Business In Review Set For April 19

Approximately One Hundred Employers Will Be On Hand

Clayton State students will have a special opportunity on April 19,1990. Representatives from 104 companies and information about 15 other organizations will be available that Thursday, from 9:00 a.m. until noon in the gymnasium, at the third annual "Business in Review."

"Business in Review '90" is a career exchange (a kind of fair), where students have the opportunity to interact with business leaders and find out the types of jobs that are available and that relate to their majors. The purpose of this fair is to assist all students with making their job choice and with initiating those first contacts with employers. "Business in Review '90" is not an interview situation -- companies will not be hiring on the spot! Some informal recruiting, however, may occur. The fair will provide an open door into the world of business.

Students will have the opportunity to discuss company trends and investigate their career options. Students will have the opportunity to make connections with representatives from local and national companies, that they can later follow up when the time approaches for finding a job. Businesses represented at the fair will also provide information about

co-op educational and internship possibilities for the immediate future -- e.g., this summer or next fall.

The businesses participating in "Business in Review '90" will be arranged in alphabetical order in the gymnasium. A program will be given to each student, so that particular businesses can be located easily. Ms. Peggy Gardner, Director of Placement at CSC, suggests that students research the companies in which they are interested prior to the fair.

In this way, students will know before hand to whom they want to talk and students can save time, as the fair is a once-a-year event. The Placement Office in D-208 can provide resources and information about the companies. Also, students are advised to check periodicals in the library, such as the *Atlanta Business Chronicle*, for information about the companies.

Students will want to "dress for success" by wearing conservative attire such as suits. Also, students will want to prepare a few questions to discuss with company representatives (see "Sample Questions" Article).

The Friendship Force is an organization that was initiated when former President Jimmy Carter was in office. Wendy has always traveled. She was in Germany when the wall came down, and helped during the Hungarian crisis. The Friendship Force really piqued her interest, so she went down and scheduled an interview.

She had to attend four days of interviewing. The people interviewed were all divided into various categories, and they chose the people to go from these categories.

Racism: The AIDS Of The 1990's?

Will racism become the AIDS of this decade? Will it become a rallying point for the media to dicuss in a variety of public forums? I don't know, but it is a problem that is eating at the very heart of America.

"The simple solution is that everybody act human whatever their skin color. I don't have a problem with white people per se. I do have a problem with white people acting Caucasian." So quotes the ever lovable, outspoken, arrogant Chuck D of Public Enemy fame. The quote comes from a recent issue of Spin magazine, a monthly music publication.

Now, I listen to the music of Public Enemy, and I do find some of the things that they preach in their songs admirable. They don't advocate the use of drugs, and they shun those that do. They belittle the government's policies on crimes, and urge for stricter laws and more stringent enforcement of them. I applaud the groups efforts in trying to make a difference in the world, but as much as they help it, they destroy it.

Many of Chuck D's lyrics call for the blacks to resist the white's rules. Rules of this nation. Rules to be obeyed by all, regardless of skin color.

Public Enemy's message of this kind of insurrection is completely unfounded, if not totally ridiculous. Much movement is being made, and progress is achieved everyday in improving the relationships between blacks and whites. The bottom line is that it is going to take time to employ all of the changes that must be made in this country, and violence is not the solution to the problem.

This summer, Spike Lee released a film called *Do The Right Thing*. The film showed the racial tensions in Brooklyn escalate to the point where a full scale riot broke out. Public Enemy fueled the film with the biting song "Fight the Power." This song glorified violent resistance, and seemed to cheer the angry black mob into doing what they did. The film ended with a quote from Malcolm X, which basically said that he didn't call it stupid to resist those that oppressed you, he called it intelligence.

Public Enemy seems to also believe that, and they model many of their songs about the black man overcoming the white man. The white man is no longer the enemy to the black, and the black is no longer the enemy to the white. The real enemy now is radical organizations like the Ku Klux Klan, who express a real extremist view.

On one side of the spectrum there are black extremists and on the other side are white extremists, and in the middle is a melange of integrated, socially adapted blacks and whites. It is the people in the middle that are the real victims. They are the ones who have to constantly take sides with one extremist group or another, just to protect themselves.

The extremists are causing more harm than good. They harm the people they claim to represent, and they further anger those that they oppose. The extrem-

ists must realize the damage that they are causing before a situation like that in *Do The Right Thing* erupts.

I hope to see a pitfall for the Ku Klux Klan, and to see better relations between the two races. Also, I hope that Chuck D will redirect his energies into writing and producing songs that will reflect a positive image for the youth of today. Perhaps one day Martin Luther King's dreams will come true, but not until a step is taken by both races in the positive direction.

This forum-type lecture is one that should be of interest to all who plan on working or who already work. We encourage those interested to join us on April 12.





FAA Co-op Prepares Students For Future Jobs

Four CSC Students Currently Participate In Air Traffic Control Program

Four students from Clayton State are learning to solve Air Traffic Control problems through a joint venture between the school and the Federal Aviation Administration known as a cooperative education program, co-op for short. The students currently participating in this cooperative education program are Ivan Harstvedt, Patrick Kee, Rodney Peek, and David Prowant. These students spend two to three work sessions at the Atlanta Air Traffic Control Center in Hampton, Georgia, earning money and studying aviation and air traffic control. These sessions alternate with quarters of academic work in management at Clayton

When they receive their baccalaureate degree from Clayton and complete their co-op sessions they shall be sent to Oklahoma City where the Federal Aviation Administration trains all of their air traffic controllers. The school at Oklahoma City consists of 12 weeks of intense and rigorous programming in which graduates of co-op programs go into with an advantage in knowledge and skills.

To get the most out of the fair, students should bring a small notebook so that they can write down contact names from the companies represented. Students don't necessarily need to bring a resume, but for students close to graduation or contemplating an internship in the near future, it won't hurt to ask if they may contact the company. Students may also consider having a "calling card" made to distribute at the fair. The calling card would have the student's name, address and phone number printed on it. However, it is mainly up to the student to follow up contacts made at the fair. Interviews can be set up at a later date through the Placement Office, as many companies come to campus during the academic

"Business in Review '90" is mainly a networking event for the students. It provides practice in effective communication with employers, as students will be visiting the various representatives at the fair and asking them questions in a one-on-one or small group situation. It also provides an excellent opportunity to see the wide range of jobs offered in the local community or with companies that have branches throughout the United States.

Students may also get credit in some classes by attending the event. Sign-up sheets will be available, listed by school (e.g., School of Business, School of Technology). To get credit, be sure to sign in.

"We all have these T-shirts that say 'Georgians of the World, Unite'." She is very optimistic about the whole trip, and feels that nothing but the best will happen.

She said, "If the family has a student, then I will go to school or to the university with him. Did you know that Soviet Georgia has over 20 universities?"

Both lecture/demonstrations will take place in G-132. Mr. Yelton uses an Apple Macintosh computer and MIDI software to recreate music from an orchestra of synthesizers. Mr. Yelton is the author of *The Rock Synthesizer Manual* and *Music and the Macintosh*. He has recorded music for Delta Airlines, Turner Broadcasting, as well as many other clients.

He has been involved with synthesizers since 1973, and with the Macintosh since its introduction in 1984. Mr. Yelton has performed concerts for the city of Atlanta, Apple Computer Corporation, and several colleges and universities.

On April 18, at 11:05 a.m., Dr. Roger Hermanson will lecture on "Accounting in the 1990's." This will take place in D-223. Dr. Hermanson is Regents' Professor of Accounting at Georgia State University. He is the co-author of several books and monographs in the accounting field and numerous articles in

professional journals. Edward and Vivian both are hesitant to admit that there is any feeling between them, but after a trip to the opera, they both realize the inevitable. Edward has reservations about marrying her because of his past failed relationships, but is drawn to her for some reason that he can not place.

He hurts her and she leaves at the end of the week. She retreats to her apartment and is determined to never work as a prostitute again. She packs her

bags and is heading away when Edward returns to her life. A fairy tale ending ensues, and I guess all is well.

The performances were all good, with the exception being Ms. Roberts. She handled her role with precision, and totally overwhelmed the audience everytime she appeared on the screen.

The story was decent, but the performances carried the script for the most part. Ms. Roberts is proving her acting range, and awards are going to start pouring her way very soon. Mr. Gere is on a comeback, sort of. This is definitely better that his three pictures before this, including *Internal Affairs*, but his screen presence is still hard to take seriously.

Pretty Woman offers a refreshing change at the movies. It doesn't carry on with all of the stereotypes that seem to populate and belittle these types of movies. The film found a place in my heart, and I'm sure it will find one in yours, too.

Carlos Head Signed As CSC's Newest Basketball Player

Morrow Senior High School basketball star, 6-1 guard Carlos Head, has signed a basketball grant-in-aid with Clayton State College, according to Mason Barfield, athletic director and head basketball coach.

Named to several post-season honor teams, Head was a leader on this year's Morrow Mustang team that finished the year with a 16-11 record. Performing at the guard position for Morrow Coach Richard Simmons, he was the team's leading rebounder, free throw shooter and second leading scorer.

Carlos pulled down almost 8 rebounds per game and set a school record by chasing in 85.5 percent of his free throws. His 18.2 scoring average was second only to the 18.4 average posted by teammate Maurice Jackson. During his senior year, Head hit 45 percent of his two-point efforts and almost 42 percent of his three-point goals.

"He's a very talented offensive player and will develop into a very good college player," Coach Barfield said of his latest recruit. "His attitude toward playing is what I really like about him...he enjoys playing and enjoys himself while playing. I think that's important."

Head's family moved from southwest Atlanta to Morrow before his junior year in high school, and he was a starter for the Mustangs by mid-season last year.

Head is the third outstanding athlete signed to play on Clayton State's first basketball team next year. Adrian Stephens, a six-foot standout guard at North Clayton Senior High School a year ago, signed in January, and Matt Bowen, a 5-11 point guard out of Calhoun High School, signed in April.

Clayton State College will enter into athletics slowly, starting with a men's basketball team during the 1990-91 season, and adding other programs each year. Clayton will be a member of NAIA District 25, playing in a conference with 11 other Georgia colleges.

Signed last week were Vince Askin, a 6-7 forward/center from Jackson High School; and Steve Wilson, a 6-8 forward/center from Duluth High School.


Coach Barfield now has five players who have agreed to play on the College's first basketball team next fall. Earlier signees were 6-0 guard Adrian Stevens of North Clayton Senior High, 5-11 guard Matt Bowen of Calhoun High, and 6-1 guard/forward Carlos Head of Morrow Senior High.

Askin, who likely will play both forward and center for Clayton State, was

a starter during the last two seasons for Jackson High. During his senior year, he led the team in blocked shots with 85, a 3.1 average, and was the second-leading rebounder with a 6.4 average.

Jackson High posted a 22-5 record last year and was 18-6 the previous season, giving the Butts County team a 40-11 two-year record with Askin as a starter.

Wilson played the center position for a Duluth team that went 15-8 this past season. A strong offensive and defensive performer, he average 10 points per game, pulled down 7 rebounds and blocked an average of 4 shots per contest.
