### New Organ Will Add Another Dimension To Future Concerts In Spivey Hall

The installation in Spivey Hall of one of the finest organs in the world will offer the students of Clayton State College an opportunity not only to hear the organ performed by guest artists, but to study keyboard using the organ. It will also serve as a showcase for the American Guild of Or-

ganists conference being held in Atlanta this summer.

The final shipment of pipes and organ parts that arrived on Friday, January 10, weighed close to 25,000 pounds. The organ, which is being paid for by the Spivey Foundation, has 79 ranks, a 3-manual console and over 4,300 pipes. Before the organ can be installed, a platform capable of holding 50,000 pounds

will be erected in Spivey Hall. The organ will be decorated in beautiful tones of salmon faux marbre with teal accents. These selections were made by Mrs. Spivey before she passed away in 1988.

Its foundation will be laid by Piero Ruffatti, who arrived from Padua, Italy on Saturday, January 11, while John Widener and Tommy McCook will supervise the installation, which will continue until the end of February. When the installation is completed, the organ will be 45 feet high and 28 feet wide. When Spivey Hall reopens on February 24, the organ will be visible to the audience, but will not be heard until its dedication in May, because it will take several months of work to complete total finishing and make it concert-ready.

Ms. Sherryl Lucarelli, Director of Spivey Hall said, "We have been so fortu-

nate to be able to install this organ and provide the opportunity to this community and people to enjoy great music." She went on to express that she has seen very strong interest in Spivey Hall from students and that she expects a hundred percent of the student population to benefit from the program. "We will encourage those who have not attended any of the performances to come and do so now that we are offering concert performances of every taste and interest."

Spivey Hall ticket prices are less than the least expensive ticket for a concert by the Atlanta Symphony. Admission is free for students with CSC student ID's and faculty and staff are able to attend at discount prices. ference victory, but that should come with game experience. "These men are willing to go through the hard work to reach the next level. They have the potential, they just have to earn it"

Mr. Mason Barfield, is in his second year as head coach of the Clayton State Lakers. The Lakers have already surpassed last year's victory total with four wins. He has previous experience in building winning programs. In 1988, he led Lassiter High

School to its first winning season and a trip to the State AAAA playoffs. He has also served as assistant coach for the

Kennesaw State Fighting Owls. Coach Barfield has a dual role at Clayton State, serving as both men's basketball coach and athletic director.

"Last year was a learning experience for this young team," Coach Barfield feels. The inaugural season was tough for

a team with an abundance of freshmen and sophomores. The Lakers' historic first victory came early in the season against DeVry Institute.

Barfield stresses high standards of scholastic performance from his young team. "I feel Clayton State has higher academic requirements, when compared to the surrounding colleges. I collect progress reports from my players every three weeks. The three main fundamentals

of my players are academic performance, a well-rounded personality, and then the development of their athletic ability."

On Thursday, January 30, Dr. Jon Bartlett will perform as part of the winter quarter Lyceum cultural schedule. His accompanist for this recital will be Mr. Walter Huff. The recital will take place in G-132 and will begin at 12:05 p.m.

Mr.Bartlett, a bass-baritone, continues to gain a national reputation for both his operatic and concert performances. His concert repertoire has included numerous works of Bach and Handel and the requiems of Mozart and Brahms. Mr. Bartlett maintains an active recital schedule, exhibiting a broad spectrum of inter-

est from sixteenth-century lute songs to the works of George Gershwin. He received his D.M.A. from the Eastman School of Music, where he studied with renowned mezzo soprano Jan DeGaetani. For several years Mr. Bartlett was a member of the Clayton State music faculty

Mr. Huff, piano, is a member of the faculty of Georgia State University and chorus master of the Atlanta Opera. He attended Oberlin and the Peabody Conservatory. He has served as vocal coach at Tanglewood, Washington Opera at Kennedy Center and the Atlanta Opera.


Mr. Youmans is a certified addiction counselor who has been with Anchor


Our fair is part of a five-week tour, putting college representatives in contact with two-year college students in all sections of the state.

## Lady Lakers Turn The Tables On The Piedmont College Lady Lions

The Lady Lakers faced the Piedmont College Lady Lions on January 15 and came away with a 70-64 victory. It was particularly sweet as the Lady Lions handed the Lady Lakers their first defeat of the season at the Lady Lakers inaugural game on November 16, 1991. This first game ended with an 80-53 Lady Lakers loss but this time the tables were turned.

Although the visiting team scored first, the Lady Lakers took the lead 3-2 at the 18:41 mark and were never behind again, although the two teams were tied at 5-5 and 7-7. When Natalie Taubert hit a three pointer at the 16:25 mark, the Lady Lakers took the lead again and never relinquished it. At the half, the score was 33-28 in favor of the Lady Lakers. Twice in the first half, the lead had stretched to 14 points.

Three times during the second half, the Lady Lions pulled to within two points. With 46 seconds left in the game, the Piedmont players began fouling in an attempt to get the ball back. Although the Lady Lakers did not sink a basket in the last 4:12 of the game, they won by being nearly perfect from the foul line, scoring 10 free throws, 7 in the last 46 seconds.

The Lady Lakers led in nearly all

categories. The Lady Lakers had 11 steals, 19 assists and 6 blocked shots compared to 7 steals, 10 assists and 1 blocked shot for the Lady Lions. Clayton State had 23 turnovers while Piedmont had 18. In scoring, the Lady Lakers were .520% for total field goals (15 for 32) compared with .364% (24 for 66) for the Lady Lions. While the Lady Lakers hit on one of two three-pointers (.500%), the Piedmont Cagers threw up eleven, connecting on only two. In the free-throw area, CSC led with 17 for 26 (.654%) to 14-24 (.583%) for Piedmont.

Individual performances were highlighted by Latrecia Drake, who scored 29 total points which included nailing 13 of 16 field goal attempts (.813%) and blocking 4 shots. Her closest competition was Piedmont's Rhonda Blackwell, who had 23 points on the night. Lady Lakers Cookie Wise and Natalie Taubert were the next two highest scorers with 13 and 11 points respectively.

The Lady Lakers led the Lady Lions in defensive rebounds, 24-16, while Piedmont snagged 23 offensive rebounds to the CSC hoopsters' 13. The Lady Lakers season record improved to 3-8 while Piedmont dropped to 8-7.

### Lakers Fall To Lions In Close Game

The CSC Lakers fell to the Piedmont College Lions 80-82 in a game played at the CSC gymnasium on January 15. The Lakers beat the Lions at Demorest, 93-87, during the first game of the Lakers 1991-92 season.

The Lakers started strong, leading by as many as 11 points during the first half. The half ended with the Lakers up 46-37. Twice during the second half, the Lakers opened up leads of 13 points. The Lions came back strongly, starting about five minutes into the second half. They outscored the Lakers 18-5 in the next 5 minutes to knot the contest 60-60 with 10:06 remaining.

A few minutes later, it was the Lakers turn to get hot and they ran up a lead of eight points with five minutes left in the game. Piedmont brought the difference down to four points over the next few minutes but the Lakers again held an eight point lead with 2:19 remaining after Jeff Rogers dunked the ball viciously, bringing the crowd to their feet.

During the last two minutes of the game, the Clayton State players couldn't buy a basket. The only point scored was a free throw by Dexter Brown with 58 seconds to go. By that time, Piedmont had hit two three-pointers and two free throws to

bring them within one of the Lakers. Piedmont's William Lay drove for a layup at the 31 second mark and the Lions took the lead 81-80. With the Lakers fouling to get the ball back, Octavius Mulligan nailed a free throw with seven seconds left to end the scoring. This was a frustrating loss for the Lakers, the coaches and the CSC crowd.

Leading the scoring for the Lakers was Keith Herring, with a game high 26 points, followed by Carlos Head (17), Dexter Brown (12), and Barrett Hoard (10). The Lions were paced by Trent Fricks with 21, followed by William Lay (17), and Doug Ballard (12). Dexter Brown was the top rebounder of the evening taking 11 off the boards with Piedmont's Trent Fricks close behind with 10.

The big difference in scoring was in the area of three-point shooting. The Lions hit 8 of 14 while the Lakers only had 2 of 7. The Lakers just couldn't seem to find the mark from outside. Had they converted on just one of the six misses from the three-point zone, they could have won 83-82.

Defensively the Lakers looked good on paper. They pulled down 27 defensive rebounds to Piedmont's 23. CSC players blocked five shots while Piedmont had none. In the steals category, CSC led 8-4.
