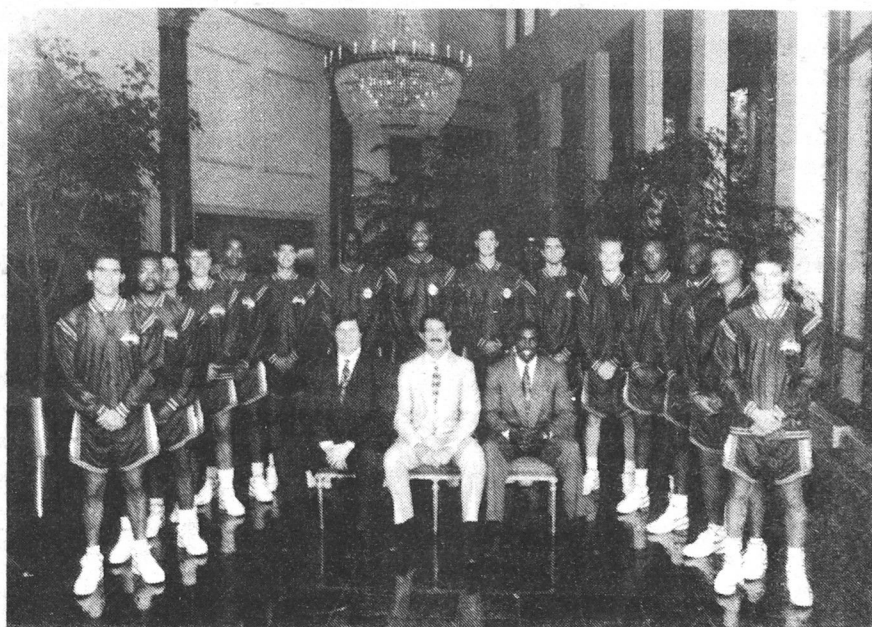

ing players and the addition of six new faces.

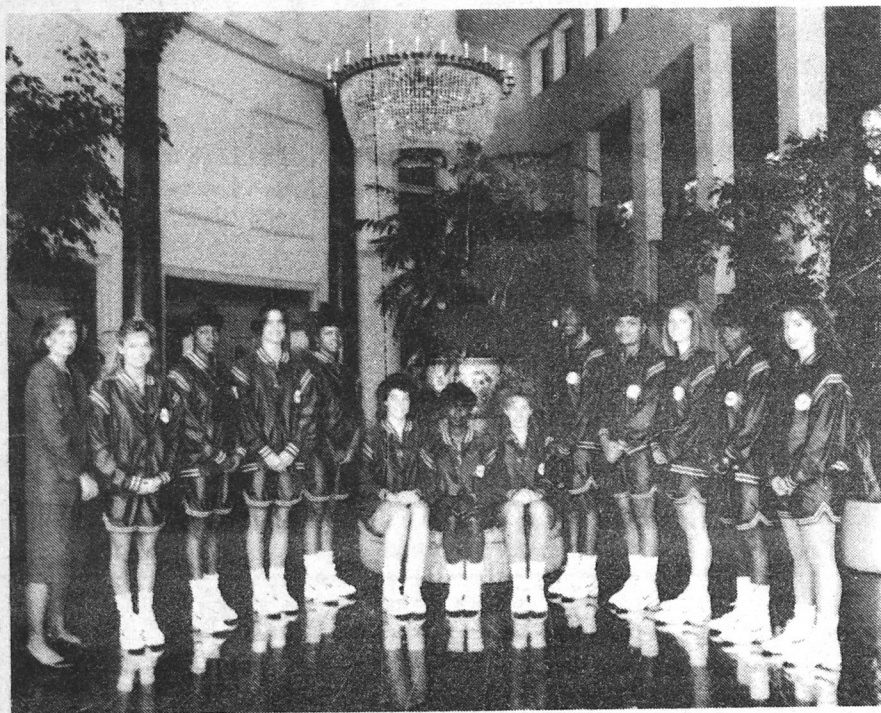

Mr. Mason Barfield, head coach of the men's basketball team and athletic director and President Harry S. Downs, announced a brand new "tradition" that will be starting at Clayton State.

In appreciation for student support for sports and to further promote a good relationship that the students and the athletics department have, the best seating at all home games is being offered to

the first 48 Clayton State students arriving at the gym.

The first four rows (A through D) of the blue chair-back section will be reserved for the students. This will be on a first come, first serve basis. Jarrett Expresses Confidence In Lady Lakers

Heading into its second year, the Lady Lakers Basketball Team opens with its first game at home against Piedmont College on November 16, at 6:00 p.m.

Coming off last year's 8-16 record, Head Coach Lynn Jarrett is confident in her five returning players and five freshmen. "Not that disappointing for a first year program, and I think as the season progressed we got better, and ended on a pretty positive note. Looking toward another building year, Jarrett wants to concentrate on the teams offensive game this year. "We talk about it everyday, offensive production. Last year we shot the ball poorly, we turned the ball over too much. This year I have spent more time on the offensive end of the floor than ever in my coaching career, and we are seeing improvement," Jarrett said. "We have to be more aggressive with the basketball, produce more points, and take more shots."

A starting line-up has not yet been named for the season opener, as Jarrett looks at the combinations of players and how they work together.

At 5'10", Staci Spencer is the only returning senior on the team. Playing the forward position, the team will be count-

ing on her, Jarrett said. Candi Wyatt, 5'8" returning sophomore forward, will also be relied upon heavily to set the tone of each game. "Candi had a couple of bad games last year, but when we got to the end of the game she was there with her attitude, she was there with her hustle. She is a key player for us. Not just in her game but in her role as a leader," Jarrett said.

Playing the guard and forward position is 5'8" sophomore Kim Hamilton. Also playing the forward position is 5'10" (See Jarrett on page 3)

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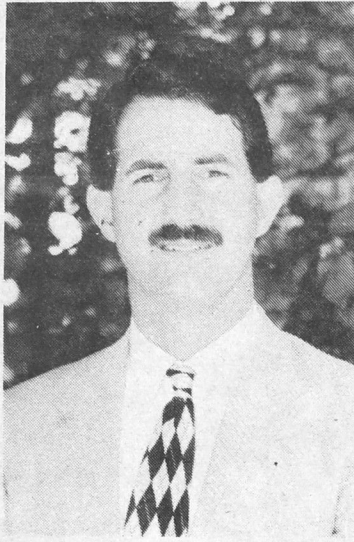
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PROFILES OF THE COACHES

Barfield Serves as Head Men's Coach And Athletic Director

H. Mason Barfield begins his third season as head coach of the Clayton State College basketball Lakers. Barfield was named Director of Athletics and head basketball coach in October of 1989. He has had the unique opportunity to establish an intercollegiate athletic program within an environment which emphasizes academic performance.

In his two seasons coaching the Lakers, he has compiled a 12-41 record. Besides his head coaching duties, Barfield oversees the day-to-day operations of CSC's growing athletics program which has added men's soccer and golf this year.



Barfield, who starred in both basketball and baseball at Lowndes High School in Valdosta, Ga. and Alabama Christian Junior College (now Faulkner University) in Montgomery, Ala., began his coaching career in 1980 as an assistant varsity coach and head junior varsity coach at Lowndes High.

He moved on to Lassiter High School, located in the north metro area of Atlanta, in 1985 and compiled a 47-30 record during a three-year stint as men's head basketball coach at the Cobb County school. During his second season, in 1986-87,

his team produced a 17-7 record, the first winning season in Lassiter's history. And in 1987-88, his last season there, Barfield's team posted a 23-7 record en route to the State AAAA semifinals where they lost to eventual state champion Griffin. He was named "Coach of the Year" in the Cobb County following the season.

He served as the men's assistant basketball coach at Kennsaw State College during the 1988-89 season, helping

guide the team to an 18-13 record and into the NAIA District 25 playoffs.

Barfield graduated from Lowndes High in 1973 and, after playing basketball two years in Alabama, transferred to Valdosta State College. He holds both a Bachelor of Science and Master's Degree in health and physical education from Valdosta State.

Married for 16 years, he and his wife, Elizabeth, have three sons: Josh, 14; Ryan, 11; and Jess, 6.

Jarrett Has Winning Record After 13 Seasons Of Coaching

Jarrett begins her second season at Clayton State and 13th season of college coaching with an overall record of 172-146. During her 12 years of coaching, Jarrett has experienced only four losing seasons. She began her coaching career in 1980 at Tennessee Wesleyan College in Athens, Tenn. She guided Tennessee Wesleyan to consecutive 16-8 records and the Eastern Volunteer State Conference title in 1982.

Jarrett, a graduate of North Georgia College, returned to her alma mater in 1982. Her first two seasons were not as successful as they had been at Tennessee Wesleyan. During the 1984-85 season, Jarrett guided North Georgia to a 15-13 record, the best mark for a Lady Saints team since 1975.

After a 13-12 season the following

year, Jarrett and North Georgia hit pay dirt in 1986-87. Behind the leadership of Brenda Hill, the Lady Saints ended the season as the NAIA's second best team with a 27-4 record. North Georgia captured District 25 and Bi-District XI titles while Hill was named MVP of the national tournament and earned Kodak All-American Champion Player of the Year and First Team NAIA All-American.

For her efforts, Jarrett was named NAIA District 25 Coach of the Year. The following year, she was inducted into the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame. After nine seasons at North Georgia, Jarrett was named coach of the first squad in the spring of 1991.

Jarrett holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in physical education and Master's Degree in education.



Nastopoulos And Nowell Assist Barfield During '92-'93

This season, Men's Coach Barfield will be assisted by two assistant coaches. Christopher Nastopoulos will be full-time and Darrie Nowell will serve as a part-time assistant.

Nastopoulos, a former high school All-American and collegiate basketball player, joined the Lakers this summer as Mason Barfield's second assistant since the program began in 1990. He succeeds former assistant Jeff Ozment,

who took the head coaching job at Truett-McConnell College earlier this summer.

Nastopoulos is a graduate of Pace Academy where he was a 1980 All-American. He played college basketball for Bill Foster at the University of South Carolina and earned a bachelor's degree in Political Science. He spent the past

several years working in sales and real estate.

Over the past six years, Nastopoulos has been very active in various youth programs, including AAU. He has served as athletic director for Greek Orthodox youth programs in Georgia and Florida.

Nastopoulos' duties include recruitment, scouting, on the floor coaching, player development and academic monitoring. He also serves as the Lakers' golf coach.

Darrie Nowell is another coaching newcomer to the Lakers' program. Nowell will serve as a part-time assistant and his duties will include assisting in the day-to-day operations and scouting.

A native of Ahoskie, NC, he served six years in the U.S. Army. He spent most of his time at Fort Stewart, GA, and in Germany and attained the rank of Specialist Four. He played post team basketball throughout Europe.

Following his military service, Nowell earned a Baccalaureate degree in counseling and psychology from Elizabeth City College in North Carolina. While at Elizabeth City, he was named to *Who's Who Among Students in American College and Universities*. In addition, he worked several years for Campus Crusade for Christ. He is currently pursuing a Master's degree in counseling and psychology at Georgia State University.

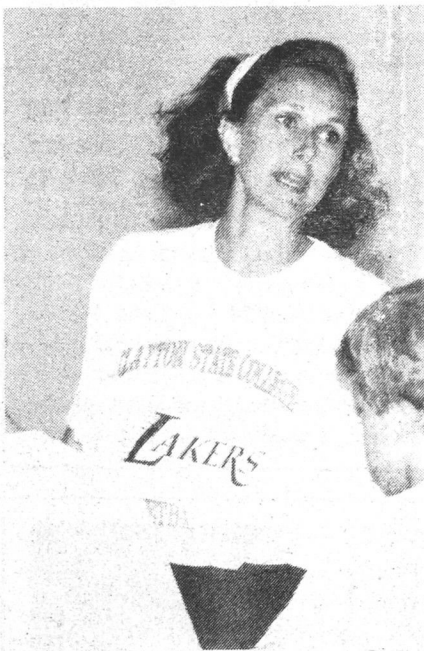

sophomore Natalie Taubert. "They have both shown a great deal of improvement, they are working hard, so we are pleased with that direction," said Jarrett.

At the point guard position is returning 5'6" sophomore Tangella Sneed. "Tangella is a smart player, adds quickness, and is a very good defensive player," Jarrett said.



Jarrett also hopes to see her freshmen come in and display the skill they show in practices. Freshmen, Tarla Tanner and Julie Cox, 5'4" and 5'5" respectively, both play the guard position and show promise with their three point guard position. She is little but she just creates a lot," said Jarrett. Cox is going to be counted on against zone defenses, with her ability to consistently play well and shoot the elusive three-point shot.

Playing the post position will be freshman Ruth Idahosa. "Ruth is a 5'11" post

player who has very good offensive skills, and is just physically a very strong player," said Jarrett.

Rounding out the five freshmen are Meredith Barnhill and Dorian Ransby. At 5'7" and 5'9", they will both be playing the forward position. Barnhill will also be seeing some time as a point guard. "Her (Ransby) quickness has really helped us this year. She has to work on some things. She is also left-handed quick which gives her a tremendous advantage on the floor, because you do not play against left-handed kids that much," Jarrett said.

As the season draws closer Jarrett is working to develop the Lady Lakers into a viable team. "We have ten quality basketball players, but they still have a lot of growing up to do. So physically and mentally we are just looking to gain experience and maturity quickly," Jarrett added.

"We are still young, we are still building. In certain areas it is kind of like we are starting over again, but the five returning players have added a lot of maturity and experience, which is going to help us," Jarrett said.

Looking at her opponents, Jarrett sees the main obstacle as experience, something she hopes to cultivate in her team. "Our opening game is against Piedmont College. They bring back five seniors who have played together for four years. You do not recruit that, you do not get that in two years," she explained.

"Experience, maturity, and learning how to win take time. We have pretty much made a commitment to freshmen. The previous program I was in, we made a commitment to freshmen, and in four years we played for a national championship," said Jarrett.

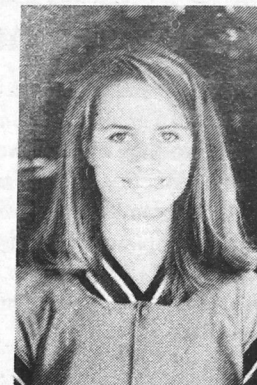

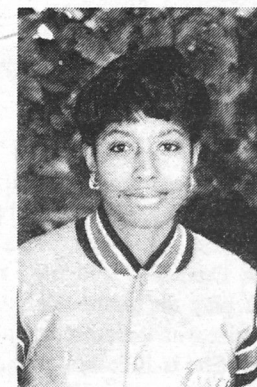

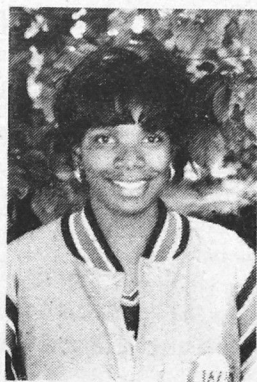

Clayton State Theater opens its 1992-93 season with Sam Shepard's Pulitzer prize winning comedy *Buried Child*. *Buried Child* will be presented in the Clayton County Schools Performing Arts Center, November 20th and 21st at 8:15 PM. The Performing Arts Center is located on Mt. Zion Parkway, just off I-75 at the Mount Zion exit. Free tickets are still available from the Dean of Students Office, D-217.

The play features Patrick Butler as Dodge, the aged and dying grandfather of

a family in crisis. His two sons Tildon and Bradley are played by Timothy Mulen and Phillip West. Dodge's wife Haile is played by Holly Hammock, Tildon's son Vince by Jeremy Hart, Vince's girlfriend by Polly Langford, and a confused and troubled minister by Jimmy Burns.

The action of the three-act drama takes place on a single night on an old family farm in Illinois. The family is going through the motions of living a normal life when their lives are torn apart by the arrival of Vince and Shelley. Til-

don and Dodge do not recognize Vince and cause him to leave. Shelley, the girlfriend, stays behind with the men. Each of the men in different ways attack her both psychologically and physically.

Haile returns from an evening out with the minister to find her home in chaos. The drunken return of Vince fi-

nally forces Dodge to reveal the dreadful secret that the family has been covering up for years, a secret that long ago had destroyed this family.

This gothic tale of one family's violent end is described by Sam Shepard as a "dark comedy about the dark side of family relationships."

Lyceum Debate Club Tackled Smoke-Free Buildings Topic

Resume Workshops Offered Information To Students

The resume workshop, held on October 20, was a successful one. Ms. Dorothy Rutledge, a personnel specialist with Atlanta Gas & Light hosted the workshop. Ms. Peggy Gardner, CSC's Director of Job Placement and Cooperative Education spoke on the outcome stating it was "an excellent workshop." Ms. Gardner also points out Ms. Rutledge's duties at her position with Atlanta Gas & Light commenting "Dorothy is responsible for a personnel group of 3,800, so she looks at thousands of resumes".

Some of the issues addressed at the workshop were the purpose of a resume, the different types of resumes, information that should go on a resume, and how to prepare a resume. Ms. Rutledge urged

students not to copy an exact resume form from another person because we are all different and usually have different career goals.

The reasons for a resume are to give a first impression of yourself to the employer. Your resume should give the employer a quick look at your background so the employer can make a decision on whether or not you should be hired or even considered for an interview.

There are five different types of resumes used. Of these five, two are usually the most preferred. The most popular resume is the historical/chronological resume. This type of resume should be brief and not very detailed. It should be two pages or less. The other type of resume that is often used is the functional resume. Seminar Offered Self-Defense Tips To Audience

For a female, statistics predict that 1 in 7 will be raped during her lifetime, and only 10 percent of these rapes are ever reported. Women between the ages of 16 and 24 are 4 times more likely to be raped than any other age group. With these statistics in mind, women have become increasingly more aware of their need for more personal safety knowledge.

Lieutenant Ted Ray of the Clayton State Police Department and Sergeant Ben Mance of the Morrow Police Department conducted a pair of seminars entitled "Self Defense for Women" to offer some direction for interested female CSC students. Several men were in attendance, as well. Sgt. Mance noted, "The most important weapon that you have is your brain," and he, with Lt. Ray's help, proceeded to give the audience tips on what to watch for when driving alone.

Since most rapes occur between a public building and the victim's parked car, several danger signs were discussed with the women in the audience. For instance, a woman walking alone to her car should remain very aware of her surroundings. She should observe every action taking place around her in the entire parking lot, rather than focusing on her car in what Sgt. Mance termed as "tunnel vision." The center of the parking lot is the most dangerous because the victim is a considerable distance from the two "points of safety." These "points of safety" are the public building and her car. Also she should have her keys in hand ready to open the car door as soon as she reaches her car, and she should lock the door as soon as she is inside.

Some of the criteria that a rapist looks for in choosing his victim are as follows: how aware the individual is of her surroundings, how the individual carries herself, and how prepared the individual appears to be.

With the holiday season approaching, women should remember that these

chaotic days at public shopping malls make perfect opportunities for thieves and rapists. In the Metro-Atlanta area only 18 percent of assailants are armed with a weapon when attempting to abduct their victim. However, whether the assailant is armed or not, the victim is still in danger, and women should remember that a cautious female makes a less desirable target. With the winter nights coming earlier, women should try to walk in groups and park in well lighted areas as close to the building as possible. Lt. Ray said, "You have to decide whether or not you are going to decrease your chances of being a victim."

While no specific precautions can insure that a female will not become a victim, there are certain measures which can significantly reduce her chances of becoming a victim of assault. Good judgment and assertiveness are necessary factors in self defense. Also for those women who wish to invest in other means of insuring their preparation for self defense, tear gas, personal body alarms, and car phones are very useful items for personal safety.

Although there was a light turnout, almost everyone in the audience participated in the discussion. Even though only students are allowed to vote on the issues, there were a few faculty members on hand to voice their opinions.

Other issues were raised while debating the smoke-free topic. For example, most of the students were concerned with how it would be enforced. Some audience members thought it should be enforced like an alcohol or drug violation on campus. Another concern was that if smokers were only allowed to smoke outdoors the campus would be littered with cigarette butts. Someone suggested placing ashtrays outside in designated areas. There were several good points brought out by the questions, but no solutions.

Smokers and non-smokers were encouraged to give their opinions on the issue. Students and faculty members participated in the discussion. The general consensus was to allow people to smoke outside or in designated areas inside certain buildings.

At the end of the debate all of the students in attendance voted to support the idea of having smoke-free buildings on campus. The results of the vote will be given to the SGA, who serve as a voice for the student body.

The next meeting of the LDC is on Tuesday, November 24. It will take place in D-223 and will begin at 12:05 p.m. The debates are open to students, faculty, and members of the community. Before each debate there will be notices posted on campus announcing the topic.

and qualifications. The other types of resumes are analytical, synoptic/amplified, and imaginative or creative. The latter is aimed at applicants in a creative type of occupation, such as art or journalism.

Some of the matters that should be addressed on a resume are employment history, and one's experience and ability. Other information contained in resumes varies on which type of resume you choose. Community and high school/college activities should also be put on a resume. This can possibly give an applicant a

slight advantage. In a job market like today's it is very important for applicants to use any edge they may have, no matter how trivial, to have an advantage over the next applicant. Today's employers can be so selective that a job vacancy may go to someone else because of something as minor as a past traffic violation.

The workshop was a very active one with a large amount of participation, even though the audience was fairly small. Ms. Gardner stressed that "It is very important that students plan their schedule to attend these events."

First Round District Playoff Win Propels Lakers Into District Championship Game

The regular season ended but by no means was the season over for the Lakers inaugural soccer team. They played in the NAIA District 25 playoffs last week. The Lakers were seeded second in the playoff tournament. The soccer team is the first Laker team to see post-season play in the two-plus years of the athletic program's existence. After a first round win, the Lakers were defeated by Berry College in the district championship game on November 7. The final score was 5-1.

The Lakers opened the first round of the District 25 playoffs on Friday, November 6 with a "home" win against Brewton-Parker College. The Lakers came out on top of a tough defensive battle, scoring the only goal made during the contest. Todd Nidiffer made a penalty kick and the Lakers triumphed 1-0.

The game was played at McCurry Park, rather than the Lakers' campus field,

because the dimensions of CSC's new field are under the NAIA's minimum requirements for post-season play. This victory propelled them into the district finals against Berry College.

Earlier this season, the Lakers suffered its first loss against Berry, a 3-0 shutout. Berry defeated Piedmont College in the first round of the playoffs. They then beat the Lakers last Saturday to capture the District 25 championship. A detailed story of the two playoff games will appear in the December issue of *The Bent Tree*.

Berry College will now advance to the NAIA Area IX playoffs which is composed of District 6 (South Carolina) and District 7 (Florida). The Area IX winner will advance to the national tournament to be played November 23-28 in San Antonio, Texas.

Lakers Soccer Team End Regular Season With A Pair Of Wins On The Road

The 1992 regular season ended for Clayton State College's first-year soccer team fast week with a pair of victories over LaGrange and North Georgia.

A pair of second half goals by Jose Ninow broke a 1-1 tie against LaGrange College on Tuesday, Oct. 27 and gave the Lakers a 3-1 win. The win snapped a four-game losing streak on the road, dating back to their loss against Berry College on October 3. It was also the first goals scored on the road since the inaugural win against Central Wesleyan College on September 19.

Ninow's pair of goals raised his season total to seven on the year and came in the last 16 minutes of the game. The Lakers got a first half goal to lead 1-0 at halftime from Todd Nidiffer, CSC's leading scorer.

Against North Georgia College on

Saturday, Oct. 31, Clayton State earned a 3-0 victory, the Lakers' sixth shutout of their inaugural season, and improved their first-year record to 10-4-1.

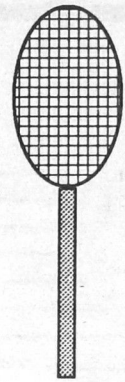
"This game was a tune-up for us, heading into the playoffs," said Lakers Coach Adrian Brooks of the North Georgia win. "The win today capped an excellent first year."

The Lakers defeated North Georgia 7-1 earlier this season which may have prompted Brooks to sit out some of his regulars and start goalkeeper Stacy Washington at forward while backup keeper Scott Roth earned his first shutout as a Laker.

The Lakers built a 2-0 lead in the first half on goals by Chris Para and Corby Whitlow. Nidiffer rounded out the Lakers' scoring in the second half with his team-leading 10th goal of the season.

tournament with a total of 643. Appalachian State took the team title with a total of 594.

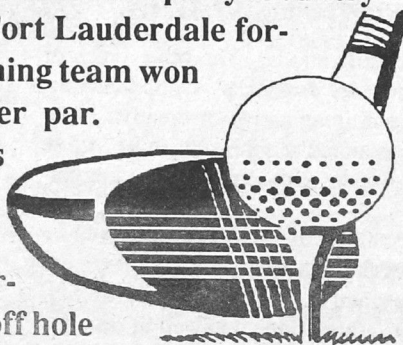
