Dear Student:

It is my pleasure to welcome you to campus for what promises to be one of the most exciting years in the history of Clayton State College. We will begin intercollegiate athletics, inaugurate the Spivey Recital Hall, and open our beautiful new Continuing Education Building. Whether you are a new or a returning student, I am delighted that you will be a part of this year's experience.

A new era will begin on November 12 when the first Clayton State College men's basketball team tips-off against Piedmont College, AMong the visiting colleges that our lakers will host this year in the newly renovated gymnasium are Kennesaw State, North Georgia, Georgia Southwestern, Berry, Georgia College, and Southern Tech. Coach Mason Barfield has recruited a promising group of student athletes. I am confident that they will represent Clayton State proudly on the floor and in the classroom.

This January we will be privileged to open the Spivey Hall. This impressive facility is being built with funds donated by the late Walter and Emily



Spivey and other community donors. Spivey Hall will bring to our campus numerous musical performances from student recitals to world-class concerts. In the fall of 1991, we will officially begin our third baccalaureate degree program--a Bachelor of Music. Spivey Recital Hall will be the centerpiece of this exciting new undertaking for the College. Currently enrolled students can begin taking courses now that will apply to the four-year degree.

Also this academic year, we will move into the new Continuing Education Building. This facility will be the home of our Community Services program and will host numerous conferences. The move to this new building will free up space in existing buildings so that we can better meet your needs in academics and student services.

Part of the construction plan around Spivey Hall and the Continuing Education Building involves relocating the tennis courts and athletic fields and constructing additional paved lots for our free parking. Unfortunately, this phase of construction will not be completed for Fall Quarter, so we ask your cooperation for the interim period during which parking on campus may present some problems.

New buildings, athletics, and, of course, parking are all important parts of college life, but these sorts of things exist only to support our real purpose--providing quality education for all of our students. The goal of the Clayton State College faculty is to help you become effective, efficient, and joyful lifelong learners.

A key to achieving this goal is our nationally recognized general education program. The faculty of the College believes that a sound general education background is the foundation upon which all associate and baccalaureate degrees should be built. Teresa Chumley Takes First In PBL National Competition

A Clayton State College sophomore, Teresa Chumley, placed first in the nation in Phi Beta Lambda's Machine Transcription Competitive Event. The competition was held at the National Phi Beta Lambda Conference, July 6-9, 1990, in Washington, D.C.

To be able to compete in this competition, Teresa placed first in this event at the State and Regional competi-

tive events. Therefore, she was Georgia's representative in the Machine Transcription Event.

This event involves transcribing business documents, letters, memos, reports, and tables, from a cassette tape. No specific instructions are given; the student is only told if the document to be dictated is a letter, memo, etc. Each contestant is to know how to set up the business document and must do so in mailable format (appropriate margins, no errors, etc.). Also, the student must provide the correct punctuation including paragraphs.

Though each student must provide his/her own transcriber, each student selects the type of equipment and software to use from a list provided by the school hosting the event. Teresa used WordPerfect 5.0 to transcribe her work.

Teresa is the first student from Clayton State College to place first in a Phi Beta Lambda national competition. CSC began its PBL Chapter in 1971 and has had approximately ten students place in the top ten--but Teresa is the first to place Number One!

Teresa is a graduate of Jonesboro High SChool. After working as a forklift driver, she decided she would never be able to "move up" in a company without a better education and marketable skills. This is when she decided to enter Clayton State College as an Office Technology certificate major. When nearing the end of her one-year certificate program, she decided to continue her education. She will complete her A.A.S. Degree with a major in Office Administration at the end of Fall Quarter, 1990.

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Guidelines For Newspaper Submissions Listed

The Bent Tree will contain six basic types of entries. They are listed as follows:

1. News - News stories are to be straight forward descriptions of upcoming or past events of relevance to the campus community. The reporter should refrain from making judgments or expressing opinion in a news story. Quoted opinions should be attributed as specifically as possible. News stories should be balanced in approach and accurate in detail. News stories are written only by staff members of *The Bent Tree*.

2. Features - Features are staff-produced articles, poems, essays, reviews, listings, etc., of a non-controversial nature. This would include magazine-type submissions. The basic purpose of a feature is to provide useful and/or interesting information to the audience of *The Bent Tree*.

3. Editorials - Editorials are staffwritten expressions of opinion on a topic of current interest to the audience of *The Bent Tree*. Unsigned editorials are presumed to represent the opinion of *The Bent Tree* staff. Signed editorials represent the opinion of the writer and may or may not reflect staff consensus. Editorials should be clearly identified as such by either placement on the editorial page or specific notation. Any factual information contained in editorials should be accurate.

4. Letters - Letters to the editor should be published only if they address a matter of current and timely concern to The Bent Tree. Letters are subject to standard editing, but the editors should be careful that the editing does not alter the writer's basic message. Editors are not obligated to print all letters, but if letters are received on both sides of a controversial issue, letters on each side should be printed. If more than one letter is to be printed on either side of a controversial

issue, the number of letters printed should be roughly in proportion to the number received on each side. Unsigned letters will not be accepted. Names may be withheld for valid reasons.

5. Freelance Submissions Freelance submissions may be accepted from members of the College community on any subject, but a submission that is essentially a short statement of opinion on a timely subject should be submitted as a letter to the editor and not as a freelance article. The editor should accept freelance submissions only if they are well written, substantive, accurate in fact and of interest to the audience of The Bent Tree. The editor should take care to make sure that a variety of submissions are accepted if they are offered. This is so that one point of view does not dominate. Freelance submissions will not be accepted on a regular or continuing basis from a single organization or individual. Regular submissions are included under category six (columns). Freelance submissions should be clearly identified as not being written by the staff of The Bent Tree. Headings such as "Guest commentary," "Student viewpoint," etc., can be used by the editor in identifying such submissions. As an alternative, the by-line or a statement at the end of an article could be used to identify the author if not a member of the

6. Columns - These are regularly appearing articles that fall in none of the above categories. Members of the College community who contribute a regular column to *The Bent Tree* become auxiliary members of the staff and agree to meet space, style, deadline and format requirements as the editor shall decide. Columnists shall, however, be given editorial freedom as to content. These columns should be clearly identified as such by placement, title, or appropriate notation.

Potential Parking Crush At CSC Will Necessitate Shuttle Buses This Fall

With a record number of students expected during the Fall quarter, the College anticipates a shortage of parking spaces, especially during the morning hours.

When all spaces on campus are full, vehicles will be directed to a shuttle parking lot on the upper P.E. fields (see map on right).

Between 8:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, free bus service will be provided between this shuttle parking lot and the Administration Building parking lot. Buses will leave every seven or eight minutes.


All students should plan to arrive early for classes, especially during the first several weeks of the quarter.

Air Traffic Control Co-op Program Has Six Students Currenty Involved

This quarter Clayton State has a record number of students working at the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) as Co-op students. Rodney Peek, David Prowart, and Ivan Harstrudt are returning for their second work session whereas Virginia Croft, David Gelmini, and Eric Rose are beginning their careers with the Center.

These students are learning to solve Air Traffic Control problems through a joint venture between the school and the FAA known as a cooperative education program, co-op for short. They will spend two to three work sessions at the Atlanta Air Traffic Control Center in Hampton, Georgia, earning money and studying aviation and air traffic control. These sessions alternate with quarters of academic work in business at Clayton State.

When they receive their baccalaureate degree from Clayton and complete their co-op sessions, they shall be sent to Oklahoma City where the FAA trains all of their air traffic controllers. The school in Oklahoma City consists of 12 weeks on intense and rigorous programming in which graduates of co-op programs go into with an advantage in knowledge and skills.

We are looking for a few more students for this program. If you are interested in applying for consideration, sign up in the Counseling and Career Center by October 26, 1990, to take the institutional administration of the Air Traffic Control Aptitude Test on November 2, 1990, from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. This is the first step toward a career in air traffic control and earnings of over \$60,000 annually.

Sign Up Early For The FAA Air Traffic Control Co-op Examination

It's that time of year again when we look forward to filling co-op positions with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). In order to be eligible for consideration to become an Air Traffic Control Co-op, a student must pass a written exam. This exam, The Air Traffic Control System Exam, shall be administered to a maximum of 25 Clayton State students on Friday, November 2, 1990, at 9:00 a.m.

The first 25 eligible students who register with the Counseling and Career Center, D-208, by Friday, October 26, 1990, shall be scheduled for this test date. In order to be eligible to be one of the students selected as a co-op for Winter work session, the student must 1) be enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program or be a current student in an associate program with immediate plans for continuing in a four year program at Clayton State College, 2) be a citizen of the United States, 3) have a 2.0 or higher grade point average, 4) have earned 45 quarter hours by the end of Fall Quarter 1990, and 5) earn a passing score on this aptitude test.

The students who become Air Traffic Control Co-ops must also meet

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certain medical requirements, satisfy security requirements, and complete the training program prior to their 31st birthday. We currently have seven students serving as FAA Co-ops and we hope to add more in the near future.

Ms. Holloway is a coordinator of Fine Arts at Clayton State College. She is also a member of the Atlanta String Quartet and serves as organist at Mary Branan United Methodist Church. She is a former member of the Atlanta and San Diego Symphony Orchestras and the Emory String Quartet. She received her B.F.A. from the University of Georgia and her M.M. from the University of Illinois.

Bachelor Of Music Degree Program To Start In September, 1991

Clayton State College will offer a Bachelor of Music degree program beginning with the Fall Quarter of 1991, according to Dr. Harry S. Downs, President of the College.

The new program will be in place during the first full year of operation of Spivey Hall, the College's \$4.2 million recital hall built with donations from the Walter and Emilie Spivey Foundation and area citizens and corporations.

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia approved the program at its June 13 meeting, authorizing Clayton State to add its third baccalaureate degree program.

The College already awards Bachelor of Business Administration degrees through the School of Business and Bachelor of Nursing through the School of Health Sciences.

The new Bachelor of Music degree program will offer majors in performance, composition and instrument building, and will be the first four-year program offered through the School of Arts and Sciences. The College already offers both a two-year transfer degree program and a two-year "career program" in music.

Students will be able to enroll in freshman-level classes in the new degree program during the 1991-92 academic year and the first baccalaureate degrees will be awarded in June of 1995.

Since most college music pro-

grams in Georgia and the southeast are training students for music education careers, and possible careers in solo performance, Clayton State proposed a program for the training of musicians in areas where demands are increasing.

Emphasis will be placed on a community atmosphere in which students will study together and learn to appreciate each other's contributions to the musical process. A common core of music courses will focus on music in cultural, historical and technological contexts.

Also included in the new degree program will be small ensemble performances, designed to train students to develop their technical abilities as well as analytical and communicative skills necessary for making music with others.

Instructors in the program will take advantage of a renewed interest in the performance of early music, as well as recent developments in digital electronic musical technology. Students majoring in the performance area will experience an emphasis in chamber music, early music or keyboard.

The Walter and Emilie Spivey Foundation, created for the sole purpose of supporting the fine arts programs at Clayton State College, will provide funds for scholarships, an enhanced performing arts series, and a means to employ nationally and internationally known musicians to hold master classes each quarter for the College's music students.

Wall Street Journal European Correspondent To Lecture

Writer Has First-Hand View Of The Current Situation In Europe

The first presentation in a lecture/forum series, entitled "the World in Revolution," will be Mr. William Echikson. His topic will be "The World in Revolution: The View From Europe." He will speak on Wednesday, October 10, at 7:00 p.m. and again on Thursday, October 11, at 12:05 p.m. Both talks will take place in room D-223.

Mr. Echikson is currently the European correspondent for *The Wall Street Journal* and as such covers the European business scene from a base in Brussels. His is also a frequent contributor to *Newsweek, BusinessWeek, Reader's Digest*, and *The Economist*. Prior to joining the staff of *The Wall Street Journal* in March, 1990, he served as the East European correspondent for *The Christian Science Monitor*. A Magna Cum Laude graduate of Yale University, Mr. Echikson earned his BA with honors in history.

Mr. Echikson's first book Lighting the Night: Revolution in Eastern Europe, was first published in London in July, 1990, with the American edition being published in September, 1990. The French edition will be published in October, 1990. With regard to Echikson's book, Miklos Haraszti, Hungarian opposition leader wrote, "Reading Lighting the Night, I recognized everything I went through fighting for democracy here in Hungary."

In 1989-90, he was a Fellow at Harvard University, where he lectured and wrote at Harvard's Russian Research Center. He was awarded the John Courtney Murray Fellowship by Yale University. This traveling fellowship for Yale graduates allowed him to spend a year studying in France. *Media Guide* honored him from 1986 to 1989 by naming him one of the "Top Ten Foreign Correspondents" each of these years.

Mr. Echikson is held in high regard by both political and economic leaders in Eastern Europe. Vaclav Havel, President of Czechoslovakia, wrote, "William Echikson was one of the few Western journalists in Czechoslovakia during the hard years, who not only wrote a lot about it but really cared." Solidarity leader Lech Walesa wrote, "Bill Echikson is a good friend of Poland."

Mr. Robert Tomasello has been involved in competitive volleyball for 16 years. In 1976, he was a member of the Clayton County Parks and Recreation Men's Volleyball League's Tournament runnerup team. In 1977, he was accepted for an interview for a position on the 1980 United States Olympic Volleyball Team. While at LaGrange College, he was voted Most Valuable Player in the Men's Athletic Association Volleyball League and Tournament. More recently, he was a member of the 1983 Clayton County Parks and

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Recreation Men's Volleyball Championship Team and the 1983 Georgia Parks and Recreation Men's District Volleyball Championship Team. Mr. Tomasello is a member of the United States Volleyball Association (USVBA).

Mr. William Tomasello is an assistant to the West Georgia College NCAA Division II women's volleyball team and has been an instructor in the Power "BB" Volleyball Clinics offered at Emory University for the past two years. As a player he is USVBA sanctioned and is a member of the USVBA and the North Georgia Volleyball Association (NGVA). He is also a USVBA certified linesman. He is a member of the Ellenwood Plowboys volleyball team which is ranked first in Power "B" volleyball by the NGVA. Regents' Test Alert

1. What is the Regents' Test?

The Regents' Test is a test used by the University System of Georgia to determine students competence in reading and writing. A certain level of competence in these areas as demonstrated on this test is required for graduation. Thus passing this test is as milestone toward graduation just as passing a course is a milestone toward graduation. The test takes less than three hours to complete and consists of an essay and a reading section.

2. Who needs to take the Regents' Test this quarter?

All students who plan to graduate with a two- or four-year degree from Clayton State College must take and pass the Regents' Test at some point in their academic career. Students who have completed their English and Speech requirements are eligible to take this test.

Students who have 45 or more quarter hours and have not taken and passed both parts of the Regents' should plan to take it this quarter. Students who are required to take it shall receive a card from the Counseling and Career Center notifying them of the dates and time for the tests. This card also acts as their ticket for admission to the test.

Should a student desire or need to take this test, yet not receive an admission card by Monday, October 15, 1990, he or she should request a card from Dr. Don Carson in D-208.

3. When is the Regents' Test offered this quarter?

This **quarter** the Regents' Test shall be offered four times rather than two.

It shall be offered on Monday, October 23, 1990 at 2:00 p.m. and again at 6:00 p.m. It shall also be offered on Tuesday, October 24, 1990 at 2:00 p.m. and again at 6:00 p.m. This should allow more students to find a time devoid of class and work obligations in which they can take this test.

APICS is an organization which promotes education concerning efficiency in manufacturing, as well as the service industry. APICS has plans for oncampus workshops during the year to increase knowledge for attaining certification in APICS of individual members.

There are plans to visit several manufacturing and service industries. A highlight of these tours will be companies such as Vernay Manufacturing in Griffin and others, which employ the Deming philosophy was first introduced in Japan after World War II to bring Japan to its high level of quality and productivity, which it enjoys today. students will see the use of statistical process control(SPC) in the work place. SPC works as a tool to attain high quality standards for such companies.

On May 15, 1990 APICS members toured the Delta facility in Atlanta. The group was given a complete tour, which included necessary work performed in maintenance and rebuilding of L-1011 aircraft. Members visited the tire shop, wing repair, and jet engine repair shops for this aircraft. APICS members not only left with a knowledge of the work and insights concerning this work, but a feeling of the high priority for safety in Delta's organization.

These tours help students see the business world he or she will be a part of after graduation. A student will see why importance is placed on efficiency and quality in their field of study. APICS attempts to cover each field, whether in accounting, technical, or human resources.





Reid graduated from Kingston College High School in Kingston, Jamaica in June, 1984. After high school, he spend two years as an assistant geologist in the

Geological Survey Department and later served as a technical assistant to hydrologists for Jamaica's Underground Water Authority. He also worked on special projects sponsored by the Canadian International Development Agency and the United Nations International Organization.

A 6-foot-6 forward, Reid played basketball in high school and on Jamaica's Juvenile Team (under 19 years of age))before joining the National Senior Team. Playing in an 8-team "super league" last year, Reid averaged 25 points, 10 rebounds, 4 assists, 3 steals and and 2 blocked shots, numbers that paralleled his senior year in high school.

"His association with the Jamaican basketball team has allowed him to travel and have an opportunity to make connections in other countries," Coach Barfield said. "Although we haven't seen (SeeReid on page 12)

Ozment Named As Lakers Assistant Basketball Coach

Coached N. Ga. High School Team Into 1990 State AA Tournament

A successful high school basketball coach has been named assistant coach at Clayton State College, according to Mason Barfield, Athletic Director and head men's basketball coach. Jeff Ozment, who led his Gilmer County High School team into the state tournament last year, will begin his new duties at Clayton State on September 1. Two weeks later, he and Coach Barfield will begin preseason drills for the Lakers' inaugural basketball season.

"We are pleased to have someone of Jeff's abilities and background to join us at Clayton State," Coach Barfield said. "He has demonstrated, both during his playing days at Berry College and his coaching there and in high school, that he has the personality to communicate with young people.

"We were looking for someone who had their priorities straight and would fit into our program here," Barfield continued, "and Jeff is that person...he knows that there's more to it that just basketball."

After making all-area basketball and baseball teams at Cave Springs High School, Ozment was awarded a full athletic scholarship to attend Berry College in Rome. He made good the opportunity by becoming a four-year letterman with the Vikings, and served as team captain during his senior year.

Ozment began his coaching career as a junior varsity coach at Berry College in 1985. After two seasons there, he became head coach at Glennville High School in south Georgia, coaching both junior varsity and varsity teams. A year later, he began a two-year stint at Gilmer High in Ellijay, and directed his 1989-90

team to a 17-9 record and to the Region 8AA North Championship. Ranked 9th in Georgia, his team lost to top-ranked East Rome in the state tournament.

Gilmer is expected to be even better this year. "With so many returners back, all of whom are good kids, it made this a really rough decision," Ozment said of taking the Clayton State position. "But, I've always wanted to coach on the college level, and I had to jump when the opportunity came."

Ozment's wife, employed as a resource assistant in the Office of Community Services at Clayton State, also was a star basketball player at Berry College. Sandra, who graduated from Johnson High School in Gainesville and Truett-McConnell College in Cleveland, earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Berry. In 1986, she was named to the first team NAIA All-American Basketball team and the Kodak All-American Basketball team. In addition, she was honored by the Atlanta Tip-Off Club as Georgia's NAIA Player of the Year.

Clayton State will play a 27-game schedule during its inaugural season, beginning with a November 12 home game against Piedmont College. The season will continue through the end of February and the NAIA District 25 Tournament will be played March 2-6, 1991.
