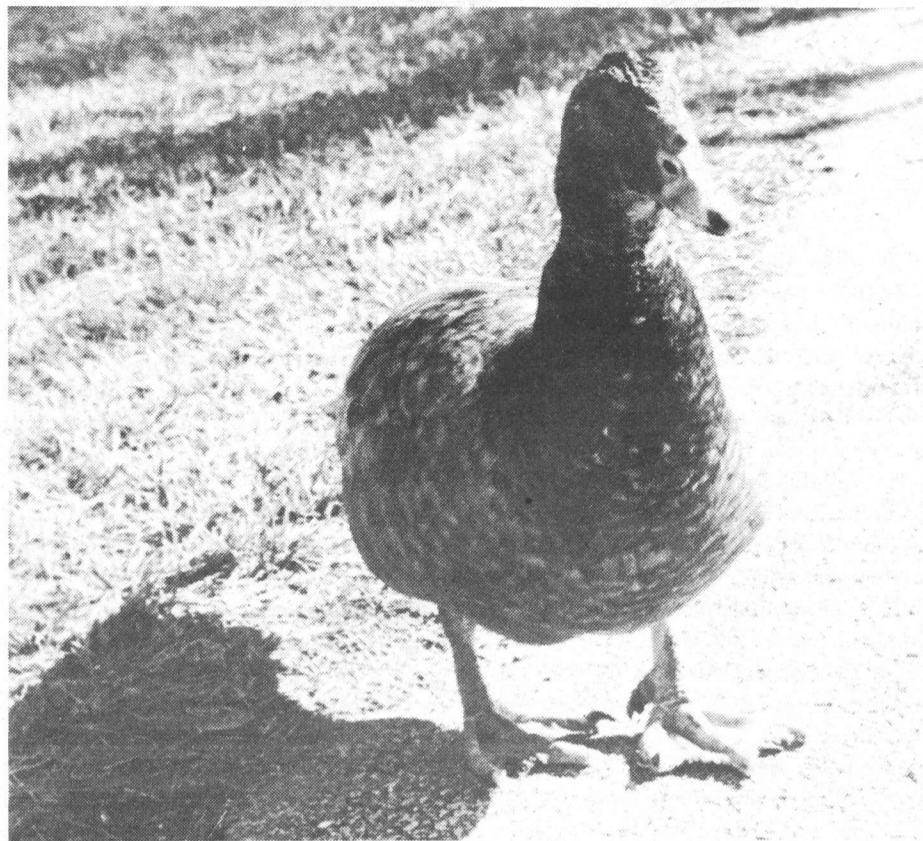
Awareness Association, College Republicans, Delta Epsilon Chi, Peacework, Phi Beta Lambda, and Students Supporting Other Students.

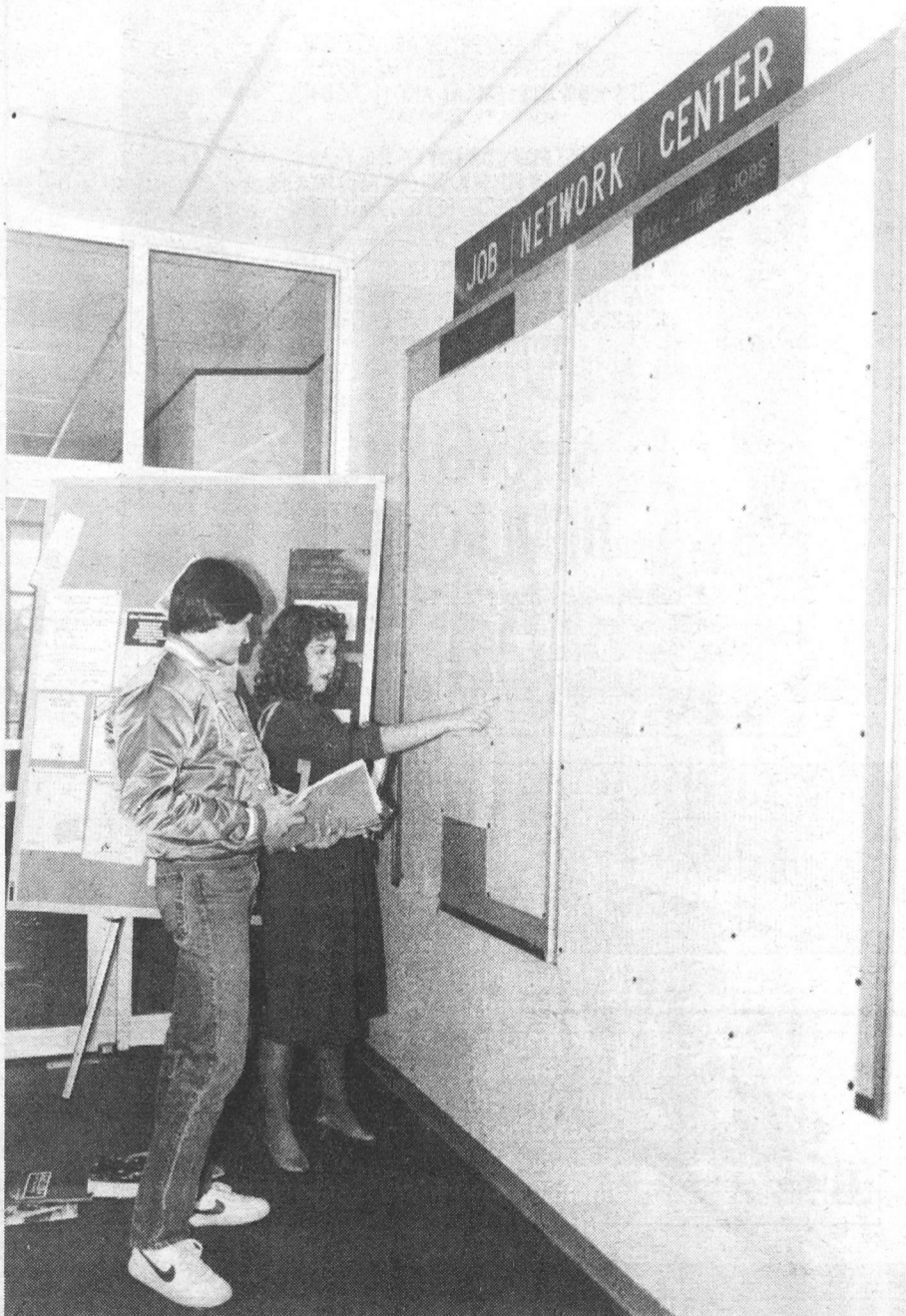
# CAMPUS SCENES



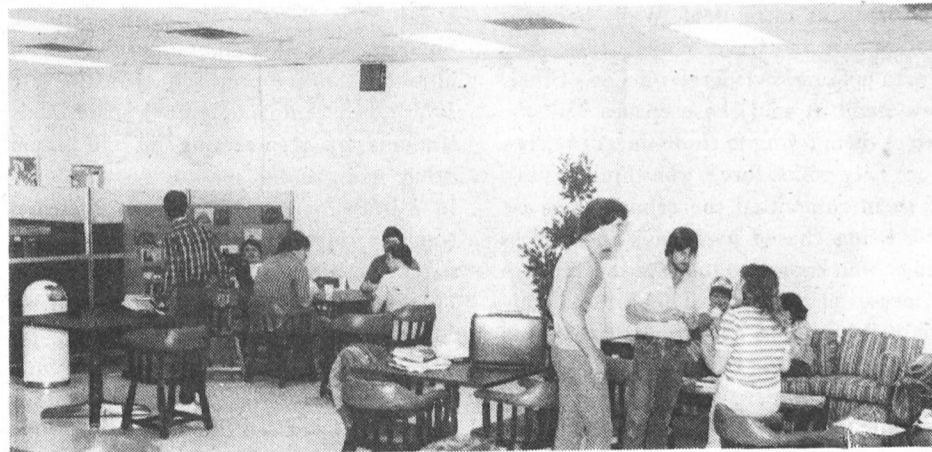
When you need a break from studying in the library take a trip to the windows overlooking the large campus lake. This is sure to relax you and get you ready mentally for more studying.

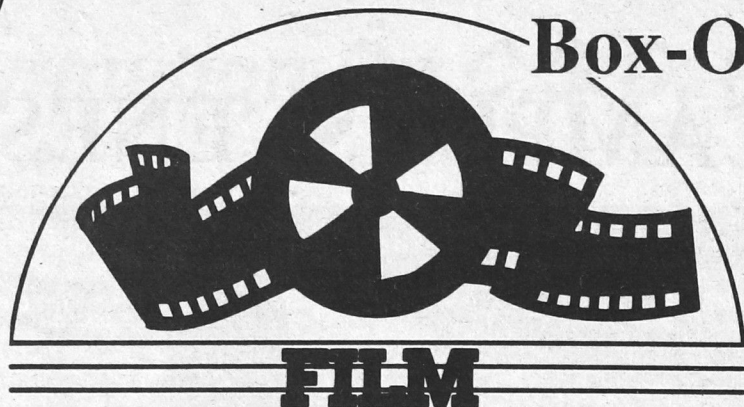

The "caped crusader" hits the screen at 1:15, 6:30, 8:45 and 11:00 p.m. on October 27. Having already earned over \$230 million nationwide, it will possibly be the biggest campus film draw in a decade. Michael Keaton plays Bruce Wayne, Gotham City's most eligible bachelor, who moonlights as Batman. Jack Nicholson,

pulling out all of the stops, overacts wildly in his portrayal of Batman's nemesis, The Joker. Also featured is Georgia-born actress Kim Basinger as reporter Vicki Vale. *Batman* is rated PG-13 and will be accompanied by screenings of *That Darn Cat* for younger audiences.

The following Friday, November 3, brings *Ghostbusters II* to campus. Bill Murray, Dan Aykroyd, Harold Ramis, and Ernie Hudson return to outwit more ghouls in this hilarious sequel to the top-grossing comedy of all times. Sigourney Weaver, Rick Moranis, and Annie Potts reprise their roles in this hit film that scares up plenty of laughs and chills with its high-spirited humor and spectacularly spook special effects. In addition to three showings in G-132 at 1:15, 8:30 and 10:30 p.m., there will be a 7:30 p.m. screening in the dining hall after the Family Night Spaghetti Dinner. There will not be a separate kiddie film for this PG-rated film.

On November 17, the multi-faceted actor and comedian, Robin Williams stars in *Dead Poets Society*, one of the surprise Summer hits. As a liberal teacher at an ultraconservative prep school in the late 1950's, he attempts to ignite a spark in his students by resurrecting an old social group dedicated to reading poetry aloud. In a dramatic departure from his usual comedy roles, Williams surprised the nation's critics with his performance. This PG-rated feature will be shown at 1:15, 6:30, 8:45, and 11:00 p.m. and *The Parent Trap* will be the evening's kiddie film.

The number one film on the film survey and the number two film at the box-office this summer was *Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade*. It was originally scheduled to show on December 1. The producers of the film had decided, in June, to release this film to colleges on November 1, and the General Entertainment Committee jumped at the opportunity to book it for CSC audiences. On September 15, the Student Activities Office was notified that the producers had decided to move the release

date to mid-January. Due to this change in release date, *Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade* has been moved to February 9, 1990.

Fortunately, another top box-office flick was available to fill the gap created by the shifting of *Indiana Jones* to Winter quarter. The new feature for December 1, will be *Lethal Weapon II*, which was originally slated for a Winter screening at CSC. Mel Gibson and Danny Glover star again as a pair of mismatched partners on the L. A. police force. This exciting action

film will be shown at 1:15, 6:30, 8:30 and 10:30 p.m. *Lethal Weapon II* is rated R. As of this writing the kiddie film for that evening has not been selected.

All feature film screenings will take place in G-132, except for the 7:30 screening of *Ghostbusters II*, which will take place in the dining hall. Kiddie films are shown in G-121. Students, faculty and staff are allowed to bring guests to the films. No one under 17 will be admitted to any R-rated film unless accompanied by one of their parents.

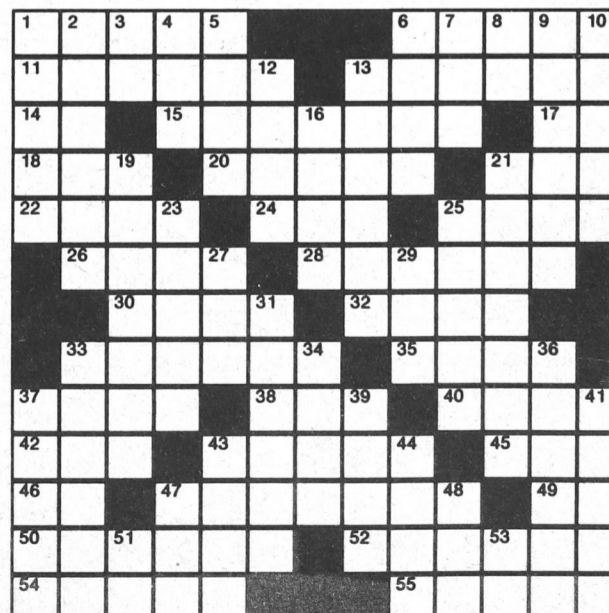
