No more excuses, it's time to get in shape. Clayton State College's new Smart Bodies Wellness Center is now in it's third week of operation with over 300 people enrolled this quarter.

Enrollers begin their first visit with an orientation of the facility as well as a personalized assessment of each machine in order to evaluate the proper weight they will be using while in the circuit.

The circuit itself lasts 30 minutes beginning and ending with a five-minute warm-up and cool-down on any number of bicycles, treadmills, or stair climbers located in the center. The remaining twenty minutes are devoted to a 30 second rotation between the universal strength train-

and aerobic stepping blocks, which allows you to maintain a constant target heart rate while exercising.

Altogether this three days a week workout becomes personally beneficial for anyone. David Levin, one of Smart Bodies's personal trainers says, "Not only should you expect better body shape, added vitality and energy, but over all, a newer, fitter, smarter, and quicker you."

CSC's Wellness Center is located on campus in the Physical Education building. It is open seven days a week to the public, students, faculty, and alumni. Just drop by anytime during operation hours and your tour will begin.

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

Seven is the latest offering from the glorious Brad Pitt. A word of warning; diehard Pitt fans beware! Don't expect shot after shot of him in all his glory, as in Legends of the Fall and Interview With a Vampire; as Seven is a gritty crime-drama.

Seven stars Pitt and Morgan Freeman as detectives on the trail of a serial killer. This literate killer has a theme to his killings. The victims are found in positions representing the seven deadly sins (gluttony, greed, sloth, lust, pride, envy, and vengeance).

Pitt plays David Mills, a hotheaded, smart-assed "dick" replacing the retiring William Somerset (Freeman). For some

unknown reason, Mills has chosen to be relocated to this Godforsaken (and unnamed) crimeinfested 'burb. Mills soon learns that being on the police force in this city isn't "landscaping at Taco Bell."

Pitt's performance as Mills is respectable but stereotypical. Mills is not unlike another famous sidekick, Sergeant Riggs (the Mel Gibson character from the *Lethal Weapon* flicks).

Freeman is a delight as the jaded yet mild-mannered Somerset. He has truths of his own to face. At the climax of his frustration, Somerset's only visible response occurs when he

hurls a metronome (he snoozes to the ticking) across the room.

Gwyneth Paltrow portrays Tracy, Mills' wife. Paltrow is rumored to be Hollywood's best in her age category and her small but pivotal role attests to this. Paltrow takes this supporting role and fully develops the character so much that the audience feels they know her better than any of the other characters.

Seven is one of the better movies this year. Filmed mainly in semidarkness, it has a "COPS" on acid feel to it. It surpasses even Natural Born Killers in its graphic portrayal of dementia gone haywire.

## Showgirls Falls Flat

And he also needs to hire talent rather than the first so-called actress who is willing to take her clothes off. Until he does this, he will be saying nothing new at all.

The C-lobby overflowed with representatives from health organizations, students, faculty, and staff. CSC's Nursing Department and the American Red Cross performed vision, blood pressure, and hearing tests while Any Lab Tests and the Sickle Cell foundation gave blood tests.

Mendee Rock presented a lecture on Neurolinguistic Programming. Those in attendance were taught how to use the power of the mind

Participants lined up for posture analysis with reps from Tara Chiropractic, while others received debt and purchasing advice from Consumer Credit Counselors. According to Wayne Stewart, Disability Services Coordinator, "the Very Special Arts Festival demonstrates the unified spirit of all individuals through the arts regardless of ability or disability." Over a thousand Clayton County special education and disabled students and their volunteers attended Imagination '95.

The area surrounding the E-building pond was the setting for students to make magic wands, colorful badges, tie-dyed scarves, and pasta necklaces. Student-created water color fish hung from trees. Youngsters performed on stage and inspected fire trucks. They played games with parachutes and streamers and dined on picnic lunches.

Many CSC students and staff visited the event. Clayton County disabled students were greeted with warm hospitality and sunny weather. Imagination '95 ended at 2:00 p.m. and was a perfect intro to the second annual Southern Crescent Celebration.

All parking is free and is at the Georgia Mental Health Institute, 1256 Briarcliff Rd: there is a free double-decker shuttle to the festival grounds.

All proceeds are given to charities. Since it's founding in 1986, the festival has disembursed more than \$375,000. This year's recipients are Jerusalem House, a residence for homeless people with AIDS; Nicholas House, a transitional residence for 13 families; and Christ Ministries, which builds affordable housing.

Fall feasting and nonstop entertainment fill the festival:

MUSICAL GROUPS appearing include folksinger Margaret Gravitt, Knightsong, the Panorama Steel Drum Band, the Atlanta Gay Men's Chorus, Hampton Court Minstrelcye and Lauda Musicam. There will be three organ concerts, plus authentic English cathedral evensong at the close of each day. Also performing are the Brasstown Ringers, violinist Susan Pitard and a children's Suzuki orchestra. Folksingers Jim Pugh and Linda Jordan will entertain, as will the Roswell High School Renaissance Chamber Choir and glass harmonica-player Brien Engel. Music of a more outdoors-y nature will be provided by the Yaarab Temple Pipe Band and the Dixie Hotshots. Atlanta's Royal Scottish Country Dancers and the Sourwood Morris Dancers will entertain with traditional British folk steps.

THEATRE includes juggler/mime Vince Tortorici, presenting his show "Have Vaud, Will Travel." The Society for Creative Anachronism will again present a medieval fashion show and rounds of swashbuckling in their clanking armor. Stilt walker Henry Huggler will tower over the festival grounds.

THE CHILDREN'S AREA, always a hit at the festival, will feature crafts, games, hair braiding and face painting, and an inflated castle walk.

FOODS include fish and chips; wine, cheese and fruit; beer and ale at the Dirty Duck Tavern: plus some American additions; hot dogs, ice cream, and barbecue at the Boar's Head. Feasting continues with substantial fare from Knives of the Round Table, the Tudor Tea Shop and more. SALE ITEMS include a gigantic flea market, a big top full of books, and a great variety of handmade gifts. And there's an assortment of Renaissance attire, including hats. THE HANDMADE FESTIVAL QUILT, reflecting the spirit of next summer's athletic events in Atlanta. will be given away to the winner of a drawing on Sunday. A SILENT AUCTION will offer numerous items and services.

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
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
