


A Sad Farewell

Good luck with everything, Michelle! *The Bent Tree* staff will miss you.




Michelle Lawrimore at the beginning of her Bent Tree career



The Gospel According to "Jaw-Jaw."

Sir Winston Churchill, was one of the greatest wartime leaders Great Britain had ever given to the world. Lately, newspaper and other media news speak volumes daily about the fact that violence has become the order of the day in contemporary societies. It appears

"jaw-jaw" has been relegated to the passenger's seat; whereas, "warwar" has taken over the driver's seat. Many people of late can't use their "cool" heads to solve conflicts; rather they allow their emotions to determine the course of events. Take a closer look at the Middle East, especially the conflict between the Palestinians and the Israelis. Any time they decide to negotiate (talk) peace agreements, both Israel and Palestinian Authorities achieve a lot more for their people than when they embark on "war-war." For example, the body counts on both sides are reduced, at least in relative terms. 

Decision 2004


With the next presidential election less than a year away, and the Democratic National Convention meeting this July, nine potential candidates have begun fighting for the coveted Democratic Party nomination. While each of them has built a loyal following, the polls show former Vermont Governor Howard Dean and Massachusetts Senator John Kelly as the two frontrunners. Even though they must first face a tremendous uphill battle, it appears that one of these two men will have the chance to go up against President Bush next November.

Two years ago, the idea that Bush would not be elected for a second term seemed ludicrous. With the military just beginning operations in Afghanistan and the entire country in a jingoistic fervor, Bush's approval rating soared to a record-breaking 92 percent. However, after two years of a slumping economy and with the U.S.'s current situation in Iraq deteriorating rapidly, the possibility of a new president in 2004 does not seem quite as shocking.


Of the nine candidates seeking the Democratic nomination, Howard Dean has garnered the most support. Dean's popularity with Democrats seems to stem from his public disdain for all things Bush. The cornerstone of his campaign, which also happens to be the most controversial aspect of it, is that Dean plans to repeal the Presidents 2001 tax cuts. Like Al Gore in the last election, he claims that the cuts only benefit the top two percent of the population. In the place of tax cuts, Dean hopes to establish a universal healthcare system, stabilize and protect social security, and return the nation to the balanced budgets of the 1990's.

While Dean's biggest rival, John Kerry, also believes that Bush's tax cuts are unfair, he does not think they should be completely repealed. Not wanting to alienate undecided voters who may have received checks from those tax cuts, Kerry instead proposes that they only be rolled back slightly. His plan is to take the cuts away from the wealthiest people in society and funnel the money into initiatives like better pay for public school teachers, increased Medicaid opportunities for children and single adults, and job training for at risk youths. Despite his less drastic tax plan, Kerry still trails Dean in the polls by 14 percentage points.

Realizing that the most effective tool in running a political campaign is money, Dean and Kerry have both opted out of public campaign financing. This move eliminates the \$45 million dollar spending limit congress placed on candidates after the Watergate scandal. Dean cites the need for a more effective campaign finance reform and the fact that Bush

opted out back in 2000 and again for this election as his reasons for not accepting public financing. Kerry, afraid that Dean's newfound unrestricted spending could hurt his own campaign, has also decided not to use public money. In an interview, Kerry explained that he cannot defeat Dean in the primaries with "one hand tied behind my back." With Dean having so far raised \$25.4 million and Kerry having raised \$20 million, they still have a long way to go if they hope to match Bush's expected \$200 million.

Although Howard Dean is currently ahead in the polls, there are still eight months until the Democratic National

Convention. Also, with the Presidential primaries beginning in less than three months, Kerry could overtake Dean, or a completely different candidate could come to the forefront. Regardless of who wins the Democratic -nomination, the much more difficult task will be convincing the American people that they need a new president. If they are unable to do this, then it makes no difference which candidate raises more money than the others.

I got yelled at if I TRIED to throw away a plastic milk jug. I said yes ma'am and no ma'am and wrote thank you notes. We are taught to make monthly tithes to any place we choose to. Most of us send our money to the hospice center my dad stayed at during his last few weeks. My whole family does charity runs to benefit organizations like that.

and carpools with two of those, one going all the way to Fairburn. She grinds her own flour and makes her own bread and cooks dinner every night, not to mention makes me eat breakfast. She does laundry for three of the kids, us older ones have been doing our own since middle school. Both my 16 year old sister and I could run our own household if we so chose. My uniform has to be ironed, and I have to be on time for work. I never called in unless my life was in jeopardy. I don't comprehend life without working for what you want. And of course I was going to college. My mom got a part time job at Gap in Southlake Mall so she could get us discounts on clothing. The employees there know her as "Miss King" and recognize me when I walk in the store. She has cussed out people for talking about her kids but lets my friends come over at 12am when life at home gets too hard. She can tell you everything about her children and knows me better than I know myself. She talks to me like an equal yet also understands that I'm still not perfectly adult. She bears the brunt of the aftermath of my father's death in all of us. My mom lets my six-year-old brother wear her wedding ring because it reminds him of his daddy as he jokingly calls it "my precious."

(This kid's fascination with Lord of the Rings is a whole 'nother article!) She's told me as mad as we can make her, when she crawls into bed at night, she is grateful because we keep her going. She cries for my dad but lives for her children, she has the strength of an army, she is my role model. It's because of her that I didn't give up, it is because of her that I won't let life break me; instead I wish to make myself into someone like she is. Ask her for advice and you get a straight answer, if you don't want the truth don't ask for a lie. She exercises with me just about every day but still gets home by 2:45 so the two little kids don't have to get off the bus to an empty house. She made us get braces and forced us to brush our teeth. She married too young and said if I planned on doing so she wouldn't come to my wedding. Her mother passed away when she was 19. You cannot meet the lady and not admire her. Knowing at this point most of us have heard it all about Christmas, I guess I'd just like to mention instead why I am grateful to have a family like mine these holidays, and every other time of the year. You say I act like my mother, huh? I only can reply, "Thank you. You just paid me the highest compliment ever."

Obviously ones behavior can easily be traced to those with whom you've spent the most time.

Because I decided a long time ago I'm never going to fit in completely, I realized that one reason that made me so different from my peers was my relationship with my parents. I admire and want to be EXACTLY like my mother. I've written before of my family and about my father. Now I plan to do equal justice to the one who's left behind to pick up the pieces.

First off, she has been right about every single guy I've dated and/or liked. They were all not right for me. The reasons she had ended up being the same reasons why it didn't work out. Somehow between the ages of 13 and 25 there seems to be a trust in your own supposedly infallible

Celebrated for What?





4-5 Unpeeled Clementines or 3 Large Orange. (About 1lb in weight)
10oz Ground Almonds
1C + 2 Tablespoons Sugar
1 Teaspoon Baking Powder – Heaped
6 Eggs
8-inch Spring form Pan

Wash the clementines/oranges but do not peel them. Bring a pan of water to the boil and put them in it to simmer, making sure the water covers them totally. Allow them to simmer for approximately two hours and they will be all soft and squishy. Let them cool a little bit. Put all of the clementines/ orange whole into a blender or food processor and puree until smooth. In a bowl, beat the eggs and add the sugar and baking powder. Add the almonds a little at a time, mixing well. After all of the almonds are added, carefully stir in the pureed clementines/oranges. Take an 8-inch Spring Form pan and butter the sides, lining the bottom with wax paper. Pour the cake mixture in and bake at 375° for an hour. After the first 40 minutes, cover the cake with foil to stop the top from burning. You can leave this to cool in the pan and it will be a wonderful moist cake bursting with flavor. This is one of my all time favorites!

Tis the Season to Be Jolly: A History Of Christmas

Let's not forget a large, kind fellow with a white beard and a large, red sack filled with gifts. As far back as memory can allow, this time of year invokes such happiness in all people that will allow love in their hearts. But how did this day, of all days in the year, get to be called Christmas?

The Origin of Christmas:

The word Christmas is from the Old English route "Cristes maesse", meaning Christ's mass. As is generally known, Christmas is the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ. The birth of Christ is glorified in the Nativity story from the bible in which the Virgin mother Mary gave birth to the son of God. In America, the idea of St. Nicholas as a celebrated figure appeared in the 1770's when a Dutch family was reported to be worshipping him under the name Sinter Klaas, the shortened Dutch name for the saint. The image of Santa was drafted in 1804 when John Pintard issued carvings of Sinter Klaas on wood at a meeting of the New York Historical Society. The images were depictions of the image that we craft today of the large man with stuffed stockings of treats hung above the hearth of a fireplace. The full image was crafted in 1881, when an Episcopalian minister named Clement Clark Moore wrote "An Account of a Visit from St. Nicholas". It illustrated the sleigh, the reindeer with names, and his overwhelming desire to deliver gifts for children. The idea of Santa being a "jolly old elf" comes from this work of literature. Embracing this beacon of joy and happiness, the Salvation Army started to dress their employees in "Santa suits" in the 1890's. Armed with bells, these men attracted donations in order to pay for the charity's free meals they offer the less fortunate around this time. Before long, stores were advertising the opportunity to see a "live" Santa Claus, and thus came the shopping mall Santas.

Trees, Candy Canes, and Holly: Three Christmas symbols that come to mind are pine trees covered with ornaments, a candied stick of peppermint, and a ring of prickly holly sprigs. Each of these items contains historical significance of some fashion. Why is it that homes that celebrate Christmas have indoor, green trees and halls that are decked with "boughs of holly"? The tradition dates back to ancient Egyptian celebrations. During the winter, evergreen plants were scattered throughout households in glorification of the sun god Ra. Wintertime, known as the "solstice", came about when Ra grew ill and couldn't warm the earth. Worshippers suggested the importance of the blooming green plants to signify their god's replenished health. In Roman culture, these plants that decorated homes to mark the Saturnalia holiday marked the budding growth of the plants after the wintertime. Throughout other cultures, the evergreen plants were consistently symbolic of the growth of life in the form of praise towards sun gods that spurs growth of plants in the spring. Interestingly enough, Martin Luther is credited through folklore as being the first to decorate a Christmas tree. The famed monk of the Protestant Reformation is thought to be responsible of lights in the Christmas tree from an experience he had walking through a forest. In order to illustrate the beauty of stars peering through the branches, he brought a tree indoors and lit candles upon it. However, the first Christmas tree was not recorded until the 16th century when German people were seen with fully decorated trees in their homes.

The American tradition of Christmas trees came much later, since it was made illegal to celebrate the holiday earlier in history. What really sparked the popularity of the Christmas tree was Queen Victoria and Prince Albert's portrayal around a decorated tree in 1846. The two were very popular leaders, and their appeal sparked the surge of trees in their subject's households. After this, ornaments and other decorations were being shipped all over the world, even to America. With the coming of electricity, we were able to safely portray the lights that Martin Luther wanted to display. Now, our holly wreaths can be symbolic of the holly crown that Jesus wore upon his head during his crucifixion, while the berries can be seen as droplets of blood from his brow. Also portraying the significance of Jesus, our delightful candy canes can be seen as a shepherd's staff or the letter J. Composed of peppermint, the staff illustrates symbolism throughout each of its components; the solidity of the cane represents the rock God's church was founded on, the white shaft represents the purity of Christ, and curved in a J shape to represent a shepherd's staff.

The history of Christmas and its celebratory elements stretch back to ancient times. With each passing year, tradition is solidified and reaffirmed in these acts. Tis the Season, everyone! Embrace the spirit of Christmas (or whatever holiday that you may celebrate) and become an innocent kid again, because there is nothing more magical than the joy that sparkles in one's heart during the holiday season.

Hanukkah

Hanukkah, which means "dedication" and is also referred to as "The Festival of Lights", is a Jewish festival which begins on the Hebrew date of the 25th of Kislev and lasts eight days, through the 2nd of Tevet. This year, that corresponds to November 30th through December 7th. Hannukah commemorates the victory of the Maccabees (led by Judah) over the Hellenistic Syrians in a revolt that took place around 165 BCE (note: Jews use BCE-Before the Common Era and CE-the Common Era instead of BC and AD). The victory in itself was considered a miracle, but Jewish legend gives an additional explanation for Hanukkah rituals, explained below. Once the Temple Mount in Jerusalem had been reclaimed, the Temple had to be rededicated. According to legend, only one jar of sacramental oil was found, enough for one day. Miraculously, the oil burned for eight days, thus the eight days of Hanukkah. The most important Hanukkah ritual is the candle lighting. Jews light candles in a special candleholder called a "menorah" or a "hanukkiah". Each night, one more candle is added. The middle candle, called the "shamash", is used to light each of the other candles and it is lit every night. Therefore, on the first night of Hanukkah, two candles are lit (the shamash and the candle for the first night) and on the last night, there are nine lit candles. It is traditional to eat foods fried in oil during Hanukkah. Some common foods are potato latkes and "sufganiot" (jelly doughnuts). Another tradition is to play the "dreidel" game. A dreidel is a four-sided top. On each side is a different Hebrew letter: peh), corresponding to the words in the sentence "nes gadol haya po" ("A great miracle happened here"). Of course, the miracle happened in Israel, so outside of Israel, the) for "nes gadol hava sham" ("A great miracle happened there"). The dreidel is used for a gambling game in which each letter represents a different amount of money (or whatever...) won or lost. Another common Hanukkah practice is giving gifts or "gelt" (money) to children. In Hebrew, "gelt" is called "d'mei Hanukkah". In Israel, Hanukkah is a very festive time. Schools are out for a week and there are lots of parties and special events around the country. We sing Hanukkah songs (like the one playing in the background), eat lots of fattening food and have lots of fun!

Yule

Also known as: Yuletide, Alban Arthuan, Winter Solstice marks the longest night of the year. It is from this point that the days begin slowly to become longer and longer. The sun is at its most southeastern point over the Tropic of Capricorn in the northern hemisphere and has no apparent northward or southward motion. In the time of the ancient tribes this was a time of celebration, for it meant the turning point of winter and the eventual return of spring. Yule is the time when we honor the Goddess for giving birth to the sun once more. It is the time when the Oak King is victorious over the Holly King. The Holly King represents death and darkness that has ruled since Samhain, and the Oak King represents rebirth and life. The waning (diminishing) sun is overtaken by the waxing (increasing) sun, thus the days become longer after the victory of the Oak King. Yule is a time when we do Rituals and celebrate the increasing daylight, to renew, and to see the world through the eyes of a child. Spells done at Yule tend to raise our spirits, and bring harmony, peace, and joy. During Yule we see the wisdom of past experience begin to glimmer. The experiences we yielded over the harvest season of the times gone past begin to be reborn as wisdom, new light, to guide us further down the Paths we have chosen. It is customary for Witches to decorate the Yule tree, and adorn the house with holly, ivy and pine. This is the eve when the Yule log from the previous year is burned in the fire. Symbolic of the newborn sun, each year's Yule log is of oak, charged in a Magic Circle and kept in sacred space the following Yule. This not only celebrates the oak and places it in a place of distinguished honor, but also ensures there will be fuel for the remainder of Winter.

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State University, Long Beach, created Kwanzaa in 1966. After the Watts riots in Los Angeles, Dr. Karenga searched for ways to bring African-Americans together as a community. He founded US, a cultural organization, and started to research African "first fruit" (harvest) celebrations. Karenga combined aspects of several different harvest celebrations, such as those of the Ashanti and those of the Zulu, to form the basis of Kwanzaa. The name Kwanzaa is derived from the phrase "matunda ya kwanza" which means "first fruits" in Swahili. Each family celebrates Kwanzaa in its own way, but celebrations often include songs and dances, African drums, storytelling, poetry reading, and a large traditional meal. On each of the seven nights, the family gathers and a child lights one of the candles on the Kinara (candleholder), then one of the seven principles is discussed. The principles, called the Nguzo Saba (seven principles in Swahili) are values of African culture which contribute to building and reinforcing community among African-Americans. Kwanzaa also has seven basic symbols which represent values and concepts reflective of African culture. An African feast, called a Karamu, is held on December 31. The candle-lighting ceremony each evening provides the opportunity to gather and discuss the meaning of Kwanzaa. The first night, the black candle in the center is lit (and the principle of umoja/unity is discussed). One candle is lit each evening and the appropriate principle is discussed.

2 eggs

6

1 cup chopped nuts (pecans or walnuts are best)
 1 cup softened butter (at room temp.)
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup all purpose (plain) flour
 6 oz. chocolate chips
