

## The Great SLAC Debate

If you have attended Clayton State for more then a semester, then you likely know of the existence of the Student Life Activities Committee, commonly abbreviated as SLAC. What you may not know if what the purpose and activities of this committee is and what role it plays on campus.

And this is where the debate begins, as many students will attest to. An unnamed SLAC representative was quoted as saying that the purpose of the group is to "... bring diverse activities to campus" and the official website for the committee states that the purpose is to "... to provide programs of a cultural, recreational, social, and educational nature to the Clayton College & State University community."

The question must therefore be asked, is SLAC performing their duties and fulfilling their purpose? The answer is an overwhelming no, and one that has brought a multitude of reactions from various students interviewed on campus.

How can such a statement be made though? A quick examination of SLAC's recent activities will show that they have sponsored a number of events around campus including various movie nights, a comedy show, fashion show and variety show in the recent months. However, how many of these events have truly appealed to the student body as a whole? With the exception of the movie showings, it is a certain fact that the other events have appealed to a very narrow demographic of the student body.

For example, the socalled "Variety Show" last semester was a disgrace to both the campus and the student body. Not only was it poorly planned, it also featured only a single non-black performer. What kind of representation is this? How can this be allowed to be a campus sponsored event.

Other events on campus have been the same, including the recent comedy show, which featured an entire cast of black performers.




Some may say that these were the only performers available, but anyone who is a clear-thinking individual will know the truth.

Other events are the same, with little to no racial diversity, and often poorly planned events that often times are not worth the time and effort to attend. A recent egg hunt on campus was not only confusing, but scarcely advertised. Once again this is a clear signal of the negligence of SLAC.

As anyone could tell you, the student body at the school is quite diverse, with a large amount of minority and exchange students as well as white, African-American and Hispanic races also being prevalent. The activities sponsored by SLAC however focus primarily on the urban and African-American demographics within the school, which while prevalent is not an overwhelming majority of students on campus. If racial diversity is common on campus, then why are the activities not also representing said diversity? Why is that at nearly every event, the same music, from Usher, Little John and Nelly is always broadcast?

One must look no further then the office of SLAC itself. At any given time, an observation of those within the office will reveal a complete underrepresentation of anybody other then African Americans. Is it because SLAC does not accept them? There have been reports of harassment due to race within the very office. Another explanation lies in the slate of activities scheduled, as few people will have any interest in joining unless the fit the narrow demographic catered to by SLAC.


**First place:** "A Clever Affair via the Tedious Grading of English Papers" by Will Melton

National Poetry Month was kicked off on Wednesday, March 30, with Clayton State's Poetrypalooza, a student poetry contest featuring works by students in this year's edition of Cygnet, Clayton State's annual literary arts magazine. Performance poet Ayodele Heath, who was present at the Poetry Slam held this past September, judged the poetry.

The Academy of American Poets proclaimed April as National Poetry Month in 1996. National Poetry Month (NPM) serves to "bring together publishers, booksellers, literary organizations, libraries, schools, and poets around the country to celebrate poetry and its vital place in American culture" (Academy of American Poets). There are readings and events held nationally in celebration of the growing world of poetry.

Clayton State will be taking part in the celebration. The Faculty/Staff poetry night, which will be held on April 11 at 7 PM in G-132, will showcase poetry written by our very own faculty and staff. In addition, this event will celebrate the launch of the aforementioned literary arts magazine, Cygnet.

There are also events off campus. As part of the Poetry at Tech program, Robert Bly and Heather McHugh, published poets, will be reading at The LeCraw Auditorium on Georgia Tech's campus at 7 PM on April 7. This event is free to the public. On Sunday April 10 at the Norcross Barnes & Noble, there will be an Open Mic poetry reading hosted by Lisa Allender. On Tuesday, April 12, at 7 PM, there will be a poetry workshop at Jake's Ice Cream on Highland Avenue. On Friday, April 15, at 8 PM, there will be an All Women's Open Mic Night at Charis Books and More. In addition, there will be a reading by David Bottoms, Alan Shapiro, and Natasha Trethewey on April 25 at the Woodruff Arts Center. 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

#### Love for Hire vs. The Date Doctor

Several movies made it big recently and two of them were the romantic films The Wedding Date and Hitch. The Wedding Date, starring Debra Messing and Dermot Melroney, is the classic chick flick. The plot is completely predictable: a pretty, slightly clumsy girl is recovering from a broken heart, meets an incredibly handsome guy with whom she is "just friends" at first, they fight, she realizes she's in love, and ... I'm going to save the ending for those who haven't seen the movie, but just know that it is an utterly textbook plot. There are, however, some poignant scenes with excellent dialogue, and several moments of overwhelming humor. The actors are both funny and believable in their roles, pulling the audience into their story despite the ordinary plot. Overall, this movie was interesting and will make a very good movie rental for a rainy Saturday night, complete with chocolate-chip cookie dough ice cream and girl talk. It is not, however, a good date movie - unless a guy has a secret crush on Debra Messing. In contrast, Hitch was entertaining, smart, and hilarious. Starring Will Smith, Kevin James, and Eva Mendez, this is the ultimate date-worthy chick flick, if there actually is such a thing. Will Smith plays Alex Hitchens, a "date doctor" who helps guys get the girl they like - yet he can't get the girl he likes for himself. The dialogue is quick, intelligent, and funny, the characters' situations are original and hysterical, and the characters themselves are beyond endearing. Best of all, the plot is not typical – although the ending is not a true stretch of the imagination. Both movies took a very unique approach to the topic of love and relationships. The love scene in The Wedding Date seemed out of place, like the writers put it there just to have a love scene in the film. There didn't appear to be any reasoning or communication between the characters before the scene to set the story for it. On the other hand, every kiss, every hug, and every sexual advance in *Hitch* is timely, fitting, and enhances the storyline. If *The* Wedding Date is just a good movie (and it truly is worth the money to see), then Hitch is a brilliant one. The writers leapt outside of the box when writing this script and the actors brought it to life. It's a guaranteed hit for a date, because the romance is not sappy or unrealistic. Instead, it is hilarious, creative, and fun. What The Wedding Date lacks in originality, Hitch makes up for a hundredfold. So next Friday night at the movie theater, remember you have a choice: just another chick flick that is funny but not very memorable, or a truly brilliant comedy about love, relationships, and the intricacies of everything in between.

#### Featured Genre: REB and Hip-hop

This month, the world of R&B and hip-hop is extremely busy, and it's full of controversy, fresh voices, new collaborations, and more music from reliable favorites. Hot 97, the well-known New York radio station, is dealing with the repercussions of unsympathetic comments and jokes made regarding December's tsunamis. The "Miss Jones in the Morning Show" featured a parody of "We are the World," called "The Tsunami Song," which included offensive and insensitive lyrics; after the song aired, Miss Info (of Best Week Ever) immediately expressed disapproval and was answered with racist comments from her fellow DJs. The parties involved have been temporarily suspended and each lost a week's pay, which will in turn be donated to the tsunami relief efforts. As far as real music, it seems that molding "protégés" has become a profitable pastime for such respected artists as Dr. Dre and Kanye West, as both have recently produced debut albums of new artists. Dre's protégé, the Game, released his first album, The Documentary, mid-January, and it carries impressive collaborations featuring 50 Cent, Snoop Dogg, and Busta Rhymes. West's protégé, John Legend, appeals to a more R&B style and has already received excellent reviews from critics with Get Lifted; like the Game, Legend's debut includes the influences of many established artists and features notable tracks with Snoop Dogg and even West himself. Aside from chaperoning John Legend into stardom, however, Kanye West is involved in numerous other projects. West has been working with Lauryn Hill

on her long-awaited sophomore solo CD, as well as with John Mayer for tracks on his own sophomore CD, Late Registration, which is due out in the spring. Hill and West seem to be a perfect musical match, as both incorporate strong spiritual tones into their songwriting, and neither shies away from honesty and authenticity. Hill's 1998 solo debut, The Miseducation of Lauryn Hill, won five Grammy's, but her MTV Unplugged 2.0 special, and CD of the same name, proved even more impressive - (particularly tracks such as "Water" and "Oh Jerusalem.") West's initial venture, The College Dropout, was equally successful, establishing a firm fan base for the new artist, as well as a fearlessly spiritual reputation. As a result of his busy year, Kanye West is up for ten Grammys on the February 13<sup>th</sup> show, only rivaled by Alicia Keys, who is nominated for eight. Queen Latifah is slated to host, and the show will include a tribute to Ray Charles, who is posthumously nominated for several awards. Keys, recognized in categories such as Album of the Year and Best Female R&B Vocal Performance, is scheduled to perform at the awards as well; she'll also be bringing her music to the Bell Auditorium in Augusta, GA on February 27th and tickets are on sale now. Another tour in the works for 2005 is a possible collaboration between Eminem, 50 Cent, and Linkin Park. The initial idea for the tour emerged late last year, but is gaining increasing interest and could potentially prove to be one of the largest shows of 2005.



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#### **Entrees and Entertainment: Café TuTu Tango**

If you've never been to Café TuTu Tango in Atlanta, you are missing out on one of the most entertaining and culturally engaging dining experiences that Atlanta has to offer. I have only been to the restaurant a few times, but each time has been unique. The atmosphere always proves to be more fun than any other restaurant I've been to, and the entertainment is just as impressive as the food. The restaurant is designed to be reminiscent of an artist's loft in Barcelona, and the color scheme and layout reflect the thematic intentions; for example, the design incorporates many bright colors, exposed piping in the high ceiling, and metal-railed staircases leading to tables on different levels. To further enhance the environment, Café TuTu Tango invites artists to come paint in the restaurant while the costumers dine and observe. The walls are covered in art and everything is for sale, providing the opportunity to obtain a beautiful, one-of-a-kind piece of art at a fairly reasonable price. Browsing for art is a great way to pass the time while you wait for your food, but once it arrives, you'll be thoroughly engrossed in the cuisine. The entire menu is comprised of multi-ethnic appetizers; it's recommended that you go with a large group, order several different things, and sample a little of everything. However, it's a great place for just two people as well; it's easier to share dishes and to keep track of the bill - (in a group, it's easy to get carried away) - and the culturally rich surroundings supply continuous interesting conversation. Often, the staff will pace the food, bringing you just one or two of your dishes at a time, so you can savor the night. Some may assume appetizers mean small portions, but a couple of egg rolls here, a few stuffed mushrooms there, and a slice of gourmet pizza later, I guarantee you'll be full. In addition to the delicious food, the restaurant also boasts an impressive collection of wine, which earned the award for "America's Best Wine List" in 2003. There are even two full bars which can cater to every beverage desire - one on the main floor and one on the top floor. The entire top floor can actually be rented out for parties, which can accommodate large groups and provide the feel of privacy while preserving the view of the entertainment. Often, guests can watch performances of various types of Latin dancing while they eat, including salsa, meringue, and appropriately enough, the tango; they even offer lessons periodically. In addition to the food, the art, and the dancing, the restaurant provides several other unique touches, such as a palm reader; she's situated in an intimate corner of the restaurant, so pay her a visit for a glimpse into the future, or at least for a good laugh. Georgia is one of only three states in the U.S. that is home to this superior restaurant - (Florida and California are the other two), and we're lucky to have such a convenient location. So, the next time you head into Atlanta for entertainment, consider having dinner at Café TuTu Tango.



#### Satisfying the Appetite and the Account

If you're looking for a great local place to eat, then there is a perfect restaurant right down the street from the Clayton State campus on Tara Blvd: Graffiti's; for the people that live a little further to the south, there is another one located in Stockbridge near the Wal-Mart. Graffiti's is great if you are looking to get something to eat and just wind down after classes, or if you are just going out with your friends. The atmosphere is very casual, and the restaurant actually has graffiti on the walls; at the one in Stockbridge, it is even encouraged that you leave a little note on the walls in the bathroom. Graffiti's is one of the best pizza places in the area. The food is great and the service is just as good. The menu offers a wide variety of food - not only pizza, but they also serve a wide variety of pastas. If you are really hungry, you should try a calzone, which is basically a medium pizza without sauce folded in half over itself. Also, the cheese pretzels are excellent, and if you have a sweet tooth and room left over after the meal, you can try some of their cheesecake as well. The restaurant is a fun place to go and provides some entertainment; they have free trivia at 7:00 on Sundays at the location in Stockbridge and at 7:30 on Thursdays at the Tara Blvd. location. However, if you're looking for a more upscale evening, consider heading into the city. Atlanta is a growing metropolis with many places for entertainment, and obviously, many wonderful restaurants to eat at. The heart of the entertainment is in Midtown, and no matter if you are going with the guys to see a ball game or taking your lady out for a night on the town, Atlanta is where you go. One restaurant that I recently had the pleasure of dining at for the first time is The Old Spaghetti Factory. The restaurant is very aesthetically pleasing and located in Midtown. When you first walk into the restaurant, you notice the plush lobby and the accompanying bar. If you're with a date, you might be thinking that you're going to spend more than you planned at this point, but that is not the case here either. The rest of the restaurant is designed very well and looks like an old train station. After the wait, which was not that bad for a restaurant in Midtown on a Friday night - (about 35 minutes for a party of three), we were seated in a comfortable booth. The service here is great. All the waiters have assistants, which means that if you're like me and drink about three to four glasses of tea before the meal even arrives, your glass will always be full. The wait staff is very nice and provides great service. The menu here can seem a little limited, mainly to pastas, but you were not expecting seafood at a place called The Old Spaghetti Factory. The Chicken Parmesan is excellent and would be my recommendation to anyone going. The meals contain large portions and all come with a choice of soup or salad and a dessert after the meal. You get a lot more food that you imagine you would just by looking at the price - about \$10 or \$11 per person if you were wondering. So gentleman, if your looking for a place to take a date out on a Friday night, before going to the clubs or wherever, head up to The Old Spaghetti Factory in Midtown.

Follow the directions on the box for the pancake mix, add the mashe up bananas and smashed up pecans. Mix, and ladle the mix onto a hot frying pan. \*Cook's note: The trick to perfect round pancakes is pouring all the batter in the same spot and letting it roll out to a complete circle.

Does she prefer a yummy dinner? Well you're in for more work then! Try Penne with Arugula and Walnut Pesto

1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil, eyeball it
2 cloves cracked garlic
12 ounces arugula, stems removed
1/2 cup walnut pieces or 2/3 cup walnut halves, toasted
1/4 teaspoon ground or grated nutmeg
Salt and pepper
1/2 cup grated Parmigiano-Reggiano
1 pound penne rigate (with lines) pasta
1/3 pound fresh green beans, cut into thirds

In a small saucepan over medium heat cook garlic in oil 5 minutes, then remove pan from stove top. Fill the food processor with arugula, loosely packed. Add walnuts and 1/2 of the warm oil and both cloves of garlic to the arugula in the processor. Add nutmeg, salt and pepper to the processor bowl, set lid in place and pulse grind the mixture into a thick paste. Add any remaining arugula to the processor and grind into the paste by pulsing the processor again. Transfer arugula paste to a large pasta bowl. Stir in the remaining oil and the cheese. Taste pesto sauce and adjust seasonings.

While cooking penne to package directions for al dente, watch the time. After about 6 minutes, add green beans to the pasta pot. The beans will cook along with pasta the last 2 or 3 minutes. Drain pasta and beans together in a colander then transfer hot pasta and beans to the pasta bowl with the pesto in the bottom. Toss pasta and beans with pesto for 2 to 3 minutes to combine and evenly coat the pasta and beans with the pesto sauce. Serve immediately.

The CLEP (College-Level Examination Program) can allow students the opportunity to shorten the amount of time it takes to get a degree. You can earn college credit for 37 subjects by taking a 90 minute computerized CLEP test. CCSU accepts credit for 25 different subjects if a score of 50 or more is achieved. The College- level examination Program offers tests ranging from American Literature to Principles of Management. The exam allows you the option of taking a test in lieu of a semester of classroom sessions. The cost is \$75 for each exam, \$85 for exams requiring an essay. Compared to the cost of tuition fees and time, Ms. Sharon Long—Director of the testing center— wants more students to know about the great opportunity CLEP testing have to offer.

Why take CLEP exams? By taking one or more CLEP exams in your strong subjects, you can ..

- Save time. Why not get college credit for what you already know! Be rewarded for what you've learned through independent study, advanced high school courses, noncredit adult courses, or professional development.
- Save mulah (money, that is). Compare the cost of a CLEP exam, just \$55, to hundreds even thousands of dollars in tuition.

Students may register for the various CLEP exams in the Testing Center. When attending an exam, students must bring appropriate identification, preferably with a picture and signature.
