Student Activity Period Resumes at CSC

Do you need a moment in your hectic college day to grab a bite to eat, meet with friends or just take a breather? As of January 2, you can; the student activity period has been reinstated at Clayton State. College President, Dr. Richard Skinner, approved the 40 minute activity period after plea and petition from the Student Government Association (SGA). The period lasts from 12:20 to 1:00 p.m. every day, a time during which no classes are scheduled.

According to Natalie Hynson, the SGA president, the initial motivator for bringing back the activity hour was a group of complaints by student organizations. The Black Cultural Awareness Association (BCAA), for example, had difficulties planning weekly meetings around their members' class schedules. Becky Alexander, the president of the organization, sought the help of the student government, and it was not long until the plans for bringing back the period were underway. Deborah Greer, coordinator of multicultural affairs at CSC, helped the students design a petition that would eventually prove to be effective. The SGA solicited signatures for the petition at information table in the Student Center and the C-building lobby, explaining to students that this

Regents Approve New Degree

On January 9, the University System of Georgia's Board of Regents approved a new Bachelor of Applied Science degree for CSC and three other colleges in Georgia. The program has been targeted to begin in the fall of 1996, though students already enrolled will be able to begin some course work in the spring of '96. The program will include four majors: Administrative Managment, Allied Health Administration, Dental Hygiene Practice & Administration and Technology. allotted period of time would serve first and foremost as an incentive for students to get involved in clubs, activities and events on campus.

Hynson and other SGA officers submitted the 500-signature petition to Vice President of Academic Affairs, Dr. Elliot McElroy, and a board of CSC deans. "They asked use to devise a matrix plan for the proposed activity period," Hynson said, but after battling with a complex plan, the SGA gave the responsibility back to the administration. It was not long until Dr. Skinner intervened and made the activity hour his top priority. "[The students] were the motivators, and when we needed him, Dr. Skinner stepped in and made it happen," the SGA leader commented.

Clayton State Continues Fast-Growing Pace

CSC has been named the fastest growing college in the University System of Georgia, according to a recent report from the System's Office of Research and Planning.

Clayton State not only increased its student headcount totals during the 1995 fiscal year, but also the number of quarter credit hours taken by those students. The College enrolled 16,444 students during the four quarters of the fiscal year, starting with the Summer Quarter of 1994 and ending with the Spring Quarter of 1995.

The 4.2 percent increase in head count totals helps boost the College to a System-wide lead in total credit hours taken. CSC students took 164,422 credit hours during the quarter, increasing by 9.2 percent over the previous year. The next closest percentage increase was 5.6 percent reported by Valdosta State University, one of two regional universities in the 34-member University System. West Georgia College reported a 4.5 percent increase to rank second behind CSC among the 13 four-year colleges.

Clayton State's enrollment exceeded the 5,000-student level for the first time during the Fall Quarter with 5,020 students attending credit degree classes. Comparison figures with other University System institutions are not available, but CSC's fastest growing trend is sure to continue.



Twenty-year-old Holly Chatham is proof that Clayton State College students really perform.

Already a senior at Clayton State, Holly has accomplished more in twenty years than some do in a lifetime. At an early age Holly traveled to New York to study dance with the Geoffrey Ballet, one of the most prestigious dance companies in the world. Soon finding that music was her passion, she began studying the piano, organ and harpsichord.

Since then, Chatham has been chosen as a finalist in the Stravinsky International Competition, won the State Literary Competition for piano and performed in the "Pianorama" at the Fox Theater in Atlanta. In 1992, she was chosen by her high school teachers to be the recipient of the esteemed Steinway Scholarship.

Upon receiving the Steinway Scholarship, Holly made the decision to skip her senior year and join the Clayton State College music program. "I chose to skip my senior year because George Lucktenberg was teaching piano at the time," Holly says of her decision. "He was instruments that I couldn't pass up the oppurtunity...I made that decision and haven't regretted it for a minute." Lucktenberg, who no longer teaches as Clayton State, is an internationally-recognized performer, scholar and curator of keyboard instruments. An expert in historical keybords, Dr. Lucktenberg now serves as director for the Southeastern Historical Keyboard Center. Indeed, Holly says one of her favorite aspects of the Clayton State music program is the exceptional teaching staff.

After Holly graduates in May, she plans to either attend graduate school or travel to Europe to study forte piano. She hopes to eventually teach in a conservatory or on the college level. Presently, she continues to perform in a variety of venues, and is an outstanding example of Clayton State College excellence.

a college-wide plan to improve recruitment and retention efforts. The office includes admissions and records, student life, counseling services, career services and financial aid. As a senior executive of the College, Dr. Thompson will be responsible for all areas of the new organization. "My personal approach to leading the enrollment management process at Clayton State College is based on a respect for the knowledge and work of the specialists in the various function areas," Dr. Thompson said. "By bringing together these services, you integrate related functions to achieve the optimum recruitment, retention and graduation of students."

Dr. Thompson has served Georgia Southern as assistant dean of students since 1984, where she is administratively responsible for judicial affairs, drug abuse, prevention programs, new student and parent programs, off-campus programs, multi-cultural programs, volunteer services and student publications. She also is an assistant professor in the Department of Student Development Programs.

Prior to joining Georgia Southern, she served as the associate dean of students at Berry College (1980-84), and held a number of positions as a graduate assistant and counselor at the University of Georgia (1976-80). Earlier she taught English in Glynn County and served as counselor and panhellenic advisor at Georgia Southern.

Thompson earned a bachelor's degree from Wesleyan College and both a master's degree and an education specialist's degree in guidance and counseling from Georgia Southern. She received her doctorate in counseling and human development services from the University of Georgia in 1980.

Thompson replaces Dr. Faye T. Barr, Professor of sociology, who has served as acting Dean and head of the search committee since the reorganization.

Clayton State and Hartsfield Train for the 21st Century


Clayton State College and Hartsfield Atlanta International Aiport have united to create what is to be the "largest continuing education course ever offered in a defined time frame," according to the Washington D.C. -based National University Continuing Education Association (NUCEA). The CSC Continuing Education Center has created a unique customer service training program for the 38,000 employees of Hartsfield. The course will cover such topics as: the fundamentals of customer service. listening and communicating, and dealing with conflict and special customer needs, as well as employee-related issues such as managing stress, team building and creating excellence in the workplace. The program was designed to train employees for the eight month period leading up to the Summer Olympic Games, however the program will allow the nations's busiest air hub to better serve both its Olympic visitors and future passengers well into the 21st century.

"Our goal is to install a renewed spirit of customer service, so that passengers can be afforded a high level of service no matter who the employee works for," adds Angela Gittens, aviation general manager at Hartsfield of the "Customer Delight is the Heart of Hartsfield" program.

"This program will be a long-term Olympic legacy for both the airport and millions of visitors to Atlanta," says Dr. Bryan Edwards, director of the CSC Continuing Education Center. "It's also the first effort by a world-class airport to systematically train all its people to serve its customers more effectively."



The 24th annual Agnes Scott Wrters' Festival will take place March 21 and 22, 1996.
Distinguished guests will include Alicia Ostriker (The Imaginary Lover, Stealing the Language), Philip Lopate (Bachelorhood: Tales of the Metropolis, The Rug Merchant), and Joy Williams (Breaking and Entering, Taking Care). These three writers will give public readings, judge finalist entries in the festival competition, and conduct private workshops for contest finalists.

The Writers' Festival competition in poetry, short fiction, and the personal essay is open to anyone currently enrolled in a graduate or undergraduate program in a Georgia college or university. Works submitted must be previously unpublished except in campus literary magazines. Finalist entries will appear in the festival magazine; authors retain all rights to their material and may publish it elsewhere after the competition.

Each entrant may submit up to five poems, up to two short stories, and up to two essays. (The editors define the personal essay as a form of nonfiction rooted in the author's experience but extending to topics or issues of general interest.)

Entries must **be** typed, and entries in short fiction and the personal essay must be double-spaced. Stories must **be** no longer than 100 lines. A prize of \$100 will be awarded for the best work in each category.

Submit two copies of each work; the author's name must not appear on either copy. With each work include a standard 3 x 5 index card bearing the author's name, address, phone number, and

Georgia Council for the Arts Solicits Groups and Artists for Touring Roster

The Georgia Council for the Arts (GCA) will accept applications through February 15 for its state Touring Roster for 1997-98. The Roster is open to groups and individuals in all artistic disciplines who can tour exhibitions, performances, readings and other arts programming.

Individual artists must be legal residents of Georgia who are not full-time students. Groups can be incorporated or unincorporated, but they cannot be student organizations, and they must be based in Georgia. Guidelines and applications, which will include reference forms, are available from the GCA by calling (404) 651-7920. Applications will be reviewed on the basis of artistic excellence and sufficient staff and experience to manage a tour.

The application process selects groups and individuals which offer high-quality arts programming for listing on the state Touring Roster from which potential presenters may select. Listing on the Roster does not guarantee selection by a presenter. Potential presenters in this program must select an artist or group from at least 40 miles away, because this program is designed to share the artistic resources of one community with another.

The GCA is a state agency whose mission is to encourage excellence in the arts, to support its many forms of expression and to make the arts available to all Georgians by providing funding, programming and other services.




Foundation Honors Trustee Born

Born began work at Beaudry Ford on Jan. 15, 1946, as a billing clerk and worked his way through the ranks to the top. He became President and Owner in 1966, and continues to lead the nation's largest Ford sales and leasing agency, 50 years from the day he joined the company. He was the 1973 national winner of Time Magazine's Quality Dealer Award and entered the distinguished Automotive Hall of Fame in 1994.

Among his many community activities has been a lifetime involvement with the Boy Scouts of America, along with his work on the local, state and national levels with his church. At the young age of 31, he became the fifth President of the Clayton County Chamber of Commerce in 1958.

Born's affiliation with Clayton State College dates back to 1974 when the College chartered its Foundation. He has served as the Foundation's only Chairman, being reelected to the position each year by his fellow Trustees.
