## Dr. Skinner Selected As New CSC President

Dr. Richard A. Skinner, 44, Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of the faculty at Lander University in Greenwood, S.C., was appointed President of Clayton State College at the October meeting of the Georgia Board of Regents.

Dr. Skinner will begin his new duties on Jan. 1, 1994, according to Dr. H. Dean Propst, Chancellor of the University System of Georgia.


"Dr. Skinner is highly qualified by academic background and administrative experience to assume presidential leadership responsibilities at Clayton State College," said Propst. "We look forward to working closely with him as he assumes these responsibilities."

From his office at Lander University, Dr. Skinner expressed his excitement and pleasure about his new assignment. "My original interest in and my excitement about joining Clayton State stem from a fascination with how the faculty, staff and community have worked together to innovate, to experiment, and always to serve the educational needs of the College's immediate region," he said.

"The growth and development of the College are the clearest signs that those efforts were on target and right for the times," Dr. Skinner continued.

Lyceum Presents Dr. Shelby Steele
As 1993 Laureate Speaker

Lyceum will present Dr. Shelby Steele in two lectures on Tuesday, November 2. His topic, at the noon and 7:00 p.m. lectures, will be "The Content of Our Character." The presentations will take place in G-132. In addition to lecturing, Dr. Steele will participate in a class discussion prior to his noon lecture. As a national prize winner, Dr. Steele's presentation will be a part of the annual Lyceum Laureate series.



Dr. Steele is a tenured Professor of English at San Jose State University in California. His 1990 book, *The Content* of Our Character: A New Vision of Race in America won the National Book Critics Circle Award. The CSC Bookstore has ordered a limited number of copies for purchase by those who want to get Dr. Steele's autograph in the book Since that time Dr. Steele has risen to national recognition He was interviewed on Nightline and profiled in Time. George Will describes Steele as combining "the literary sensibility of novelist Ralph Ellison with the analytic acuteness of America's most profound black man, Frederick Douglass." In spite of having his views labelled as neo-conservative, Steele considers himself a liberal, staunchly supportive of social equality and individual free-

The Content of Our Character has brought a storm of comment, both negative and positive, from blacks and whites alike. Largely because Steele himself is black, his critics have been unable to label his book as racist; on the other hand, however, many have hailed this work as a new perspective on the changing face of racial relations.

Dr. Steele speaks on the virtues of self-help and personal responsibility as the best way for blacks to succeed in the American mainstream. His writings have appeared in Harper's, New York Times Magazine, the Washington Post, and American Scholar. One of his essays on race was chosen for The Best American Essays 1989.

News of the appointment also was well received on campus. Dr. Faye T. Barr, who chaired the Presidential Search and Screen Committee, expressed her pleasure. "The Committee is very ex-



cited about the prospects for the College under the leadership of Dr. Skinner," she said. "There is no doubt that the entire campus will be energized by his presence."

Continuing, Dr. Skinner is looking forward to his challenge. "At a time when change in higher education seems to be almost constant, Clayton State is particularly well-prepared. Change, foresight, vision, and responsiveness are hallmarks of Harry Down's tenure as president and of the work of the staff and faculty."

"The alumni and students of Clayton State are important elements of communities throughout metropolitan Atlanta, and are the clearest measures of how successful the College has been," he added.

Dr. Skinner earned his bachelor's degree in political science from Georgia Southern University in 1971, and both his master's degree (1974) and doctor of philosophy degree (1975) in government and international studies from the University of South Carolina.

Dr. Skinner began his educational career at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Va. in 1976, starting as the Director of the computer-based laboratory for instruction and analysis while also serving as an Assistant Professor of political science. In 1981, he was promoted to an Associate Professor and a year later was named Chair of the Department of Political Science and Geography. Between 1985 and 1987, he served as the Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Letters and Director of the academic honors program.

He has served as Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of the Faculty at Lander University since 1988. His experiences at Lander, a small, regional state university, included strategic planning and implementation efforts aimed at effecting fundamental improvements to the academic quality of the institution.

Dr. Skinner is the author of *International Events and the Comparative Analysis of Foreign Policy* (Columbia: University of South Carolina Press, 1975), and has written numerous articles and reviews.

As President of Clayton State College, Dr. Skinner will administer an \$18 million operating budget involving 350 full-time faculty and staff, and a student (See President Skinner on page 11)

# Is The Black Male Vanishing?

Is the black male on the verge of vanishing from American society? When looking at statistics, the future of the black male does not look bright. A University of Chicago study predicts that by the year 2000, at least 70% of all black males will be on dope, in jail, or dead. These statistics lead me to believe that our black men are indeed vanishing from American society. I personally feel that there are three major factors that contribute to the black male vanishing from American society. These three factors are a low self-esteem, a lack of education, and a lack of good black male role models.

Self-esteem is defined by "Mr. Webster" as "regard for one's self." Therefore since our black men do not seem to hold themselves in very high regard, I guess it is fair to say that they have little or no self-esteem. I also feel that there is a reason for this low level of self-esteem. I am under the opinion that society has stripped the black male of his self-esteem. As stated by Dr. Nathan Hare in an interview published in Ebony, "society has taken away the black males' feeling of masculinity, which is so vital to him.' Through subtle and sometimes not so subtle ways, I feel that society has planted a feeling of inferiority in the mind of the

black male. For example, textbooks used in our public schools fail to tell the true history and accomplishments of black people. History books have done nothing less than take the black male and his accomplishments out of history and deny him his rightful past. This form of censorship in turn gives the black man a feeling of living in a country where he has little or no past.

The black male's lack of education is another major contributor in his vanishing from the American society. Because education is the cornerstone of success, the black male's lack of it puts him at a disadvantage. Studies have been done and have shown that in all cities black males were shown to have dramatically higher suspension, expulsion, and dropout rates, and dramatically lower gradepoint averages. This suggests that our males are doing much less than performing poorly, they are actually not performing at all.

I feel that a large part of the black male's problem with performance has to do with the school system itself. I refuse to believe that our black men are incapable of learning. Our schools and the American society need to find a better and more supportive way of educating our black males. ### Coach Barfield Is Confident

Mr. Mason Barfield, coach of the Clayton State men's basketball team, is optimistic about the upcoming season. He feels that with the momentum provided by last year's winning record (16-15), the team has a good chance to return to the district tournament this year. "We



want to win that tournament and get the chance to go to Tulsa," he says.

Six of the ten returning players are seniors, and this is just one of the assets that Coach Barfield feels the team has. "the senior members have great leadership ability and have really grown emotionally and physically," he says. To the list of strengths, he adds that guard play has improved, players are doing a better job of shooting from the perimeter, and that the team has three post men with size, strength, and skill.


Coach Barfield knows, however, that "it's not going to be easy." He recognizes that even though the Lakers have improved, the other teams in the conference have also improved. Furthermore, he is not expecting to see a great leap in ability from the team because, as he puts it, "there is a lot of improvement from a high school junior to a high school senior but not nearly as much from a college junior to a college senior."

While Coach Barfield feels the game of basketball should be played from the inside out, he also contends the what he thinks does not really matter very much. He says, "the role of coach is overplayed. It's important to a certain point, but champion teams are more from great players than from coaches.'

played hard; battles; and scraps." She feels that those people who appreciate the finesse and execution of basketball will greatly enjoy watching the Lady Lakers.

Jarrett begins her 14th season of college coaching with an overall record of 172-146. During her 13 years of coaching, Jarrett has experienced only four losing seasons. She began her coaching career in 1980 at Tennessee Wesleyan College in Athens, Tenn. She guided Tennessee Wesleyan to back-to-back 16-8 records and the Eastern Volunteer State Conference title in 1982.

Jarrett guided North Georgia to a 15-13 record, the best mark for a Lady Saint team since 1975.

After a 13-12 season the following year, Jarrett and North Georgia hit pay dirt in 1986-87. Behind the leadership of Brenda Hill, the Lady Saints ended the season as the NAIA's second best team with a 27-4 record. North Georgia cap-

tured District 25 and Bi-District XI titles while Hill was named MVP of the national tournament and earned Kodak All-American Champion Player of the Year and First Team NAIA All-American honors.

For her efforts, Jarrett was named NAIA District 25 Coach of the Year and was recognized by the Georgia Sports

Hall of Fame. After nine seasons at North Georgia, Jarrett was named coach of the first Lady Lakers squad in the spring of 1991.

Jarrett holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in physical education and Master's Degree in education. She is active in NAIA and has served as a member of the Executive Committee of District 25.





### Lyceum Lecturer Discusses Similarities And Differences

On October 12, Lyceum's Tuesday Tradition welcomed Ms. Claudia Mertl. Speaking to a culturally diverse audience, Ms. Mertl presented her lecture, "The Same-But Different; How Do I Make That Work for Me?"

Ms. Mertl is a highly accomplished business woman as well as a strong community leader. She is the President and founder of Leisure Lines Playground Equipment Company, an internationally successful business. She also holds the position as Chairperson of the Clayton County Chamber of Commerce.

Ms. Mertl opened her lecture with a few exercises designed to show the audience how similiar we really are. In one, she asked us to hold up three fingers on our writing hand. body of nearly 5,000. Serving the six counties which comprise the Southern Crescent area of Atlanta, the College also provides classes for just over 5,000 community residents enrolled in non-credit continuing education courses.

Clayton State's new president emerged from a ten-month national search that attracted 98 original applicants. He was one of seven semifinalists selected by the College's Search and Screen Committee to visit the campus for two-day interviews in August, and one of three finalists

who returned to Atlanta for interviews with Chancellor Propst and a special three-member Board of Regents Committee.

Because of this failure, the question before the nation today should be, WHY? Why are our schools failing to properly educate our black males? Educator Marva Collins in Ebony stated, "We teach one group of students ideas of Nietzhe, and Plato and we teach our black males 'See Sue. See Sue run.'" I ask you, how can we expect our black men to learn and perform equal to others if teachers educate them on a much lower level?
