Though many media outlets asked the question, "Is this country ready for a black president?" voters were not discouraged, and instead came out in record numbers to declare that they were indeed ready.


With this new chapter in history being written, one can't help but wonder what trials will face the newly elected President.




Welcome to the Student Activities Center- 'SAC'

Confessions, of a McCain Supporter

"My President is black."

In the aftermath of the election I've seen those words printed on T-shirts, in news articles, and broadcast over the radio. The night of the election one CSU student's Facebook status reflected Obama's victory when she exclaimed that her president was black, and to "take that, McCain supporters." In a post-election interview, African American poet Maya Angelou said that when visiting foreign countries, she no longer has to be ashamed of being an American because Barack Obama's ascension to the presidency is a symbol of our country's transcendence of racism.

The first oppressed people of the United States were inarguably Native Americans. Slavery epitomized the oppression of African Americans. Throughout the years immigrants have faced similar mistreatment. During World War II, Japanese Americans were held in internment camps. Currently, Hispanics, Asians, and Latinos experience discrimination similar to that of African Americans, and are underrepresented in our government. After congratulating fellow students on Obama's victory, another CSU student commented on Facebook that he hoped Asians and Latinos would experience similar victories. His statement represents a sentiment shared by many that one man's victory does not eradicate all the subjugation that persists in America.

Martin Luther King, Jr. said, "there is no place for misguided emotionalism," and yet in the same breath that African Americans claim victory in the election of Barack Obama, there is also a tacit accusation of racism toward those that voted for John McCain. Many McCain supporters, myself included, simply followed the advice of Dr. King when he implored that men "be judged on the basis of the content of their character, and not the color of their skin." As someone that is pro-life, believes in trickle down economics, lower taxes, and a smaller government, John McCain was the better choice for me, although it is worth noting he was not my first choice. Had John McCain been black, and Barack Obama been white, my vote would have still been for McCain. For me, this was not a race about race, but a careful decision about who was better qualified for the job.


Despite feminist leanings, I am staunchly prolife, and John McCain took on a pro-life stance during his campaign. During his tenure as senator, Barack Obama voted against bills that would have provided medical treatment to babies that survived abortions. His reasoning was that there were already laws in place to protect babies that survive abortions. However, as an Illinois senator, the laws he voted against would have closed loopholes in the current laws. As a matter of conscience, I could not overlook his vote on this matter.

President-elect Barack Obama proposes one trillion dollars in new spending, and that money has to come from somewhere. He stated throughout his campaign that he would not raise taxes on the middle class. If he allows the Bush tax cuts to expire in 2010 (something he is expected to do), then he will not technically be raising taxes on the middle class. Nevertheless, the expiration of the Bush tax cuts will bring about an increase in taxes for middle class Americans. Obama's presidentelect web site www.change.gov further explains his tax policies. He wants to eliminate income tax on the elderly. He also wants to give a tax credit of \$4000 toward tuition for college students that perform 100 hours of community service per year that they are in school. In 2006 there were roughly

20 million college students. If 20 million college students perform the required hours of community service, the total owed them in the form of a tax credit amounts to 80 billion dollars. Obama has stated he will simply tax the rich in order to pay for his proposals. When businesses (large or small) are taxed at higher rates they raise the cost of goods, and eliminate jobs, in order to cover the increase. So, while Obama has stated that he will increase taxes on the rich, it is average Americans that will pay the price.

On the matter of experience, with specific regard to foreign policy experience, Barack Obama has stated that he will meet with foreign leaders without pre-conditions. During a time in which anti-Bush Americans seem to place extraordinary importance on the opinions of foreign leaders,

France's president, Nicolas Sarkozy, recently stated that Obama's views on Iran are "utterly immature," and, "formulations empty of all content." It seems only fair that Barack Obama be held to the same litmus test of world-opinion as George W. Bush. That Obama has not yet taken office, and is already being criticized as having an "immature" view of a country that recently threatened to use suicide bombers against the United States, and that continues to try and develop nuclear weapons, is disconcerting to say the least. Vice President-elect Joe Biden was reportedly picked as Obama's running mate to boost his foreign



Barack Obama has a history of questionable associations, and as is the case with any president I think it only fair to question those associations. Bill Ayers, a member of the domestic terrorist organization, Weather Underground, is at minimum an associate of Barack Obama. Ayers is a selfconfessed communist, and he participated in a series of anti-war bombings in the 60s and 70s. On September 11, 2001, Ayers stated that he had no regrets about his part in the bombings, and wished he had done more with regard to his violent antiwar movement. Prairie Fire, the manifesto of the Weather Underground, was written by Bill Ayers, his wife, Bernardine Dohrn, and other members of the Weather Underground. Among others, the manifesto is dedicated to "political prisoner" Sirhan Sirhan.

Sirhan Sirhan assassinated Robert F. Kennedy.

Barack Obama wrote a positive review for Bill Ayers' book, A Kind and Just Parent: The Children

of Juvenile Court, and served with him on The Annenberg Challenge Project, which sought to improve education. Ironically, the Weather Underground implored children to, "Bring the revolution home. Kill your parents." Obama not only associated with Ayers professionally, but also socialized with Ayers and his wife, which leads to another of Obama's associations, Rashid Khalidi. In addition to being a distinguished scholar, Rashid Khalidi is a known anti-Semite, and advocate for the PLO, at times speaking on behalf of the organization. Rashid Khalidi and his wife, Mona, held a fund raiser for Obama in 2000. Obama is on record as saying that he enjoyed Khalidi's company, and meals prepared by Khalidi's wife. Barack and Michelle Obama, along with Bill Ayers and Bernardine Dohrn, attended a party for Rashid Khalidi in 2003. In the last few weeks

> of the presidential campaign, it was revealed that the LA Times had a tape which showed the events of the now infamous 2003 Khalidi party. When members of the press demanded that the tape be turned over for public consumption, the LA Times referenced an article published in May of this year, which described what was seen on the tape. When pressed further to hand over the tape, the LA Times said they couldn't because they were protecting their source.

When asked about his associations with Ayers and Khalidi, Obama dismissed both by saying that neither Ayers nor Khalidi were advising him on policy decisions. Take

a moment and imagine a world in which John McCain frequently associated and socialized with Eric Robert Rudolph who, in his protest against abortion, bombed abortion clinics, or if McCain had befriended the authors of a book whose dedication included an assassin; imagine, for a moment, that John McCain ate dinner with, and attended parties for, someone that frequently denigrated Africa and her citizens. I doubt that McCain would be given the benefit of the doubt about those associations. One thing is for certain: If John McCain had socialized with a man that had (as Ayers did) bombed the United States Capitol, the Pentagon, the State Department, and the home of a United States Supreme Court Justice, and if McCain had befriended someone actively involved in the

denigration of Israel, I wouldn't have voted for such a man. Without sounding too cliché or token, I have fought against racism whenever I have encountered it. With great earnestness I have tried to learn and be compassionate about the very real tragedies and oppression that African Americans have faced in this country. And, yet, in the course of this election, and in its aftermath, I have been accused of being a racist simply because I supported the man I believe most qualified for the job. I find myself afraid to speak out, and yet convicted to speak up. I find myself wondering how the world would react to a "My President is white again" T-shirt after Obama's term or terms in office have expired, should a white man be elected. In the aftermath of this election I hope that the mistakes of the past will

not be repeated in ways that seem different but are

ultimately the same.



Dr. Deering Speaks on POST TRAUMATIC DISORDER

Dr. Catherine Deering, Professor of Psychology at CSU, was interviewed on August 20, for a new documentary about Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) in war veterans.

Dr. Deering is a clinical psychologist, working with patients of all ages who suffer from various psychological problems. For the last 20 years, she has been working primarily with combat veterans who have Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). 17 of those years, she was at the Atlanta VA Medical Center in Decatur.

One of her former doctoral students, who worked as an intern at the VA, recommended her to be interviewed by, independent film maker, John Clower. Clower, who has worked for over 36 years in broadcasting (at various locations such as Walt Disney, GA Power Co., and Lockheed) was interested in helping vets with PTSD, so he teamed up with long-time activist Reid Jenkins who has been affiliated with Greenpeace, Amnesty International, and the Vets for Peace chapter in Atlanta).

The untitled documentary will soon be completed and presented

to a viewing panel at GPTV for possible airing in the near future. Dr. Deering feels that it was an honor for her to contribute to this documentary and says, "It is of utmost importance that the public be made aware of what the PTSD symptoms are. Once recognized, treatment can be sought and the healing will begin."

Dr. Deering has discovered PTSD symptoms unique to each war. Some of the veterans of WWII and Korea have had heavily delayed reaction. When these veterans first returned from war, they were met with a grand welcome home; then they fell back into their respective jobs on the farm or in the business world. It wasn't until their retirement, that many of them began to suffer from a flood of repressed memories, which caused severe depression.

Many of the veterans returning from Vietnam were "unwelcome" and became addicted to drugs. The drug use was an unrecognized symptom of PTSD that caused them to self-medicate with alcohol and other substances. This caused a cascading effect that led to job loss, homelessness, and further difficulties with their families, causing chronic PTSD. Dr. Deering sees special

differences between those veterans who had fought in the jungle, as with the Vietnam vets, and those who fought in the desert, such as Desert Storm, Afghanistan, and Iraq. She also notes differences between those who fought using guerilla warfare verses those who fought from a tank. She sees many Iraq and Afghanistan veterans who suffer from head injuries caused by Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) and amputees who would

normally not survive the blast but do because of the strength of the body armor.

There had been no diagnosis for PTSD available for these veterans, until the

1980's. Even then, at times, the veterans were misdiagnosed.

Over the years, Dr. Deering has seen a tremendous change in the types of treatments that are now available to war veterans. Psychiatrists currently avoid prescribing anti-anxiety medications because it has been proven to be highly addictive. Antidepressants and psychotherapy are currently the treatments of choice for most

patients. Dr. Deering says, "The [veteran] needs to be allowed to talk about the horrors of their experience and discuss it in detail to someone who they feel is confident enough to be able to tolerate such descriptions."

When asked how she can handle such a tremendous task and responsibility she replies that is possible, "If you're dedicated and work hard at being present

-- it is painful but it's important to heal." Then adds, "And I take care of myself." She has a supportive family and system within the psychology community. She walks her dog every morning, listens to music and meditates.

Dr. Deering urges, "Anyone who might suffer or know of anyone who suffers should seek help immediately because there is help available."

THE CONSTITUTION AND CIVIC ENGAGEMENT AT CSU

Dr. Gene Hatfield is a CSU professor of History who retired this Summer after contributing 32 years to the University. Dr. Hatfield returned on Monday, September 15, 2008 to address the

campus during "Constitution Week." He shared his thoughts about the celebration during his speech appropriately entitled, "The Constitution and Civic Engagement."

Dr. Hatfield opened his speech by telling his audience, made up of students and professors, that even though it is a difficult time for America, post 9/11, it is critical that we continue to develop together as a strong, healthy nation. To meet this challenge, it is each of our responsibility to engage ourselves with the constitution, on a personal basis, as the "living, breathing document" it was created to be, by our great Founding Fathers.

Dr. Hatfield described West Virginia's Senator Robert C. Byrd's proposal to implement a holiday to recognize the United States' Constitution. Senator Byrd hopes that the holiday will help American students learn how to keep the Constitution inextinguishable in each of their lives and advise them how to apply it toward the betterment of their grand nation. Senator Byrd has also recognized the fact that many Americans are not familiar with the nation's document.

In order to promote a regeneration of patriotism, in light of 9/11, he has proposed a program that would require all Federal Agencies,

receiving Federal funds, to "celebrate the Constitution". The date that chosen to celebrate the Constitution is September 17, Citizen's Day. This holiday commemorates the day that our Founding Fathers affixed their signatures to the Constitution and submitted it for ratification. Here, at CSU, we join 230 other universities participating in a week long "Celebrate the Constitution" learning fest.

Dr. Hatfield reminded us that, "Our Founding Fathers were made up of young, energetic, experienced, educated men who... believed in a person's natural rights, not to have a monarchy, and to have limited government. This was a radical, new government, existing no where else in the world ... it was written and ratified at a critical period of history." Dr. Hatfield also stated, "It allowed risk-taking of a higher order. No one knew what this new government would be like."

In closing, Dr. Hatfield expressed his hope that even though the United States is currently experiencing tough times, that "this too shall pass." "We have a challenge," he said, "We must nurture the political process and believe again that politics are important. 9/11 reminded us of our interdependence with each other. It is [at] a time like this that we need a stable constitution in order to survive as a nation."

Dr. Hatfield was presented with a framed copy of the original document, the "Instrument of Ratification", executed by Georgia at the ratification convention.


Inside Laker Hall






Laker Hall, Clayton State's New Dormitory



Jennings paces 23rd-ranked Lakers with 17 points

NOVEMBER 11, 2008 – MORROW, GA – If Tuesday was any indication, the Clayton State Laker women's basketball team is a little ahead of the curve as the 2008-09 season is on the horizon.

Playing host to visiting Southern Polytechnic State in a preseason exhibition, the 23rd-ranked Lakers had five players reach double-figures in scoring in route to a rather easy 89-57 rout at the Athletics and Fitness Center. This is the first and only preseason exhibition for Clayton State prior to the start of the regular season this weekend.

Clayton State's full-court pressure proved to be a nightmare for the Hornets, holding Southern Polytechnic State to only 21 percent shooting from the field for the game and only a mere nine percent from 3-point range.

It was the Laker bench that provided the early spark as Clayton State wiped out a 3-point Hornet lead with a 21-4 run. Jene'e Jemison scored six points during the rally and Tanisha Woodard scored five points. Woodard's lay-up at the 11:29 mark gave the Lakers a 21-11 lead.

Southern Polytechnic State trimmed the lead to 10 points on a jump shot by Tiffany Scales with 8:17 remaining, but Clayton State answered with a 10-0 run. Dominique Jennings converted a 3-point play and then drained a 3-point basket to give the Lakers their largest lead of the first half, 37-17 with 6:36 remaining.

Clayton State's hounding defensive pressure limited Southern Polytechnic State to only five field goals in the second half and 16 percent shooting from the field. Meanwhile, the Lakers turned up the offensive intensity. They stretched a 15-point halftime lead to 27 points in the first eight minutes.

Marie St. Fort began the assault with a 3-point basket, followed by two straight lay-ups by Lisa Jackson. A jump shot by Nikkisha Pritchett as the shot clock expired gave Clayton State a commanding 63-36 lead with 12:49 remaining.

Down the stretch, Clayton State out-scored Southern Polytechnic State 15-3.

Jennings paced a balanced Laker attack with 17 points, followed closely by St. Fort with 15 points. Pritchett scored 13 points, while Jemison scored 12 points on a perfect 5-for-5 shooting from the field. Jackson added 11 points for Clayton State.

For Southern Polytechnic State, Crystal Davis scored 12 points, while Scales scored 11 points and Ray Donee' Jones, LaKiedra Harvey each scored 10 points

Clayton State officially opens the 2008-09 season this weekend in the Marriot Tip-Off Classic at Nova Southeastern.

This is the second All-Peach Belt Conference selection for Powell, a senior from Rincon, Ga. She was also an All-Peach Belt selection as a freshman in the 2005 season. This

season, Powell became the anchor of the Laker midfield with two goals and three for seven points, ranking her third on the team in scoring.

For her career, Powell played 65 games, starting all but three.

Durability is the best way to describe Tanimola, a senior from Kigo-State, Nigeria. She started 15 games this season on the Clayton State defensive backbone, serving as the defensive leader most of the time. For her career, Tanimola started every game (68), including the first 56 straight games.





CLAYTON STATE MEN Play Host to Martinique Golden Star in First Preseason Exhibition

- First of 2 Preseason Exhibition Games for Lakers prior to 2008-09 Season

NOVEMBER 6, 2008 – MORROW, GA – Clayton State men's head basketball coach Gordon Gibbons first visited the French Caribbean Island of Martinique in the summer of 1985 when he took an Under-15 American traveling team on a trip there.

It was a culture shock. There was no true gymnasium on the island, and soccer was head-over-heels the big sport in Martinique at the time.

However, as the old saying goes - "how times have changed."

"It's grown and you can feel the interest in basketball there." said Gibbons, who has had an association with basketball in Martinique over the last 22 years. "The sport has become extremely popular on the island."

Martinique will have a chance to show how far it's come on the hardwood when its top club organization - the Golden Star squares off against Clayton State in a preseason exhibition on Friday night at 7:30 p.m. at the Athletics and Fitness Center. It will be the conclusion of a week-long tour for the Golden Star against area collegiate programs and prep schools.

It's also the first preseason contest of the 2008-09 season for Gibbons' Lakers. Clayton State is coming off a thrilling 19-15 season last season, winning its first Peach Belt Conference Tournament championship and advancing to the NCAA Division II "Sweet 16" for the first time in program history.

The season-ending momentum has carried over into the preseason, as Clayton State is ranked nationally in two preseason polls. The Lakers are ranked 20th in the Division II Basketball Times Top 20, and 22nd in the Division II Bulletin preseason Top 25. In addition, Clayton State has been picked third in the 11-team race in the Peach Belt Conference preseason poll.

Gibbons has had a long relationship with the Golden Star Club, located in the Martinique capital city of Fort-de-France. In addition to the American tour for the Golden Star Senior Men's team to the Atlanta area, he also runs a camp for the Martinique juniors during the summer both at Clayton State and in Fort-de-France.

In the last 17 years, three Golden Star players have been signed by Gibbons at both Clayton State and Florida Southern.

"The Golden Star organization is managed by an outstanding group that's made an impact on the lives of many young men and women," said Gibbons. "My association with the club has been a highlight of my career."

After Friday's contest, the Lakers will play another exhibition next Friday against Baseline USA, followed by the official start to the regular season on Nov. 20 at home against in-state rival West Georgia.

NOVEMBER 5, 2008 – MORROW, GA – What is starting to become an annual event, the Clayton State Laker women's basketball team is once again getting national preseason attention.

After being ranked 21st in the Division II Preseason Top 25 for women's basketball last month, Clayton State is ranked 23rd in the USA Today/ESPN Division II Top 25 Coach's Poll, which was released on Wednesday. This marks the second straight season that Clayton State has been ranked in the Division II preseason Top 25 Coach's Poll.

Clayton State and head coach Dennis Cox is coming off a 2007-08 season in which the Lakers went 20-11 overall with a third Peach Belt Conference regular season championship in the last four seasons. In addition, the Lakers earned their fourth straight NCAA Division II National Tournament berth, advancing to the "Sweet 16." "Obviously, we have not achieved anything this season," said Cox, who is 99-30 in four seasons at Clayton State. "However, it is a great honor to be mentioned in the preseason with other elite programs in the country. It is also noteworthy that there are two other ranked teams that appear on our schedule this year.

"It certainly gives us motivation, as we try to prove ourselves worthy of this recognition."

Clayton State is one of two Peach Belt Conference teams ranked in the Division II preseason Top 25. USC Aiken is ranked 21st, while another Laker opponent for this season – Wingate – is tied for 13th, respectively.

The Lakers return three starters and seven letterwinners from last season. Clayton State opens the 2008-09 season on Nov. 15 against Barry in the Marriot Tip-Off Classic at Nova Southeastern.





NOVEMBER 7, 2008 – MORROW, GA – For the second straight season, the Freshman of the Year in men's soccer for the Peach Belt Conference will be at Clayton State. Last season, the award went to Jamal Geathers. This season, it's going to Leighton Fredericks.

Fredericks was recognized on Friday as the Peach Belt Conference released its postseason awards for men's soccer, not to mention the 2008 All-Peach Belt Conference team. All totaled, Clayton State, which went 9-5-4 overall and 3-0-3 in the Peach Belt, placed five on the All-Conference squad.

Senior midfielder Johnny Lara was a first team selection for All-Peach Belt Conference for the Lakers, while Fredericks, junior midfielder Kyle Timm, junior defender Patrick Ahern and freshman forward Matty Phillips were each second team All-Peach Belt selections.

Fredericks almost immediately became Clayton State's top scoring threat, and he was at his best in the clutch. The forward from Johannesburg, South Africa is currently leading the Peach Belt Conference in scoring with 13 goals and is second in points scored with 27.

However, Fredericks also leads the Peach Belt in game-winning goals with five. Three of those game-winners came in overtime.

Lara's selection is almost unprecedented in that he becomes only the second player ever at Clayton State to earn All-Peach Belt Conference honors three years. Lara, from Lilburn, Ga., was also selected All-Peach Belt in both 2005 and 2006, and he joins former Laker goalkeeper great Warren van der Westhuizen as Clayton State's only three-time All-Peach Belt selections.

Lara finished the season with three goals and one assist for seven points, tying him for fifth on the team in scoring. For his career, Lara played in 74 games in a Laker uniform, tying him for third all-time at Clayton State.

Timm, a junior from Johannesburg, South Africa, became the glue offensively for the Clayton State offensive attack. A former NJCAA first-team All-American at Tyler (Tex.) Junior College, Timm scored one goal with four assists for six points this season.

Ahern, from Duluth, Ga., became the main backbone to the Laker defense after transferring to Clayton State from Division I Memphis. He played in 15 games, starting the last 12 on the season, scoring two goals with three assists for seven points. Both of his goals came late in games and were game-tying goals in the process.

Phillips, from Swindon, England, developed into Clayton State's playmaker on the wing this season. He is currently tied for the Peach Belt Conference lead in assists with 10, becoming the fifth player in Clayton State history to have double-digit assist totals in a season.

CLAYTON STATE RUNNERS vie for Trip to NCAA Division II Championship Meet

NOVEMBER 5, 2008 – MORROW, GA – The Clayton State Laker men's cross country team will be among the top teams battling this Saturday for one of two qualifying spots to advance to the NCAA Division II Cross Country Championships later this month. The Lakers, along with Allison Kreutzer and Chelsea Ellis, will travel to Wingate to compete in the NCAA Division II Southeast Regional meet.

The men's team will be seeking to return to the national meet since its first appearance in 2005. It was also in 2005 that Kreutzer last ran at the Division Il cross country championship meet in which she finished 11th.

Unlike in 2005 when they won the Peach Belt Conference title, this year's Clayton State team must get past Columbus State, which won its third straight PBC title two weeks ago, while Queens University is the pre-meet favorite. Meantime, the Laker women's team will not send a full squad to the region meet for the second straight year after a disappointing eighth place finish at the conference meet.

Instead, Kreutzer will be seeking her first region title to cap a stellar career and extend her unbeaten streak to seven meets, while Ellis looks to improve her finish at region from a year ago.

"Our men's season comes down to the region meet on Saturday," said Laker head coach Mike Mead. "These guys have worked hard throughout the season. They've put together our best season record of 36-4, but three of those defeats have come against Columbus State. The only edge we have going into Saturday is that we have run on this course and Columbus State has not.

"But it's going to come down to who wants to go to nationals bad enough."

Clayton State has been led throughout most of the season by sophomore newcomer Fidelis Mutiso of Nairobi, Kenya, who was named four times as the Peach Belt "Runner of the Week." But an ankle sprain a week before the conference meet took him out of the running for the meet's individual title. Meantime, sophomore Joey Chino from Eudora, Kan., stepped up to lead the Lakers at the muddy conference meet with a second place finish and his second All-PBC honor.

It will come down to the Lakers veterans in seniors Anthony Aguilar and Au

Nguyen, along with sophomore Walid Berkhedle, the 2007 PBC "Runner of the Year" to secure Clayton State's standing for a trip to the national meet.

Aguilar, from Glendale, Ari., was the top Laker in the season-opening meet and a steady No. 2 team finisher throughout most of the season. Nguyen, from Mesa, Ari., has been the Lakers' No. 5 finisher most of the season and set a career-best in the 8K back in September, while also the current 10,000m team record holder on the track; the latter distance that will be run at region and nationals. Berkhedle, from Scarborough, Ontario, has made steady progress after a slow start to the season, finishing fifth at the recent Peach Belt meet.

"Our Top five are as solid as we have ever had," Mead said. "And Jarrid Casimir has been showing tremendous improvement in the past month that gives us a strong six."

Casimir, a sophomore from Auburn, Ga. and Cesar Valdovino, a sophomore from Bell Gardens, Calif., will make up the remaining Top 7 who will represent Clayton State on Saturday.

Kreutzer will enter the meet as the one to beat for the individual region title. The Lilburn, Ga. senior will be seeking her first region title after finishing runner-up her freshman year in 2004 when Clayton State competed in the South Region. The two-time Division II cross country All-American will also be seeking her 16th career cross country title and her third trip to the national

She may also be hard to beat on the Wingate course since she has never lost a race in four previous meets. Ellis, a sophomore from Port St. Lucie, Fla., will run in her second region meet after being the lone representative for the team in 2007.

"Allison is in top form and owns this course since she has run on it more than any other one in her career," Mead said. "Chelsea has had a good season up until the conference meet and needs to end the season on a good note. I expect her and Allison to represent us well."

Saturday's region championship will begin with the men's 10K race at 9:30 a.m. on Wingate campus course, followed with the women's 6K race at 10:30 a.m. Those teams and individuals who qualify for the national meet compete at Slippery Rock, Pa. on November 22.
