UGA Changes Transfer Admissions Standards

Minimum Acceptable Grade Point Average Is Raised

Many Clayton State College students transfer to the University of Georgia each year. Recently, a change in the University of Georgia transfer admissions requirements has been made. Effective summer quarter, 1991, the minimum grade point average in academic courses required for admissions for transfer students to UGA will be raised from 2.0 to 2.2. Some of the colleges on the University of Georgia campus require a higher grade point average for admission to that college.

Dr. William Prokasy, Vice President for Academic Affairs at the University of Georgia, has written that, "This decision was made reluctantly. Ideally, we would like to accept any student in good standing at another system institution. But the continued growth in our enrollment, primarily coming from transfer students, has now reached the point that we think that we would be doing our students and the citizens of this state a disservice if we were to allow it to continue. We believe we must achieve a better balance between our faculty and physical resources on the one hand and the demand for effective instruction on the other. Thus, we are taking this step in limiting our enrollment."

If you will be completing your coursework at Clayton State College and transferring to the University of Georgia beginning this coming summer quarter, you will be affected by this change in transfer admissions requirements.

A representative of the University of Georgia Office of Admissions will be present at the College Transfer Fair on Wednesday, February 6, 1991. The College Transfer Fair will take place in the Student Lounge (D-116) from at 9:30 a.m. until noon that day. If you have any questions about this new policy, feel free to speak with the UGA Admissions Counselor at the Fair.

The Green team, the tougher team, usually comprised of people with the most seniority and the greater ability. Last quarter the Green team ended the season with a 6-1-0 record and the Orange team with 2-5-0.

If you have ever had the urge to legally do something illegal then the Art club is for you. As you approached campus last quarter did you ever notice the retaining wall on your left so nicely painted? The creativity and work was compliments of the CSC Art club. Faculty advisor Mr. Tommy Daughtry explained that the college had to obtainspecial permission to decorate the wall legally. Currently the Art club has painted over their recent mural in order to repaint the wall later this year, once the weatherbecomes more agreeable.





On January 19, this season's second showdown between Clayton State (1-13) and Kennesaw Owls (7-7) went much as the first, with CSC left in the cold, suffering a 86-61 loss.

Clayton wasn't as shy in the aggressive moves department during the final minutes of the last half, but they did not profit from the efforts.

Clayton State College will have women's intercollegiate basketball in place for the 1991-92 season. The women's program, which will also compete in NAIA District 25, will complement the men's basketball program which is in its inaugural season.

The College's Athletic Committee, made up of faculty and staff, finalized the decision in December. The committee's decision was recently approved by CSC president Dr. Harry Downs.

According to Mason Barfield, athletics director, a search for the women's coaching position is underway. "We have

advertised the position and are collecting resumes from prospects," said Barfield. "We hope to start screening applicants on February 15 and fill the position by the end of March."

"Usually you find a great deal of success in a situation like ours," said Barfield. "You can reach a competitive level of play in small college in a short amount of time."

Once the new coach is in place, he or she will have until June to recruit and hold tryouts for CSC's first women's team. "We should have a good pool of local women's basketball players to get us off on the right foot," said Barfield.

The Lakers Will Face A Tough Schedule Starting This Friday

Four Games In Eight Days Hornets, who lead the district in team field **Challenge CSC Hoopsters**

The Clayton State College basketball Lakers face a challenging week with four games over the course of eight days. They start the stretch with a pair of home games and conclude it with two road games.

The Lakers begin the stretch on Saturday, Feb. 9 with their second meeting of the season against the Panthers of LaGrange College. The Panthers edged the Lakers 89-86 in November.

Like the Lakers, LaGrange is struggling. The Panthers are last in District 25 in scoring defense and have been outscored an average of 22.0 points per game. The Lakers are currently being outscored an overage of 13.8 ppg.

Saturday's game, which will be carried on radio station WSSA (1570 AM), will begin at 7:30 p.m. The contest will wrap up a LakerFest celebration.

The Lakers conclude the home stand Monday, Feb. 11 with another meeting with the Hornets of Southern Tech. In the Jan. 23 meeting in Marietta, the Lakers held their own, but lost 69-55, against the

The Lakers will conclude the week on Saturday, Feb. 16 in Dahlonega against the Saints of North Georgia College. North Georgia visited the Lakers on Jan. 30. The Saints will again be shorthanded with nine players healthy. The ballgame is scheduled to tip off at 7:30 p.m.
