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### DR. THOMAS HARDEN TO LEAVE CLAYTON STATE AFTER 9 YEARS OF SERVICE

Dr. Thomas Harden has served as the President of Clayton State University for nine years. He helped the school grow and expand from Clayton College and State University to Clayton State University. "It's been a series of almost concurrent adventures," he says of his time here. In a little over a month, Dr. Harden will move on to his next adventure, serving as Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin Green Bay.


Before moving to Clayton State, Dr. Harden worked as a Dean at East Michigan University. After doing some Internet research on the University System of Georgia, Dr. Harden became interested

in Clayton College and State University. He decided that if the office of president came available, he would apply for it. The position posted two months later. He applied for the position, was hired, and began serving as President of Clayton College and State University on June 1, 2000.

Dr. Harden credits past presidents and faculty for giving him a lot to build on. When he came, there was a lot of expectation for Clayton State to provide more to the community and the region in terms of educational opportunities. In 2000 and 2001, he helped the university develop a vision and a strategic plan of exactly where to take the university.

Under his leadership, the university has been able to nearly triple the number of bachelor's degrees, begin to offer a fairly large number of master's degrees, and open on-campus housing. He says that the credit doesn't belong to one person, but to the cooperation of many people working together. Dr. Harden said, "It takes all of us. We all have a job to do ... every group of people have played their part."

Another thing that Dr. Harden is proud of is the physical development of the school. He and the faculty have worked hard to not only maintain but enhance the physical beauty of the campus, and to fit the buildings into what was already a part of the campus. In doing this, he continued the legacy set by previous Clayton State Presidents Harry Downs and Rick Skinner. He



quoted former Clayton State
President Harry Downs as
saying that Clayton State is "the
community's college." Both
worked to make ties with the
community and to build things to
enhance the community such as
the Clayton Place Apartments and
Gateway Village.

When asked about his regrets, Dr. Harden replied, "I don't think there are ever only good things or successful things that happen." He agrees that though Clayton State has had many successes under his leadership, they have had some failures. He adds, "In a sense they're not failures. They helped us refine our vision and refocus. Once something doesn't work, we figure out what was wrong with that idea ... and then we can regroup and be more

successful the next time we foray out into another adventure."

According to President Harden, the best part of his job was the people. He says that he has hundreds of memories that he will take with him from his administration. President Harden and his wife Cathy have attended many events during their time here including student activities, plays, lectures, concerts, recitals, and many other things. He reminisced, "We've gotten to know a lot of the students and the students recognize and know us and feel comfortable with us and we're just really pleased with that. That's been one of the most enjoyable things that we've been able to do."

When asked about his legacy, he says that he has never really thought about the legacy he will leave Clayton State. He thinks about the work that he feels is important and the work that he is about to do. "Legacy will take care of itself ... it's not for me to determine whether I'm remembered at all," he said. "I really feel fortunate to be able to do the kinds of work that I do." He remarked that his time at Clayton State has been a tremendous experience and it's one of the best atmospheres that he's ever experienced. Allow me to leave you with a quote from Dr. Harden that really stood out to me, "Clayton State is its people. It's not the buildings. It's not the parking lots, and the lights, and the furniture, and that sort of thing. That's not what the university is. Clayton State is its people. And that's why it's such a good institution. It's because we have such good people."


Dear TMA,

## CLAYTON TO CHANGE BUILDING NAMES \* Clouder University Canter offering CAMPUS by Carolyn Boone CLIRDENT NAMES

Clayton Junior College opened to 942 students on eptember 30, 9 with Dr. Harry Downs as the

founding President. In 1981, Clayton State, through cooperation with the Georgia Department of Technical and Adult Education, began offering Applied Associate Degrees and Certificates. Five years later, the Board elevated the institution to Baccalaureate status as Clayton State College, with four-year programs in Nursing and Business.

President Downs retired in January 1994 and was succeeded by Dr. Richard A. Skinner. Under Skinner's leadership, Clayton State was elevated to University status as Clayton College & State University in 1996 and became the first public University in the southeast, and one of the first in the nation, to issue notebook computers to all students.

The Clayton State campus entered into a phase of rapid infrastructure growth in 2004 with the completion of the James M. Baker

of alumnus James M. Baker in a naming ceremony the following year. A true "Center" for student life, the building contains the Lakeside Café and student dining area, state-of-the-art visual technology classrooms, offices, and enhanced learning facilities including wireless capabilities.

On May 18, 2005 Clayton State's name was officially change to Clayton State University. Later that same year, the Board approved Clayton State's first graduate degree program, the Master of Arts in Liberal Studies (MALS). Infrastructure growth reached its highest point since the initial construction of the campus when, in 2008, the University opened three new buildings: the Student Activities Center, the School of Business Building and Laker Hall, Clayton State's first on-campus housing facility. The open-air Judge Eugene Lawson Amphitheatre and the L. Jerry Eskew Stage were also dedicated in 2008.

As part of an on-going effort to better and more clearly identify the buildings on the Clayton State University campus, several buildings will soon have their names changed. Current and New Names are detailed at the right.

Remember the Student Activity Center (S.A.C)? Well, since it's been built there have been some new equipment and classes that you should know about. For those who have been left in the dark, the S.A.C building was created last year as a place for students to go to unwind with games and activities or to shed a few pounds in the fitness center.

The S.A.C fitness center currently has a state of the art gym that is available to students for free. Whether you're looking to bulk up or slim down, the fitness center is a great place to get fit and stay fit. Ms. Cindy Lauer Director of the S.A.C Fitness Center states, "When we were building the Student Activities Center we were given [a certain amount of money] to allocate to the equipment in the gym. I chose to use the best technological equipment for the gym."

The equipment center definitely is high-tech. It has 12 treadmills, 8 elliptical machines, 6 arc trainers, 5 upright bikes, 5 recumbent bikes, 2 "gaming" bikes, 5 stair climbers, and 2 rowers (and that is just the in the cardio section). The weight training system includes 25 Cybex strength machines and a full array of free weights. Don't know how to use the machines? Don't worry. The S.A.C has programs and services, such as the equipment orientation that informs students on how to effectively and safely use the new equipment.

The S.A.C also has group exercise classes and sessions for those who don't

want to do it alone or need a little help. Classes such as Kickboxing, Power Yoga, and the new Body Pump are just a few of the exercise classes offered in the S.A.C. A Few restrictions apply, such as schedule availability; cost and the semester availability. "Some of the classes offered are only offered at [certain times of the semester and based on demand]." states Ms. Lauer.

If you are more athletic and crave the outdoors, then the Department of Recreation and Wellness Outdoor Adventure Program is perfect for you. This is program is also offered by the S.A.C. Activities such as paintball, white water rafting and horseback riding are still available for 2009. Spring 2010 will offer new activities such as a ski trip to West Virginia, indoor rock climbing, hiking in Amicalola Falls, and fly fishing. If it's tournaments you want, the S.A.C. also has that. They offer tournaments in spades, tennis, badminton and volleyball.

Finally, if exercising and outdoor adventure is not your thing, then check out the S.A.C. game room. It has everything from video games to foosball. They have gaming consoles such as Nintendo Wii and Microsoft's Xbox. Since it has been created, they have added many new games. Don't want to play alone? The gaming room allows you to bring one guest so you'll never have to worry about finding a game partner.

Check it out. The S.A.C. surely has something to take your mind off your studies and maybe even improve your physical outlook while you are at it.



"Clayton State University is such a



The toughest time for Rajiv was the rigorous curriculum. "Time management has to be almost impeccable to achieve an A in the course," he said. "I had to study between 80 and 90 hours per week to achieve a 4.0 GPA for that semester."

Rajiv says his favorite professor is Dr. Benita Moore. "She was understanding, pleasant and eager to assist with any problem that I may have faced."

After graduation, he plans to continue his internship with the Fulton County Government as an IT associate and will begin his Executive Masters in Technology Management at the Georgia institute of Technology (GA. Tech) in August.

"My career goal is to effectively gain professional experience, qualifications, skills and principles through training so that I may strategically gain a competitive advantage within any market."




When asked how fans can support him and get involved, Michael replied, "By building community within the sport through communication with the athletes and attending events."

### DR. DAVID LUDLEY: PUBLISHED IN CONFLUENCE

Dr. David Ludley is known to most on Clayton State's campus as a professor of Art History and English, but many people do not know about his passion for poetry. His poem "Sundowners" was selected and published in the spring edition of Confluence, a literary publication of the Association of Graduate Liberal Studies Program. His poem is much more than an ode to his late mother as she journeyed through the difficult stages of Alzheimer's. It is also a story of trust.

Ludley explains how his relationship with his mother influenced "Sundowners": "Her Alzheimer's was a journey in itself. It was worse after she forgot who I was. When your mother forgets you, doesn't know you anymore, its a little death, as I say in my poem. My mother made possible whatever success I have now in life. Her love was unequivocal, and I loved her back. The worst part was a symptom of Alzheimer's called Sundowners Syndrome; that's why the poem is entitled "Sundowners."

Ludley continues, "This syndrome comes out at night, like a ghost in the mind. With it, one hallucinates and becomes paranoid. My poem deals extensively with that. But it goes beyond a mere look at the illness she suffered and involves issues of trust and our different conceptions of reality. It begins with an experience I had with

my first son, when he was little, involving trust, and moves into my mother's journey, her many questions, and, finally, the end, beyond the Alzheimer's."

Ludley advises students to pursue their dreams as he did, as he claims that, "It's never too late."

"It's an old line, but, truly, do what you love. If you dream of being an artist, of writing, of whatever, make time to do it. We do not know if our lives will be long or short, or if we'll even live to retirement. Do not base it on salary or what your uncle did. Base it on what really would have meaning for you in this lifetime, so that when you're old, you could look back and ask, 'What have I done that made a difference in this life, that did some good, and that meant more than a paycheck or a prestigious car' which is all 'dust in the wind' in the end and says nothing of your worth. There's nothing wrong with finally achieving your dreams when you're old, but never postpone your dreams while you're young."

Although Dr. Ludley enjoys creative writing, that isn't his only hobby. He also enjoys collecting political campaign buttons and other paraphernalia. He's even collected something with President Obama's actual signature.





With the recent success of his latest work, Ludley still has others in progress. One of his works



The Clayton State Gay-Straight Alliance would like to formally thank all the participants and the supporters of The First Annual Day of Silence. We would like to especially recognize the History Society and their members for the outstanding and generous support they provided to help us make this event such a huge success. We would also like to thank the many other organizations that helped make this event a success.

A Day of Silence was observed at Clayton State University on Thursday, April 16th from 6a.m. to 6p.m.; with over 25 participants and 50 supporters the GSA feels the First Day of Silence was a tremendous success. Participants in The Day of Silence agreed not to speak for the entire day between the hours of 6a.m. and 6p.m. This silence included a halt to not only speaking, it also prohibited cell phone usage, texting, e-mailing and other social

networking (Facebook, Twitter, etc...). In essence all communication was halted for the twelve hours during the event.

The purpose of The Day of Silence was to bring attention to the bullying, harassing, and name-calling the LGBT Community faces that ultimately silence their voices. By remaining silent for one day the participants reflected on how they have been silenced and it creates a desire to no longer be silent about LGBT harassment. As the new group emerges, their intent is to motivate, inspire, network and connect


women who are interested in Science, Technology, Engineering or Mathematics.

### REVIEW OF THE GRAPHIC NOVEL:

### WATCHMEN

President Richard Nixon is elected for a fifth term, vigilantism is outlawed, and tensions between the United States and the Soviet Union are at an all time high as a nuclear holocaust seems imminent. These events set the tone for Alan Moore's Watchmen. Originally released as a twelve-issue limited series comic book published by DC comics between 1986 and 1987, and later released as a graphic novel, Watchmen presents an alternate history in which the emergence of costumed vigilantes in the late 1930s and early 1940s have altered or impacted many historical events.

Set in 1985, the murder of government agent, Edward Blake (a.k.a The Comedian) sets the plot in motion. Working against the doomsday clock, a half-insane vigilante, Rorschach, works to uncover a plot to assassinate superheroes. However, in the midst of his investigation, he unearths a plan that may threaten millions of civilian lives.

Moore's Watchmen gives readers a chance to take a semi-realistic look at the world of superheroes in relation to our own world. Akin to Frank Miller's The Dark Knight, Watchmen addresses issues such as power, control, and identity crisis during a time in which people struggled to reaffirm their identity after three

decades of immense change. Eliminating the campy elements of comics in the past, Watchmen borrows elements of a great mystery/suspense novel and mixes it with the ingredients of a summer action blockbuster.

For those readers who haven't seen the film adaptation of Watchmen yet, this writer highly recommends that you read the graphic novel first. If you've seen the movie, I still recommend that you read the graphic novel. While the recent film adaptation brings Watchmen to life with a great cast and a soundtrack featuring artists such as Bob Dylan, Simon and Garfunkel, and Jimi Hendrix, it leaves out a good portion of the history that plays a pivotal role in the graphic novel.

With mature and exotic artwork by renowned comic book artist, Dave Gibbons, one may find that Watchmen isn't their parent's typical villain of the week comic book. In the end, not only are readers left to determine the fate of the world presented at the beginning of the novel, they are also left to think about how the choices one makes can affect the world around him or her. ### THE IMPORTANCE OF FOREIGN LANGUAGE EDUCATION

While national reports indicate the need for Americans to be knowledgeable about languages other than English, only a few states actually require a foreign language to be taught in elementary schools.

Local districts are one reason foreign language is included for most elementary school programs, such as the Foreign Language in the Elementary Schools (FLES) in Pennsylvania. This program offers courses starting in primary school and continuing through high school. However, due to a lack of support from the state and federal government, districts continue to face challenges in employing programs like FLES.

The primary obstacle is the failure to recognize the benefits of early foreign language studies. It is incumbent upon school officials to stress to the state and federal government the need for graduates to be prepared to live and work in a global environment. Many language programs not only instruct students in how to speak another



language, they also enable students to be more aware and knowledgeable of other cultures they might encounter. It is also important to understand that if a child develops foreign language skills at a very early age, then they will be more adept at that language as an adult.

Clayton State University currently offers two foreign language minor programs in Spanish and French. The first classes taken for Spanish and French begin at the 2000 level, and each minor requires an additional four 3000-4000 upper level classes. Though most natives are not bilingual, obtaining a foreign language degree improves your ability to set yourself apart from others in the work place and in life. Dr. Joe Johnson, Associate Professor of Foreign Languages states, "No one has ever lost a job opportunity because they spoke a second language." Students should be enthusiastic about learning a second language since it offers better job opportunities and, perhaps, an increase in salary.


