Women's Studies Minor Approved by Board of Regents

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia recently granted administrative approval for Clayton State University to establish a minor in Women's Studies (WST), effective immediately.

The Women's Studies minor will integrate social science, science and humanistic approaches by using women's experience and feminist theory to analyze themes in the humanities, fine arts, social sciences, and natural sciences. The Women's Studies minor also emphasizes the interdisciplinary study of women and gender, and is an inclusive study of women that acknowledges differences such as race, class, sexuality, and national belonging.

Clayton State's WST will include 18 course hours, including two required

Women's Studies courses, WST 2500 -- Introduction to Women's Studies, and WST 3500 -- Feminist Theory. Elective courses will be drawn from the University's English, Political Science, Health Science, Communication and Media Studies, History, Psychology and Business offerings.

Affiliated faculty for Women's Studies includes: Dr. Virginia Bonner, assistant professor of Film & Media Studies; Dr. Wendy Burns-Ardolino, assistant professor and coordinator of Integrative Studies; Dr. Gwendolyn Jones, associate professor of English; Debra Cody, R.N., assistant professor of Healthcare Management; Dr. Catherine G. Deering, professor of Psychology; Dr. J. Celeste Walley-Jean, assistant professor of Psychology; Dr. Margaret Thompson, assistant professor of

Management; and Deborah Gritzmacher, assistant professor of Health Care Management.

"Women's Studies develops students' skills of critical thinking and reading, communication and analysis, writing and research, imagination and creative expression," says Burns-Ardolino. "Women's Studies is a flexible, versatile field of study that can be used in many careers and provides students a strong education in writing, critical thinking, research, public presentation, and leadership skills that are valuable in many fields.

"In addition, many employers are increasingly aware that they need to deal with gender and diversity issues in the workplace."

On Wednesday, Feb. 28, a video, "How You Look Is Not Who You Are: Teens Talk About Eating Disorders" by the National Eating Disorders Screening

Program will be hosted by Elaina Chance from 12:30 p.m. to 1:20 p.m. in room 268 of the Baker Center.

According to Clayton State student Sheryl James, the University's NEDAW coordinator, the goals of Clayton State's programs will be to identify patterns and behaviors related to eating disorders; provide resources and educational materials associated with the awareness, diagnosis, treatments, and prevention of eating disorders and Night Eating Syndrome; and to challenge media myths and become comfortable in your "Genes." ■

Barnes Joins Dental Hygiene Faculty

Dr. W. Gail Barnes has joined the faculty of the Department of Dental Hygiene in the College of Professional Studies at Clayton State University.

Barnes comes to Clayton State from the Forsyth Dental Hygiene Program at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences in Boston, where she was program director and chairperson, and an associate professor. Prior to her time in Boston, Barnes spent nine years (1995-2004) as an assistant professor in the dental hygiene program at East Tennessee State University (ETSU) in Johnson City, Tn., where she also filled the role of assistant director. She also was an assistant professor in the ETSU Dental Hygiene program from 1988 to 1989. Between her two periods of service at ETSU, she spent six years (1989-1995) as a clinical associate in the dental hygiene program at The Ohio State University.

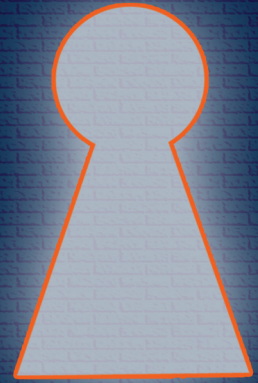
While at the Forsyth Dental Hygiene Program she worked closely with the architects to design and order equipment for the new Esther M. Wilkins Dental

Hygiene clinic, a state of the art clinic with 24 cubicles, digital pan and intraoral radiography, intraoral cameras, Dentrix paperless data collection, and faculty and staff offices.

In addition, Barnes has taught many continuing education courses and given more than 20 research-based presentations at national and regional conferences. She has authored many works in dental hygiene and dental education journals, and her mentorship of dental hygiene students has led to their publication.

Barnes received her dental hygiene credential from Howard University in Washington, DC; bachelor's and master's degrees in Dental Auxiliary Teacher Education at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill College of Dentistry; and her doctorate in Higher Education Administration from The Ohio State University. ■

Nurse Managed Clinic: *from past to present*

The Nurse Managed Clinic (NMC) has provided health care to Clayton State students since 1999.

Initially, from 1999 to 2001, two members of the nursing faculty, Susan

Campaign, and the annual Women's Health Fair. In addition, she developed a business plan for a \$5 student health fee proposal, which was approved by the students, President Dr. Thomas Harden, and the Board of Regents in 2004. The fee increased in 2005 to \$10 and then to \$24 in 2006.

The Nurse Managed Clinic gives \$1 of each health fee to pay for psychiatrist services to be available for students who may need counseling and medication management or psychiatric evaluation services.

The psychiatrist is available by appointment at the Counseling Services Department. The rest of the \$23/semester health fee allows students to receive unlimited office visits/evaluations by the registered nurse and the nurse practitioner for three months during each semester. The fee is considerably less than what the same service would cost at a doctor's office in the community... anywhere from \$50-75 per office visit.

After the approval of the health fee increases, from 2004-2006, the staffing for the clinic increased to the following: Lemons (the NMC director/nurse practitioner); medical assistant Latrice Barlow; registered nurse Caroline Richards; Gina Henderson, work study student; one part time nurse practitioner -- Teddi Vaile; and one doctor -- Dr. Travis Honeycutt, who comes three hours a week and can evaluate students, staff, and faculty for a small

co-pay fee. The NMC also has several staff members who work at the clinic part time as needed -- Shirley Cooper, clerk, Jacinta Thomas, nurse practitioner, and Valerie Spearman, registered nurse.

In 2006, the clinic was renovated and moved to room 211 of the Student Center. A new service which began in February 2007 includes providing health education seminars on the following topics: HIV/AIDS/Condom education; Cholesterol & Nutrition; and Alcohol & Drugs education. Beginning in the last week of March 2007, the NMC will offer Male's Sexually Transmitted Diseases/Women's Health Services.

The Clinic currently provides the following services:

Primary Care

Provide unlimited office visits with the Nurse Practitioner and contract doctor for a wide variety of acute care medical problems such as: colds/flu, earaches, bronchitis, sore throats, back pain, sinusitis, minor cuts, and sprains. The staff provides direct patient care, including diagnosis and treatment of illnesses and injuries.

Allergy Services

Administer injections at the direction of the student's own allergist or physician. After the allergy serum and instructions from an allergist are provided, the NMC provides a registered nurse to administer the allergy injections. Allergy testing is not done at the clinic.

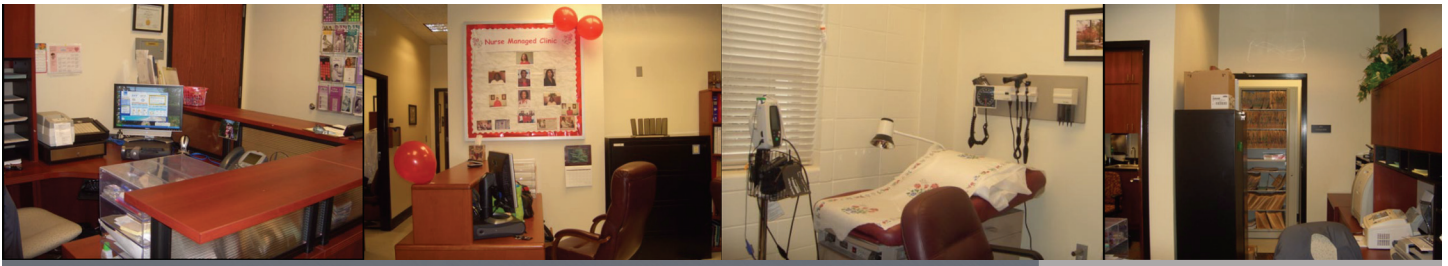

Sanner and Grace Nteff, ran the clinic several hours a week. In the fall of 2001, the School of Health Science hired a fulltime nursing faculty/nurse practitioner, Terrilyn Lemons, to develop a student clinic for Clayton State University.

The first NMC was located in room 207 of the Student Center, next to the Public Safety Office. Curtains partitioned the small area into two patient exam rooms and a lab room. Lemons, as the only healthcare provider in the NMC from 2001-2003, provided service to the 5,000 member student body. The clinic provided acute primary care services to Clayton State students, as well as to the staff and faculty.

Lemons developed NMC annual services such as the Breast Cancer Awareness Campaign, the Flu Shot

Immunizations Services

To help new students meet the Board of Regent's policy on immunization, the NMC provides measles, mumps and rubella vaccinations. Additionally, Tetanus, Menomune vaccine, Flu vaccines, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B and Twinrix injections as well as Tuberculosis skin tests are available.

Laboratory Services

Provide lab services as requested by the healthcare provider or patient

Health Education

Health clinic staff is available to provide factual information on health related topics. Provide the campus community with an opportunity to increase their knowledge and awareness of healthy lifestyles through health education literature and health fairs.

Non-Prescription Medications

Over-the-counter medications may be requested and are sold for a nominal price. These services will also be provided in conjunction with appropriate patient education.

Services included in the Nurse Managed Clinic \$23 health fee are as follows:

Routine primary care in the clinic by the Nurse Practitioner

Acute illness care

Acute injury care except for the supplies

Health education literature

Health screening- blood pressure)

Individual counseling on health issues

Lab testing (i.e., MMR titer, hepatitis b titer, Cholesterol)

Allergy Injections

Flu vaccines

Throat cultures

Cholesterol screening

Diabetes screening

Over the counter medications

Services provided for an additional cost:

Physician & Psychiatrist services for \$7 per office visit

Physical exams for \$27 each

The doctor's visits are limited time appointments.

The Nurse Managed Clinic hosted an Open House on Feb. 14 to showcase the clinic's new office space and new services. The event was a great success.

For the Open House the clinic provided free health screenings, including cholesterol, blood glucose and HIV/AIDS testing. Approximately 75 people stopped by the clinic to take part. Along with the free services, every one in attendance received a goodie bag filled with useful items, book bag, pens, pencils, notepads etc. There was lots of free food, free condoms and an opportunity to register to win other free items; two sweetheart baskets and two clinic chairs.

"It was a great day to share with the entire campus," says Lemons. ■

"A Team" Improves 5K Qualifying Times at DePauw Indoor Classic

A small contingent of the Clayton State Laker track and field athletes set three meet records, while the "A Team," Allison Kreutzer and Angela Cobb, improved their NCAA Division II qualifying chances in the women's 5,000-meter run, at the DePauw Indoor Classic.

Fresh off helping meet a NCAA Division II qualifying time the night before in the distance medley relay at Indiana University, Kreutzer and Cobb improved their times in the 5,000-meters at DePauw as Kreutzer won the event with a meet record time of 17:30.44, while Cobb finished third in 17:35.91. Both Kreutzer and Cobb have been on the 5,000-meter provisional list since the beginning of the season when they hit qualifying times at the Clemson Opener back in December.

"Allison and Angela ran strong today and improved their chances of making

the cut for the Division II indoor meet next month," said Clayton State head coach Mike Mead. "Also to their credit is the fact they had not run a 5,000m race since the Clemson meet in December."



Besides Kreutzer's win and meet record, Clayton State also got wins and meet records from Lawrence DeShields in the men's 55-meter hurdles and Ahmad Rolle in the men's triple jump. DeShields, along with Greenville College's Jarod Renford, was clocked in 7.88 in the finals of the 55-meter hurdles. In the triple jump, Rolle easily won with a leap of 45-3/4 and bettered the meet record. Rolle, who also finished second in the long jump, has previously made NCAA qualifying marks in the long and triple jumps, but was not close to his best jumps at DePauw. ■

also missed the front end of a one-and-one. Augusta State had one final opportunity to either tie or win, but a running jump shot from the free throw line was off as time expired.

Michael Sloan paced Clayton State with 22 points on 4-for-5 shooting from 3-point range, while Kelley scored 17 points on 7-for-10 shooting from the field.

The Lakers improve to 21-5 overall and 11-4 in the Peach Belt with one game remaining in the regular season.

In the women's game, defense was the difference for the Lakers, in comparison to the previous outing against Augusta State (an 84-79 defeat on Feb. 7). Clayton State put the clamps on Augusta State, holding the Lady Jaguars to only 35 percent shooting from the field, including only 31 percent from 3-point range.

Early in the second half, Augusta State trimmed the Laker lead to one point on a lay-up in transition by Jasmine Godwin. But Clayton State extended the lead back to 10 points as Lynette Jackson converted a 3-point play, and a 3-point basket by

Roberta Phillips made the Clayton State lead 60-50 with nine minutes remaining.

The lead got as high 14 points twice, and the closest Augusta State was able to trim the deficit was six points with 13 seconds remaining.

For the second straight, Nikkisha Pritchett was tremendous off the bench for Clayton State. The junior wing paced the Lakers with 14 points, while Sharon Wiles scored 10 points and Alecia Humphrey added eight points.

Clayton State closes out the regular season on Saturday, playing host to Georgia College at 5:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. It will be Senior Night for the Laker seniors playing their final games at the Athletics and Fitness Center. A win for the women will give them the regular season Peach Belt title. ■

Men Hand Eighth-ranked Jaguars First Conference Defeat; Women Clinch Share of Peach Belt Crown

Clayton State Sweeps Augusta State

Wednesday's much-anticipated men's basketball rematch between Clayton State and Augusta State will go down in the annals of the Peach Belt Conference as a "Classic," a "Classic" long-remembered a long time by Clayton State.

In the showdown between two Division II Top 25 teams, 22nd-ranked Clayton State handed eighth-ranked and Peach Belt regular season champion Augusta State its first conference defeat of the season 70-68 at the Athletics and Fitness Center. The Laker victory gives Clayton State a split in the season series as the Lakers improve

to 21-5 overall and 10-5 in the Peach Belt with one regular season game remaining. In the women's game, the Lakers rebounded successfully from Saturday's disappointing defeat at North Georgia to post a 68-61 victory, giving the also 22nd-ranked Clayton State at least a share of its second Peach Belt Conference regular season championship in the last two seasons.

In the first half of the men's game, the Lakers shot a whopping 62 percent from the field, including 57 percent from three-point range, in building an early 16-point lead and taking a 38-28 lead at halftime.

The Lakers never trailed in the second half, but had to fight off a furious Augusta State rally down the stretch.

Augusta State trimmed the lead to 69-66 on two Ben Madgen free throws with 24 seconds remaining. After Brandon Kelley made one of two free throws, the Jaguars' Kip Small converted two more to trim the Laker lead to two points with nine seconds remaining. Clayton State's Todd McLaurin was fouled on the inbounds pass with six seconds remaining, but he
