## "The Bard In Atlanta" Is Next On Lyceum Schedule

The Atlanta Shakespeare Company, will present "The Bard in Atlanta: Shakespeare For the People" on Thursday, May 2. This lecture performance will begin at 12:05 p.m. and will take place in G-132.

The Company, founded in 1979, has performed in various spaces around

Atlanta, most notably and recently at Manuel's Tavern. Earlier this year the Company moved into its own 165-seat tavern theatre at 499 Peachtree Street, a converted warehouse. The Company's goal "...is to create a first rate classical repertory company in Atlanta," according to Jeffrey Watkins, President and Artistic

Director. Over the years the Company has presented Twelfth Night, Two Gentlemen of Verona, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Romeo and Juliet and other works.

Mr. Watkins, a graduate of Trinity University with majors in drama and photography, joined the Atlanta Shakespeare Company in 1984, after several years as an actor, director, set designer, mime, juggler, magician, jazz dancer and singer. During that first year he approached Manuel Maloof, Chairman of the DeKalb County Commission and owner of Manuel's Tavern, about performing As You Like It in the popular bar's back room. Watkins thought, "...the atmosphere of a bar might evoke that rowdiness of the

Globe Theater, where many of Shakespeare's plays were first performed," according to an article in *The Wall Street Journal*.

In addition to the full-length productions, the company presents 20-minute versions of the Bard's works, written and directed by Clark Orwick, a member of the Company. The basic premise is "..." as if a scuzzy troupe of Elizabethan actors wandering the backroads of sixteenth-century England had attempted to put on a Shakespeare play relying on the impaired memory of one of its members who know someone who had once seen the play at the Globe." ## **Akbar To Present Program On Cultural Diversity**

Dr. Na'im Akbar,a professor of psychology at Florida State University, will present two talks on "African-American Cultural Awareness and Cultural Diversity" as the last program in the yearlong Lyceum series on Cultural Diversity. He will speak at 7:00 p.m. on May 15 and at 12:05 p.m. on May 16. Both presentations will take place in D-223.

Dr. Akbar has also taught at Norfolk State College and waschairman of Morehouse College's Psychology Department. After several terms on the board of the National Association of Black Psychologists, he was elected President of the Association in 1987. He is currently on the editorial board of The Journal of Black Studies and for eight years was Associate Editor of The Journal of Black Psychology

Dr. Akbar received his B.A., M.S. and Ph.D. from the University of Michigan. In addition to having more than twenty articles published in scholarly journals, Dr. Akbar is the author of four books, including From Miseducation to Education and Chains and Images of Psychological Slav-



ery. He has appeared as a guest on numerous television programs including Tony Brown's Journal, The Phil Donahue Show and The Oprah Winfrey Show. Among his honors are inclusion in Who's Who in Black America. He is the recipient of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Distinguished Scholar Award presented by the National Human Relations Task Force and the Association of Black Psychologists' Annual Research Award.

#### Compeer Atlanta Seeks Volunteers

How important is a friend? For an isolated elderly person, a homeless individual, or someone suffering from mental illness, a friend can be very important. For these populations, friends can provide the support and encouragement that could mean the difference between independent living and homelessness or institutionalization.

"Compeer Atlanta" specializes in friendship. Compeer (meaning companion, peer, or equal) is a program of the Metropolitan Atlanta Deinstitutionalization Task Force, Inc. The Task Force's ultimate goal is to make community care a positive reality for deinstitutionalized mentally ill, developmentally disable adults, homeless, and elderly people who are at risk for institutionalization because of a shortage of community resources.

Since 1986, Compeer Atlanta has been utilizing well-trained volunteers who are screened and "matched" as friends with individuals referred to Compeer by

community mental health agencies, social workers, clergy, or physicians. Compeer volunteers provide emotional support as well as assisting their friends with basic skills, such as staying linked with community resources that provide for their basic needs, gaining access to recreational and social opportunities, and mastering everyday living skills.

Compeer volunteers receive 10 hours of initial screening and training in preparation for participation in the program and attend monthly support meetings with Compeer staff. Volunteers commit to spend one hour a week for a year with their friends.

## NCAA Player To Tranfer To Clayton State

The Clayton State College basketball Lakers have landed a big catch during the spring signing period. Lakers Coach Mason Barfield has signed Bruce Oglesby, a 6'5" forward currently at NCAA Division I Tennessee Tech, who is transferring to CSC to be closer to his family.

"We're very fortunate to sign a player of Bruce's abilities," said Barfield. "He'll make a big difference for us in District 25."

Oglesby, from Hartwell, GA, played high school basketball at Hart County High School. He was rated among the top 100 prep prospects in the country.

He led Hart County to a school record finish of 26-2 his senior year while averaging 21.0 points per game (ppg) and 11.0 rebounds. He set a single-game school record of 42 points while finishing

with 1,833 career points.

Oglesby garnered numerous awards and honors during his three years as a starter. He was "Northeast Georgia Player of the Year," named to the Atlanta Journal-Constitution's first team all-state, selected to the North-South All-Star team and selected to the Georgia all-star team which played against a Soviet all-star team. He was twice named team MVP and was MVP in two tournaments.

Oglesby exhibited his collegiate potential for Tennessee Tech this season by being named to the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) All-Rookie Team. He appeared in 27 games for the Golden Eagles and started in three games.

Oglesby played an average of 19 minutes per game, averaged 11.5 ppg and 4.0 rebounds. He was the Golden Eagles leading scorer six times and leading rebounder four times. His best performances

of the season were 23 points and 10 rebounds against Western Kentucky and 12 points and 7 rebounds against nationallyranked Nebraska.

Oglesby was considered an "immediate impact player" at Tennessee Tech and in the OVC. Obviously, Barfield has the same considerations.

Coming from an NCAA Division I program to Clayton State, an NAIA member, will not hinder Oglesby's three remaining years of eligibility. According to Barfield, the rules allow Oglesby to transfer without having to sit out the entire season. Thus, Oglesby's impact could be hard felt throughout District 25.

Oglesby becomes the third player signed by Barfield during the spring signing period. He joins 6'3" guard David Viti, a transfer from Gordon College, and 6'5" forward Jeff Rogers, from Heritage High School (see related article).

## Lakers Sign Heritage High Standout

Jeff Rogers, a 6-5 forward at Heritage High School in Conyers, became the second player signed by the Clayton State College basketball Lakers during the current spring signing period.

Rogers, who plans to major in business at Clayton State, averaged 18.0 points per game and 9.0 rebounds this past season at Heritage. He was the Atlanta Tip Off Club "Player of the Month" for February and was two-time all-tourney at the annual Newton County Thanks-

giving Tournament

"I think he'll be an asset at Clayton State," said Curtis Bell, Rogers' coach at Heritage. "He's an outstanding leaper and is a good ball handler. He has a good shooting range and is capable of playing the two or three position," said Bell.

"Jeff is going to contribute to this program," said Lakers coach Mason Barfield. "He's the type of player who will fit in nicely to our scheme."

## Head Selected For GIAC All-Freshman Team

Carlos Head, the leading scorer during the inaugural season of the Clayton State College basketball Lakers, was named to the Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GIAC) All-Freshman Team.

Head, a 6'1" guard from Morrow, started in 22 of 27 games for the 3-24 Lakers. He averaged 17.4 points per game and pulled down an average of 4.6 rebounds per game. He also led the Lakers from 3-

point range, making .397 percent (52 of 131) of his shots.

Head finished the season in NAIA District 25 among the top 10 in scoring. He was the Lakers' leading scorer in 14 of the 27 games played this past season.

"Carlos was one of the few bright spots that we had this season," said Lakers coach Mason Barfield. "We look for more good things from Carlos in the upcoming seasons."
