H. Mason Barfield, assistant men's basketball coach at Kennesaw College, has been named Director of Athletics and head basketball coach at Clayton State College, according to Dr. Harry S. Downs, President.

"We are extremely pleased to have Mason Barfield head up our new program of athletics," Dr. Downs said. "He has demonstrated outstanding leadership qualities in coaching and teaching, and his experiences undoubtedly will make him successful in working with our students, faculty and the community while establishing a quality athletic program."

Clayton State will enter into intercollegiate athletic competition on the NAIA level during the 1990-91 basketball season. Starting with a men's program only, the College anticipates the addition of other sports after studies are completed to determine their impact on the College and the community.

As Director of Athletics, Barfield will be charged with identifying the next athletic programs to be added, to fill coaching posi-

First Wellness Fair Set For October 19

On Thursday, October 19, 1989, from 9:00 a.m.—noon, in and around the Clobby, there will be a Wellness Fair. Twenty organizations will be present and representatives from them will be answering questions and providing information. Among these will be AID Atlanta, Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, MADD, Clayton General Hospital, American Heart Association, Battered Women's Association, and the Clayton State College Dental Hygiene and Nursing Departments.

Screenings will be offered to all who want them. Among the screenings that will be offered free of charge are blood pressure, glaucoma, cataracts, vision titmus, acuity, and hearing. Clayton General Hospital will be providing a cholesterol screening for \$5. If you want to have the cholesterol screening done, fasting for eight hours prior to the screening is recommended.

In addition to the screenings, there will also be several different seminars in the Bbuilding from 11:05 a.m.-12:05 p.m. In room B-15, "The Devastating Effects of Alcohol" will be presented. A panel comprised of a student whose life was changed permanently by an alcohol-related accident, a felon convicted of vehicular homicide, and a parent whose child had planned to attend Clayton State College but was killed by a drunk driver, will be featured. "AIDS, It Can Happen" will feature a speaker who has AIDS. The main emphasis will be on student education about the disease and how it can happen to anybody. The importance of being assertive about protecting your body and life will be stressed. This seminar will be held in room B-10.

On October 10, President Harry S. Downs called for a press conference in order to introduce the man who would fill the position of Athletic Director and Men's Basketball Coach here at Clayton State College. Held in the Gym at 11:00 AM, President Downs presented H. Mason Barfield to the press and others in attendence.

President Downs, while introducing Mr. Barfield, seemed to be excited about what was taking place. That also seemed to be the feeling of other CSC officials. "This is our first venture into the arena of intercollegiate athletics," stated Dr. Down. He continued by welcoming Mr. Barfield, his wife Elizabeth, and their three children to Clayton State College and the surrounding community.

The former assistant men's basketball coach at Kennesaw College, Mr. Barfield seemed to be well experienced in dealing with the demands of building an athletics program. Mr. Barfield is quite hopeful of **Continued on Page 7**


"We're a small organization with just a core group of committed volunteers. We always like to see new faces and can certainly find everyone a way to help out," Tom Baker, President of Clayton Habitat, said. "I don't think we'll ever have too many volunteers. That would be a problem I'd like to deal with."

Clayton Habitat builds its homes from the ground up and depends on volunteers for labor, building supplies, and financial support. Volunteers of all skill levels are invited to participate in Habitat's activities. Professionals are always needed, but those with no construction skills are just as welcome.

Clayton Habitat also needs volunteers to serve on its numerous committees. These committees include administration, building, church development, family selection, finance, nominations and personnel, nurturing, publicity, resources, site selection, and volunteers. Clayton Habitat meets at 7:30 p.m., the third Thursday of each month at Jonesboro United Methodist Church. "Most of our committees have only one or two people working on them. There's a lot of behind the scenes work to be done, and these are the people we count on for that," Baker said.

Clayton County Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit Christian housing ministry dedicated to working with people to improve their living conditions. Habitat accomplishes this by building or renovating houses and selling them at no profit and no interest.

Two Nursing Scholarships To Be Awarded This Fall

Two scholarships for hursing students have recently been announced by the Dean of Students office. The Georgia Association of Post Anesthesia Nurses, South Metro District, is offering a \$500 scholarship and the Association of Operating Room Nurses, Tara Chapter, is offering a \$100 scholarship.

The \$500 scholarship is open to all second, third and fourth year Clayton State College nursing students. The requirements are that the applicant be in good academic standing and complete a two-part scholarship application.

The \$100 scholarship is open to

freshman and sophomore Clayton State College nursing students. Applicants must be in good academic standing, complete a three-part application including a one-page paper on the subject of "What in Your Life Influenced You To Become a Professional Nurse." Applicants must agree that their name and photo can be released for publicity purposes.

Applications for both of the scholarships. are available from the Dean of the School of Health Sciences (C-37) or the Dean of Students (C-57). Applications must be submitted to the Dean of Students by no later than October 31.

Harry S. Truman Scholarship Is Available To C.S.C. Students

Clayton State College sophomores interested in a career in government service at the federal, state, or local level are invited to apply for the 1990 Harry S. Truman Scholarship.


Established by Congress in 1975, the Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation operates ongoing educational scholarship programs designed to provide opportunities for outstanding students in the United States with potential leadership ability to prepare for careers in government service.

In April 1990, the foundation will award 92 scholarships nationally. The deadline for all 1990 applications is December 1, 1989. Clayton State College is eligible to nominate three students for the 1990 competition.

The scholarship award covers eligible expenses up to \$7,000 per year for the junior and senior years and up to two years of graduate study.

To be eligible, a student must be a fulltime sophomore working toward or planning to pursue a baccalaureate degree, have a "B" average or equivalent, stand in the upper fourth of the class, and be a United States citizen or United States national heading toward a career in government.

Interested students should submit a letter of application, a statement of career plans, a list of past public service activities or other leadership positions, a current transcript, and a 600-word essay discussing a public policy issue of their choice. These items need to be submitted to Robert C. Bolander, Dean of Students, Truman Scholarship Faculty Representative, by November 21, 1989. Dean Bolander's office is located in room C-57.

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Scott Doner Appointed As C.S.C. **Public Safety Director**

H. Scott Doner, a ten-year veteran with Emory University's Department of Public Safety, has assumed duties as Director of Public Safety at Clayton State College, according to Robert H. Koermer, Vice President for Fiscal Affairs.

Doner earned a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from Troy State University in 1979, and a master's degree in the same field from Georgia State University in 1988. In addition, he has completed over 55 training courses, ranging from firearms and explosives to CPR, child abuse, terrorism, traffic and criminal laws, self defense, riot control, and police administration

Since 1984, he has served as an associate instructor at the Region 4 Police Academy's Public Safety Training Institute, providing instruction in medical emergencies, firearms and other basic courses.

Doner joined Emory University as a Public Safety Officer in 1980. He became supervisor of traffic and parking in 1982, and in 1984, was promoted to Sergeant in charge of the morning watch.

He was named Supervisor of Support Services in 1986, and a year later was named Public Safety Supervisor and promoted to the rank of Lieutenant.

As Director of Public Safety at Clayton State, Doner is responsible for the super-

vision and administrative work involved in planning, organizing and directing the seven-officer department.

It is the responsibility of the department to enforce all traffic rules and regulations of the College, and to cooperate with appropriate law enforcement agencies in the on-campus enforcement of local, state and federal laws.

The special performance of "Mark Twain on Tour," starring Kenneth Richters, will take place on October 20 at 8:00 p.m. It will be preceded by a dinner in the dining hall.

Tickets for the 7:00 p.m. dinner are priced at \$7.00 in advance and \$8.00 at the door (if any are available). Seating will be limited to 150. Those wishing to attend just the performance are welcome to do so.

The dinner will feature roast beef, squash souffle, Italian green beans, salad, rolls, and strawberry shortcake. Those purchasing their tickets early will be assured of the best seating.

Mr. Richters has performed "Mark Twain on Tour" over 700 times since 1978. The extraordinary aging process, which takes close to three hours of make-up application, transform Richters from a man

in his early thirties to one in his seventies. Mr. Richters has appeared as Mark Twain for AT&T, on the Public Broadcasting System, the BBC in England, before members of Congress in Washington, D.C., and most recently as a spokesman for United Technologies and the World Trade Center Association.

In other roles, Ken Richters has performed in live stage productions such as Oklahoma, Brigadoon, and Godspell. On television he has had roles on Happy Days, Search for Tomorrow and in the NBC-TV movie Johnny We Hardly Knew Ye, a film about the early political life of President John F. Kennedy.

In a review of a past performance the Los Angeles Times reviewer wrote, "Mark Twain is without question alive and well, and traveling the world with actor Ken Richters." After his performance at Oxford University, a reviewer wrote, "The American actor Richters was Mark Twain! The opening night audience was en-thusiastic and very impressed..."

S.G.A. President Speaks Out On **Representatives Election**

On October 24 and 25, the Student Government Association will hold elections for SGA representatives. A representative will be elected from each of the following schools: School of Arts & Sciences, School of Health Sciences, School of Technology, and School of Business, along with two night student positions and two representative-at-large positions. This ensures that all of the various groups of students have equal representation. Representatives have voting power on all issues and the privilege of debate at all meetings. The requirements are: (1) Be enrolled in at least (5) credit hours per quarter during the academic year (fall, winter, and spring) and (2) Have and maintain a minimum 2.5 grade point average.

To run, you must fill out a petition which is available in the Dean of Students Office (C-57). Petitions need to be turned in as soon as possible but no later than 3:00 p.m. on October 20. The proper procedure for campaigning is explained on the petition. Campaigning starts as soon as your petition has been verified by the Dean of Students Office and ends when the polls close on October 25.

There are also many committee positions open for all students. These positions are not elected but appointed by the SGA. They include committees such as Student Affairs Committee, Executive Committee, Lyceum Committee, Library Committee, Judicial Commission, and Publication Committee. If you are interested in participating, there will be a sign up sheet at the ballot box. The person working the ballot box will be able to answer any questions you may have. We need good people as representatives and committee members to help provide student input on these committees, all of which affect students directly. This College would not exist if students were not here. Don't be someone who sits around and complains. Get involved-if you want to make changes-This is the place to start!

Beginning October 25, the Lyceum Committee will present a series of programs focusing on perspectives in contemporary art.

The first speaker will be Mr. Joseph Perrin from Georgia State University. He is Professor and Head Emeritus of the School of Art and Design. Lecture times are 7:00 p.m. on October 25 and 11:05 a.m. on October 26. The lectures will take place in room D-223. Mr. Perrin will also be visiting the studio art and humanities classes to provide students with the opportunity for a more personalized discussion. Videotapes of all speakers will be made.

There will be other lecturers featured throughout the year to encompass the many forms of contemporary art in the Southeast and in Georgia, particularly. These include Dr. John Howett, Professor of Art History at Emory University. He will speak at 7:00 p.m. on November 8. Mr. Lamar Dodd from the University of Georgia and several private gallery owners, art critics and historians will also be a part of this series.

This program was proposed and implemented by Dr. June M. Legge, Assistant Professor of Foreign Language and Mr. Thomas B. Daughtry, Associate Professor of Art. It was specifically developed to bring together the people who helped to shape art, as it is now, in the State of Georgia and those students who would like to open up their understanding of art and to develop their aesthetic perspective.

According to Mr. Daughtry, "This will add a whole new dimension to the overall educational experience here at the College."

This program is a first of its kind, in that well known artists and critics will be speaking to the general student body for the first time at Clayton State. Dr. Legge and Mr. Daughtry are very excited and have worked hard to put this program together. Dr. Legge says, "We have the educational circle of speakers well represented." The two series proposers are hoping the students will participate and take advantage of the presenters knowledge and experience to help expose them to the art of the past and present, thereby understanding art as it relates to our culture.


Halloween Bash Slated For October 31

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Earl Is A Real "Renaissance" Man

To most people, Joey Earl is about as normal as the rest of us. He graduated from Morrow Senior High. He goes to Clayton State College, where he majors in business. He likes to keep in shape by cycling and occasionally working out with weights. However, Mr. Earl has a hobby that most of us would find unique.

He makes armour. Thirteenth century European armour to be exact. "Well, I guess I've been interested in it since I was in Junior High." said Mr. Earl. "At that point I made some armour out of airplane aluminum, but it was just for looks." However, a close look at some of the things which Joey has created will reveal much more than armour made just for looks. "I started making real armour my junior year in high school. I got the idea from that year's Renaissance festival, which featured members of a group called 'Society for Creative Anachronism.' They were holding demonstrations on armour making, and so I bought a couple of their manuals and that's where the stuff I make now comes from," he explained.

Joey has made a brigandine from 1/8 inch steel which he cut into plates about three inches long and two inches wide. He then glues the plates in between two pieces of leather which are cut to the specifications of his chest and abdomen. He then does the same for his back, and then connects the two at his shoulder.

Other pieces of armour created by Mr. Earl include plate mail leg pieces, chain mail sleeves on his brigandine, elbow covers made out of steel, and a thirteenth century helmet.

Earl has forged two swords at a forge he built in the back yard of his home in Rex. The forge is made out of an old grill filled with heating bricks, and has an old manual blower attached to one side.

Making armour, however, is just the beginning. Mr. Earl takes his hobby a step further. He fights with what he creates. "Every Sunday afternoon at Atlanta Memorial Park the Society (For Creative Anachronism) holds fighter practice. I occasionally go up there, when I can find the time," he said. At fighter practice, Mr. Earl spars with other members of the society using swords made out of a bamboo-like wood called rattan. He also uses a shield. "Most of the other guys are really good. Sometimes they fight with wooden axes. and polearms. Nobody ever gets hurt real badly, but I've had a lot of bruises," he went on to say.

Obviously Mr. Earl takes his medieval history pretty seriously. This includes designing his room like the inside of a medieval castle. "My parents are pretty used to this stuff by now." claimed Earl. "They've always been supportive of what I'm doing."

Mr. Earl is currently making a fantasy action film with fellow students from Clayton State, the University of Georgia, Georgia Tech, and Georgia State. Mr. Earl provides most of the costumes for the film, as well as playing one of the leading roles.







building a well rounded program of sports here at Clayton State. "We want to provide as many athletic activities as we can," stated Mr. Barfield. However, he is also pleased with the fact that CSC will only start out with a men's basketball team for the 1990-91 season. Other sports will be added during future seasons. "I think we're starting out in a rational way," claimed Barfield.

Mr. Barfield also seemed rather hopeful about the possible success of the new athletic program. "We can have a successful program in a very short period of time," Barfield said.

The main theme, however, of Mr. Barfield's address, was the importance of a strong relationship between academics and athletics. Barfield spoke of the two as a "marriage" in which a strong academic program created a strong athletic program. This theory seems to be one of the main reasons Mr. Barfield was chosen as athletic director. When asked about why Mr. Barfield was picked for the postion, Dr. Avery Harvill, chairman of the search committee for an athletic director, stated "I think it was his philosophy about what an athletics program should be, and how it should intertwine with academics."

College in Montgomery, began his coaching career in 1980 as an assistant varsity coach and head junior varsity coach at Lowndes High.

He moved to Lassiter High School in 1985 and compiled a 47-30 record during a three-year stint as head boy's basketball coach at the Cobb County school. In 1987-88, his last season there, Barfield's team posted a 23-7 record en route to the State AAAA semifinals where they lost to eventual state champion Griffin. He was named "coach of the year" in Cobb County following the season.

90-91 season being his first task, Mr. Barfield made it clear he has a positive attitude on how he plans to recruit. He claimed, "This area can provide the athletes we need to build our program." Here Mr. Barfield made it clear than he planned to heavily recruit from the high school region 4-AAAA. These incude Clayton County high schools, as well as Griffin High School, which typically has some of the best basketball players in the state. When recruiting top players, however, Mr. Barfield might find tough competition in NCAA Division 1 teams. "If a player is a Division 1 quality player, then they're going to a Division 1 school. But, I think we'll be able to draw quality players for the NAIA," analyzed Mr. Barfield.

In a conversation after the press conference, President Downs expressed hope for student involvement with the program. "We'll have cheerleaders, and a pep band ... we'll shoot the works." claimed President Downs. "But we really need to build some spirit, get the students involved, and hopefully this thing will really take off "

Attending the press conference were local media, including the Clayton News Daily, and WGNX (channel 46). Also in attendence were SGA officials.


