Do you spend most of your Friday nights with a book published by McGraw-Hill? Well, stop complaining and show your school spirit! To release all of your tensions and experience the ultimate in student/faculty fellowship (Did we just say that?), come participate in LakerFest II.

Now, you may be wondering what is LakerFest II. It's simply a week of spirited events normally associated with homecomings or spirit weeks. In its entirety, LakerFest II is designed to promote support for the Lakers and the Lady Lakers and to encourage student/faculty participation.

The week tips off with an activity geared toward a group of students who are often forgotten. On Monday, February 3, from 7:45 p.m. to 8:15 p.m., a study break will be held in the C-lobby.

On Tuesday, February 4, there will be a scavenger hunt from noon to 1:00 p.m. in D-116. Teams of five can register through clubs or by contacting the Student Activities Office (D-217).

On Wednesday, February 5, from 10:50 a.m. to 11:20 a.m., there will be a study break for the AVMT students. Also encourage everyone to support our Lady Lakers as they take on Agnes Scott at 7:30 p.m. in the gym.

The Regents' Test: A Requirement For Graduation

Students who are enrolled in courses leading to a two-year or four-year degree at Clayton State College are required to take the Regents' Test during the next quarter of enrollment after having earned 45 quarter credit hours. It is a test of competence in two areas: writing and reading comprehension. The test dates for Winter, 1992, are February 10 and February 11. See page 2 for the complete testing schedule.

Each student who is required to take the Regents' Test during Winter Quarter,

Thursday, February 6 will, for the lack of a better work, test the not-so-athletic skills of CSC students. From noon to 1:00 p.m., there will be a Club Olympics held in D-116.

And if Tuesday's Scavenger Hunt isn't satisfying enough, then another hunt will be held from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. in D-116. On Thursday, February 6 there will also be another study break for the night students from 7:45 p.m. to 8:45 p.m.

Although the week will be drawing to a close, we'll just be getting started on Friday, February 7. How does 32 tons of snow sound? Snow sledding will take place from noon to 8:00 p.m. behind the D-building. There will also be a barbecue, for which tickets are required. These can be purchased either from any SGA member or in the Office of Student Activities (D-217). For the enjoyment of families and smaller children, we ask that students stay off the slopes from 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.

On Saturday, February 8, our Lady Lakers will take on Tennessee Temple at 6:00 p.m. and the Lakers will take on LaGrange at 8:00 p.m. During halftime of the men's game, the Laker King and Queen will be crowned.

Finally, from 10:30 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. that night, there will be a dance held in the gym.

Now, we've reached total satisfaction. But it will only hold you for a little while, so get active. Last year, LakerFest was extremely successful. Everyone (see LakerFest on page 4)

Proposal For A CSC Baccalaureate Teacher Education Program Being Studied

Clayton State College has received approval from the Board of Regents' staff to begin the planning process for a Teacher Education program. In order to make this program successful, a partnership with the six public school systems (Clayton, Fayette, Fulton, Henry, Rockdale, and Spalding) in Clayton State's service area has been formed. School personnel in our service area are actively involved in the planning process. Pending the Board of Regents' approval of the proposed program, CSC hopes to be able to offer its first junior class in this program in the fall quarter of 1993 and to award its first baccalaureate degrees in June, 1995.

During the summer and fall of 1991 the College conducted a needs assessment survey. Results of the survey show that about 95 percent of teacher education majors at Clayton State College are fully in support of the program. Following

Regents' staff authorization to plan, a Teacher Education Steering Committee (TESC) was appointed; experts in the field of education were consulted; a Teacher Education Planning Guide was adopted; and based on the needs assessment data, middle grades education for the first stage of the teacher education program was (See Teacher Education on page 7)

Regents' Test Alert

1. What is the Regents' Test?

The Regents' Test is a test used by the University System of Georgia to determine students' competence in reading and writing. A certain level of competence in these areas as demonstrated on this test is required for graduation. Thus passing this test is a milestone toward graduation just as passing a course is a milestone toward graduation. The test takes less than three hours to complete and consists of an essay and a reading section.

2. Who needs to take the Regents' Test this quarter?

All students who plan to graduate with a two- or four-year degree from Clayton State College must take and pass the Regents' Test at some point in their academic career. Students who have completed their English and speech requirements are eligible to take this test.

Students who have 45 or more quarter hours and have not taken and passed both parts of the Regents' Test should plan to take it this quarter. Students who are required to take it will receive a card from the Counseling and Career Center notifying them of the dates and times for the tests. This card also acts as their ticket for admission to the test.

3. When is the Regents' Test offered this quarter?

Students are asked to choose the test session (date and time) that they plan to attend, and to register their choice in D-208 (phone 961-3515), by February 7, 1992.

Noted Organ Restorer Speaks on Reconstruction of Pipe Organs

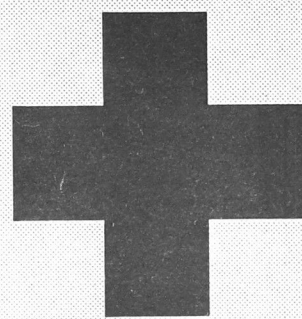
Ms. Susan Tattershall, a builder and restorer of pipe organs, will lecture on the "reconstruction of 18th- and 19th-Century Latin American Organ"s in a Lyceum-sponsored presentation. Her presentation, originally scheduled for 10:00 a.m. on February 10 in G-132, has been rescheduled for 9:45 a.m. in G-101.

Ms. Tattershall received her B.A. in Asian religions from Wittenberg University and has done graduate work in music history and ethnomusicology at the University of Western Ontario and the University of Texas at Austin, respectively.

From 1971 to 1979, Ms. Tattershall

served as apprentice to noted organ builders and restorers on three continents. Since that time, she has completed dozens of restorations of organs, many of which date back to the 18th century, as well as building several new organs. A past recipient of a National Endowment for the Humanities grant, Ms. Tattershall has been included in the *International Who's Who in Music*.

Lucktenberg/Teixeira Duo Present Recital on February 6

Harpichordist and pianist George Lucktenberg and flutist Teresa Teixeira will present a duo program on Thursday, February 6, at 12:05 p.m. in G-132.

Dr. Lucktenberg has earned international recognition as a distinguished early keyboard performer, scholar and teacher as well as a leading proponent of major new commissioned works for the harpsichord. He is the President of the Alienor Harpsichord Competition Awards, founder of the Southeastern Historical Keyboard Society and a long-time faculty member of the Interlochen National Music Camp. Currently Professor of Music at Clayton State, Dr. Lucktenberg received his B.M. and M.M. from the University of Illinois and his D.M. from Florida State University.

Ms. Teixeira is the founder and Artist Director of the Atlanta Musica Antiqua, the city's premiere Baroque chamber ensemble. Ms. Teixeira, a Fulbright scholar and former student of Stephen Preston,

has performed with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, the Charleston Symphony of South Carolina and at the Spoleto Festival. In addition to performing the Baroque flute, she presents over 100 educational concerts each year on the modern flute with the Orpheus Woodwind Quintet, and she performs on over 50 ethnic flutes with the World Music Concert, of which she is a founding member. Ms. Teixeira received her B.M. from Georgia State University and did graduate work at Stetson University and Northwestern University.

From early to modern, the Lucktenberg-Teixeira duo will perform music from Bach to Prokofiev. Both performers are skilled on original instruments as well as modern, so each work will be performed as the composer would have heard it. During this recital Ms. Teixeira will be playing both the baroque and modern flute while Mr. Lucktenberg will perform on both piano and harpsichord

In addition to his residency, Mr. Carpenter will be exhibiting his work on campus during the month of February.

Author of Eyes On The Prize Addresses Topic Of The Press and Civil Rights

In addition to his experience with the press, Mr. Williams works frequently in the non-print media. He has appeared as a guest on "Nightline," "Firing Line," "The Oprah Winfrey Show," and National Public Radio and has served as a commentator for the "MacNeil-Lehrer News Hour." Mr. Williams has been a correspondent and writer for several documentaries which appeared on PBS. In 1989, he received an Emmy Award for Documentary Writing.

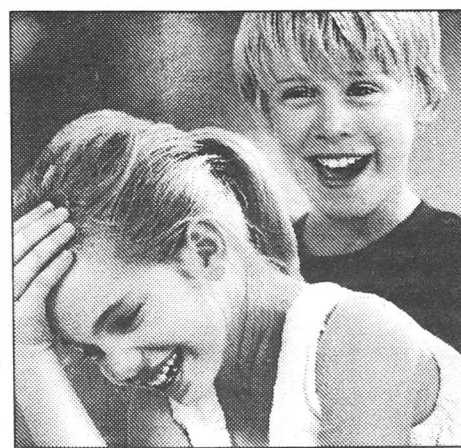

Anna Chlumsky, in her debut performance in a major motion picture, sparkles as a young adolescent, Vaida, dealing with anxiety and death. Living above her father's funeral parlor, Vaida attempts to gain attention from her dad. Problems arise when Jamie Lee Curtis answers an ad for a makeup artist. Vaida feels jealous

when her father starts showing an obvious interest in Shelly (Jamie Lee Curtis). The men in Vaida's life, who include her father (Dan Ackroyd), her best friend (Macaulay Culkin), and her teacher (Griffin Dunne), all help her come of age during her summer vacation.

The team of Dan Ackroyd and Jamie Lee Curtis shines yet again. These two have the right chemistry. Macaulay Culkin, in his supporting role, is not as effective as his leading role in *Home Alone*. His character, Thomas J., takes on a severe quality that was unexpected.

Music was a major highlight. The soundtrack of the movie has some oldies but goodies. This film has some serious content, although, there are some light-hearted moments. I recommend strongly that this movie be viewed by children twelve and over.

adopted by the TESC.

The TESC has identified existing attributes at CSC that will facilitate the implementation of the Teacher Education Program. These include: the opportunity to start with a clean slate; high status for teacher education; integrated general education core curriculum and an assessment-based approach to curriculum, which was established in 1983. They have also worked with the school systems and the CSC faculty to identify outcomes, that is, what teachers need to know and be able to do in order to be successful teachers. A project director is being recruited who will look at the outcomes and be responsible for developing learning experiences to achieve the outcomes.

The curricular development process will include finding ways to "package" the appropriate learning experiences and deliver them effectively. By March of this year, the committee will prepare and submit a preliminary proposal for a teacher edu-

cation program to the Board of Regents. A final proposal will be submitted to the Board by the end of April, 1992.

Responding to a question on his feelings about the possible approval of the program, Dr. John Kohler, who is the chairman of the Teacher Education Steering Committee, said: "Although the Board might feel reluctant in approving such programs considering the difficult times of budget cuts, I think we have a very strong case." He went on to say, "I think that this program, if approved, will provide many new opportunities for our students and will be an excellent addition to the baccalaureate programs offered by the College." Believing that there are many students who will pursue teacher education as their major, he concluded: "We put a lot of work in planning and we hope it will be approved."

Lady Lakers Improve Record To 5-11

In the 8 days ending on January 29, the Lady Lakers brought their season record to 5-11, thanks to 2 victories out of 4 games played. On January 22, the Lady Lakers outscored Lee College's Lady Flames 20-1 during the last 5 minutes to win by a final score of 76-61. The Lady Flames led by as much as 10 points in the first half, but the Lady Lakers fought back during the final 6 minutes to knot the score at 38-38 at the half.

The first 15 minutes of the second half were close with the teams tied 60-60 with only 5 minutes to go. The Lady Lakers closing scoring surge was led by Candi Wyatt, who poured in 10 points in just 3 1/2 minutes.

Leading the Lady Lakers in scoring was Latrecia Drake, who rang up a total of 25 points with 24 coming from the field. Wyatt and Cookie Wise each added 13 to the Lady Lakers winning efforts. Chrissy Anderson paced the Lady Flames with 21 points. Drake led both teams with 14 rebounds and 5 blocked shots for the evening. The Lady Lakers, as a team, had their best night at the free-throw line. They sank 21 of 26 for 81% from the charity stripe.

On January 25, the Lady Lakers won their first district victory by beating the Southwestern College Lady Hurricanes, 56-45 at Americus. The team was again led by Latrecia Drake's 21 points and 16 rebounds. Cookie Wise added 11 points and pulled down 7 rebounds. A big statistic that figured prominently in the victory

was CSC rebounding. The Lady Lakers pulled down 41 to Southwestern's 27.

This 2-game win streak ended on January 27 with the Lady Lakers falling to Georgia College 82-56. CSC hit on only 8 of 25 from the field for 32%. Trailing 36-22 at the half, Drake sparked a second-half surge which saw the team hit 61% (14 of 23) of their shots from the field. Drake scored a game high of 22 points and had 17 rebounds, 6 steals and 3 block shots. Wyatt had her best scoring night as a college player with 15 points. One thing that particularly hurt the Lady Lakers that evening was 37 turnovers.

Although they reduced the turnovers to 24 against North Georgia on January 29, the Lady Lakers still came up short losing 59-33 in a conference game played in the Laker Dome. The Lady Lakers led the Lady Saints for a scant 2:09. The visitors took the lead 3-2 and never looked back. The first half ended with the Lady Saints leading 22-17.

The second half was more of the same. The Lady Lakers only scored 4 points in the opening 9 minutes of the second stanza. North Georgia rang up 18 during the same time period. The Lady Saints kept on the offensive and added a total of 35 points to cruise to victory.

Drake again led the Lady Lakers in scoring with 10 points. She also pulled down 10 rebounds. North Georgia was led by Christy Cook, who scored 20 and tied teammate Tara Hall with rebounding honors with 12.

Lakers Lose Ten Straight Games

After 4 losses in 8 days, the Lakers record dropped to 4-12. The string of 10 straight losses began in December when the Lakers played Valdosta State College, their first NCAA opponent.

On January 22, the Lakers were hammered by Southern Tech. Scoring a record low in the teams 2-year existence, the Lakers fell to the Hornets 74-51. The previous low was 53 points scored against Brewton-Parker College on February 4, 1991.

Eric Boazman was the only Laker to score in double-figures that evening with 14 points. CSC's leading scorer and rebounder, Keith Herring, was held to just 4 points and 3 rebounds during the game.

On January 25, the Lakers were defeated soundly by Georgia Southwestern. The final score was 86-62. Unlike previous losses this season, the Lakers made a strong second-half run at the host Hurricanes. The highlight of the game for the Lakers was in the free-throw area. The team made 78% (28 of 36) of its charity shots. This was CSC's best night of the season in this department. Of their final 19 points, 15 came from free throw.

During the final 13 minutes, the Lakers sank only 2 field goals. They were both by Carlos Head, who came off the bench to lead CSC with 16 points. Bobby Chappell added 14, while Keith Herring had 13 points. Clayton State finished the game hitting 35% (17 of 49) from the field while Georgia Southwestern was 50% (27 of 54).

On January 27, the Lakers faced Life College's Running Eagles in Marietta. Of the game, Coach Barfield stated, "This was by far our best game of the season. We played well enough to win, but we made a couple of crucial mistakes down the stretch that hurt us. I do hope that tonight is a sign of things to come when we finally get back to our gym and play in front of the home folks."

Clayton State had it's best shooting night in 6 game's hitting 56% (26 of 49) from the field and 77% (20 of 26) from the free-throw line. Life College shot 46% (30 of 65) from the field and 71% (12 of 17) at the line. The Lakers also held a slight 31-30 edge in the rebounding area. Herring had a strong evening with a game high 23 points, 11 rebounds and 3 blocked

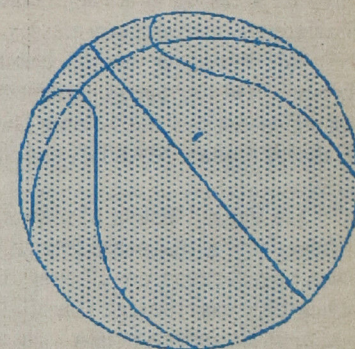
shots. Chappell followed with 17 points, while Dexter Brown had 16.

The Lakers returned home on January 29 to face the North Georgia College Saints. After a 34-34 first half, the Lakers fell to the Saints by a final score of 74-65. At the 14:47 mark of the second half, the Lakers led by 7 (36-49). Within 6 short minutes the charging Saints outscored the Lakers 16-3 to lead the game 55-49.

During the closing moments of the game, the Saints slowed the pace down and tried to deny the Lakers the ball. Although the Lakers were down by only 3 points with 2:25 left in the game, they had to foul to get the ball back. During the last 2:07 of the game, the Saints tossed in 12 free-throws to the Lakers 3 jumpers.

Leading scorers for the Lakers were Eric Boazman with 15, Barrett Hoard with 14, Herring with 13, and Chappell with 12. Herring and Chappell each pulled down 10 rebounds. Darnell Holland of North Georgia led the scoring with a game-high 32 points followed by Walter Drake with 13. Only 1 Saint had double figures in rebounds. Statistically the Lakers were very close to the Saints. Each team had 16 assists, while the Lakers had 11 turnovers to the Saints 10 and 6 steals to the Saints 7. The only area where the Saints were significantly different was in the area of blocked shots. The Saints finished the game with 9 blocked shots to the Lakers 2. The Lakers hit on only 37% (27 of 72) from the field compared to 49% (24 of 49)
