Will You Be At The Polls Next Week?

Have you registered to vote yet? Don't worry, registration is not a prerequisite for voting in the Clayton State College Student Government (SGA) elections.

The election that will take place this quarter will take place on Wednesday and Thursday, October 21-22. On October 21, voting will take place between 10:50 a.m.-11:20 a.m. in the AVMT Break room, and from 5:15 p.m.-6:15 p.m., and 7:45 p.m.-8:15 p.m. in the C building lobby. On October 22, election hours are from 10:50 a.m.-1:30 p.m. and from 5:15 p.m.-6:15 p.m. and 7:45 p.m.-8:15 p.m. in the C-building lobby.

This fall CSC students will be voting or running for representative positions from the School of Arts and Sciences and

the School of Business. There were no candidates from the Schools of Health Sciences or Technology. The ballot will also include a candidate representing night students, and the executive position of Secretary due to the resignation of this position since the Spring election. No student submitted petitions for the second night student Representative position or the two Student Body At-Large Representative positions.

Every year there are at least two quarters CSC students have the chance to vote or run for SGA offices. In the spring quarter elections are held for the executive positions of the SGA. These are the president, the vice president, the secretary, and the treasurer. In the fall quarter elections are held for the representatives, who are the liaisons between the student body and the student executive branch of (See SGA Election on Page 3)

Student Asks "Why Vote?" In The Upcoming State/National Election

The signs are everywhere, from neighborhood yards to fast food restaurants: "Vote for So-and-So," "Mr. Blah-Blah for Congress." What is the point of voting anyway, and why should a college student vote?

Bill Moyers' PBS series *Listening to America* reports that only one-half of the 27 million Americans between 18 and 24 years of age are registered to vote. In 1988, only 36 percent of these same 18-24 year olds actually voted in the Bush-Dukakis election. Why did only 36 percent of our peers make a decision that affects 27 million young adults? According to the CSC student Wendell Mann, most people "don't think [the candidate] they'll elect makes a difference." Voter apathy is the one problem that causes politicians to overlook younger citizens. Politicians, it has been said, listen to people who vote, and with only 36 percent of today's youth voting, politicians don't listen to us.

Why is it important to vote? By voting, your voice is actually heard. Millions of people died to allow the nearly 250 million residents of the United States

of America the right to decide how their government operates. Congress passed the 26th Amendment in 1971, giving 18 year olds the ability to vote. The number (See Why Vote? on page 3)

Student Has Desire For Expanded Journalism Course At CSC

The Editors:

Our journalism course is currently caught in a catch-22 situation. Due to very low enrollment, the administration is understandably reluctant to hire a full-time instructor and expand the course to 4 or 5 credit status. On the other hand, due to the fact that the course is currently only worth an hour's credit, many who may be interested in journalism avoid it.

Two things may help solve this problem. One is that most students probably do not realize that the journalism course may be taken up to six times for credit. This should be an incentive to those interested to enroll. Another incentive is that the

more enrollment the administration sees, the better the chances that the course will be expanded to 4 or 5 hours. In this case, broadcast journalism could also be taught using the complete TV studio in the media center.

It all begins with student interest. If you have any interest at all in journalism, please sign up for the class. Also remember that journalistic writing applies to other fields as well.

of 18-24 year olds who actually vote, however, has steadily decreased since passage of this amendment. Those who do not vote are relinquishing their right to register their feelings on topics vital to the nations, state, and community.

Efforts have been made to make it easier for younger citizens to vote. MTV has combined with local cable companies in the "Rock the Vote" campaign to register 18-24 year olds. On September 24, the Clayton State College SGA co-sponsored Wometco Cable's voter registration drive. A total of 74 persons register. Voter drives like "Rock the Vote" give an alternative to "going to the post office," according to Stephanie Widemond.

Even student government elections are important. Clayton State's SGA elections will be held on October 21 and 22, but many students did not know that CSC had elections! Students like Rich Lunsford believe the College should "definitely publicize" the upcoming election, while Jennifer Klessig thinks that more people would vote "if [students] would feel passionate about it."

The easiest way to get things done in government is to register and vote in every election, from national to SGA. Registration is easy and quick, and most public libraries (including the CSC Library) will be glad to register voters. If you are a Georgia resident and at least 17 1/2 years old, you can register by bringing a form of identification (driver's license or student ID) to the library and filling out a registration form. If you are not already registered to vote in the upcoming state/

national election, it's too late. The voter registration books closed on October 5.

Before you vote, check local newspapers to find out candidates' stands on issues. Information on SGA candidates can be found by contacting SGA at 961-3510, by dropping by the Student Activities Office, room D-217 or by reading the information, submitted by the candidates, in this edition of *The Bent Tree*. There is no need to register for SGA elections; being a student automatically registers you.

Another way to find out more about candidates is to contact Project Vote Smart, a non-partisan group attempting to educate voters on vital issues of the presidential campaign. The telephone number for Project Vote Smart is 1-800-786-6885. The decision is simple: register and vote, or don't gripe when things don't go your way.

Regents' Test Alert

1. What is the Regents' Test?

The Regents' Test is a test used by the University System of Georgia to determine students' competence in reading and writing. A certain level of competence in these areas as demonstrated on this test is required for graduation. Thus passing this test is a milestone toward graduation just as passing a course is a milestone toward graduation. The test takes less than three hours to complete and consists of an essay and a reading section.

2. Who needs to take the Regents' Test this quarter?

All students who plan to graduate with a two- or four-year degree from Clayton State College must take and pass the Regents' Test at some point in their academic career. Students who have completed their English and speech requirements are eligible to take this test.

Students who have 45 or more quarter hours and have not taken and passed both parts of the Regents' Test should plan to take it this quarter. Students who are required to take it will receive a card from the Counseling and Career Center notifying them of the dates and times for the tests. This card also acts as their ticket for admission to the test.

3. When is the Regents' Test offered this quarter?

Students are asked to choose the test session (date and time) that they plan to attend, and to register their choice in D-208 (phone 961-3515), by October 23, 1992.

Dr. Lyle Nordstrom recently accepted the position of Head of the CSC Music Department. He had taught at Oakland University, in Rochester Michigan, for the past 23 years.

Dr. Nordstrom was a chemistry ma-

yor while in his first year of college, but then changed his focus to music. He was originally a rock-guitarist, but realized that classical music offered unlimited material. Dr. Nordstrom is now a member and codirector of The Musicians of Swanee Alley, a group that travels world-wide.

Dr Nordstrom encourages students to take part in the music program, as well as the performance groups. On Friday, November 13, he will be performing lute duets at Spivey Hall, with CSC faculty member William Hearn. The concert will begin at 8:15 p.m.

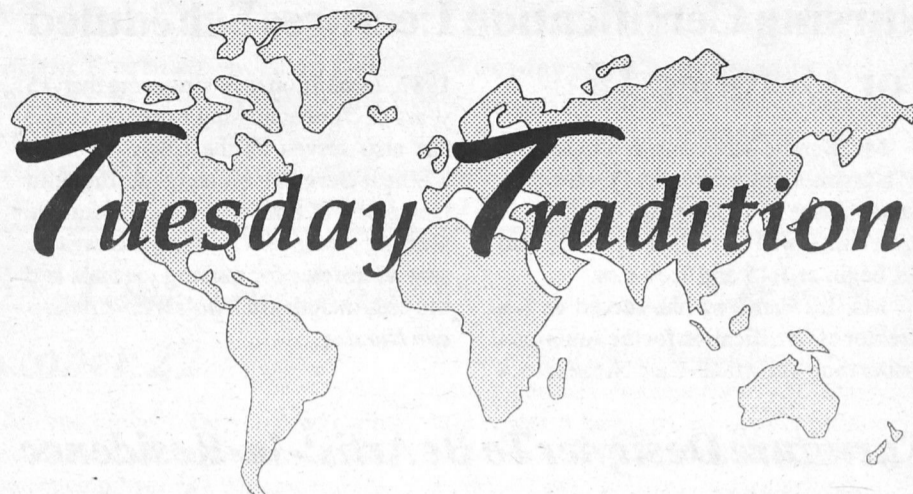
The Lark Quartet And Emanuel Ax Will Be Presented In Spivey Hall This Month

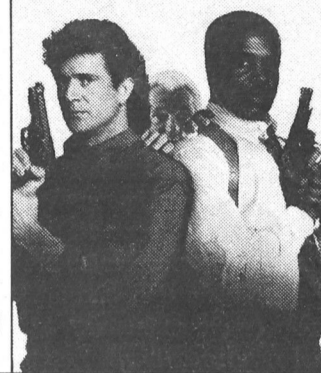
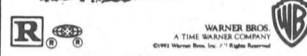

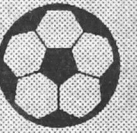

Both teams remained aggressive throughout the game. Contrary to the first home game, the goalkeeper, Stacy Washington, had plenty of offensive company and defensive challenges throughout the game. It was truly a team effort to prevent USC-Aiken from scoring.

The final game of the three-game home stand was against LaGrange College. This was at Lovejoy, on September 30. The game was played at a sluggish pace. During the first half Matthew Gi-
