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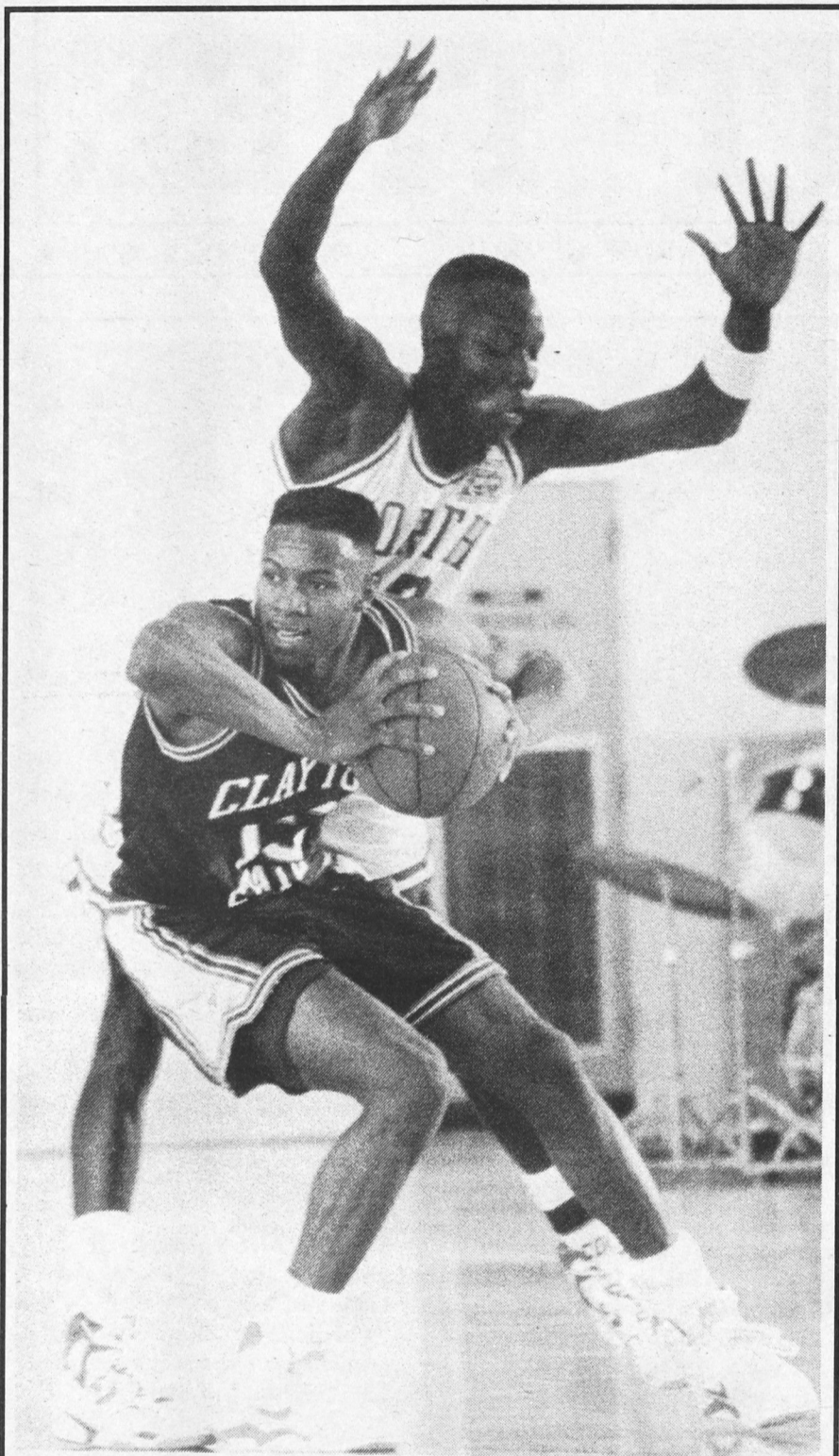

Ms. Turner joined Chick-Fil-A in 1985, in Support Services. She currently serves as the Personnel Manager and is responsible for recruiting and hiring employees for the corporate headquarters. Ferguson Relates A Variety Of Creation Stories For Lyceum Audience

On January 26, Ms. Jane Anne Ferguson told a collection of stories to CSC students. The stories centered on the theme of creation. The program, "Creation Stories and Myths," was a part of the Lyceum "Tuesday Tradition" multi-cultural awareness series. Ms. Ferguson's storytelling performance approached this theme from a religious viewpoint. Among the stories were two versions of the creation story from Genesis in the Bible, and three stories which depicted the Native American traditional stories of creation.

Ms. Ferguson explained, "Stories are always true; they are not always factual." She is involved in a program which allows her to tell stories to children from three years old up to third grade every week with a touring series called the Golden Key Worldsong Children's Theater sponsored by Atlanta's Theater Gael. The storytelling performance at Clayton State was a new opportunity for Ms. Ferguson to tell her stories to an older audience.

Ms. Ferguson is an Atlanta resident who also enjoys acting. For twenty years she has enjoyed participating in stage productions. Her experiences in acting served as a natural lead into her involvement in storytelling. Ms. Ferguson received her Master's degree in Performance Studies and Oral Interpretation. Last year she attended classes offered by Atlanta's Alliance Theater.

"We tell more stories every day than we know," said Ms. Ferguson. She views stories as a natural part of life and being human, and she enjoys sharing her stories with others. "We learn through story," she explained. Ms. Ferguson's stories allow her to communicate with people of all ages through her use of one of the oldest art forms known.

This campus storytelling performance was developed by the United Methodist Foundation (UMF) at Clayton State. UMF President Randy Duke said the message of the performance could be summed up in something from Ms. Ferguson's last story called "Old Turtle." "They learned to see God in each other," he stated. Mr. Duke said that Ms. Ferguson has agreed to research more stories for the CSC students and plans to return during the spring quarter.

Michael Mann, who directed the television series *Miami Vice* and is described as one of the master film directors of our time, has given us what many critics call America's Number One 1992 movie.


Jeff Craig, in his "Sixty Second Preview", reprinted in the Films Incorporated catalog wrote, "Oscar-winning Daniel Day-Lewis (My Left Foot) portrays fearless frontiersman Hawkeye in this magnificent retelling of James Fenimore Cooper's classic novel. Amidst the conflict of the French and Indian War, Hawkeye, who was raised by the Mohicans, is torn between his loyalty to his adopted people and his passionate love for Cora Monro (Madeleine Stowe, *Unlawful Entry*), the proud, independent daughter of a British Officer."

David Ansen wrote an excellent review (titled "Mann In the Wilderness") of this movie in the "Movies" Section of the September 28, 1992 issue of *Newsweek*. In his review, Ansen describes the setting as Colonial America in 1757, with the French and English at war over the new continent, and with each side allied with Native American tribes (enter Hawkeye, the Mohicans, and the bloodthirsty Hurons). In his review, Ansen wrote "Mann and screenwriter Christopher Crowe stray far from Cooper (they base their script just as much on the 1936 movie with Randolph Scott). The Hawkeye-Cora romance doesn't exist in the novel, where the Native Americans are either sentimentalized

noble savages or bloodthirsty demons. These are liberties for which we can be thankful."

And later, Ansen wrote "*The Last of the Mohicans*, swept along by Trevor Jones and Randy Edelman's stirring score, is a great date movie. For women, it plugs into the most primal rescue fantasy while presenting a strong-willed, defiant heroine. For the boys, (sic) Mann offers spectacular action sequences. The climactic hand-to-hand fights, brilliantly choreographed on precipitous cliffs, put the poetry back into violence. This is the rare recent movie that knows when to end, all passion spent...."

I retraced my steps from earlier years; I checked-out a copy of Cooper's *The Last of the Mohicans*, and scanned through it. Sure enough, right there in the first third of the book, I found this description of the manly combat Ansen described: "...he soon succeeded in disarming his adversary, whose knife fell on the rock at their feet; and from this moment it became a fierce struggle who should cast the other over the dizzy height into a neighboring cavern of the falls. Every successive struggle brought them nearer to the verge, where Duncan perceived the final and conquering effort must be made. Each of the combatants threw all his energies into that effort, and the result was that both tottered on the brink of the precipice...."

Clayton Loses "Heartbreaker" To The 'Canes

The Clayton State Lakers (10-7, 2-2 district) entered their January 23 game against the Georgia Southwestern (GSW) Hurricanes (8-7, 3-4 district) seventh in the District 25 standings. The Lakers were hoping to improve their district standing and end a two-game losing streak.

When asked how the Lakers matched up with GSW, Coach Mason Barfield said, "Physically not; in quickness not; but that's not what wins games." The first half of the game proved Coach Barfield's comment to be true in favor of the Lakers.

During the first half, CSC trailed for only slightly more than a minute. After a 12-12 tie at the 11:45 mark, the Lakers lead the rest of the half, finishing the initial period up 28-22.

The second half was a close battle with 7 ties and 9 lead changes. GSW gained the lead for the remainder of the

game on a free throw by Charles Howard, that came four and a half minutes from the end of the game. The final was 65-61.

The key to the game according to Coach Barfield was the Lakers "not getting those key defensive rebounds" from the Hurricanes' misses on free throw attempts late in the game. He also felt that CSC "missed some very important free throws and easy baskets down the stretch."

Clayton was led by Todd Holts with 18 points. He was followed by David Curry with 12 and Carlos Head with 11. Dexter Brown led the Lakers in rebounds with 11.

GSW's leading scorer was Carlos Brown with 18. Eric Taylor had 17 points, and Billy Rice had 13 points to round out those in double figures.

CSC shot only 38% for the game which is below their last place district average of 45%. The Lakers were also only 2 of 9 from 3-point range.

The Lady Lakers Take The Wind Out Of The Lady Hurricanes

The CSC Lady Lakers (11-6, 2-3 district) came into the January 23 match up against the Georgia Southwestern (GSW) Lady Hurricanes (3-13, 0-5 district) looking to gain some ground in the standings.

The Lady Lakers appeared to have every intention of improving their District 25 record this day. Clayton gained a 9-7 lead at the 14:24 point in the first half. The Lady Lakers never relinquished this lead. The half ended with Clayton up 38-24.

The second half was completely dominated by Clayton and resulted in a victory for the Lady Lakers by the score of 82-52.

CSC had five players in double figures. Ruth Idahosa, the team's leading scorer, was on average with 12 points. She was followed by Natalie Taubert and Dorian Ransby with 11 points each and Candi Wyatt and Stacy Spencer with 10 points each. Idahosa also had another big rebounding game with 13.

The Lady Hurricanes were led by

Fran Mathews with 17 and Becky Brown with 13. Mathews hit only 5 of 15 from the floor and scored below her team-leading average of 20.8 ppg.

As a team, Clayton posted some very good numbers. They shot 89% from the free throw line. This is well above the Lady Lakers' last placedistrict free throw average of 56%. CSC also added 3 more 3-pointers to their total to make it 40 on the season compared to 25 all of last season.

GSW out shot Clayton 39% to 38%. However, the Lady Hurricanes were only 2 of 11 from 3-point range for an 18% total. They were well below their second place average of 36%.

The story of the game was the intensity with which the Lady Lakers played. Tarla Tanner was the embodiment of this when, with CSC up by 30, she ran down a loose ball that was headed out of bounds. This is the kind of play that Coach Jarrett hoped the Lady Lakers would learn from the last home double-header.

Coach Jarrett stated that she was "very encouraged by the intensity of the Lady Lakers in the second half."
