

Tuition Goes Up Three Percent This Summer

The University System of Georgia Board of Regents voted last week to increase tuition for CSC and the other schools in the System. This three percent increase will go into effect beginning summer quarter. The Regents also created a committee to make sure a much larger increase in tuition for out-of-state students does not harm the System. The out-of-state increase, expected to be about 25%, is meant to charge non-Georgia students all of the instructional coss. The committee is expected to present its findings at the Regents' September meeting. Any increase in this area is scheduled to take effect for the fall quarter of 1995.

Lyceum Presents Date/Acquaintance Rape Seminar will include in her speech the facts and

What happens when a simple goodnight kiss is taken the wrong way, when harmless flirtation becomes dangerous, traumatic, or even life-threatening? What happens when, at the end of a date, the male party decides that he's going to get lucky, despite whether the female party is willing or not? The answer is date/acquaintance rape, a violation of trust and self-esteem that, sadly, occurs far too often. At noon on April 21, in room G-132, Ms. Nikki Sard will conduct a seminar that will answer some of the questions, and put to rest the myths, surrounding date rape.

Legal liaison for the Grady Memorial Hospital Rape Crisis Center (RCC), Miss Sard received her Bachelor's Degree in Psychology in 1988. Three years later, she earned her Masters in Counseling Psychology. From there, she went on to work for the Grady RCC.

Beginning at noon, Ms. Sard will discuss in detail the services and history of the Grady Rape Crisis Center. She

will include in her speech the facts and statistics of date rape, in order to hopefully dispel any misconceptions her audience may have.

The main focus of Ms. Sard's seminar, however, will be precaution and awareness. Among the specifics to be covered will be what signs to watch out for that may indicate that a guy has date rape on his mind. Another specific area she will cover is what makes some guys think that they "deserve" sex on a date, a complex problem that often leads to date rape. Other topics to be covered will be the medical and legal procedures which can follow when date-rape occurs.

In addition to the lecture, audience members will be encouraged to ask Ms. Sard questions concerning date rape that they feel are not covered in the seminar.

Date/acquaintance rape is too pressing a problem to be simply swept under the rug and forgotten about. With the proper knowledge, however, it is a problem that can be dealt with and, perhaps someday, brought to an end. Nikki Sard's date rape prevention seminar is one that can not afford to be missed.

Regents' Test Alert

1. What is the Regents' Test?

The Regents' Test is a test used by the University System of Georgia to determine students' competence in reading and writing. A certain level of competence in these areas as demonstrated on this test is required for graduation. Thus passing this test is a milestone toward graduation just as passing a course is a milestone toward graduation. The test takes less than three hours to complete and consists of an essay and a reading section.

2. Who needs to take the Regents' Test this quarter?

All students who plan to graduate with a two- or four-year degree from Clayton State College must take and pass the Regents' Test at some point in their academic career. Students who have completed their English and speech requirements are eligible to take this test.

Students who have 45 or more quarter hours and have not taken and passed both parts of the Regents' Test should plan to take it this quarter. Students who are required to take it will receive a card from the Counseling and Career Center notifying them of the dates and times for the tests. This card also acts as their ticket for admission to the test.

3. When is the Regents' Test offered this quarter?

In 1978, Dr. Braun was asked by the great Rob Taylor, CSC's Director of Student Activities, to do a magic show to be presented by the series of Magical Extravaganza which started in 1980.

Dr. Braun said that the magic show has always been entertaining. There has always been a wide variety of tricks, as there will be this year, ranging from sleight of hand tricks to professional quality illusions. He told of some classic tricks from the past. A car was made to disappear on stage along with its human driver. On another occasion, Dr. Braun recalled, a woman was sawed in half on the stage.

While there may be dozens of high-

lights in this years show, Dr. Braun mentioned specifically that there will be a magician who will sit on a board with nails through it. The magician told Dr. Braun that this is more impressive than lying on nails because all of the body weight is concentrated on fewer nails. Another trick will be done with the board of nails. The magician will put bricks on the board while it is on his chest. A person will break the bricks with a sledge hammer. An illusion that will be presented is one in which a person grows out of an empty box. Dr. Braun mentioned that David Copperfield uses a light box in his show and that he probably got the idea from the CSC magic show. All of the other tricks will be a surprise, even to Dr. Braun

If a student or anyone else would like to perform in the show, it is not too late yet, but Dr. Braun says to see him immediately. One does not have to be of professional skill to perform, although those people should feel free to participate.
