Clayton State Now Offers Music Education Degree

Clayton State University's School of Arts & Sciences' Department of Music has a new major – Bachelor of Music in Music Education – with classes beginning this fall. The Pre-Kindergarten through 12th grade Music Education degree program is a first for Clayton State, which has long offered the Bachelor of Arts in Teacher Education designed to lead to licensure/certification in Middle Childhood Education.

Two tracks will be offered - General Music, taught by director of the program, Dr. Sharyn Battersby, and Instrumental Music, taught by newcomer Dr. Amanda Leon-Guerrero. The General Music track includes vocal, choral and general music and will enable graduates to pursue a career as a choral director or general music

instructor on the elementary, middle or high school level. The Instrumental track encompasses the necessary course work for becoming a middle school or high school band director. Graduates will be certified by Georgia's Professional Standards Commission and both tracks will prepare the graduate to pursue higher degrees in music education.

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia had previously approved the new music major, but the University wanted to wait for the Professional Standards Commission's approval this past June before offering classes. Current Clayton State students as well as incoming freshman and non-traditional students are encouraged to enroll in the program as a major or in individual

classes as electives.

The university's Concert Chorale has auditioned music and non-music majors for several years. In the same way Leon-Guerrero is hoping to appeal to the general student population as well as those interested in pursuing a music education degree for the concert band and wind ensemble.

The Spivey Hall Education Committee has been a key player in realizing this Music Education major. For more than 10 years, the committee has worked closely with the music education community in 19 metro Atlanta counties to bring programs such as the Spivey

Kevin Demmitt Named Interim Director of Clayton State Honors Program

Dr. Kevin Demmitt has been appointed interim director of Clayton State University's Honors Program.

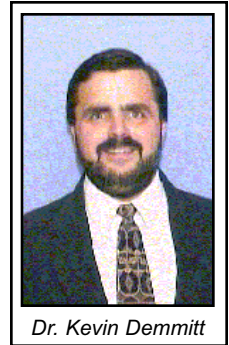
Demmitt is professor of Sociology at Clayton State and has been teaching at the University since 1994. In addition to teaching Sociology, he designed Clayton State's new Criminal Justice program and has served as the program coordinator since its inception.

"Clayton State's Honors Program challenges students who are already at the top of their class to take that extra step to fully

develop their academic and leadership potential," notes Demmitt. "Not only do Honors students benefit from smaller classes in honors sections, increased interaction with faculty, and financial scholarships, they also become connected with a community of students with similar goals and ambitions."

Demmitt replaces Dr. Gene Hatfield, chair of the University's Social Sciences Department and developer and founding director (in 1995) of the Honors Program. Under Hatfield's direction, the program has enjoyed numerous triumphs and has

made many varied contributions to the University; academically, in recruiting new students, and in service rendered to the University and the surrounding community. One of its most notable achievements came in the program's early years, when Honors Program members were the first Clayton State students to be equipped with notebook computers, in effect acting as

When you login using your new password, you can even see a map showing approximately where your ridematches are.

You can do this by:

Going to www.187RIDEFIND.com

Click on "Immediate Ridematch"

Go to the section marked "Login"

If you do not have a password yet, you can get one emailed to you. Be sure to use the email address that was on your original registration form.

Once you have logged in, you can run a carpool match, change your schedule ("Edit Your Profile"), or vary your flexibility time.

You can "View Map Match" to see where your matches are on a map.

Employees are matched with other Clayton State employees and students with other Clayton State students. The Clean Air Campaign also uses the 1-87-Ridefind database, so you only have to update your information in one place.

New Band Director to Add Wind to Music Department's Sails

Beginning Aug. 15, 2005, East Point resident Dr. Amanda Leon-Guerrero will direct Clayton State's Music Department in its first Wind Ensemble.

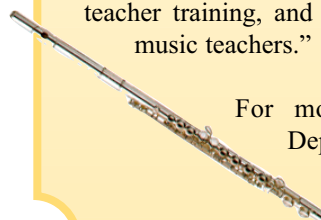
"Initially the group will be a wind ensemble," said Guerrero. However, she also intends to expose students to a variety of literature... music written specifically for bands, transcriptions from other genres, arrangements of popular music, and music featuring soloists.

Guerrero, originally from Dayton, Ohio, earned her B.M. from East Carolina University in Greenville, N.C., and her M.M. and Ph.D. in Music Education from Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill. Guerrero comes to Clayton State from Georgia State University's School of Music. Prior to teaching at Georgia State, Guerrero directed music for 17 years in various private and public schools. She spent a part of her early childhood in the Philippines and later lived in Northern Virginia (Fairfax County), where she graduated from high school.

According to Guerrero, she is intrigued and excited about being a part of the Clayton State Music Department's new music ensemble. Guerrero will also be responsible for recruiting and teaching courses for instrumental musicians.

As new band director, Guerrero is focused on establishing Clayton State, "as a quality place for young instrumentalists to pursue their musical training and teacher training, and help influence the development of outstanding young music teachers."

Clayton State to Establish Study Abroad Program in Veracruz

Clayton State University students can strengthen their Spanish skills while exploring the modern architecture and ancient ruins of Mexico in May 2006, when the University will offer its first study abroad program in Veracruz, Mexico.

Students will have the unique opportunity to study the Spanish language among the sights and sounds of Hispanic culture. *¡Veracruz te espera con los brazos abiertos!*



Offered through the University of Veracruz's Escuela para Estudiantes Extranjeros (School for Exchange Students) in downtown Xalapa, the three-week program welcomes students beyond the SPAN 1102 level of language study. Students accepted into the program will be placed in an appropriate level of study with a native Mexican teacher and can receive credit for Clayton State's SPAN 2001 or SPAN 2002 courses. A free placement exam can be conducted to determine proficiency.

Students must be at least 18 years of age to participate and must be a registered student at Clayton State University or another University System of Georgia institution. The program will run from May 9, 2006 until May 29, 2006 and is designed to fit between Clayton State's spring 2006 and summer 2006 sessions.

The total cost of the three-week program will be \$2,400, which includes the following: registration fee, including an ID and use of Universidad Veracruzana facilities; transportation fee, including Atlanta-Veracruz airfare and Veracruz-Xalapa local transportation; tuition/academic program, including instruction and materials; home

stay, including room and three meals per day; weekend field trip to the El Tajin archaeological site; medical insurance. Home stay fees are based on double occupancy. Single occupancy is available for an additional \$75. Special dietary needs can also be accommodated with advance notice and for an additional fee.

Clayton State to Offer Cuzco, Peru Study Abroad Program

Clayton State students can soon add a new international flair to their undergraduate education by taking MATH1101, Introduction to Mathematical Modeling among the sights and sounds of Peru.

In May 2006, Clayton State University will offer its first study abroad program in Cuzco, Peru, giving students the opportunity to learn math while exploring Machu Picchu, one of the world's most beautiful and mysterious ancient cities. Participants will also travel to Lima, Cuzco, and Cuzco's Sacred Valley where they will sample Peruvian culture, tour Incan temples, and enjoy Peru's Hot Springs.

Students participating in the three-week study abroad program with Assistant Professor of Mathematics Dr. Aprilly Lanz will receive three credit hours for MATH1101. Students can also receive credit for INTL2800 if approved by Clayton State's International Coordinator and the dean of the student's major.

Classes will be held mainly in Cuzco and will meet for four hours each morning. Class materials and instructions will be provided throughout the trip, and students will work in groups to apply mathematical knowledge to real world problems in Peruvian life.

Students must be at least 18 years of age to participate and must be a registered student at Clayton State University or another University System of Georgia institution. The program will run from May 11, 2006 until May 23, 2006 and is designed to fit between Clayton State's spring 2006 and summer 2006 sessions.

The total cost of the three-week program will be \$2,250. This amount includes the following: all roundtrip fares, including airport taxes; accommodations in three star hotels; all internal admission costs; continental breakfast throughout the fields and some dinners; field trips to Sacred Valley and Machu Picchu with a full time tour manager; and medical insurance.

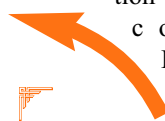

State Office Supply Agreements Enhanced

The State of Georgia is pleased to announce several enhancements to the statewide office supply agreements. Office Depot holds the statewide contract for office supplies. The State also entered into an agreement with U.S. Communities, a non profit purchasing cooperative for governmental entities for office supplies. The contract holder for U.S. Communities is Office Depot. Our Regional Suppliers are: Cajun Office Supply, Inc., Minton-Jones Supplies, Inc., Prime Office Products.

The existing core lists for both the Regional Supply Contracts and the agreement with U.S. Communities will be updated and expanded to two core lists of 350 items each, one for agency use and the other for college and university use. A core list is a group of most commonly purchased items. The Regional Office Suppliers and Office Depot's web sites will be updated by Aug. 1 to reflect this change. The core lists are considered a mandatory source for the college and university system. Clayton State University will order from the college and university system core list.

Other than choosing the particular core list, the ordering process will remain the same. Orders may be placed through company websites, fax transmissions, or telephone orders.

beta testers for the University's pioneering Information Technology Project.

"We have been able to recruit outstanding students for Clayton State. Those students have made great contributions to the University not only in the classroom, but also in service to campus and community."

According to Dr. Sharon Hoffman, Clayton State provost and vice president for Academic Affairs, a committee will be formed in the fall to conduct a search for a permanent director of the Honors Program.

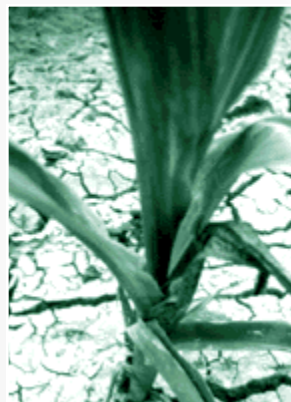

Clayton State Adds Two More to 05-06 Recruiting Class

Clayton State University women's basketball, the defending Peach Belt Conference champion, has announced the signing of two players, rounding out its recruiting class for the 2005-06 season.

Head coach Dennis Cox has announced the signing of Crystal Brown, a junior college transfer from Indian River Community College in Florida and Kim Lloyd, a junior transferring from Georgia Southwestern University in Americus, Ga.

Brown, a 5-10 forward from Fort Pierce, FL, averaged over 17 points per game at Indian River and was a two-time selection to the first team All-FCCAA Southern

Conference team. She also averaged seven rebounds per contest, while shooting 57 percent from the floor and 84 percent from the free throw line.

Lloyd, a native of Riverdale, Ga., started 25 games last year at Georgia Southwestern, averaging six points and over three assists per game. Her top game came against SCAD with 11 points, 10 assists and three steals.

Brown and Lloyd join Clayton State's national caliber recruiting class that consists of six additional newcomers to the program. Cox's other signees include: guards Roberta Phillips and Teri Willis;

forward Sharon Wiles; and posts Tracey Browne, Alecia Humphrey and Jelela Simpson.

Night Soccer on Tap for Clayton State in 2005

With a flip of the switch, Clayton State soccer matches will now be brighter in 2005.

The final steps of the installation of lights on the Clayton State University soccer field has been completed with the setting of four, 75-foot light poles on school's on-campus facility, Laker Field.

The project of setting the utility poles was a bit unique in that the poles were positioned by using a helicopter.

The lighting project could not have come at a better time for both the Clayton State men's and women's soccer programs, as excitement and expectations for the programs are at high levels with both teams coming off their best seasons in school history last year.

After Clayton State's season-opener against Belmont Abbey, the Lakers will face Queens College, a team that the Lakers prevailed over in

the NCAA Division II National Championships in a penalty kick shootout. The match will kick off on Saturday, Aug. 27 at 7:30 p.m.

"It will bring an entirely new and exciting atmosphere to our soccer matches," said athletic director Mason Barfield. "With the ability to have night soccer we will have the opportunity to draw more folks from the local community in the evening, and they will be able to enjoy the high level of soccer at the NCAA Division II level."

Clayton State's men's team will have the first opportunity to play under the lights, hosting Belmont Abbey College in the Secon Annual Laker Soccer Shootout at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 26.

The project of setting the utility poles was a bit unique in that the poles were positioned by using a helicopter. The helicopter lifted each of the 3,500 lb. poles, maneuvered to its respective corner of the field, while workers below fastened the pole to the ground. The process of setting one pole took less than 30 minutes.

The Clayton State women's team will open its season on Saturday, Aug. 27 on the road, traveling to face Newberry College. The team's first home match will be Sunday, Sept. 11 against Carson-Newman College at 2 p.m., and the squad's first match under the lights will be Saturday, Sept. 17, hosting Peach Belt Conference opponent North Georgia College & State University at 7 p.m.
