Students who have complied 3.8 grade point averages out of a possible 4.0 during the past year will be honored dur-

ing the ceremony. In addition, students who have perfect 4.0 averages in all college work attempted will receive full-tuition scholarships provided by the Clayton State College Foundation.

Dr. Harry S. Downs, President of the College, will preside during the ceremony.

The annual Convocation will be followed by a reception honoring these students.

When John Hughes Lost His Soul

"It's inevitable...when you get older, your heart just dies." This is a quote from Ally Sheedy in *The Breakfast Club*, John Hughes' brilliant film about troubled youth. And as she so aptly quoted, when you grow older, your heart does die. Just look at John Hughes.

Many of the readers, I'm sure, are familiar with Mr. Hughes' work. Films such as The Breakfast Club, Some Kind of Wonderful, She's Having a Baby, and Ferris Bueller's Day Off all but captured the pivotal and quintessential essence of youth and its tedious transition into adulthood. These films were compelling and thought-provoking, and provide their audiences (teenagers and adults alike) with a broader perspective of the problems with the young people and just how im-

portant seemingly trivial things are to youths; Mr. Hughes was a master of capturing this.

I use 'was' because lately Mr. Hughes has been bitten by the "The Gold Bug," as Mr. Poe would say. Hughes' early endeavors (National Lampoon's Vacation, Mr. Mom, 16 Candles), and all of the other aforementioned movies were not blockbusters. They usually made between \$40-\$70 million, but were made for no more than \$5 million. So, with all things considered, he was a profitable and profound filmmaker. But the profound soon diverged into the prolific.

Since 1989, John Hughes has released five films (The Great Outdoors, Uncle Buck, National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation, Home Alone, and Career Opportunities) and has two more slated for release this year, including the sequel to Home Alone.

The Accounting Club sponsored an "Alumni Night" on April 24, 1991, to welcome back CSC accounting graduates and to afford its members an opportunity to learn of their experiences since leaving the academic world. Alumni present were employed by Certified Public Accounting firms immediately upon graduation.

Ms. Renee Day, a 1990 graduate, is employed by M. Barry Erwin, CPA. Located in Griffin, the firm has rural clients, and specializes in nursing home accounting. Mr. Jeff Woolums, an '89 graduate, is employed by Smith, Adcock & Company, CPAs, in downtown Atlanta. He expects to receive his CPA certificate in July.

When asked about how the CSC curriculum helped prepare them for their current professions, both cited "learning how to learn" as a very important factor, because a vast amount of learning takes

place after graduation — on subjects not taught in any textbooks. For example, with regard to clients who have farms, Ms. Day spoke of having to learn how to depreciate cows. through their curriculum at CSC, both were already familiar with doing research using the various professional guides and tax services. Also mentioned were the basic writing and speaking skills developed through the multitude of projects and presentation in the accounting program.

Most importantly, they felt, was the tremendous sense of discipline acquired through successful completion of what is generally acknowledged as one of the toughest curricula at CSC. Both Ms. Day and Mr. Woolums, were, upon employment, already accustomed to working long hours to meet numerous, seemingly impossible, deadlines.

The members present received interesting and motivating information and hope to make this an annual event.



The Great Outdoors marked the turning point in his career. He sloughed off the young adult image and returned to slapstick comedy, which is how he began his career, only now he wasn't funny, not even remotely. But the public ate it up, and it grossed nearly \$90 million.

So he tried it again, with *Uncle Buck*. He took a step back with *Christmas Vacation*, and re-entered with *Home Alone*.

Now, Home Alone is that film with that cute little tyke Macaulay Culkin. At last count, the film was well over the \$250 million mark, and had established itself not only as the highest grossing comedy, but as the third highest grossing film in history. Granted, the last twenty minutes were funny, but the hour and ten minutes you were forced to wait for it were horrible. No, not horrible, pathetic.

And, as if it couldn't get worse, he released *Career Opportunities*, an attempt to re-create the same magic he had done with his earlier work. But he failed — miserably. The movie was a disaster, both as a comedy and as a drama.

Now, Mr. Hughes is truly the king of the comedy industry, and all it cost us was everything. All our faith in his seemingly unique vision and grandfather-like understanding that he treated us with. This is truly a sad, sad day for me, as a film lover.
