In addition, Leadership CSC will be working with the Office of Admissions on developing student involvement in the new student orientation process.

Lady Lakers Began Inaugural Practice On September 23

The Clayton State College Lady Lakers basketball team began preparations for its inaugural season September 23. Coach Lynn Jarrett and her young squad have a little more than a month to prepare for their inaugural game November 16 against Piedmont College in Demorest, Ga.

"There is a lot of excitement regarding our program," said Jarrett. "Everyday is one step forward. We will not have any failures this year, just a lot of lessons."

The Lady Lakers spent the first two weeks of practice working on conditioning. During the early weeks of court time, Jarrett had the squad concentrating on fundamentals of the game. Before the Piedmont game, Jarrett plans to schedule three scrimmages.

"I don't prepare my teams for the first game," said Jarrett. "I get them ready for January and February. The best brand of basketball comes after Christmas."

The biggest questions concerning the Lady Lakers for Jarrett are the intangibles. "There are a lot of if's," said Jarrett. I'm (continued on page 4)

Barfield is upbeat about the Lakers' second season. The Lakers return nine of 13 players from last year's inaugural squad which finished with a 3-24 record. "I can guarantee one-hundred percent improvement from last year," said Barfield with a smile.





going to be searching for team chemistry. We certainly have a good bunch to start with."



played on championship-caliber basketball teams," said Barfield.

"The people we have coming back are improved and more confident, having played a season together. With the addition of our newcomers, we just need to put together the right chemistry to win some ballgames."

A year ago, Barfield was not too optimistic about his inaugural season. "Last year was rough," said Barfield. "We knew the league would be tough. We did not have high expectations because of our lack of experience."

Barfield admitted that by the inaugural game, he was burnt out from the culmination of getting the program started. But that is all behind him.

In preparing for this season, Barfield has been able to concentrate on basketball and he's been able to be more focused on his game plan.

Past members of the team have been named Masters of Sport while one former member played on an Olympic championship squad. Of the nine newcomers, Bruce Oglesby, a 6'5 sophomore forward, heads the list. Oglesby, from Hartwell, Ga., is a transfer from NCAA Div. I Tennessee Tech, where he started in eight games and was named to the Ohio Valley Conference's All-Rookie Team last season.

Other top newcomers include Eric Boazman (6'3" guard), a junior transfer from Calhoun Community College in Decatur, Ala.; Dexter Brown (6'3" forward), a junior transfer from Clark-Atlanta University; Jeff Rogers (6'5" forward), a freshman from Heritage High School in Conyers; and David Viti (6'3" guard), a junior transfer from Gordon College.
