

TEACHER EDUCATION ALERT

Students applying to the B.A. in Teacher Education degree program may submit their application for Fall 1995 admission between September 20, 1994, and June 30, 1995. Applications are available in the Office of Teacher Education. Enrollment in the program is limited, and students must meet certain eligibility standards to be considered for admission.

CSC Buildings Go "Smoke-Free" Starting Today

Effective today the buildings at Clayton State College will be "smoke free."

Last spring, the Executive Committee of the College voted unanimously to approve a resolution from the Student Government Association to eliminate smoking from all campus buildings. This action came after surveys of students, faculty, and staff and four open forums devoted exclusively to a discussion of a no-smoking policy. The overwhelming message that emerged from all of this was a desire on the part of a large majority of College citizens to end smoking inside of our buildings.

President Skinner, in a memorandum to faculty and staff, wrote, "I have considered all aspects of this issue, mindful of my past as a four-pack-perday smoker, and weighed the 'rights' of smokers against both the desires of nonsmokers and the growing body of evidence that indicates the very serious consequences of 'second-hand smoke.'

With all of this in mind, I am hereby announcing the following College policy:

College Policy on Smoking

In order to protect the health and well-being of faculty, staff, and students, Clayton State College prohibits all smoking inside campus buildings, effective September 19, 1994. Specific areas outside campus buildings are designated for those individuals who wish to smoke.

Assistance

Clayton State College seeks to assist smokers in complying with institutional policy related to smoking. Local service agencies offering stopsmoking programs are as follows: American Lung Association, 872-9653; South Fulton Medical Health Advancement Center, 305-4450; and

the American Cancer Society (Clayton County Chapter), 961-8921.

South Fulton Medical Center will be offering a eight-week education and support program designed by the American Lung Association to help you quit smoking for good. This program can be used in conjunction with a physician-prescribed nicotine patch. To register call 305-4550. The cost is \$60. The program will take place at South Fulton Medical Center and Begins Thursday, November 3.

A smoking cessation workshop/ seminar is planned for the annual Wellness Fair, set for Thursday, October 13.

Federal Crackdown Proposed To Curb Smoking By Teens

On September 13, a National Academy of Sciences committee said that tough new measures, such as banning cigarette machines and placing a heavy federal tax on tobacco products, may be necessary to reduce the growing number of teen smokers.

According to an article published in the Atlanta Journal-Constitution, "Every day, an estimated 3,000 young Americans become regular smokers. They are cutting their lives short by an average of 15 years. The extra medical costs for each day's crop of new smokers will total more than \$20 million during their lifetimes, experts say."

The recommendations of the committee include:

- * Increasing federal cigarette taxes by \$2.00 per pack.
- * Banning tobacco vending machines
- * Banning self-service tobacco displays
- * Repealing the federal law that prevents state and local governments from regulating tobacco promotion.
- * Intensifying anti-smoking media campaigns.
- * Requiring merchants to obtain state licenses to sell tobacco products.
- * Increasing the use of tobacco-free policies in areas frequented by children and youth.

CAMPUS NEWS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

We want you to be a part of *The Bent Tree*. The guidelines for submissions are below. We invite you to submit articles, art work, poetry, and other items of interest. Submit them in room D-223.

Guidelines For Student Newspaper Submissions (Approved by the Student Publications Committee)

The Bent Tree will contain six basic types of entries. They are listed as follows:

- 1. News News stories are to be straight forward descriptions of upcoming or past events of relevance to the campus community. The reporter should refrain from making judgments or expressing opinion in a news story. Quoted opinions should be attributed as specifically as possible. News stories should be balanced in approach and accurate in detail. News stories are written only by staff members of *The Bent Tree*.
- 2. Features Features are staff-produced articles, poems, essays, reviews, listings, etc., of a noncontroversial nature. This would include magazine-type submissions. The basic purpose of a feature is to provide useful and/or interesting information to the audience of *The Bent Tree*.
- 3. Editorials Editorials are staff-written expressions of opinion on a topic of current interest to the audience of *The Bent Tree*. Unsigned editorials are presumed to represent the opinion of *The Bent Tree* staff. Signed editorials represent the opinion of the writer and may or may not reflect staff consensus. Editorials will be clearly identified as such by either placement on the editorial page or specific notation. Any factual information contained in editorials should be accurate.
- 4. Letters Letters to the editor should be published only if they address a matter of current and timely concern to *The Bent Tree*. Letters are subject to standard editing, but the editors will take care to see that the editing does not alter the writer's basic message. Editors are not obligated to print all letters, but if letters are received on both sides of a controversial issues, letters on each side should be printed. If more than one letter is to be printed on either side of a controversial issue, the number of letters printed should be roughly in proportion to the number received on each side. Unsigned letters will not be accepted. Names may be withheld for valid reasons. The social security number of the writer is also required on the submission.
- 5. Free-lance Submission Free-lance submissions may be accepted from members of the College community on any subject, but a submission that is essentially a short statement of opinion on a timely subject should be submitted as a letter to the editor and not as a freelance article. Free-lance submissions will be accepted only if they are well written, substantive, accurate in fact, and of interest to the audience of The Bent Tree. Care will be taken to make sure that a variety of submissions are accepted if they are offered. This is so that one point of view does not dominate. Free-lance submissions will not be accepted on a regular or continuing basis from a single organization or individual. Regular submissions are included under category six (columns). Free-lance submissions will be clearly identified as not being written by the staff of The Bent Tree. Headings such as "Guest Commentary," "Student Viewpoint," etc., can be used by the editor in identifying such submissions. As an alternative, the byline or a statement at the end of an article could be used to identify the author if not a member of the staff. All free-lance submissions have to include the name and social security number of the contributor.
- 6. Columns These are regularly appearing articles that fall in none of the above categories. Members of the College community who contribute a regular column to *The Bent Tree* become auxiliary members of the staff and agree to meet space, style, deadline and format requirements as the editor shall decide. Columnists shall, however, be given editorial freedom as to content. These columns should be clearly identified as such by placement, title, or appropriate notation.
